Woodland, M.S., M.D., Chair, called the 17 meeting to order at 10:40 a.m. \* \* \* 18 19 Introduction of Audience 20 [Chair Woodland requested Mr. Stauffer introduce audience members.] 21 \* \* \* 22 23 [Dana M. Wucinski, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted the 24 Board was in Executive Session prior to the meeting 25 and reviewed all of the Consent Agreements presented

today, along with agenda items 19 through 29. 1 Ms. Wucinski also noted the meeting was being 2 3 recorded, and those who remained were consenting to be 4 recorded.] \* \* \* 5 6 Introduction of Board Members 7 [Chair Woodland requested the introduction of Board 8 members.1 9 \* \* \* 10 Approval of minutes of the December 15, 2020 meeting CHAIR WOODLAND: 11 12 Our first order of business is approval of our minutes from December 15, 2020. 13 14 I think everyone has had a chance to 15 look at them. I would entertain a motion to 16 17 approve the minutes. DR. YEALY: 18 19 So moved. 20 MR. EISENHAUER: 21 Second. YEALY: 12 Second. CHAIR WOODLAND: 13 14 We have a motion to approve and a 15 second. All in favor, please? Any 16 opposed? Any abstentions? 17 [The motion carried. Dr. Domen and Dr. Valigorsky 18 were recused from item 7. The Respondent's name is 19 Heather Renee Bailey, LRT.] \* \* \* 20 21 Report of Commissioner - No Report 22 [K. Kalonji Johnson, Commissioner, Bureau of 23 Professional and Occupational Affairs, noted a letter 24 from the Department of Health regarding care for 25 maternity and labor providers in the Commonwealth for

the Board's review.] 1

2 3 Appointment - Carolyn A. DeLaurentis, Esquire, Deputy 4 Chief Counsel, Prosecution Division Presentation 5 [Carolyn A. DeLaurentis, Esquire, Deputy Chief 6 Counsel, Prosecution Division, provided highlights of 7 the prosecution division's work during the past year. She commended staff for all of their hard work to make 8 9 telework successful. She noted all decisions were 10 made thoughtfully and with the safety of all in mind. 11 Ms. DeLaurentis stated the Board prosecutors made 12 every effort to monitor the restrictions, waivers, policies, and new procedures specific to the practice 13 14 in each profession regarding challenges imposed on 15 licensees by the COVID-19 pandemic. Ms. DeLaurentis noted the Pennsylvania Licensing 16

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17 System (PALS) to be a lifeline. She stated the Bureau 18 of Enforcement and Investigation (BEI) worked closely 19 with prosecution to continue investigations and figure 20 out the best methods during statewide shutdowns and stay-at-home orders. She also noted the Professional 21 22 Compliance Office continued opening cases and 23 processing files, and legal assistants have been 24 working a hybrid schedule to ensure mailings and 25 filings were completed.

Ms. DeLaurentis commented that the Board, Board 1 2 staff, and counsel all have adapted to virtual Board 3 meetings and prosecution will continue to work with 4 everyone to ensure efficient and effective 5 presentation and resolution of cases. She mentioned 6 2020 was a year filled with challenges, but the 7 prosecution division led by the incredible senior staff rose to the challenge and will continue to do 8 9 so.

Ms. DeLaurentis informed the Board that 1,942 cases were opened in 2020 and 3,352 in 2019 with 2,273 cases closed in 2020 for the Board of Medicine. She noted 1,795 open files as of January 1, 2021. She thanked Timothy Smith for his assistance providing information for 2020.

Ms. DeLaurentis addressed enforcement actions 16 17 with 148 total cases that resulted in discipline in 18 2020 for the Board of Medicine. She reported 193 19 warning letters, 22 fines, 49 suspensions, 6 automatic 20 suspensions, 21 reprimands, 47 revocations or voluntary surrenders, and 13 probation cases in 2020. 21 Ms. DeLaurentis discussed 2020 overall 22 23 prosecution as a whole. She noted 44 immediate 24 temporary suspensions in 2020. She mentioned 112 of 25 the 1,223 opened COVID-19 cases are for the Board of

