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   Report of Commissioner
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   [K. Kalonji Johnson, Commissioner, Bureau of

   Professional and Occupational Affairs, welcomed
24
   everyone. He announced developments with regard to
25
   the Pennsylvania Licensing System (PALS) application
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with release of the newest instructions for the written agreements in the PALS application. He noted the initial application for the written agreement and the ability to delete the agreement. He stated the instructions could be found on the Board's website, along with the notification that no manual paper applications would be accepted after April 30, 2021, and directing individuals to use the PALS application.

Commissioner Johnson reported that change forms for the written agreement still exist with the manual process. He stated written instructions were being finalized, and when those become live, licensees will be notified. He mentioned there will be a 60-day window for the phase-out of paper applications and promoting the PALS application.

Chair Woodland noted a question received in chat asking how delegates would complete the written agreement. Commissioner Johnson noted that to be a longstanding concern about delegate functionality. He reminded everybody that delegate functionality had not been legislatively approved. He stated the instructions in the system were reviewed by stakeholders last year and agreed upon by all parties.

Commissioner Johnson mention that the written agreement process in conjunction with the PALS status tracker for Medical Board licensees will work handin-hand to enable employers, whether they be hospitals or associations. He noted that applicants would now have the ability to review the status of applications and upload documents required for applications. He stated the delegate authority is something the written instructions do not address.

Commissioner Johnson addressed another question received on chat. He noted the department would no longer be accepting the written agreements sent in outside of the PALS application after April 30, 2021. He informed everyone the information was available on both the website and PALS site.

Susan DeSantis, PA-C, Pennsylvania Society of Physician Assistants, stated that when the legislation passed in the summer of 2019, it gave delegate authority to complete and submit the written agreement.

Ms. DeSantis questioned whether there was something within PALS to permit a delegate to do that. There are instructions for the physician assistant (PA) to start and finish the application and the supervising physician to start and finish the

application, but no other option. She noted it is
the medical staff office completing, processing, and
monitoring and this issue is still not clear as April
30, 2021 approaches.

Commissioner Johnson explained that the application did not have the delegate functionality but, with the status tracker, the delegate has the ability to review the information in the application and submit documentation. He stated notifications would soon begin. He commented that collaborative agreements were being worked on with the Board of Nursing to similarly integrate the collaborative agreement process.]

24 Wolf announced pre-K through grade 12 public and

25 nonpublic school teachers will have an opportunity to

be vaccinated with single-dose Johnson & Johnson
vaccine.

Ms. Howard also announced Dr. Denise Johnson will start as the new physician general on March 29, 2021.

Ms. Howard encouraged everyone to visit the Department of Health's COVID and vaccine dashboards for COVID updates. She reported 1,658 additional positive cases from Saturday through early yesterday morning with a total of 950,161 in Pennsylvania to date. She also reported 1,587 hospitalizations with 314 in the intensive care unit. She noted a positivity rate for last week of 5.7%, which is a reduction from 6.3% the week before.

Ms. Howard announced the Centers for Disease
Control and Prevention (CDC) recently issued new
guidelines for people who are fully vaccinated and
are available on the website.

Chair Woodland thanked Ms. Howard and applauded the Department of Health for their efforts in providing specific information.

Ms. Howard provided information regarding vaccine administration.]

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10 Report of Vice Chair

11 [Ronald E. Domen, M.D., Vice Chair, informed the

12 Board that the Federation of State Medical Boards

13 (FSMB) just recently announced the formation of an ad

14 hoc Health Equity and Medical Regulation Task Force.

15 He stated the task force would gather information on

16 literature review as it relates to medical

17 | regulations.

18 Dr. Domen addressed Medical Board implicit bias

19 | initiatives, where the task force will be surveying

20 all of their member boards. He stated the task force

21 | will direct efforts through the creation of a public

22 spacing platform to provide educational resources for

23 addressing implicit bias in medical licensing,

24 discipline, and regulation.

25 Dr. Domen noted the task force would lead

discussions on medical regulation, systemic racism, implicit bias, and health equity.

Dr. Domen referred to prior Board discussion, where the Board cannot unilaterally call for an investigation of somebody who may be committing malpractice or unprofessional behavior, but a public member can anonymously report something to the Department's professional compliance office and the prosecuting attorneys would then investigate the matter and report back to the Board. He also mentioned a Board member could file a complaint online, but the Board cannot discuss the matter unless and until it comes before the Board.

Mr. Anderson further explained that any person in the Commonwealth has the ability to file a complaint with the Department of State regarding a licensing issue. He stated a member of the Board as a private citizen can file a complaint; however, the Board itself cannot institute disciplinary or investigatory action against a licensee. He commented that every complainant is notified of the results of their complaint, told if the matter is open or closed, and whether a formal action took place.

Mr. Dillon noted the Board's interest in issues arising that may be putting citizens of Pennsylvania

in danger. He requested input as to whether the Board could have more impact regarding violations of directives related to the virus.

Ms. Walter explained that the Board's goal is to issue adjudications and determine discipline. She stated the Board has standards through regulations that it implements, and the legislature did the same through the Medical Practice Act. Board adjudicatory function and the prosecution investigative function are two completely separate roles.

