3 * * * 1 2 State Board of Chiropractic 3 January 17, 2019 * * * 4 5 The regularly scheduled meeting of the State 6 Board of Chiropractic was held on Thursday, January 7 17, 2019. * * * 8 9 Official Call to Order 10 [J. Gerard Halloran, D.C., Chair, called the meeting 11 to order at 9:14 a.m.] * * * 12 13 Approval of Minutes of the November 8, 2018 meeting CHAIR HALLORAN: 14 I would like to review the draft minutes 15 of November 8, 2018. Has everyone had a 16 chance to do so? 17 18 Are there any changes that you 19 would like to do? 20 [The Board discussed corrections to the minutes.] 21 CHAIR HALLORAN: 22 Are there any other changes that Board 23 members need to note? 24 Could I have a motion to accept the 25 Board minutes as corrected?

4 1 MS. BROCK: 2 Yes. 3 CHAIR HALLORAN: 4 Nikole Brock. Is there a second? 5 MS. WOODS: 6 Second. 7 CHAIR HALLORAN: 8 Merry Woods, second. All in favor, say 9 aye. Thank you. The Board minutes have 10 been approved. 11 [The motion carried unanimously.] * * * 12 13 Report of Board Prosecutor [Kimberly A. Adams, Esquire, Board Prosecutor, 14 15 presented the Consent Agreement for File No. 18-43-008427. 16 17 Paul J. Jarabeck, Esquire, Senior Prosecuting 18 Attorney, informed the Board that he will be attending 19 meetings regularly, but Kim Adams will be listed as 20 liaison.] 21 * * * 22 Report of Commissioner - No Report 23 * * * 24 Report of Board Counsel 25 [Kerry E. Maloney, Esquire, Board Counsel, stated only

a few comments were received on the exposure draft for 1 2 the delegation regulation. He may send it out again 3 for more comments or bring it back to the Board before 4 moving it forward. He also noted a hearing scheduled 5 for later in the meeting. Mr. Maloney announced this to be his last Board 6 7 meeting. Mr. Suter will be taking over as Board 8 Counsel. He will see the delegation regulation and Bennett case through and provided an update on the 9 10 Bennett case. 11 Mr. Maloney stated that animal chiropractic regulation will be discussed during Executive Session. 12 13 The Board may then decide to continue the discussion 14 in open session or at the next Board meeting. 15 Chair Halloran noted the Board's enjoyment with 16 working with Mr. Maloney.] * * * 17 18 Report of Board Chairman 19 [J. Gerard Halloran, D.C., Chair, welcomed the 20 Pennsylvania State Board of Chiropractic for 2019. 21 Chair Halloran reviewed the process for updating

22 passwords every 60 days to access state Board emails. 23 Chair Halloran advised using Adventure Travel 24 (ADTRAV) for state travel arrangements and reminded 25 Board members to use their Pennsylvania Tax Exemption

Certificate when checking into a hotel, noting the
 importance of documentation on the Travel Expense
 Reports.

Chair Halloran thanked Dr. Aukerman, Ms. Woods,
and Dr. Khoury, who is no longer with the Board, for
their travel to opioid conferences.

7 Chair Halloran and Dr. Khoury have been active in 8 traveling to the Federation of Chiropractic Licensing 9 Boards Meetings to discuss issues and discover 10 procedures to help with the regulations of the 11 chiropractic practice.

12 Dr. Swank traveled to the American Veterinary 13 Chiropractic Association Convention to discover how 14 other states are helping veterinarians and 15 chiropractors working together on the subject of 16 animal chiropractic.