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1	Medicine in 2020. She reported the total number of
2	open cases as of January 1 is 12,250 and the total
3	number of cases opened overall in 2020 is 13,394,
4	which is down from 2019 at 16,295. She noted 13,274
5	files were closed in 2020.
6	She noted most complaints that involved the Board
7	of Medicine involved following social distancing and
8	temperature and masking requirements.]
9	* * *
10	Report of Department of Health
11	[Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., Chair, thanked, on
12	behalf of the Board of Medicine, Dr. Rachel Levine for
13	her roles as Secretary of Health and Physician General
14	in helping to support the state through many issues
15	and applauded her efforts as she moves to Washington.
16	Chair Woodland conversed with Alison Beam as the
17	new Secretary of Health. He invited her and Dr. Wendy
18	Braund, the interim Acting Physician General, to give
19	a report.
20	Mary Pat Howard, M.S., RN-BC, Executive Assistant
21	of Quality Assurance, provided an update regarding
22	COVID-19. She reported the positivity rate was 9.3%
23	from January 22 to January 28, 2021, down from 10.5%
24	the week before. She noted 63 counties have
25	substantial transmission above 5% and 25,986 new cases

1 in Pennsylvania.

2	Ms. Howard announced new travel recommendations,
3	where anyone over the age of 11 visiting from another
4	state must provide evidence of a negative COVID test
5	or place themselves in a travel quarantine for 10 days
6	but does not apply to people who commute to and from
7	another state for work, medical treatment, or anyone
8	who left the state for fewer than 24 hours. She
9	encouraged everyone to visit the Department of
10	Health's dashboard concerning COVID activity in the
11	state.
12	Chair Woodland also mentioned the state's website
13	for vaccine distribution information.
14	Ms. Howard noted providing voluntary testing
15	every Tuesday of 235 surveyors with very few positive
16	cases.
17	Chair Woodland reported Pennsylvania had received
18	over 2.1 million vaccine doses and over half had been
19	allocated with a large percent of those administered.
20	Ms. Howard stated the department responds within
21	24 hours to any complaints from nursing homes and
22	hospitals.
23	Chair Woodland wished to send a letter from the
24	State Board of Medicine to Dr. Levine to thank her for
25	her services and leadership and wish her well from the

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State Board of Medicine.] 1 \* \* \* 2 3 Report of Committee on Health-Related Professionals 4 [Walter A. Eisenhauer, PA-C, stated there was nothing 5 formal to report. He did note one work agreement that 6 was brought before the committee with limited 7 discussion via email that has been supportive of 8 approval.] 9 \* \* \* 10 Report of Committee on Legislation/Policy Development 11 and Review [Mary Pat Howard, M.S., RN-BC, Executive Assistant of 12 13 Quality Assurance, addressed bill analysis, where the 14 majority were bills introduced last session that never 15 went anywhere and were reintroduced. She also 16 mentioned a lot of waivers but nothing out of the 17 ordinary.] \* \* \* 18 19 Report of Committee on Licensure Qualifications 20 [Donald M. Yealy, M.D., addressed licensure 21 qualifications the Education Commission for Foreign 2.2 Medical Graduates (ECFMG) imposes for physicians 23 educated outside the United States. Related to that 24 topic, Mr. Dillon suggested sharing research and 25 articles, identified by he and Dr. Domen, with the

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Board. 1 Chair Woodland recommended sharing that 2 3 information and having further discussion at the next 4 Board meeting.] \* \* \* 5 6 Report of Vice Chair 7 [Ronald E. Domen, M.D., Vice Chair, encouraged Board members to become more active in the Federation of 8 9 State Medical Boards and provided applications for 10 committee membership.] \* \* \* 11 Report of Board Chair 12 [Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., Board Chair, thanked 13 14 Board counsel for their leadership in the State Board 15 of Medicine and now co-counsel to the State Board of Osteopathic Medicine and State Board of Dentistry. 16 17 Chair Woodland recognized Back History Month and 18 provided background, noting Carter G. Woodson was the 19 son of a slave who did much research on African 20 Americans in our country. He stated Mr. Woodson established Black History Week in 1926, which was 21 22 renamed Black History Month in 1976. 23 Chair Woodland also addressed the celebration last month of maternal health awareness. 2.4 25 Dr. Silver stated, as a psychiatrist she deals

with health disorders related to the reproductive lifecycle, specifically pregnancy and postpartum. She noted documented racial disparities in treatment. She emphasized the importance of maternal health awareness and addressed research on the functionality of a healthy mother, physically and mentally.

