Gerard Halloran, D.C., Chair, called the meeting 11 to order at 9:08 a.m.] \* \* \* 12 13 Approval of Minutes of the July 19, 2018 meeting 14 CHAIR HALLORAN: 15 Are there any corrections that anybody 16 needs to change or ask questions about 17 the minutes of the last Board meeting? 18 Could I have a motion to accept the Board minutes? 19 20 DR. AUKERMAN: 21 I'll make a motion to approve the 22 minutes of July 19. 2.3 CHAIR HALLORAN: 24 Do I have a second? 25 MS. WOODS:

Second. 1 2 CHAIR HALLORAN: 3 Everyone in favor, say aye. These Board 4 minutes have been approved for the last 5 Board meeting. 6 [The motion carried unanimously.] \* \* \* 8 Report of Board Prosecutor [Paul J. 1 Report of Board Chairman

[J. Gerard Halloran, D.C., Chair, and Dr. Khoury attended the Federation of Chiropractic Licensing Boards District III Meeting in September.

Chair Halloran noted discussion concerning the Chiropractic Board's responsibility to inform state medical agencies on chiropractic assistance with the opioid crisis.

Chair Halloran noted veterinary and chiropractic cooperation in chiropractic states becoming stricter with criminal background checks when licensing chiropractors, reciprocity of more licenses between states, and online continuing education.

Chair Halloran addressed temporary treatment licenses for chiropractors and their own medical staff traveling from city to city.

Chair Halloran noted a concern for the regulatory medical-legal and ethical problems occurring in chiropractic multidisciplinary clinics that the Board will be considering in the future.

Chair Halloran stated the delegation of chiropractic duties should be defined by the Board, noting that Drs. McConnell and McCullough attempted to have the Chiropractic Board define the practices to be delegated by a chiropractor in 2007. He noted that

the Superior Court ruling does not just affect chiropractors but may affect other professions as well.

Chair Halloran noted that Dr. Swank would be attending the American Veterinary Chiropractic Convention to gather information on the coordination between chiropractic and veterinary professions. He stated the Chiropractic Board was in the process of obtaining information on the similar practices of other states, as well as their difficulties and solutions.

Chair Halloran commented that the Board intends to send Ms. Woods to the opioid conference in Baltimore so that the Board can continue to be educated on the opioid crisis. It was noted that Board members placed on the Pennsylvania State Opioid Committee over a year ago had not yet been contacted.

Chair Halloran noted the importance of helping fellow chiropractors with licensing issues but also noted the need to preserve the integrity of the Chiropractic Board.

Chair Halloran stated that associations should nominate a slate of Board members from the eastern, central, and western parts of the state so that a Board representation balance can be maintained.

Chair Halloran discussed the need to consider introducing rules and regulations to govern the relationship between the student doctor, the supervising chiropractor, and the patient now that student doctors of chiropractic will be permitted to learn from experienced doctors of chiropractic.

Chair Halloran noted the need to outline a desirable practice environment and to clearly work with the chiropractic colleges and the supervising chiropractors to use the framework of the recently passed legislation.]

Appointment - Pennsylvania Chiropractic Association

[Edward Nielsen, MHS, Executive Vice President,

Pennsylvania Chiropractic Association, addressed the

issue of delegation, noting the State Farm vs. Cavoto

decision. Mr. Nielsen stated PCA supports the

exposure draft from Mr. Maloney regarding a delegation

to unlicensed personnel relative to therapeutic

exercise.

Mr. Nielsen noted that PCA has taken no position concerning certified chiropractic assistants but will provide the Board with information at a later date.

Chair Halloran requested doctors in the audience to briefly explain issues they were encountering with

the recent Superior Court Decision.

Marc Belitsky, D.C., Broomall Total Health, addressed the recent ruling by Judge G. Michael Green of Delaware County regarding a case between an insurance company and a single chiropractor, interpreting the state law and Chiropractic Practice Act and changing the scope and way chiropractic care would be rendered in the Commonwealth.

