3 * * * 1 2 State Board of Chiropractic 3 April 28, 2022 * * * 4 5 [Pursuant to Section 708(a)(5) of the Sunshine Act, at 6 10:00 a.m. the Board entered Executive Session with 7 Steven A. Mimm, Esquire, Board Counsel, to have attorney-client consultations and for the purpose of 8 conducting quasi-judicial deliberations. 9 The Board 10 returned to open session at 11:30 a.m.] * * * 11 [Steven A. Mimm, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted the 12 13 meeting was being recorded, and those who continued to 14 participate were giving their consent to be recorded. 15 Mr. Mimm informed everyone that the Board met in 16 Executive Session to have attorney-client consultation 17 and for the purpose of conducting quasi-judicial 18 deliberations prior to the Board meeting.] * * * 19 20 Official Call to Order 21 [Joseph Gerard Halloran, D.C., Chair, called the meeting to order at 11:31 a.m.] 22 23 * * * 24 Introduction of Board Members 25 [Chair Halloran requested an introduction of Board

4 1 members.] * * * 2 3 Adoption of the Agenda 4 CHAIR HALLORAN: 5 I make a motion that we approve the 6 agenda as posted for this meeting. 7 Does anybody second it? 8 DR. SWANK: 9 Second. 10 CHAIR HALLORAN: Let's do a roll call vote for this. 11 12 13 Dr. Halloran, aye; Dr. Swank, aye; Dr. 14 Aukerman, aye; Kelsie Coats, aye; 15 Commissioner Claggett, aye. 16 [The motion carried unanimously.] * * * 17 Approval of minutes of the February 24, 2022 meeting 18 19 CHAIR HALLORAN: 20 The next item on the agenda is approval 21 of the minutes. I've had a chance to 2.2 review them. I found no problems that I 23 could see. 24 Does anybody else have an objection 25 after reviewing the minutes from the

5 February 24, 2022 Board meeting? 1 With no objections that I can see, 2 3 I'm going to make a motion that we 4 accept the draft minutes of February 24, 2022. 5 6 Do I have a second on that? 7 DR. AUKERMAN: 8 Second. 9 CHAIR HALLORAN: 10 Let's do a voice vote on that. 11 12 Dr. Halloran, aye; Dr. Swank, aye; Dr. 13 Aukerman, aye; Kelsie Coats, aye; 14 Commissioner Claggett, aye. 15 [The motion carried unanimously.] * * * 16 Report of Prosecution 17 18 [Colby B. Widdowson, Esquire, Board Prosecutor, 19 presented the Consent Agreement for Case No. 18-43-20 010822.1 21 CHAIR HALLORAN: 2.2 I will make a motion in regards to Case 23 No. 18-43-010822. I recommend that we 24 accept the Consent Agreement and Order 25 in connection to that case.

6 Do I have a second? 1 2 MS. COATS: 3 I second. CHAIR HALLORAN: 4 5 We have to vote on this by voice vote. 6 7 Dr. Halloran, aye; Dr. Swank, aye; Dr. 8 Aukerman, aye; Kelsie Coats, aye; 9 Commissioner Claggett, aye. 10 [The motion carried unanimously. The Respondent's 11 name is Moses Jevicky, D.C.] * * * 12 13 Report of Acting Commissioner 14 [Arion R. Claggett, Acting Commissioner, Bureau of 15 Professional and Occupational Affairs, informed Board 16 members that the department is currently in the 17 process of replacing the Pennsylvania Licensing System 18 (PALS) and should have the new system identified and 19 in place by the end of 2023.] * * * 20 21 Report of Board Counsel - No Report 22 * * * 23 Report of Board Chair 24 [Joseph Gerard Halloran, D.C., Chair, thanked Dr. 25 Michael Swank for chairing the Chiropractic Regulatory

Meeting earlier today and noted looking forward to Dr.
Swank's direction at future regulatory meetings as the
Board performs its regulatory duties for the state of
Pennsylvania.

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5 Chair Halloran reminded Board members to file 6 their financial responsibility statements online by 7 May 1, 2022.