7 Chair Woodland thanked her for participation in 8 the statewide presentation hosted by fellow 9 practitioners at the University of Pittsburgh Medical 10 Center.

11 Chair Woodland encouraged the Board to be cognitive and address what the pipeline looks like as 12 13 far as practitioners in provider communities. He mentioned the Federation of State Medical Boards 14 15 (FSMB) will be challenging each Board to not only addressed the demographics of the practitioner as 16 17 related to the demographics of their citizens but to 18 address initiatives by each of the educational 19 institutions to support the pipeline.

20 Chair Woodland announced FSMB also put out 21 proposed recommendations for the State Board of 22 Medicine and is requesting Board comments.

23 Chair Woodland addressed provider wellness, 24 noting Medscape offers a physician wellness report 25 every year. He reported 51% of women providers and

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36% of men providers admit they are tired. He noted a 1 2 large percentage of different professions that 3 actually talk about suicide ideation with over 400 4 physician suicides a year in the United States. He 5 stated over 19% of OB/GYN surveyed thought about 6 suicide. He reported exercise as the number one thing 7 physicians are doing to cope with burnout. Chair Woodland suggested future discussion of how 8 9 the Board would like to honor the providers and the 10 people who died of COVID-19. 11 Dr. Silver noted an increased number of calls from doctors in significant distress and informed the 12 13 Board of the Physician Support Line that is available 14 24/7 and free of charge.] \* \* \* 15 16 Report of Board Counsel - Regulatory Status Report [Cynthia K. Montgomery, Esquire, Deputy Chief 17 18 Counsel/Regulatory Counsel, Department of State, 19 addressed 16A-4946 regarding acupuncturists and 20 practitioners of Oriental medicine. 21 Ms. Montgomery informed the Board that the Office 22 of General Counsel expressed concerns with the Board 23 changing the practitioner of Oriental medicine 2.4 credential to a one-time registration, which they 25 believed to be problematic legally because the statute

1 includes the practice of herbal therapies as part of 2 the practice of acupuncture and acupuncture requires a 3 license.

Ms. Montgomery mentioned assisting Ms. Wucinski and Ms. Walter with the proposed regulation presented today by taking it back to just a separate license and retaining all of the other changes made to the regulation.

Ms. Montgomery reported receiving information 9 10 from Mr. Dillon concerning the Test of English as a 11 Foreign Language (TOEFL) passing scores being referred to § 18.13. She stated the previous requirement was a 12 13 score of 550 on the old paper-based test (PBT). Ιn 14 the proposed regulation presented today that previous 15 requirement would be replaced by TOEFL internet-based test (iBT) score of 79. 16

17 Mr. Dillon noted concern in the preamble, where 18 it claimed, as part of the rationale, that both a PBT 19 score of 550 and an iBT score of 79 were at the 50th 20 percentile of test takers. Mr. Dillon noted that he 21 is not sure that has ever been the case for the iBT 2.2 examination. He stated Ms. Wucinski contacted the 23 Educational Testing Service (ETS) who indicated that 24 the 50th percentile on iBT is really close to a score 25 of 86, not only for the total group of examinees on

1 that examination but also for those who take it for 2 the purpose of trying to get a license.

Mr. Dillon commented that the arguments in the preamble seem off when it comes to using a "50<sup>th</sup> percentile" argument in order to associate a PBT score of 550 with an iBT score of 79. He wondered if the recommended iBT score should be reassessed and requested Ms. Montgomery's recommendation concerning making adjustments to the preamble and annex.

Ms. Montgomery referred to the most recent 2019 data from ETS, which provided evidence that the average score for professional license purposes was 83, noting the questioned to be whether to change the number in the annex and revise the language in the preamble.

16 Ms. Montgomery explained that it is up to the 17 Board to decide whether the acceptable score should be 18 the average score for people taking the exam or the 19 score at the 50th percentile. She noted that they 20 could correct the language in the preamble to 21 eliminate the "50<sup>th</sup> percentile" argument and then the 22 proposal could be published and await public comment. 23 She noted that there would still be an opportunity for 24 the board to modify the recommendations for acceptable 25 TOEFL scores.

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Dr. Yealy commented that the goal is not to have a certain number of people pass or fail but to ensure language skills are adequate.

