3 \* \* \* 1 2 State Board of Chiropractic 3 July 20, 2017 \* \* \* 4 5 The regularly scheduled meeting of the State 6 Board of Chiropractic was held on Thursday, July 20, 7 2017. \* \* \* Official Call to Order 10 [John E. McCarrin, DC, Chair, called the meeting to 11 order at 9:07 a.m.] \* \* \* 12 13 Appointment 14 [Rachel Levine, M.D., introduced herself to the Board 15 as the current Acting Secretary of Health and the Physician General for Pennsylvania. Dr. Levine stated 16 17 Secretary Karen Murphy left the Department of Health 18 to take a position at Geisinger Health System. 19 Dr. Levine addressed the opioid crisis in 20 Pennsylvania. Dr. Levine noted that statistically in 2016 that were 4,812 deaths from overdoses, 3,500 in 21 22 2015, and 2,500 in 2014. She further reported that 23 the 58,000 to 59,000 Americans who will die of 2.4 overdoses is consistent with the number of Americans 25 killed during the entire course of the Vietnam War.

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pr. Levine stated that changes introduced 20 years ago by the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services and the Joint Commission resulted in healthcare professionals doing a better job assessing and treating pain. She discussed the fact that powerful long-acting opioid pain medications, such as OxyContin, which were marketed as being non-addicting, was proven to be completely false. The dangers of synthetic opioids, such as fentanyl and carfentanyl compounds, were also discussed.
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Dr. Levine explained the networking between the Public Health Department and the Office of the Attorney General, Pennsylvania State Police, Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), and High Intensity Drug Trafficking Areas (HIDTA).

Dr. Levine reviewed several initiatives, including opioid stewardship, core competency, continuing education credits for prescribers and dispensers, prescribing guidelines, and the revision of the chronic non-cancer pain guidelines. Dr. Levine invited a member of the Chiropractic Board to attend committee discussion regarding the treatment of chronic pain without opiates. She provided her email address as ralevine@pa.gov.

Dr. Levine addressed the state's comprehensive

prescription drug monitoring program as well as the naloxone (Narcan) rescue, which can be either an inhaler or injection. There was discussion with regard to The Warm Handoff Clinical Pathway Program, which seeks to aid individuals suffering from addiction, as well as provide treatment options.

Dr. Levine answered questions regarding the nonprescription treatment options and whether or not she foresees any legislation or regulations relating to the treatment of pain without the use of opioids. She referred to different modalities used to treat chronic pain, including chiropractic care, osteopathic care, biofeedback, acupuncture, the use of TENS units, occupational therapy, and physical therapy. Dr. Levine addressed inpatient and outpatient insurance coverages for treatments.

Dr. Levine discussed Pennsylvania Coordinated Medication-Assisted Treatment or PACMAT, which she referred to as the health systems as the hub and their primary care networks as the spokes. She further explained the primary care doctors would write the prescriptions, but the health systems would be conducting the case management and care.

Dr. Levine stated there are 45 Centers of Excellence located throughout the state, which are

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   Robert A. Cavoto, Jr., who presented an overview as to
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   the lack of clarity in the regulations. He discussed
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   the potential economic implications for chiropractors
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   as a result of his recent court decision entered in
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his lawsuit against State Farm Insurance.

Mr. Nielsen referred Board members to Judge Green's decision, specifically pages 15 and 16, which provided a declaration as to specialized findings by licensed chiropractors. He discussed the McKinsey Documents, which depict the claims process and their impact on insurance companies, as well as the process for insurance companies to turn their PIP or medical department into a profit center.

Dr. Cavoto urged the Board to support him in this matter. The Board will further discuss the matter during Executive Session.]

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[Mr. Nielsen reviewed a decision from December of 2015 by a county judge relating to the scope of practice and the delegation to unlicensed assistant personnel, who is considered unlicensed personnel, and the standards of training.

He explained that should this law stand and the State Board not provide further clarification of the regulations, the economic fallout in terms of access to chiropractic care will be seriously compromised.

Chair McCarrin stated the Board would further discuss the best method by which to handle the matter.]
