The Board 11 returned to open session at 10:30 a.m.] * * * 12 13 The regularly scheduled meeting of the State 14 Board of Medicine was held on Tuesday, March 15, 2022. 15 Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., FACOG, Chair, called the meeting to order at 10:42 a.m. 16 * * * 17 18 [Chair Woodland welcomed everyone to the Pennsylvania 19 State Board of Medicine Meeting. WUCINSKI: 8 The final vote is agenda item 29. I 9 believe the Board would entertain a 10 motion to deny the CE Waiver Request for 11 Gregory N. Bender, M.D., noting Dr. 12 Yealy has recused. MR. EISENHAUER: 13 14 So moved. 15 DR. SILVER: 16 Second. CHAIR WOODLAND: 17 Any further discussion on this one? 18 19 All those in favor, say yea. Any 20 against, say nay. Any abstentions? 21 [The motion carried. Donald Yealy recused himself 22 from deliberations and voting on the motion.] 23 * * * 24 Report of Department of Health 25 [Carolyn Byrnes, M.P.H., C.P.H., Senior Advisor to the

Physician General, on behalf of Denise A. Johnson, 1 2 M.D., Physician General, Department of Health, 3 provided a COVID-19 update, noting 2,769,835 total 4 cases in the state of Pennsylvania, which has 5 increased 1,595 as of yesterday. She reported 795 hospitalizations, which is down 107 compared to 6 7 Friday. She reported 43,845 deaths in Pennsylvania. Ms. Byrnes stated the Centers for Disease Control 8 9 and Prevention (CDC) recently released their COVID 10 community levels, which are determined by looking at 11 COVID-19 admissions per 100,000 population in the past seven days, percent of patient beds occupied by COVID-12 13 19 patients, and total new COVID-19 cases per 100,000 14 population in the past seven days. 15 Ms. Byrnes reported 18,741,514 COVID-19 16 vaccinations as of yesterday with the current seven-17 day moving average of vaccines administered at 5,290. She noted as of March 14^{th} 71.2 percent of the 5 and 18 19 up population in Pennsylvania fully vaccinated with a 20 United States average of 69.4 percent and booster rate 21 for those 12 plus at 43 percent as of yesterday. She 22 reported 566,224 children ages 5 to 11 have been 23 vaccinated since November with an additional 1,453 2.4 over the weekend. 25 Ms. Byrnes reported 3.2 million booster doses,

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which is up 6,395. She noted the Medicaid population,
younger population of ages 10 to 14 and 25 to 29,
African Americans, and pregnant people to be under
vaccinated.

5 Ms. Byrnes addressed hesitancy work through the 6 United Way grant and the Department of Community and 7 Economic Development (DCED) grant. She offered to 8 share materials to any organizations that would want 9 to apply.

10 Ms. Byrnes also addressed a motivational interviewing pocket guide for providers utilizing 11 12 research from the University of Pittsburgh from Dr. 13 Antoine Douaihy and his colleagues. She noted Dr. Johnson would like to hear whether the Board of 14 15 Medicine would be interested in sharing the guide with 16 licensees and offered to send it to Chair Woodland. 17 Ms. Byrnes stated there are multiple COVID-19 18 prevention and treatment options authorized by the 19 Food and Drug Administration (FDA) on their website, 20 along with a link to a map of locations that are able 21 to provide treatment.

Ms. Byrnes reported a slight increase in influenza A and B cases for the week ending March 5, 24 2022, with a total of 40,484 laboratory confirmed 25 cases to date. She noted a total of 45 confirmed

1 influenza-associated deaths have been reported this 2 season, but there have been no influenza-associated 3 confirmed pediatric deaths this season.

Ms. Byrnes highlighted that the Pennsylvania Maternal Mortality Review Committee (PA MMRC) published their report in January and the findings of their review of maternal deaths, noting Dr. Johnson wanted to encourage health providers to review the findings and recommendations.

Ms. Byrnes stated PA MMRC found accidental poisoning, including drug-related overdoses, was the top cause of maternal deaths and made several recommendations to prevent accidental poisonings based on the deaths reviewed. She offered to provide the report to the Board.