Ms. Walter noted that complaints could be made through PALS, but the individual would have to recuse if the complaint came before the Board.

Chair Woodland mentioned there are specific individual complaints and generalized situations, where the Board could have a discussion on a general issue and an individual issue may apply to licensure qualification.

Ms. Wucinski explained that when a proposed adjudication comes before the Board from a hearing examiner, the Board may either adopt the hearing examiner's proposed report or substitute their own adjudication and order if they do not agree with the proposed report.

Mr. Eisenhauer requested information concerning

1 resources attorneys utilize if something was outside 2 of their scope of practice to determine.

Mr. Anderson stated the Bureau of Enforcement and Investigation (BEI) does a good job digging into cases based on instruction from prosecuting attorneys to determine if there is a potential violation of the practice act. He noted an unprofessional conduct charge, which deals with immoral practice or substandard practice, are reviewed by experts to determine if a violation has occurred.]

Chair Woodland announced the Federation of State Medical Boards (FSMB) Annual Meeting will be held April 29 through May 1, 2021. He mentioned Dr. Domen will be representing the Board and bring back any information available from the meeting. He encouraged everyone to participate in the virtual

meeting.

Chair Woodland mentioned the Federation of State
Medical Boards put out a resolution relating to
incorporating care of intellectual and
developmentally disabled individuals into a medical
student curriculum. He noted Dr. Beam connected him
with Brian Lentes about moving the demographic
diversity dashboard forward for the State Board of
Medicine.

Chair Woodland noted the Board's letter of support of vaccines worked its way through the legislature and was posted.

Chair Woodland addressed the year of COVID, noting it had changed the Board members' lives and the lives of citizens and providers. He announced Tower Health will have a recognition event on March 31, 2021 at 7 p.m. He recognized the efforts of the Board and all of the licensure groups who provide not only care and thought during this time but also qualified practitioners and providers that help with outreach to citizens.]

- Ms. Wucinski informed the Board that 16A-4941
 regarding the proposed child abuse reporting
 requirements was published as proposed on January 30,
 2021, for 30 days of public comment. She stated no
 comments were received and awaits comments from the
 Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) that

Chair Woodland noted amendments were made that changed the 3-hour mandated educational process to 2 hours, amendments concerning mandates, and sections were added regarding training and reporting.]

17 [Shana M. Walter, Esquire, Board Counsel, referred to

18 House Bill 131 requiring the respondent in a

19 disciplinary action to appear in person at a hearing

20 on a disciplinary matter.

- Ms. Walter referred to House Bill 325 authorizing the Board to issue advisory opinions.
- 23 Mr. Dillon requested an example of an advisory opinion.
- 25 Ms. Walter explained that if a practitioner

contacted Board Counsel and asked if they could delegate a procedure to a medical assistant that was within their delegation authority, they would advise them that they cannot advise whether the particular action is or is not within the delegation authority in the Medical Practice Act.

Ms. Wucinski noted Board Counsel receives many emails requesting advisory opinions but can only offer individuals standard "no advisory" language because Board Counsel may only provide legal advice to the Board and not to licensees. She stated this bill would change that, where not only would Board Counsel provide legal advice to the Board but they would also provide non-binding legal advice to licensees. She expressed a concern with the bill because of the number of emails received and amount of time it would take to respond.

Chair Woodland noted the possible need to inventory the advisory opinions so as to not contradict one already created.

Chair Woodland commented that advising people about the status of their licensure and how to preserve their license may be a good advisory opinion item.

Ms. Walter addressed House Bill 192 involving the

- 1 | Interstate Medical Licensure Compact Act. She stated
- 2 | House Bill 192 sets forth the steps to obtain a
- 3 criminal history record check and allows the Federal
- 4 Bureau of Investigation to release the federal
- 5 background check to the Board.
- 6 Ms. Wucinski referred to House Bill 245. She
- 7 explained that graduates of accredited medical
- 8 schools currently must complete 2 years of training
- 9 through an approved medical residency program in
- 10 order to apply for a license in Pennsylvania and
- 11 international medical grads 3 years. She stated the
- 12 bill would change that to 2 years. She noted that
- 13 the rationale for the house bill states that the
- 14 third year of postgraduate training was created
- 15 because international medical graduates (IMG) faced
- 16 less rigorous testing and training in completing
- 17 | their education, which had changed over years and is
- 18 now considered the same as attending schools in the
- 19 United States.
- 20 Mr. Dillon commented that while IMGs now have as
- 21 rigorous testing as students in the United States, he
- 22 expressed a concern for the claim that IMGs also met
- 23 the same educational standards equal to students from
- 24 medical schools in the United States.
- 25 Mr. Dillon stated that there is no organization

domestically or internationally that assesses the quality of curricula, faculty, and campuses of all international medical schools like it is done for US medical schools by the Liaison Committee on Medical Education (LCME). He stated that the broad claim about comparability of educational standards had no basis; that it was inaccurate and misleading. Mr. Dillon asked if that claim could be corrected prior to final consideration of the bill.

