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3 * * * 1 2 State Board of Chiropractic 3 January 28, 2021 * * * 4 5 The regularly scheduled meeting of the State Board of Chiropractic was held on Thursday, January 28, 2021. * * * 8 Official Call to Order 10 [Acting Chair McCarrin officially called the meeting to order. 11 * * * 12 [Pursuant to Section 708(a)(5) of the Sunshine Act, 13 14 the Board entered into Executive Session with Nicole 15 VanOrder, Esquire, Board Counsel, for the purpose of conducting quasi-judicial deliberations. The Board 16 17 returned to open session at 10:30 a.m.] * * * 18 19 MS. VANORDER: 20 I believe the Board would entertain a 21 motion, is that correct, in regard to 22 Item Number three. 23 DR. AUKERMAN: 24 William Aukerman. I want to make a 25 motion to Deem Facts Admitted, Case No.

20-43-001775 and instruct the Board to 1 2 draft and Adjudication and Order consistent with Executive Session 3 discussion. 4 DR. HALLORAN: 6 I second that. ACTING CHAIR MCCARRIN: 8 Let's take a vote. 9 10 McCarrin, aye; Woods, aye; Halloran, aye; 11 Coats, aye; Swank, aye; and Aukerman, 12 aye. 13 [The motion carried unanimously.] * * * 14 15 MS. VANORDER: 16 Is there a motion in regards to Item 17 Number Six on the agenda? DR. HALLORAN: 18 This is Dr. Halloran. I make a motion to 19 2.0 deny the request to rescind the Order to 21 refer case No. 18-43-011786 to a Hearing 22 Examiner. The Board believes that this 23 case should be referred to a Hearing 24 Examiner and that's the motion I'm 25 making.

5 MS. VANORDER: 2 If there are any additional questions, I 3 do note that counsel for Respondent is on the phone. 4 DR. AUKERMAN: I'd like to second the motion. 6 William Aukerman. [Kerry E. Maloney, Esquire, Post & Schell, Counsel for Respondent, discussed the matter. He stressed the 10 importance of Board members being able to see demonstrations of techniques and procedures rather 11 12 than reading them in a transcript. Dr. Halloran noted the limited amount of time to 13 14 gather evidence and spend time in Zoom meetings. 15 suggested it would be best to present the matter to a Hearing Examiner first. 16 17 Attorney Maloney suggested scheduling the hearing 18 in May or June when an in-person hearing may be 19 possible.] 2.0 ACTING CHAIR MCCARRIN: 21 Do we have anyone who wants to make a 22 motion on this issue? 23 DR. HALLORAN: 2.4 I made a motion already that we do not 25 accept the request to rescind the Hearing

Examiner. 1 ACTING CHAIR MCCARRIN: 2 3 Who was the second again? DR. AUKERMAN: 5 William Aukerman. ACTING CHAIR MCCARRIN: All in favor of Dr. Halloran's motion? Swank, aye; Woods, aye; Aukerman, aye; 8 9 Halloran, aye; Coats, aye; McCarrin, aye; 10 [The motion carried unanimously.] 11 12 BPOA CE Carryovers [Ms. VanOrder noted that the recent Act 116 of 2020 1.3 14 allows for carryover of continuing education credits 15 into the next biennial term. She stressed it was not 16 mandated. She noted there were benefits to having the 17 carryover, but also some administrative difficulties. 18 Ms. Roberts noted that allowing carryover of CEs affects audits in that it requires auditing multiple 19 20 cycles. 21 Dr. Halloran noted there was a year and a half 22 left in the current cycle for chiropractors to obtain 23 CEs without being affected by the pandemic emergency. 24 He opined there was plenty of time to get to the next

cycle and carryover was unnecessary.

Commissioner Johnson clarified that the CE carryover was not a response to the pandemic, rather it was designed to promote and encourage continuing education.

The Board discussed limits to the length of carryover.

Commissioner Johnson encouraged the Board to consider the benefits of carryover versus the administrative challenges.

