23 [Carolyn A. DeLaurentis, Esquire, Deputy Chief

24 Counsel, Prosecution Division, provided highlights of

25 the prosecution division's work during the past year.

She commended staff for their hard work to make telework successful. She noted all decisions were made thoughtfully and with the safety of all in mind.

Ms. DeLaurentis stated the Board prosecutors made every effort to monitor the restrictions, waivers, policies, and new procedures specific to the practice in each profession regarding challenges imposed on licensees by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Ms. DeLaurentis noted the Pennsylvania Licensing System (PALS) to be a lifeline. She stated the Bureau of Enforcement and Investigation (BEI) worked closely with prosecution to continue investigations and figure out the best methods during statewide shutdowns and stay-at-home orders. She also noted the Professional Compliance Office continued opening cases and processing files, and legal assistants had been working a hybrid schedule to ensure mailings and filings were completed.

Ms. DeLaurentis commented that the Board, Board staff, and counsel have adapted to virtual Board meetings. Prosecution will continue to work with all to ensure efficient and effective presentation and resolution of cases. She mentioned 2020 was a year filled with challenges, but the prosecution division led by the incredible senior staff rose to the

challenge and would continue to do so in 2021.

Ms. DeLaurentis informed the Board that 307 files
were opened in 2020 and 343 in 2019 with 234 files
closed in 2020 for the Board of Social Workers,
Marriage and Family Therapists and Professional
Counselors. She noted 301 open files as of January 1,
2021. She thanked Timothy Smith for his assistance

Ms. DeLaurentis addressed enforcement actions with 33 total cases that resulted in discipline in 2020 for the Board of Social Workers, Marriage and Family Therapists and Professional Counselors. She reported 32 warning letters, 9 fines, 10 Act 48 citation fines, 16 suspensions, 1 automatic suspension, 4 reprimands, 4 revocations or voluntary surrenders, and 5 probation cases in 2020.

Ms. DeLaurentis discussed 2020 overall prosecution as a whole. She noted 44 immediate temporary suspensions in 2020. She mentioned 3 of the 1,223 opened COVID-19 cases are for the Board of Social Workers, Marriage and Family Therapists and Professional Counselors in 2020. She reported the total number of open cases as of January 1, 2021, was 12,250. The total number of cases opened overall in 2020 was 13,394, which is down from 2019 at 16,295.

Ms. Black provided a summary of her professional background.

Ms. Wucinski addressed Act 116 of 2020 regarding carryover of continuing education credits for one biennial renewal period. She stated it would be at the discretion of the Board if they wanted to implement the carryover. She mentioned several boards had concerns regarding the time required for Board administration to calculate and audit the hours.

Ms. Matter added that the State Board of Psychology has carryover CEs already in its regulations, noted the difficulty of ensuring other biennial renewal periods and the new biennial renewal period have the correct number.

Dr. Kraus requested more information regarding why carryover was coming up at this moment. Ms. Black stated that this Act was enacted by the legislature and it gave all the Boards the discretion to offer this provision. Ms. Black referred to the Board of Psychology, noting that at its February meeting, not only did the Psychology Board vote not to adopt Act 116 but it also voted to remove the carryover provision that currently exists in their regulation.

Cynthia K. Montgomery, Esquire, Deputy Chief
Counsel/Regulatory Counsel, Department of State,
further explained that some boards were interested in
the carryover provision, but their statute did not
authorize the same, which may have prompted Act 116.

Dr. Elberfeld questioned whether the carryover was for general continuing education only. Ms.

Montgomery believed the carryover of continuing education would only be for the general continuing education, noting the need for the matter to be addressed in the regulations. She stated mandatory child abuse, suicide prevention, and ethics would need to be addressed in the regulations.

Dr. Elberfeld expressed a concern, stating the continuing education credits (CEUs) are supposed to be current. By allowing an individual to take 60 credits in 2020 and carrying those out to 2024 would not be current.

Ms. Wucinski also noted that CE carryover caused difficulties for the Board of Psychology and suggested the Board take into consideration the number of CE to be reviewed and the backlog that may be caused for the Board administrator.

Dr. Kraus commented that the goal of continuing education was not stockpiling education. He mentioned

that the 30 hours is not onerous given the current
flexibility, where all of the hours could be earned
online. He encouraged the Board to not further burden
Board administration.

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Chair Corby questioned whether it would be possible to compromise, where an individual could ask that so many credits be applied to the next biennial.

Ms. Matter commented that excess clocked hours may not be carried over to the next biennium according to the regulations.

Ms. Black explained that Board administration would have to go through the task of auditing biennium periods to determine whether or not there was an excess and if the excess could be moved forward and not specifically allocated for that year. She stated a compromise would put that burden on Board administration. She also noted that licensees who may run into an issue with CE compliance have the ability to ask for an extension or waiver.

Ms. Wucinski noted the majority of the Board was not in favor of amending the regulations to allow for the carryover and suggested the Board discuss the issue again at a later time.

Ms. Wucinski addressed Senate Bill 26 regarding prohibiting mental health professionals from engaging

in sexual orientation change efforts with individuals
under 18 years of age. She stated the bill was
referred to the Consumer Protection & Professional
Liability Committee on January 20, 2021.

Ms. Wucinski addressed Act 53 of 2020. She mentioned not having definite guidance regarding the qualifications for a health care practitioner. She expressed concern with Act 76 with the ability to diagnose. She mentioned any health care practitioners convicted of a sexual offense were automatically precluded from obtaining a license. She provided a definition of health care practitioner.

Ms. Montgomery addressed case law, where social workers are not considered health care practitioners. She stated licensed professional counselors (LPCs), licensed marriage and family therapist (LMFTs), and licensed clinical social workers (LCSWs) are health care practitioners and can diagnose and treat mental health disorders.

Ms. Montgomery recommended the Board take another look at whether to specifically designate any or all of the sexual offenses as being directly related to the profession of social work, bachelor of social work, or any of the other professions to be safe in the event of legal challenges.

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Ms. Wucinski further explained that sexual