- Mr. Eisenhauer addressed the military, stating that all branches allow individuals to complete their PGY-1 and then go on to serve in active duty roles if they have licensure in a state. He noted it would be helpful if Pennsylvania had a mechanism for active duty physicians who have completed all their United States Medical Licensing Examination (USMLE) requirements and the PGY-1 to get some type of licensure to recruit them back into residency programs in the state or ultimately into practice if they do the residency in the military.
- Ms. Wucinski stated many IMGs may not choose to come to Pennsylvania because of the extra requirement and may go to another state.
- Ms. Wucinski referred to Senate Bill 26, which would prohibit mental health professionals from

engaging in sexual orientation change efforts with individuals under 18. She stated it did not prohibit counseling for gender transition or otherwise relating to understanding a person's coping, social support, or identity exploration and development and does not prevent parents from teaching their children whatever they wish regarding sexual orientation.

Chair Woodland commented that the bill is not specific to conversion therapy but expressed a concern with how children gender dysphoria programs would be impacted. He noted sexual orientation conversion has not worked. He was worried about the lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and queer (LGBTQ) spectrum and how this might impact some of those other areas, especially mental health.

Dr. Silver also expressed a concern for how it would impact the LGBTQ community. She noted there are specific psychiatrists who deal with the LGBTQ community in Hershey and agreed with Dr. Woodland and wondered how to help the way it is worded.

Ms. Wucinski commented that Board Counsel had not been asked to conduct a bill analysis yet but would reach out to Board members and refer to notes to put forth a proper analysis when that time came.

Chair Woodland suggested providing feedback as an

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individual and not as a Board member to the people 1 2 who sponsor these bills. He stated the bill is 3 robust and sounds good regarding conversion therapy, but it may have unintended consequences that would 4 5 impact all kinds of other therapies, especially for 6 minors. He mentioned that the LGBTQ minors are 7 disenfranchised in so many ways and any perceived 8 block for access to care would be problematic.

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- Ms. Wucinski addressed Act 53 of 2020, noting the list of several crimes the prosecution division is suggesting be added. She noted two additions from Board Counsel and referred to aggravated assault against a child under § 2702(a)(8).
- Dr. Yealy referred to § 5112 regarding interfering with emergency services providers and expressed concerned with it being prone to wide and disparate interpretation as written.
- Ms. Wucinski mentioned that even if the Board chooses not to add a specific crime to the list, it would not stop prosecution from doing their job. Ms. Wucinski stated that the crime could be removed if the rest of the Board agreed.
- Chair Woodland noted the Board was in agreement.
- Ms. Wucinski provided another list for the
 Board's opinion, including perjury, false swearing,

unsworn falsification, false alarms to agencies of public safety, false reports to law enforcement agencies, witness or informant taking bribes, and tampering with or fabricating physical evidence.

Chair Woodland noted that it would not be a bad thing if the list was shorter.

Ms. Wucinski opened the meeting to public comment.

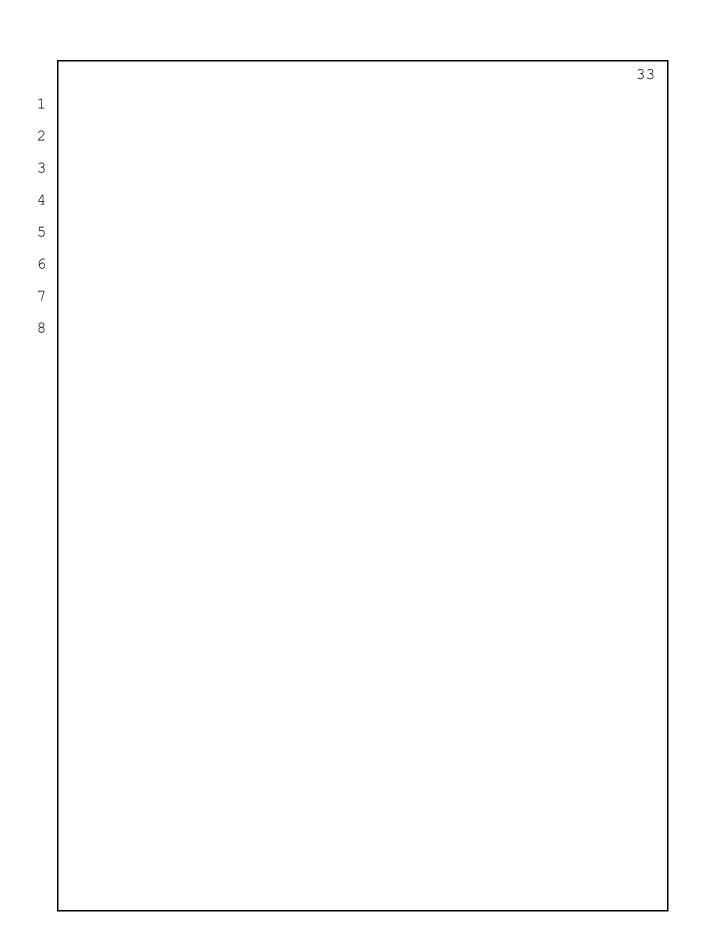