Ms. Byrnes reported a rise in syphilis cases, including congenital syphilis, noting the PA Health Alert Network continues to send out information and encourage providers to screen all pregnant people for syphilis at the first prenatal visit, third trimester, and delivery.

22 Chair Woodland commented that looking at maternal 23 deaths, not only for the peripartum and immediate 24 postpartum phase but for the first year after giving 25 birth, is an amazing process. He requested Ms. Hunter

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remind him to have a formal presentation and to 1 2 include the findings from the maternal mortality 3 review. 4 Dr. Ripchinski requested more information 5 regarding the rise in BA.2 in Pennsylvania. 6 Ms. Byrnes stated she would have to ask 7 colleagues for a specific number. 8 Chair Woodland mentioned Pfizer announced a 9 fourth or annual does would be necessary moving toward 10 endemic status and asked whether the Department of 11 Health is going to move toward an endorsement. 12 Ms. Byrnes stated she would need to speak with Dr. Johnson. 13 14 Chair Woodland asked whether there was any 15 reaction by the Department of Health concerning the increased number of cases seen in China. 16 17 Ms. Byrnes noted being on a call yesterday with 18 the CDC and discussion concerning the increase in 19 China, where China did not see the same level of 20 Omicron and BA.2 is kind of now taking over. 21 Chair Woodland commented that the fourth shot 22 issue is going to come up now even more prevalent and 23 thinks that is why Pfizer is moving in that direction 2.4 and other companies will also. 25 Dr. Yealy mentioned not being sure of having

1 enough clarity in the vast majority of

2 immunocompromised and nonelderly population that 3 additional doses add significant benefit, particularly 4 to the serious illness. He commented that the China 5 observation shows how difficult an intense mitigation 6 strategy is to sustain as a virus changes.

7 Chair Woodland thanked the Department of Health 8 for all of the public service announcements (PSAs), 9 especially with the reproductive age people because 10 those seem to be the most reticent and is where we are 11 seeing pregnancy outcomes and pregnancies being 12 affected in a major way. He commented that the data 13 is going to be astounding when published regarding 14 what the virus does to placentas and what that looks 15 like for women who have not been vaccinated.

16 Chair Woodland addressed the 2022 CDC report 17 regarding life expectancy by state, noting 18 Pennsylvania ranked 28 at 78.3 years. He mentioned 19 that has been dramatically affected in every state by 20 COVID and opioid use disorder because both of those 21 issues have increased mortalities over the last year. 22 Ms. Byrnes reported overdose deaths had been 23 going down pre-COVID but have shot back up and is 24 something the Department of Health is working on and 25 reviewing.]

* * * 1 2 Report of Board Chair 3 [Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., FACOG, Chair, announced 4 that this was Dr. Domen's last meeting. He thanked 5 Dr. Domen for his contributions to the State Board of Medicine and participation in the Federation of State 6 7 Medical Boards and wished him well. Chair Woodland recognized Match Week 2022, where 8 9 new providers will be coming to Pennsylvania and will 10 be the largest match ever recorded in history of 11 people coming to the area. He reported the northeast 12 region preliminarily did fairly well in most 13 specialties in the match, noting he would have a lot of data to present at the next Board meeting. 14 15 Chair Woodland addressed an American Medical 16 Association (AMA) study regarding physician turnover. 17 He noted the AMA had seen a turnover of primary care 18 physicians with an estimated cost of almost \$1 19 billion. He mentioned it results in additional health 20 care spending each year, not only to maintain and 21 recruit new providers but also to think about what 22 that looks like for Pennsylvania. He noted the great 23 resignation included all providers at all levels in 24 health care. 25 Chair Woodland addressed the 2022 Medscape

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Physician Suicide Report, noting many of the specialty societies are calling this out because the rate of physician suicide in the United States is remarkable as it applies to other high intensity industries because physicians are two or three times the amount. He noted suicidal ideation among physician providers being as high as almost 10 percent.

8 Chair Woodland mentioned that state and national 9 resources are available for physicians having suicidal 10 ideations and is something the Board should start 11 promoting heavier within the state and amongst the 12 State Board of Medicine on their website.