Chair Halloran informed everyone that masks and 8 9 COVID sanitation is still required at all medical 10 offices around the state of Pennsylvania, and local 11 laws that relax mask mandates do not apply to the 12 chiropractic and medical community. He commented that 13 everyone should observe COVID protocols since the 14 start of the COVID pandemic in chiropractic offices 15 until the Pennsylvania Department of Health tells them 16 otherwise.

17 Chair Halloran reminded all chiropractors who 18 practice animal chiropractic in the state of Pennsylvania that they can only practice chiropractic 19 20 on animals under the supervision of a veterinarian. 21 He stated the Pennsylvania veterinary law allows vets 22 to utilize the services of other medical specialties 23 if the treatment is likely to be beneficial to an 24 animal.

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Chair Halloran thanked Dr. Kathleen McConnell, a

prior Board chair, for representing the state of
Pennsylvania in assisting with the National Board of
Chiropractic Examiners Exam Part IV in New York.

Chair Halloran noted he and Dr. Aukerman would be 4 5 representing the state of Pennsylvania at the combined 6 Federation of Chiropractic Licensing Boards and 7 National Board of Chiropractic Examiner Meetings in Denver, CO, May 5-8, 2022. He mentioned there are 8 9 many meetings on regulation, public protection, and 10 chiropractic education and would report on those 11 meetings in June.

12 Chair Halloran thanked Ms. Roberts and Ms. Van 13 Order for their work on the State Board of 14 Chiropractic. He anticipated work with the new Board 15 staff and Commissioner Claggett would be efficient and 16 fruitful as before with other members.

17 Chair Halloran commented that the State Board of 18 Chiropractic is missing two public members and two 19 professional members, noting the importance of 20 starting the process of identifying qualified members 21 to fill those roles and have them approved.

22 Chair Halloran thanked Dr. John McCarrin, who 23 retired from the State Board of Chiropractic, for his 24 leadership, dedication, and insight.]

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Report of Board Administrator - No Report 1 * * * 2 3 New Business 4 CHAIR HALLORAN: 5 I make a motion that we nominate Dr. Kathleen McConnell to represent the 6 7 state Board at the Part IV Examinations 8 for the National Board of Chiropractic 9 Examiners in New York City. 10 Do I have a second? 11 DR. AUKERMAN: I'll second it. 12 CHAIR HALLORAN: 13 Let's do a voice vote for that as well. 14 15 16 Dr. Halloran, aye; Dr. Swank, aye; Dr. 17 Aukerman, aye; Kelsie Coats, aye; 18 Commissioner Claggett, aye. 19 [The motion carried unanimously.] * * * 20 21 Miscellaneous 22 [Joseph Gerard Halloran, D.C., Chair, referred to 23 correspondence from Dr. Victor Rizzo concerning a 24 proposed amendment to § 5.62 of the regulations 25 regarding auxiliary personnel who may perform

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1 radiological procedures.

2	Victor J. Rizzo D.C., Radiology Working Group
3	Chairman, Pennsylvania Chiropractic Association;
4	Chiropractic Representative, Radiation Protection
5	Advisory Committee, Pennsylvania Department of
6	Environmental Protection, discussed his role in
7	creating a better environment for chiropractors who
8	take X-rays, including lowering the fees for X-ray
9	tubes significantly.
10	Dr. Rizzo mentioned also being an American
11	Chiropractic Registry of Radiologic Technologists
12	(ACRRT) instructor for the state of Pennsylvania and
13	Virginia. He referred to § 5.62 regarding auxiliary
14	personnel, noting chiropractic assistants have to take
15	the ACRRT Exam unless they are X-ray technicians.
16	Dr. Rizzo stated ACRRT was in disarray with the
17	passing of Dr. Pyzik. He proposed the Board consider
18	the addition of "and/or" and having a state-sponsored
19	X-ray program if ACRRT is not available. He mentioned
20	that other states changed to that and he would like to
21	have an option for chiropractors in Pennsylvania whose
22	staff wants to take X-rays, are willing to take
23	classes, and are able to take a state-sponsored exam.
24	
25	Dr. Rizzo commented that he would like to see a

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1 36-hour course and an exam approved by the state Board 2 as an option for staff. He mentioned ACRRT has total 3 control of the program and is not in a good situation 4 right now. He noted candidates wanting to take the 5 exam in May, but there was no exam.