Edward L. Nielsen, MHS, Executive Vice President, Pennsylvania Chiropractic Association Mr. Nielsen, (PCA), noted the organization would appreciate information from the Board on their eventual decision. He noted PCA would be happy to work with the Board, including polling members for their opinions.

The Board agreed to table the discussion until the 17 next meeting.]

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[Nicole L. VanOrder, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted the status of regulations for the Board' review in the areas of Act 41, volunteer licenses, child abuse requirements, employee liability coverage, sexual 23 misconduct, and licensure by endorsement.

Mr. McCarrin expressed interest in reviewing the delegation to exercise personnel. He noted the field 1 had lost many kinesiologists and exercise
2 physiologists due to past changes.

Ms. VanOrder offered to gather information to assist further discussion by the Board.

Mr. Nielsen offered input and insight from PCA. He noted regulations from the state board would be ideal, followed by the regulatory process and IRRC.

Ms. VanOrder asked Commissioner Johnson for recommendation in terms of further conversation on the topic with Governor's policy office or others.

Commissioner Johnson suggested framing the issue and having a discussion with policy staff.

Marc Farrell, Deputy Policy Director, Department of State noted the Department would be happy to take the issue under consideration.]

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[Mr. Nielsen requested clarification on mandatory masking versus guidelines and recommendations. He suggested it be sent out to licensees. Mr. Nielsen noted debate going on within the chiropractic community about what is really required.

Dr. McCarrin noted the requirements come from the Governor's office, rather than the state board. He noted the Board could repost the Governor's recommendations on their web page.

Keith Miller, D.C., Vice President, Pennsylvania Chiropractic Association (PCA) noted it would be helpful for a post that the Board stands by the decision of the Governor's office.

Commissioner Johnson pointed out if consumers are concerned about the practices of a licensee there are avenues to report those concerns.

Dr. McCarrin noted the Governor put out orders and the Board's job is to enforce that if someone files a complaint. He stated the most the Board could do is restate the policy on the web page.]

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  Appointment - Prosecution Division
   [Carolyn DeLaurentis, Esquire, Deputy Chief of
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12 Prosecution Division, reviewed some highlights of
  2020. She noted Prosecution Department staff has
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14 successfully handled the challenges of telework and
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  virtual hearings. She noted Board prosecutors made
16 efforts to monitor restrictions, waivers, policies and
17 new procedures.
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       Ms. DeLaurentis reported that 117 cases were
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  opened in 2020 for the Chiropractic Board and 119
20 cases were closed. She noted, as of January 1, 2021,
21 the Crane Board had 105 cases open. She thanked
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  Attorney Tim Smith for working the New Year's weekend
23 to pull the numbers.
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       Ms. DeLaurentis noted the Chiropractic Board's
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  enforcement and disciplinary actions. She stated
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there were 20 cases which resulted in discipline, 9
warning letters, 4 cases resulting in fines, 2 cases
resulting in Act 40 citation fines, 7 cases resulting
in suspension, I case resulting in automatic
suspension, 6 cases resulting in reprimands, 6 cases
resulting in revocation or voluntary surrenders and 5
cases resulting in probation.

Ms. DeLaurentis presented overall Prosecution Division information. She noted 44 immediate temporary license suspensions in 2020.

Ms. DeLaurentis presented COVID-19 complaints.

She noted 1,223 COVID-19 cases were opened in 2020, 32 of which were for the Chiropractic Board. Ms.

DeLaurentis pointed out that the Department are trying to make sure information is available for licensees.

She stated that current open cases as of January 1 for the entire office was 12,250. Total cases opened in

Dr. Halloran inquired about the nature of the violations.

2020 was 13,394 with total cases closed of 13,274.

Ms. DeLaurentis noted the allegations vary and can include violations of the Governor's orders, Secretary of Health orders, and board guidance violations.]