17 Dr. Swank advised chiropractors who are 18 interested in this area of practice to remain patient. 19 He also commented that regulations take time and 20 cautioned against exposing oneself to unnecessary 21 legal problems with letters, advertisements, or 2.2 testimonials that become part of the public record. 23 Chair Halloran commented that the Pennsylvania 24 Chiropractic Association Counsel cautioned all 25 chiropractors, noting that they cannot legally

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delegate therapeutic exercise in their office to nonlicensed personnel. Chair Halloran stated the Pennsylvania Chiropractic Association (PCA) did an interesting survey on the subject, where a significant number of chiropractors had routinely delegated exercises to their personnel before the Superior Court ruling.

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Chair Halloran noted the need to develop a way to 8 9 work with the National Board of Chiropractic Examiners 10 so that current Board members can attend their Board 11 meetings. Chair Halloran contacted the NBCE to investigate legally sending Board members in the 12 13 future and will keep the Board informed on this issue. 14 Chair Halloran stated Dr. Khoury will represent 15 the Board at the March NBCE Meeting and may have to 16 represent the Board at the May meeting as well. 17 Chair Halloran commented that the only NBCE 18 meetings the Board can attend are the joint meetings 19 and asked the Board to approve his travel expenses to 20 the Federation of Chiropractic Licensing Boards/ 21 National Board of Chiropractic Examiners Annual 22 Meeting, May 1-5, 2019, in Mission Bay, CA. Chair 23 Halloran would be the voting delegate at the annual 2.4 meeting representing Pennsylvania.] * * * 25

[A Formal Hearing was held from 9:33 a.m. until 1 2 10:52 a.m. in the matter of the Commonwealth of 3 Pennsylvania Bureau of Professional and Occupational 4 Affairs vs. John R. Vira, File No. 17-43-12601.] * * * 5 6 Report of Regulatory Counsel 7 [Kerry E. Maloney, Esquire, Regulatory Counsel, addressed dry needling and its relation to the 8 definition of acupuncture in Pennsylvania. 9 Нe 10 commented on the differences from other states 11 regarding providing an alternative to opioids to patients as pain management. He noted a prior meeting 12 13 with the former deputy commissioner and Board Chairs and would like to continue with the delegation 14 15 regulation, needing the Commissioner's Office on this issue. 16 17 Mr. Maloney is now Counsel to the State Board of 18 Medicine and Osteopathic Medicine and will be able to 19 provide additional input on the issue. 20 Mr. Maloney discussed CE certification hours, noting 300 hours for MDs and DOs and 2400 for a person 21 without medical training. He made the argument at the 22 23 meeting that with the amount of education, training, 24 and focus chiropractors have on anatomy and the 25 nervous system as it relates to pain and traveling of

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1 pain that 300 hours would be sufficient.

Mr. Maloney also mentioned the possibility of a sublicensure class authorization, like an adjunctive procedures certificate to provide the Board the ability to regulate. He noted discussion at the meeting arguing that dry needling was acupuncture and the general definition of acupuncture, likely included dry needling.

9 Dr. Swank stated chiropractic colleges are 10 teaching students acupuncture, where they receive an 11 acupuncture licenses that may be applied in the state 12 where the college resides.

13 Mr. Maloney explained that it is two separate 14 licenses and authorizations to do two sets of 15 procedures. He stated now is the time to act, whether 16 the legislature needs to amend the Chiropractic Act or 17 change the Medical Board's regulations.] * * * 18 19 Report of Board Administrator 20 [Elizabeth Wecker, Board Administrator, noted the 21 Application for Certification to Use Adjunctive 2.2 Procedures for discussion during Executive Session.] 23 * * * 24 Old Business 25 [Elizabeth Wecker, Board Administrator, addressed the