13 Chair Woodland noted the 2022 Federation of State 14 Medical Boards Annual Meeting is in April, and Dr. 15 Rachel Levine, who is Pennsylvania's past physician 16 general member of the Board, is going to be a keynote 17 speaker.

Chair Woodland mentioned Dr. Levine is now 18 19 Admiral Levine as the Assistant Secretary for Health 20 for the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services has been recognized by USA Today as one of the women 21 22 of the year for her courage and contributions to 23 medicine and issues of COVID and opioid use disorders. 24 He gave a shout-out to Dr. Levine for her 25 achievements.

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Chair Woodland mentioned Cory Feist from the 1 2 Lorna Breen Heroes' Foundation is also going to be a 3 keynote speaker. He noted the foundation was named 4 for Dr. Lorna Breen, a caring and compassionate 5 emergency room physician who committed suicide in 2022 6 during the early stages of the COVID-19 pandemic. Не 7 stated her death helped raise awareness of the heavy burden being placed on first responders in the 8 9 workforce and the ongoing issues of physician burnout 10 and wellness.

11 Chair Woodland noted his candidacy for the board of directors will be voted on by other members at the 12 13 April meeting. He commented that being a candidate 14 does not mean anyone is going to be elected to the 15 board of directors, and it is a vote of the delegates 16 who elect the board of directors. He requested Ms. 17 Byrnes take the information in his report back to the 18 Department of Health.

Dr. Silver offered to provide a summary on the Maternal Mortality Review Committee findings and the physician suicide issue.

22 Chair Woodland informed Dr. Silver that he would 23 request a formal presentation on maternal mortality at 24 the next meeting.

25

Dr. Silver addressed physician suicide, noting

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prior to COVID it was around 400 to 450 physicians who 1 2 committed suicide yearly, and that rate has increased 3 by 10 percent from just the overload, lack of being able to be with family members, and seeing multiple 4 5 deaths during the day. She reported the stigma as 6 being another issue in mental health with physicians, 7 where most physicians are apprehensive about coming forward with mental health problems for fear of their 8 license being taken away. 9 10 Dr. Silver again informed everyone of a physician 11 hotline available at any hour of the day. 12 Chair Woodland noted appreciation for Dr. 13 Silver's knowledge as a psychiatrist in this area and 14 for the resources.] * * * 15 16 Report of Acting Commissioner 17 [Arion R. Claggett, Acting Commissioner, Bureau of 18 Professional and Occupational Affairs, informed everyone that all Board meetings moving forward will 19 20 be held in a hybrid format providing the option of 21 attending virtually or in person. 22 Acting Commissioner Claggett and Ms. Hunter would 23 be attending all Board meetings in person, and the 24 meetings would be hosted on Microsoft Teams instead of 25 Cisco Webex.

25 Chair Woodland asked whether there was a 1 2 particular Board meeting that should be done in 3 person. He noted having discussions with Dr. Johnson, 4 where one or two Board meetings a year should be in 5 person to get the Board together. He mentioned being 6 able to see and hear better during the virtual 7 platform and noted safety issues for those driving and 8 attending in person.] 9 * * * 10 Report of Committee on Health-Related Professionals -11 No Report * * * 12 13 Report of Committee on Legislation/Policy Development 14 and Review 15 [Nazanin E. Silver, M.D., MPH, FACOG, stated the 16 Journal of Medical Regulations was calling for submissions in 2022. She noted the journal is the 17 18 primary vehicle in which the United States medical 19 regulatory community has shared knowledge about 20 licensure, discipline, and regulation. She encouraged 21 anyone who wished to submit to go to their website. 2.2 Dr. Silver addressed the Interstate Medical 23 Licensure Compact (IMLC), which is an agreement among 24 participating states to work together to streamline 25 the licensing process for physicians who want to