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25 Election of Officers

VANORDER: 15 Are there any nominations for Secretary? DR. HALLORAN: 16 17 This is Dr. Halloran. I make a motion 18 that John McCarrin be Secretary. [The Board held a discussion regarding the changed to 19 20 the nomination for Secretary.] 21 DR. HALLORAN: 22 I will amend my motion. I'm nominating 23 Bill Aukerman to be Secretary. 2.4 DR. MCCARRIN: 25 I'll second that motion.

13 MS. VANORDER: 1 Is there a vote? 2 3 Woods, aye; Swank, aye; McCarrin, aye; 4 Coats, aye; Halloran, aye; Aukerman, aye. [The motion carried unanimously.] * * * 6 [Michelle Roberts, Board Administrator, noted 2021 meeting dates. Dr. McCarrin inquired regarding appointing another 10 member to the Board. 11 Ms. Roberts noted the matter had to go through the 12 Governor's office. 13 Commissioner Johnson noted the Department was 14 working to fill board vacancies.] * * * 15 16 Old Business 17 [Dr. Halloran noted an order on the website issued by 18 Dr. Rachel Levine on April 15, 2020, which outlines directives by the Governor and the Department of 19 20 Health to wear masks, mitigate businesses with 21 sanitation and make sure patients coming in wear

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22 masks. He stated the information was readily

23 available on every state practice website.]

25 Public Comment

[Justin Miller, D.C., inquired as to minutes not being updated on website since July 2019.

Ms. VanOrder noted there had been technical difficulties with the posting the minutes.

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Ms. Roberts noted there were physical copies of minutes with corrections in the previous administrator's office. She will obtain the minutes and post them as soon as she was able to physically go into the office.

Dr. Miller asked about a letter submitted by the PCA on his behalf in July 2019 regarding the PIAA. 12 noted the organization is hindering the scope of chiropractic practice in regard to returning athletes to play. Dr. Miller inquired if there had been any further dialogue.

Dr. Halloran noted the PIAA was struggling to try to keep programs going and chiropractic issues low on their list of priorities. He advised there would likely be no action until a break in Covid issues.

Dr. Miller asked if the Board had a plan on how to handle the issue.

Dr. Halloran stated there had been conversations 23 with Board Counsel and Commissioner Johnson. He noted the Board can weigh in on the issue, but cannot take a leadership role.

Ms. VanOrder stressed that the Board needed to be careful to stay within their jurisdiction.

Mr. Nielsen remarked that PIAA was not just limiting the scope of practice, but completely restricting it.

Ms. VanOrder suggested PCA has the option to file a complaint and have the issue evaluated on the investigative/prosecutorial side.

Mr. Nielsen noted the organization will regroup and put together a complaint.]

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12 Delegation Orders

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[Ms. VanOrder commented that the Chiropractic Board does not have a standing delegation order. She noted many of the health boards have such an order in place to delegate certain cases to a Hearing Examiner.

She offered copies of delegation orders from other boards for the Chiropractic Board to review. VanOrder noted the Board could decide how broad they would like the order to be. She stated the delegation order would eliminate the need to bring every case 22 before the Board, which would allow cases to move faster.

Ms. VanOrder explained the Board would still have 25 the opportunity to review the proposed report of the

1 Hearing Examiner to decide what final decision is to 2 be made.

She noted the Board could opt to have a delegation order in place just for the length of the pandemic.

Dr. Halloran noted that in prior discussions the Board had decided to hear everything and then decide whether to delegate to a hearing examiner.

Dr. Swank and Dr. McCarrin agreed to keep the current arrangement.

Ms. VanOrder inquired if there was interest in having a short-term general delegation order for the duration of the pandemic.

Dr. Halloran noted that the Board is having regular meetings and that he felt it was not necessary.

Ms. VanOrder clarified her suggestion for the PCA to file a complaint against the PIAA, noting she was not implying that PIAA falls within jurisdiction of the agency.

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[The Board discussed a correction to date of next meeting on the agenda, noting it should be March 11, 23 2021.]