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mandated Child Abuse Recognition and Reporting 1 2 Continuing Education under Act 31 of 2014. Ms. Wecker 3 reviewed Act 31 initial and renewal child abuse requirements.] 4 * * * 5 New Business 6 7 [Michael S. Swank, D.C., addressed his attendance at the American Veterinary Chiropractic Association 8 Conference in Dallas in November. Dr. Swank provided 9 10 a report and discussed training through specialty 11 classes, didactic class time, and hands-on adjusting. 12 Chair Halloran questioned how many states now 13 have some version of a chiropractic law that chiropractors can treat animals. 14 15 Dr. Swank referred to Oklahoma law, where a 16 chiropractor has taken 200 hours of CE credits, passed 17 the examination, are able to adjust animals 18 accurately, and maintain CE. He stated that Colorado has one in the process of being passed and Ohio has 19 20 one, but most states do not have anything on the 21 record. 2.2 Dr. Swank commented that veterinarians are upset 23 with their profession for not permitting chiropractors 24 the ability to perform this in some states. He noted 25 a list of chiropractors and veterinarians who are

within the state of Pennsylvania who have taken these
 classes and are certified.

3 Mr. Maloney questioned whether any states require 4 some sort of consultation or referral with the 5 veterinarian.

6 Dr. Swank referred to the Colorado law, where 7 there must be a referral note of some kind from a 8 veterinary doctor for the chiropractor or the 9 veterinary doctor, explaining that veterinarians can 10 do their own but have to have something in the record 11 stating why they are doing it.

Dr. Swank stated that this became a problem in Colorado, where most veterinarians are not trained on the reasons for adjustment, and the veterinary profession wants referral status as well, which seems to be the holdup.

Dr. Swank commented that the testing Board is separate from the organization, where they have their own bylaws and write their own test and do not intermix because it is a growing organization. Chair Halloran thanked Dr. Swank for his hard work, noting the possibility of having a separate committee on that issue.

24 Mr. Maloney addressed the gift ban, suggesting 25 the Board vote on the record to send Board members to

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conferences because it will already be authorized if 1 2 the gift ban changes. 3 Chair Halloran requested someone attend the NBCE 4 Annual/FCLB Annual Conference May 1-5, 2019, in 5 Mission Bay, CA. Chair Halloran will be the voting 6 member with Dr. Khoury leaving the Board. Не 7 commented that Dr. Khoury was involved with FCLB, moving up to higher leadership with them, and will be 8 9 there on his own.] 10 CHAIR HALLORAN: 11 I would like somebody to make a motion 12 that Dr. Halloran and Dr. Aukerman 13 attend the Federation Chiropractic 14 Licensing Boards and National Board of 15 Chiropractic Examiners combined annual meeting in Mission Bay, CA, May 1-5, 16 17 2019. DR. SWANK: 18 19 I make a motion that Dr. Halloran and 20 Dr. Aukerman go to the Federation of 21 Chiropractic Licensing Boards and 2.2 National Board of Chiropractic Examiners 23 Annual Convention in Mission Bay, CA, 24 May 1-5. 25 DR. MCCARRIN:

13 I'll second. 1 2 CHAIR HALLORAN: 3 Seconded by Dr. McCarrin. All in favor, 4 say aye? 5 [The motion carried unanimously.] * * * 6 7 New Business - NBCE Part IV Exam & Test Committee Schedule for 2019 8 9 [J. Gerard Halloran, D.C., Chair, addressed NBCE 10 Meetings, noting that the Board does not mesh with 11 their separate meetings rules. Chair Halloran stated 12 that the Board needs to convince the NBCE to find a 13 way through this, so the state will pay our way but 14 they will not assist on reimbursing the Board. Нe 15 asked NBCE to accept Dr. Khoury and possibly Dr. 16 McConnell if they have room for her. Chair Halloran noted that Dr. Khoury will 17 18 represent the Board at several NBCE meetings this 19 year. He was hopeful that the Board will be able to 20 send a Board member in March and to the June meetings 21 in Greeley, Colorado. Ms. Woods addressed her attendance last month at 2.2 23 the National Conference on Alcohol & Addiction in 24 Baltimore. She noted confusion with the distinction 25 between opioids and stimulants and frustration for the

1 people treating them because they cannot get the 2 doctors to be on their side. She also noted no 3 resources for minors in Maryland.

