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5 [Pursuant to Section 708(a)(5) of the Sunshine Act, 6 at 9:00 a.m. the Board entered into Executive Session 7 with Sean C. Barrett, Esquire, Board Counsel, for the 8 purpose of conducting quasi-judicial deliberations on 9 a number of matters currently pending before the 10 Board and to receive the advice of counsel. The 11 Board returned to open session at 10:30 a.m.]

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The regularly scheduled meeting of the State
Board of Cosmetology was held on Monday, July 31,
2023. Tammy Y. O'Neill, Chairperson, Professional
Member, called the meeting to order at 10:33 a.m.

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[Sean C. Barrett, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted the Board entered into Executive Session for the purpose of conducting quasi-judicial deliberations on a number of matters pending before the Board and to receive the advice of counsel.

Mr. Barrett also noted the meeting was being recorded and voluntary participation constituted consent to be recorded.]

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2 Roll Call/Introduction of Attendees

3 | [Valerie Eaton, Board Administrator, provided a roll

4 | call of Board members and introduction of attendees.]

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[Arion R. Claggett, Acting Commissioner, Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs, announced that the Board did not have a quorum present and would not be able to vote on the items on the agenda. He noted items 1 through 29 and items 31 through 51 would not be voted on again due to a lack of a quorum being present but would be placed on September's agenda.

Acting Commissioner Claggett informed everyone that the Board would be able to have the presentations scheduled on the agenda and allow time for any public comments.]

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18 | Appointment - Introduction

19 [Michael McDonald, Policy Director, Department of

20 State, introduced himself and provided a brief

21 history of his professional background. He informed

22 everyone that the policy office works with all of the

23 program areas and licensing boards and commissions to

24 | handle a myriad of tasks involving research.

25 Mr. McDonald noted working closely with Board

1 | Counsel to help review and draft regulations or

- 2 | implement a new policy. He also noted the research
- 3 going on to review the practices in other
- 4 jurisdictions and across Pennsylvania that could have
- 5 | an impact on the licensing population or citizens of
- 6 Pennsylvania.
- 7 Mr. McDonald encouraged Board members to consider
- 8 him or Deputy Policy Director Andrew LaFratte as a

- 23 [The Board was asked whether it was legal to refuse
- 24 clients with diseases and referred to the Americans
- 25 | with Disabilities Act (ADA) Section 20 Part B.

Mr. Barrett informed everyone that the Board cannot provide a legal opinion or interpretation of the law and suggested she speak to a private attorney.

Debbie Eckstine-Weidner, Cosmetology Instructor,
Cumberland Perry Vo-Tech, asked whether someone who
is going to be taking their nail and esthetics
program and would like to take the teacher's program
needs to take the teacher's test twice to be licensed
to teach both programs since it is the exact same
test.

- Mr. Barrett believed the test would need to be taken only once under their laws.
- Ms. Eckstine-Weidner commented that someone could teach anything they are licensed for in the industry once they have a teacher's license.
- Mr. Barrett noted they could teach as far as the limited license.
 - Ms. Eckstine-Weidner asked whether someone would be able to teach cosmetology if they decide to do that at a later time.
 - Mr. Barrett again noted it would be an advisory opinion in terms of a specific instance or student. He stated someone would need the 500-hour course and be licensed in that profession to be a teacher. He

mentioned that typically someone does not need to retake it multiple times once they have that teacher authorization.

Ms. Eckstine-Weidner asked why a nail tech would not be able to rent in a barbershop to do nails if a cosmetologist can rent in a barbershop who is licensed to do nails.

Mr. Barrett noted that question to also be a legal or advisory opinion and suggested she consult the law and regulations or seek legal advice.

Ms. Eckstine-Weidner was moving her school after over 30 years to another location and asked whether she would be able to get that location inspected while the other school was still finishing up students.

Chair O'Neill explained that the new location would require a new application for licensure, but the current location would still be valid.

Mr. Barrett believed it to be possible if she applies while the current license is open.

Ms. Eckstine-Weidner asked whether she would need to submit everything all over again as if it were a new school or whether the curriculum automatically goes to the other location.

25 Chair O'Neill commented that a new location

1 indicates a new business or facility and would
2 require all new documentation.