6 Dr. Rizzo addressed the possibility of having the 7 ACRRT program with the new person they hired as 8 executive vice president but also having another 9 option with a state-sponsored program if this person 10 decides to back out.

11 Keith Miller, D.C., President-elect/Legislative 12 Chair, Pennsylvania Chiropractic Association, thanked Dr. Rizzo for his work at the state level to reduce 13 14 the cost of X-ray tubes by getting chiropractors 15 properly classified separately from other facilities. 16 He noted the reduction in the cost of X-rays for 17 offices should increase utilization again for 18 chiropractic X-rays in the state for the first time in 19 several years.

Dr. Miller expressed concern with the burden on doctors' offices, especially the current hiring problems, where offices that were utilizing chiropractic assistants (CAs) who were able to go through ACRRT might not be able to take a test for a year. He noted that having multiple paths makes

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1 sense.

2	Dr. Miller addressed complaints from doctors and
3	the public who have taken the ACRRT Exam, where some
4	of the questions are not only ambiguous, but sometimes
5	there has been more than one positive answer. He
6	mentioned other certifications, where being observed
7	by a chiropractor when taking X-rays and signing off
8	on them as being proficient in lieu of taking a
9	written exam would also be fine for PCA as part of an
10	internal state-run 36-hour program.
11	Chair Halloran suggested Dr. Rizzo send Ms.
12	McNeill a concrete proposal to be placed on the agenda
13	for discussion at the Chiropractic Regulatory Meeting
14	on June 30. He also asked him to send ACRRT materials
15	with his comments and recommendations.
16	Chair Halloran also thanked Dr. Rizzo for the
17	time he spent on chiropractic evaluation and
18	<pre>treatment.]</pre>
19	* * *
20	Public Comment
21	[Keith Miller, D.C., President-elect/Legislative
22	Chair, Pennsylvania Chiropractic Association, asked
23	whether the Department of Health could provide
24	something that states providers should still be
25	wearing masks. He commented that the Department of

Health website only states to follow the Centers for
Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) Guidelines, which
is becoming a difficult debate with members.

4 Chair Halloran informed everyone that he consults 5 with the Department of Health a day before a Board 6 meeting and knows there have been no changes for any 7 medical group. He stated health care professionals 8 mistakenly follow local business rules that are not 9 health care rules.

10 Chair Halloran mentioned that health care was the 11 first one to adopt harder rules and would be the last 12 one to come off those rules, especially with Omicron 13 BA.2 starting to surge throughout the United States.

14 Chair Halloran encouraged everyone to follow the 15 guidance in the chairman's report because the 16 chiropractic profession is not exempt and still 17 required to follow CDC Guidelines, including masks and 18 sanitization.

Dr. Miller asked whether a request could be made through the state Board to have the Department of Health put out updated guidelines that all medical practices should at this time maintain mask mandates regardless of local ordinances.

24 Chair Halloran reported only 32 COVID-related 25 complaints regarding chiropractors from staff and

patients out of 1,032 complaints. He commented that 1 2 chiropractors are doing a good job and should continue 3 to follow state guidelines until told differently for 4 the safety of patients, employees, and themselves. 5 Acting Commissioner Claggett did not think the Department of Health would be inclined to send out 6 7 letters with their masking guidelines but would refer 8 people to their website. 9 Chair Halloran emphasized the importance of 10 following the laws and guidelines from the 11 Pennsylvania Department of Health concerning mandates for all medical offices.] 12 13 * * * 14 Adjournment 15 CHAIR HALLORAN: 16 Does anybody want to make a motion to 17 adjourn this meeting? DR. AUKERMAN: 18 19 I'll make a motion to adjourn the 20 meeting. 21 DR. SWANK: 2.2 Second. 23 CHAIR HALLORAN: 24 Let's do a voice vote on that. 25