Dr. Belitsky stated that chiropractors have been treating patients with the ability to delegate therapeutic exercise since Practice Act 188 in 1986. He commented that, if the judge's opinion overrides the Practice Act, it will negatively change the course of chiropractic and limit the ability of chiropractors to practice and help patients. He discussed being restricted to a one-on-one doctor-patient encounter without staff assistance causing a reduction in the number of patients to be evaluated.

Dr. Belitsky contacted legislators, state senators, and state representatives, who expressed confusion on how this happened. He requested that the Board expedite the exposure draft on behalf of thousands of chiropractors, patients, and chiropractic employees who do not want to lose their jobs.

Mr. Maloney explained that the regulatory process

would take longer than a few months. He commented that the new draft was detailed and has a better chance of moving forward than the one from 2007-2008.

Mr. Belitsky stated this was causing confusion with practicing professionally, ethically, and within the scope of practice.

Mr. Maloney commented on the Board's opportunity to expand and/or clarify the Act and the regulations.

Chair Halloran suggested continuing to send letters to congressmen and senators, noting that this type of urgency would make a difference.

Chair Halloran questioned whether the

Pennsylvania Chiropractic Association had their legal
counsel working on proper practice under this law.

Mr. Nielsen stated that General Counsel had taken a
position, given how aggressive State Farm was in their
prosecution of this issue, informing the Board of

PCA's recommendation of not delegating to unlicensed
personnel.

Jason Lazaroff, D.C., Maxcare Chiropractic LLC, addressed chiropractic acute care and the ability to keep patients off of narcotics. He discussed current restrictions causing patients to leave his practice and return to medications.

David Nadler, D.C., David W. Nadler & Associates,

is the team chiropractor for World Team Tennis with Billie Jean King and has been working as the team doctor/chiropractor for the Philadelphia Wings the last 17 seasons. Dr. Nadler stated the delegation issue has been problematic and concerning with only being able to be with one player at a time.

Dr. Nadler mentioned being a chiropractor for the Women's World Cup in 2003 and the Men's Gold Cup in 2010 as an integral part of the medical staff. He stated his counterparts in the allopathic and osteopathic profession have free reign in terms of delegation.

Michael Bennese, D.C., Synchrony ChiroCare, noted his concern for being vulnerable in the future to other issues when one judge can singlehandedly change the practice of chiropractic.

Brian M. Epp, D.C., Performance Chiropractic & Rehabilitation, explained he is a chiropractor with a background in physical therapy and athletic training, along with performing neurological testing for many years. He also practiced acupuncture under his state license in Colorado. Dr. Epp returned to Pennsylvania in 2009 and expressed his concern upon learning of the ensuing limited scope of practice for chiropractors. He commented that chiropractors are being devalued to

the point of being considered no better than a

licensed massage therapist. He expressed his

dissatisfaction with the chiropractic profession just

taking the position to sit back and wait until the

profession becomes further eroded just because of one
loss with State Farm.

Patrick Borja, D.C., The Spine & Wellness Center, discussed financial loss, stating that 50 percent of new patients are referred by medical doctors.

Referrals will be decreased with the possibility of reduction in staff.

Chair Halloran noted difficulties with dealing with multiple levels of regulatory commissions and agencies but noted that the Board will go forward on this issue with a regulatory solution. He commented that the more chiropractors who come forward into a venue like this the better.

Chair Halloran commented that the current exposure draft is more sophisticated and more targeted than the one in 2006-2007 and is targeted to the point where it will help chiropractors in need right now with delegation issues. He stated the language in the regulations is streamlined to clarify this point and protect chiropractors to practice the way our law intended.]

Crystal LaClair presented before the Board in support of Dr. Smolensky. She referred to her letter previously sent to the Board for further discussion of Dr. Smolensky's dedication and compassion with regard to the chiropractic care provided to her cat.

David Smolensky, D.C., presented before the Board in support of his Petition. He provided a summary of his professional and educational background, including being certified by the Animal Chiropractic Certification Commission.

Dr. Smolensky stated the objective of the American Veterinary Chiropractic Association (AVCA) program is to cross train human chiropractors and veterinarians in locating, analyzing and adjusting vertebral subluxation. He provided examples of some of the animal chiropractic care he has provided.