practice in multiple states and increase access to 1 2 health care. She noted 37 states have joined, but 3 there are some delays with Pennsylvania. 4 Ms. Walter commented that the compact has passed 5 in Pennsylvania but had not been implemented at this point in time. She offered to provide a more thorough 6 7 report at the next meeting regarding the status of the 8 IMLC in Pennsylvania.] 9 * * * 10 Report of Committee on Licensure Qualifications 11 [Donald M. Yealy, M.D., Vice Chair, noted having 12 vigorous evaluation of individual licensure requests 13 and actions and ongoing dialogue amongst the committee 14 and Board concerning learning opportunities.] * * * 15 16 Report of Vice Chair - No Report * * * 17 18 Motions (cont.) 19 MS. WUCINSKI: 20 I realized I missed a vote on agenda 21 item 20. Any abstentions? 12 [The motion carried unanimously.] 13 * * * For the Board's Information/Discussion - Old 14 15 Business/New Business [Dana M. Wucinski, Esquire, Board Counsel, referred to 16 17 the Federation of State Medical Boards opposition to 18 legislative efforts limiting medical boards' authority 19 to investigate patient harm. She noted the Federation 20 of State Medical Boards issued a statement on February 21 28, 2022, in opposition to all of the legislative 22 efforts in a specific statement that state medical 23 boards protect patients by investigating complaints, 24 evaluating the standards of care, and taking 25 disciplinary actions when appropriate.

Ms. Wucinski noted FSMB opposes legislation 1 2 intended to limit the board's ability to conduct its 3 important work as it sets a dangerous precedent and puts the public at risk. She further noted state 4 5 legislatures are encouraged to work with their state 6 medical boards to uphold existing statutory authority 7 to respond to complaints about the quality of care 8 provided and take disciplinary action against 9 physicians when necessary to protect the public.

10 Chair Woodland mentioned the importance of having 11 some of those being brought forth from the federation 12 to the state level to advise the Board of what is 13 going on at the federation level.

14 Ms. Wucinski referred to a letter from the Food 15 and Drug Administration to the Federation of State 16 Medical Boards from December 13, 2021, to bring 17 attention to FSMB about ivermectin prescribing. She 18 noted the letter points out the harm in claiming that 19 ivermectin can treat or prevent COVID-19 due to the 20 serious side effects that can be experienced with the 21 use of ivermectin.

22 Chair Woodland noted the letter educates everyone 23 as to where the FDA stands on ivermectin.

24 Dr. Yealy commented that the State Board of 25 Medicine's role is to respond to investigations that

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are often based on complaints and function on
selective cases rather than through only broad
legislative actions.

Ms. Walter addressed the Educational Testing Service (ETS) Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) internet-based test (iBT) Home Edition. She stated TOEFL now offers an at-home or third-party English proficiency exam option. She mentioned the State Board of Medicine does not see applications where the individual has taken the TOEFL very often.

Ms. Walter commented that the Educational Commission for Foreign Medical Graduates (ECFMG) has a component in their certification requiring an English proficiency examination that is separate from the TOEFL. She noted counsel would be asking for a vote to accept the TOEFL iBT Home Edition Examination in the instance it arises in an application.

18 Mr. Dillon commented that the Board of Nursing 19 has some discomfort about accepting the home edition 20 version. He stated the requirements for the home version are very strict and seem secure and requested 21 2.2 more time to obtain feedback from nursing colleagues. 23 Ms. Walter explained that a comparison between 24 the Board of Nursing and Board of Medicine is not fair 25 based upon the application and requirement process and

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different license types. She noted it appears to be a 1 2 secure pathway for the Board's purposes to obtain the 3 English as a second language requirement. Ms. Walter referred to Act 41, noting the English 4 proficiency portion is in there, along with other 5 6 English proficiency exams approved by the Board. She 7 stated the Board of Nursing does not have as many pathways to obtain English proficiency certification 8 9 as the Board of Medicine. She suggested tabling the 10 matter and offered to check the minutes and with the 11 Board of Nursing counsel and then provide the 12 information at the next meeting.] * * * 13 14 [Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., FACOG, Chair, referred 15 to the 2022 Board meeting dates listed on the agenda, 16 noting the next Board meeting is scheduled for April 17 19. Chair Woodland also mentioned the 2023 Board 18 meeting dates are listed as February 7, March 7, April 19 20 18, May 23, June 20, July 18, September 12, October 21 24, and December 12. 22 Ms. Walter informed everyone that she and Ms. 23 Wucinski would be in person for meetings starting 24 April 1.] 25 * * *