Ms. Woods noted the difficulty of introducing prevention and treatment for chiropractic when their topic was so clearly defined. She stated that she would like to attend seminars regarding prevention, treatment, and public health.

9 Chair Halloran suggested focusing on the opioid10 conference in April.

Mr. Maloney commented that there may be pushback from the administrative offices because chiropractors do not prescribe opioids and recommended noting that chiropractors treat patients for pain who are often using pain medications, opioids, or anything else in addition to seeking chiropractic treatment.

Ms. Woods suggested creating a partnership, chiropractors with athletic directors, due to the percentage of chiropractors that are athletic directors because a lot of teenagers receive sports injuries.]

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23 Miscellaneous
24 [J. Gerard Halloran, D.C., Chair, noted 2019 Board
25 meeting dates. Chair Halloran also noted proposed

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2020 Board meeting dates.] 1 * * * 2 3 DR. AUKERMAN: 4 I'll make a motion to approve these 5 Board meeting dates for 2020 as 6 proposed. 7 CHAIR HALLORAN: 8 Do I have a second? 9 MS. BROCK: 10 I second that motion. 11 CHAIR HALLORAN: 12 All in favor, say aye? [The motion carried unanimously.] 13 * * * 14 15 [The Board recessed from 10:42 a.m. until 10:52 a.m.] * * * 16 17 Miscellaneous (Continued) - Committee Assignments 18 [J. Gerard Halloran, D.C., Chair, noted Ms. Brock as 19 the Probable Cause Screening Committee contact and 20 Ms. Woods as the alternate. Chair Halloran noted no 21 changes to the Regulations Committee. He noted the 22 Board to be clear on the Opioid Committee, waiting for 23 contact from a state standpoint. He mentioned the 24 Master Committee, noting his impression from 25 Commissioner Harlow to be that it was too massive of a

committee to be effective and was unwieldy with all 1 2 the different groups on it. 3 Chair Halloran discussed the Newsletter Committee and will start working with Dr. McCarrin and 4 5 Ms. Woods, stating that he would like to have 6 newsletters online and will obtain approval from 7 Counsel and Commissioner Harlow before putting it on 8 the site. Chair Halloran noted that the Continuing 9 10 Education Review Committee was good. 11 Dr. Swank addressed graduates from schools 12 outside of the United States, non-Council on 13 Chiropractic Education (CCE). He questioned whether colleges from Canada that come to our state to do CE 14 15 can be approved since we do not take their CE. Нe noted reviewing regulations where it only states 16 17 Board-approved colleges for CE and does not state CCE 18 requirements. He noted that he approved two of those 19 for Canadian Memorial Chiropractic College. 20 Dr. Swank reviewed regulations under CE credits 21 and what is needed, noting that it just stated Board-22 approved chiropractic colleges and did not 23 specifically say CCE.

24 Mr. Maloney commented that this was the right 25 distinction between CE provider and an applicant who

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went to a Canadian chiropractic college. 1 2 Mr. Maloney questioned whether the University of 3 Pittsburgh School of Medicine College of Chiropractic 4 was anywhere near opening. 5 Mr. Nielsen stated that it was not near opening, 6 and Mike Schneider keeps him briefed on what is going 7 on. He stated that Dr. Levine, who was the Dean of the University of Pittsburgh School of Medicine, was 8 9 no longer there. He commented that he was waiting for 10 things to settle down to see if he could get support 11 of the dean and a calendar for presentation.] 12 DR. MCCARRIN: 13 I'll make a motion to approve the committee list. 14 15 CHAIR HALLORAN: 16 Dr. McCarrin has made a motion to 17 approve the committee list. Second? MS. WOODS: 18 19 Second. 20 CHAIR HALLORAN: 21 Woods, second. All in favor? 22 [The motion carried unanimously.] 23 * * * 24 Review of Applications - No Report 25 * * *