Ms. Montgomery noted the regulation currently 4 5 states the applicant has to score a score of 550 on 6 the test but the test has changed since the existing 7 regulation was promulgated. She explained that the regulation would need adjustment. She reported that 8 9 ETS also provides a revised Paper-based test (rPBT) 10 which only has three of the four sections contained on 11 the iBT. If has no reported total score. In the 12 proposed regulation a scale score on each section 13 would need to be at least 21, which is approximately 14 the average for those sections on the iBT, according 15 to information from ETS. 16 Ms. Montgomery noted the Association for

17 Professional Acupuncture in Pennsylvania provided a 18 comment on chat supporting the approach to retain the 19 separate license.]

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21 CHAIR WOODLAND:

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I would entertain a motion to approve the proposed rulemaking package as presented and to promulgate it through the regulatory review process to open it

20 up for public comment. 1 2 DR. DOMEN: 3 So moved. CHAIR WOODLAND: 4 5 Second? 6 DR. YEALY: 7 Second. 8 CHATE WOODLAND: 9 We have a motion and a second. All for 10 approval, say aye. Any objection? Any 11 abstentions? 12 [The motion carried unanimously.] 13 \* \* \* 14 [Chair Woodland suggested having the Committee on 15 Licensure Qualifications review comments and report 16 back to the Board.] \* \* \* 17 18 Report of Board Counsel - Regulatory Status Report 19 [Cynthia K. Montgomery, Esquire, Deputy Chief 20 Counsel/Regulatory Counsel, Department of State, 21 addressed 16A-4953 regarding naturopathic doctor 22 registration. She noted prior discussion in September 23 2020, where the Board selected exposure draft 4 24 version B. She reported it to be the version of the 25 regulation adopted by the Board in 2019 and revamped

to include the fees and some of the things previously 1 2 in the practitioners of oriental medicine regulation 3 that specifically apply to naturopathic doctors. Ms. Montgomery noted the addition of an exception 4 5 for naturopathic doctors who are also licensed 6 acupuncturists and practitioners of oriental medicine, 7 where anything that had to do with naturopathic doctors was added to this regulation. 8 Ms. Montgomery noted a recommended fee for 9 10 registration and reactivation application for 11 naturopathic doctors of \$100 and an annual renewal fee 12 of \$50 based on the recommendations of the Revenue 13 Office and Bureau of Finance and Operations. Chair Woodland requested more information 14 15 regarding removing the drugless therapists 16 nomenclature. 17 Ms. Montgomery explained that the provision was 18 not necessary anymore and replaced with the 19 naturopathic doctor information.] \* \* \* 20 21 MS. MONTGOMERY: 2.2 I would need a motion from the Board to 23 adopt the proposed rulemaking package as 24 presented and to promulgate it through 25 the regulatory review process to

22 ultimately be published as proposed 1 2 rulemaking for public comment. 3 CHAIR WOODLAND: 4 Okay. Let's entertain that motion. Do 5 I have a motion? 6 DR. YEALY: 7 So moved. 8 CHATE WOODLAND: 9 Second? MR. EISENHAUER: 10 11 Second. 12 CHAIR WOODLAND: 13 All in favor, say aye. 23 So moved. 1 2 DR. YEALY: 3 Second. CHAIR WOODLAND: 4 5 Mr. Eisenhauer moves and Dr. Yealy 6 seconds. All in favor, say yea. Any 7 opposed? Any abstentions? 8 [The motion carried unanimously.] \* \* \* 9 10 For the Board's Information/Discussion - Board 11 Meeting Dates [Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., Chair, noted 2021 Board 12 meeting dates. He also noted 2022 meeting dates for 13 14 the Board's approval.] \* \* \* 15 16 CHAIR WOODLAND: 17 I would entertain a motion to approve 18 those dates for the upcoming Board 19 meetings for 2022. 20 MR. DILLON: 21 So moved. 22 DR. YEALY: 23 Second. 24 CHAIR WOODLAND: 25 All in favor, say yea. Objections? Any