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- Ms. Eckstine-Weidner asked whether two restrooms are still required since men and women can now use the same restroom.
- 6 Mr. Barrett mentioned that the question has come 7 up before but is a matter of regulatory
- 8 | interpretation and would also be an advisory opinion.
- 9 He suggested she refer to the law and regulations
 10 and any other statutes governing restrooms, such as
 11 the Uniform Commercial Construction Act.
 - The Board was asked whether she has to provide service to people who go against her religion, including satanism.
- 15 Mr. Barrett again noted there are legal 16 implications, and the Board cannot answer the 17 question but suggested she seek legal advice.
 - The Board was asked who provides translator services during examinations.
- Ms. Eaton stated anyone looking for translator services for an examination should contact Pearson VUE and apply themselves when scheduling the exam.
- 23 Mr. Barrett informed everyone that they could 24 contact the Board if they become aware of any type of 25 discrimination.]

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Appointment - Pennsylvania Department of Education
[Nicole Campbell, Coordinating Secretary, State Board of Private Licensed Schools, Pennsylvania Department of Education, informed Board members that private licensed schools are interested in putting in applications for program approval containing things that they would consider related to cosmetology but some that are not included in the regulations.

Ms. Campbell presented to the Board to review some of the applications and asked for insight as to whether or not it is something they could approve, the Board could approve, or State Board of Medicine approve.

Mr. Barrett informed Ms. Campbell that the Board cannot give an advisory opinion or run down a checklist to say what is good or not. He explained that the Board could only consider that as part of an application and deliberate on it. He stated all matters would have to be pending before the Board and the Board cannot give an advisory opinion as to any services that may or may not be related to cosmetology and whether or not that would be appropriate. He mentioned that it would require a full Board vote and a quorum was not present.

Nancy Decker, Chair, State Board of Private

Licensed Schools, explained that they were not sure

where to go to find the answers regarding the program

applications with a variety of medical services,

including microdermabrasion and laser treatments.

Chair O'Neill commented that many of those services do not fall under the scope of cosmetology.

Ms. Campbell referred to proposed legislation to include dermaplaning and asked whether the Board had any involvement.

Mr. Barrett explained that legislation is the purview of the General Assembly and not the Board and he could not give a projection or prediction of what is going to happen. He noted that the Board would be willing to deal with that if it becomes a reality and the definitions and the Cosmetology Act are changed.

Ms. Decker commented that individuals are coming to the Private Licensed School Board asking for the procedures, which the Board knows nothing about. She mentioned that it is not in their purview and do not want to be tasked with approving procedures that really need to be practiced under the State Board of Cosmetology or under the State Board of Medicine.

Ms. Decker explained that they wanted the Board's opinion to see if they are in line with their

thinking because they believed they would be getting
more schools asking if they start approving the
applications because salons see it as another source
of revenue.

Mr. Barrett commented that many of those services would require another type of licensure under the act and regulations and would not necessarily be inclusive of those. He stated the definition of cosmetology is clear as to whether those services would fit within that definition. He mentioned that the General Assembly could change that, but everyone has to follow the current language.

Ms. Decker discussed being clear that the State Board of Cosmetology does not approve this, but a school is asking whether it could be done under a physician's license, where maybe it should be State Board of Medicine approval as opposed to Private Licensed School Board approval.

Mr. Barrett noted the State Board of Medicine would be contacted for their opinion, because the State Board of Cosmetology cannot say one way or another without a quorum. He suggested looking at the definition of cosmetology because the Board abides by the definitions in terms of a curriculum within their act.

Mr. Barrett referred to a comment about a non-cosmetology school teaching medical esthetics and stated there was no such thing as a medical esthetics license in their statutes and regulations. He noted the Board does not have a definition of medical esthetics and to check with the Board of Medicine.

Ms. Decker commented that the State Board of Cosmetology has been helpful in confirming that this does not come under their Board, and the Board would continue to determine the best direction for the programs. She asked when the Board would be able to fill their open seat to be closer to a quorum.

Acting Commissioner Claggett discussed their work on soliciting new Board members, but there was a lack of a quorum because three Board members could not attend.

Ms. Decker thanked the Board for their time and cooperation, noting they are all trying to do what is best for the students and consumer population.]

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Appointment - Pennsylvania Insurance Department Pennie Health Insurance Presentation
[Scott Yeager, Outreach Manager, Pennie, presented to
the Board to provide information about the

25 Pennsylvania Health Insurance Exchange Authority,

also known as Pennie, for health and dental insurance options that offers financial assistance, along with information concerning the end of continuous coverage through Medical Assistance.