24 abstentions? 1 2 [The motion carried unanimously.] \* \* \* 3 For the Board's Information/Discussion - Old/New 4 5 Business 6 [Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., Chair, referred to the 7 request from the Federation of State Medical Boards 8 concerning the interim report of the FSMB Workgroup on 9 Emergency Preparedness and Response. 10 Dr. Yealy commented that the paper was well done, 11 but it focus on how to prepare for the next type of 12 pandemic. He noted matters to be missing from the 13 paper that were enacted during the pandemic and should 14 be continued and changed permanently. 15 Chair Woodland suggested the Board respond to FSMB comment requests as a state Board in the future. 16 17 Ms. Wucinski explained that statements are 18 usually approved through policy before the Board 19 issues a statement and would be easier to respond as 20 an individual licensee. 21 Chair Woodland recognized the importance of 22 having a voice, where Board members should respond as 23 individuals, especially in public comment; but if a 2.4 statement is to be made as a state Board, there should 25 be discussion and then presented collaboratively.

1 Chair Woodland mentioned guidelines for the 2 structure and function of a State Medical and 3 Osteopathic Board by FSMB, which will be adopted as a 4 policy by the federation in April. He recommended 5 placing it on the agenda for discussion at the March 6 meeting.

Ms. Wucinski addressed House Bill 171 regarding prohibiting non-compete clauses for health care practitioners. She explained that it would void employment agreements that would restrict or prohibit a health care practitioner from treating a prior patient after the termination of employment.

Ms. Walter addressed an email received from Calli 13 Johnson regarding insertion and maintenance of 14 15 vascular access devices by respiratory therapists. 16 She noted the addition to the scope of practice of 17 respiratory therapists in 11 states concerning 18 vascular access and the request that the Pennsylvania 19 State Board of Medicine permit respiratory therapists to engage in this treatment. 20

Ms. Walter stated the Medical Practice Act and the Board's regulation limits the scope of practice of respiratory therapists, and an amendment to the Medical Practice Act by legislature would need to occur if the Board was interested in allowing

respiratory therapists provide this treatment. 1 2 Thomas Lamphere, BS, RRT-ACCS, FAARC, PSRC, 3 Executive Director, Pennsylvania Society for 4 Respiratory Care, commented that he had no knowledge 5 of the letter but stated respiratory therapists are 6 already providing services considered outside the box. 7 Mr. Lamphere also mentioned that a letter has been sent to the governor's office and the Department 8 9 of Health requesting respiratory therapists provide 10 vaccinations during the pandemic. 11 Ms. Walter also suggested directing the group to the legislature to seek amendments to the Medical 12 13 Practice Act if they want to make changes to expand 14 respiratory therapists to include something other than 15 direct respiratory care. 16 Ms. Walter will inform nursing of the letter 17 concerning respiratory therapists seeking to provide additional services. 18 19 Chair Woodland referred to the annual the Federation of State Medical Boards House of Delegates 20 21 Meeting and encourage Board members to attend.] \* \* \* 22 23 CHAIR WOODLAND: 24 I would like to make the recommendation 25 that Dr. Domen support us as the voting

He noted approximately 75% of 21 current enrollees are in the voluntary recovery 22 program. He mentioned the program is offered to 23 licenses with no mark on their record and license is 2.4 active and in good standing. 25 Mr. Knipe noted DMU is reserved for licensees who

have been formally disciplined by the Board and
 directed to enroll through a consent agreement.

Mr. Knipe addressed the referral and notification of availability process to the voluntary recovery program and compliance while in the program. He also discussed issues that make individuals ineligible for the voluntary recovery program.

8 Mr. Knipe discussed workplace monitoring, where 9 someone aware of the individual's involvement in the 10 program provides updates on a quarterly basis 11 regarding work performance.

Mr. Knipe mentioned PHMP works cooperatively with the Physicians' Health Program, which is a program of The Foundation of the Pennsylvania Medical Society.

15 Mr. Knipe provided data regarding medical board 16 cases processed over the past 5 years. He provided 17 statistical data regarding referral sources with most 18 of the cases being referred by the Pennsylvania 19 Justice Network (JNET). He also provided material 20 concerning open and closed cases by license type for 21 VRP and DMU. He noted medical cases are around 10% of 22 the voluntary recovery program.

23 Mr. Knipe reported close contact with prosecuting 24 attorneys and Board counsel who do a great job in 25 supporting PHMP.

1 Chair Woodland thanked Mr. Knipe for his 2 presentation.] 3 \* \* \* 4 Adjournment 5 CHAIR WOODLAND: 6 I entertain a motion to adjourn the 7 meeting? 8 DR.