Mr. Yeager informed everyone that Pennie replaced HealthCare.gov and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania was sending about \$98 million a year to the federal government for utilization of its platform. He noted that bringing it to Pennsylvania and having local control has made a difference. He stated Pennie launched on November 1, 2020, to establish Pennsylvania's specific marketplace and set up a reinsurance program to help regulate premiums.

Mr. Yeager emphasized that Pennie is a marketplace that helps individuals who fall into gray areas and do not have protection through employer-sponsored coverage, sole proprietors, and many others. He reported 1 in 20 Pennsylvanians do not have quality health insurance.

Mr. Yeager addressed the No Wrong Door policy with the Pennsylvania Department of Human services, where Pennie transfers application information of an individual who may qualify for Medical Assistance.

Mr. Yeager mentioned the importance of affordable health insurance, noting 90 percent of current

customers qualify for financial assistance through
Pennie. He explained that financial assistance is
available through the marketplace from advanced
premium tax credits and cost-sharing reductions with
silver plans that help with copays, deductibles, and
coinsurance.

Mr. Yeager reported that 1 out of 4 customers pay less than \$1 a day, 14 percent pay less than \$1 a month, and 40 percent pay less than \$75 a month for quality health insurance.

Mr. Yeager informed everyone that the open enrollment period is from November 1 through January 15. He also noted a special enrollment period from January 1 through December 31 every year for qualifying life events, including loss of Medical Assistance, loss of employer-sponsored coverage, and many others.

Mr. Yeager noted that Pennie has developed pathways for people to connect with coverage, where a qualifying life event was created for Pennsylvania residents who are at or below 150 percent of the federal poverty limit and otherwise not able to secure protection through Medical Assistance.

Mr. Yeager addressed a program called the Path to Pennie, which is a partnership between Pennie and the

Pennsylvania Department of Revenue, to help uninsured tax filers in Pennsylvania. He explained that Form REV-1882 could be completed and attached to their state tax return and then the Pennsylvania Department of Revenue transfers the individual's information to Pennie.

- Mr. Yeager discussed the end of continuous coverage for Medical Assistance. He mentioned about 600,000 to 700,000 individuals were continually covered through Medical Assistance during the pandemic, noting the Pennsylvania Department of Human Services resumed the annual redetermination as of April 1, 2023, and Pennie is an option for those who are no longer covered.
 - Mr. Yeager addressed the importance getting the word out, noting both the Department of Human Services and Pennie have developed websites specifically geared toward addressing options for individuals who lose Medical Assistance.
 - Mr. Yeager provided Pennie's Customer Service

 Call Center number at 1-844-844-8040 to connect

 individuals with Pennie options through the

 marketplace and with assistors and Pennie-certified

 insurance brokers throughout the Commonwealth of

 Pennsylvania. He also noted that coverage cannot be

denied because of a preexisting condition or increase the premium.

Mr. Yeager offered to provide a toolkit with educational materials free of charge directly to their shop or colleagues. He noted that individuals could also be referred to pennie.com. He welcomed everyone to attend Pennie's Community Workgroup on the second Friday of every month to share information and provide feedback to improve service to the residents of Pennsylvania.]

13 [The Board was asked whether a readily accessible 14 sink could be down the hall or in the square footage.

Mr. Barrett again noted that he could not give advisory or legal opinions and directed her to Board regulations on their website.

Rachell Joseph-Dudley, Nails Instructor,
Christine Valmy International School for Esthetics,
Skin Care, and Makeup, noted that someone requested
that she attend the meeting because her license
application was forwarded to the Board. She
commented that she is aware that all members were not
present and no voting would take place at this
meeting. She mentioned being a licensed New York

1 State educator and being licensed in cosmetology in 2 both New York and Pennsylvania.

Ms. Joseph-Dudley informed Board members that she applied for reciprocity for her license with reference to teaching and submitted all the requirements for a final vote. She asked whether she would need to wait until September when all Board members would be present for a verdict on her application.

Mr. Barrett explained that applications would be addressed through the Board's Applications Committee but some would be placed on the September agenda. He noted the Board cannot take any official action at this meeting and suggested she keep an eye on the September agenda. He also noted that the Board would notify her of any changes.

Mr. Barrett welcomed Ms. Joseph-Dudley to attend the September Board meeting and provided a summary of the application process.]
