Wucinski, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted Dr. 4 Zafar Iqbal appealed the decision of the Board to the 5 Commonwealth Court of Pennsylvania, which is currently being reviewed at Case No. 1190 C.D. 2020.] 6 Appointment - Prosecution Presentation on Practice 8 Education Remediation Collaboration (PERC) and 10 Nondisciplinary Voluntary Surrender Agreements 11 [Jason T. Anderson, Esquire, Board Prosecution 12 Liaison, presented to the Board to discuss Practice 1.3 Education Remediation Collaboration (PERC) and 14 Nondisciplinary Voluntary Surrender Agreements. Не 15 commented that the State Board of Nursing used PERC 16 Agreements for years. He explained that it is a 17 voluntary recovery program (VRP)-style agreement for a 18 practice issue related solely to education, where a 19 practitioner may do something in error because of a 2.0 lack of understanding. 2.1 Mr. Anderson mentioned that the agreements are 22

not discipline in the form of public disclosure unless they violate the terms. He stated that individuals are put under terms of a stay in suspension that is deferred while they receive the education as defined

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over a period of 6-12 months but is not put on the record if they perform all this and the agreement is satisfied and dismissed.

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Mr. Anderson addressed Nondisciplinary Voluntary Surrender Agreements. He stated the Board of Osteopathic Medicine and Board of Medicine used to have forms on their website where a person could apply for a voluntary surrender of their license. He explained that those were evaluated based on open cases and existing criminal actions and then an order was issued from the Board approving it as disciplinary or nondisciplinary.

Mr. Anderson noted the databank had issues with those over the years because of lack of information as to why the license was being surrendered or restricted, and this is an attempt to address that issue.

Mr. Anderson explained that they would be nondisciplinary consent agreements approved by the Board for the surrender of the license. He noted it would still be required to be reported to the databank because it is a restriction on licensure because they are surrendering their property interest but would be nondisciplinary, so it would not affect any reciprocal discipline or actions in other states.

Mr. Anderson stated the primary goal is for people who do not want their license anymore and to ease that transition. He explained that someone who obtained a license in Pennsylvania and has a property interest, letting it expire or go inactive does not prevent further action. He commented that this would only be for nondisciplinary, and disciplinary would still get the same voluntary surrender agreements or actions.

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Mr. Anderson further explained that it would not be available to the public to fill in the blanks and is for giving Board counsel and Board members an idea language-wise for the future if they are used and for prosecution to understand the format and template to be used.

Mr. Anderson stated the prosecution will be the ones drafting and providing these, and the Board would be signing off on them the same as other consent agreements. He mentioned that it is removing some of the work the attorneys had when there was just a form letter and making sure everything is included information-wise and still allowing the Board the opportunity to vote.

Chair Woodland commented that they could be modified for any nuances or circumstances.

Mr. Anderson noted Chair Woodland to be correct, where it is supposed to be the language that would be usually similar.

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Mr. Dillon asked whether other jurisdictions were precluded from acting or would know not to act based on the information.

Mr. Anderson stated it would be based on their own practice acts, but most practice acts are similar to Pennsylvania whether it is a disciplinary action in another state or restriction on practice in lieu of investigation. He commented that these are solely for people to want to get rid of a license and move somewhere else. He noted that things can come back as long as they still have property interest in Pennsylvania.

Chair Woodland noted the importance of trainees understanding the whole licensure issue to the depth of it and its implications to be able to stop a problem before it becomes an issue.

Mr. Anderson informed the Board of prosecution's outreach programs for schools.

Chair Woodland commented that the Board might engage those services, especially at the graduate medical education level where it is going to be important for them to understand the different state

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11 Report of Department of Health

12 [Carolyn Byrnes, M.P.H., C.P.H., Department of Health,

13 provided a COVID-19 update, noting 2,899,047 total

14 cases in the state of Pennsylvania as of Monday, which

15 | increased 11,331 over the weekend or 3,377 per day.

16 | She reported 1,180 hospitalizations, which is up 8

17 compared to Friday. She also reported 44,898 total

18 deaths.

19 Ms. Byrnes stated the Centers for Disease Control

20 and Prevention (CDC) is using COVID community levels

21 to illustrate risk. She reported 27 of Pennsylvania's

22 | 67 counties are green or low risk, 17 are yellow, and

23 23 are red or high risk as of May 19.

24 Ms. Byrnes reported Pennsylvania administered

25 | 19,603,894 vaccinations as of May 23 with 72.8 percent

of those 5 years of age or older who are fully vaccinated with the United States average at 70.7 percent. She noted also administering boosters and third and fourth doses.

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- Ms. Byrnes stated the CDC recommended children 5 to 11 years of age should receive a booster five months after their initial Pfizer vaccination as of May 19. She mentioned continuing to reach the under vaccinated populations.
- Ms. Byrnes addressed data from the CDC estimating that within the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) region for the week ending May 14 that 44 percent of all COVID cases were due to the Omicron BA.2 variant and 56 percent to BA.2.12.1, which is up 48 percent from the previous time period. She noted vaccination is expected to protect against severe illness, hospitalizations, and death from infection with the Omicron variant. She also noted therapeutics are available, and details on how to obtain treatment can be found on the Department of Health (DOH) website.
- Ms. Byrnes informed everyone that seasonal influenza activity in Pennsylvania and the United States was moderate as of the week ending May 14 with decreased activity over the past few weeks. She

reported a total of 79,892 laboratory-confirmed
influenza cases in 67 counties with a total of 62
confirmed influenza-associated deaths and 1 pediatric
death.

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- Ms. Byrnes reported five pediatric patients with hepatitis of unknown cause were identified at a hospital in Alabama in October 21. She noted the children had significant liver illness, including some with liver failure with no known cause. She stated the five children tested negative for hepatitis A, hepatitis B, and hepatitis C but tested positive for adenovirus, a common virus that causes cold or flulike illness or stomach or intestine problems.
- Ms. Byrnes mentioned that no known contact or common exposures were found among the children and no children had significant underlying medical conditions. She stated the CDC issued a health advisory on April 21 and 36 states reported at least one person under investigation, including Pennsylvania, as of May 18. She reported that the hepatitis does not seem to be associated with COVID or COVID vaccinations.
- Ms. Byrnes addressed monkeypox, noting cases have been reported in Europe and North America with one confirmed case by the CDC on May 18 in Massachusetts.

She stated cases of monkeypox have been previously identified in travelers or residents of West African or Central African countries where monkeypox has been seen regularly. She noted the CDC is issuing a health alert to ask clinicians in the United States to be vigilant to the characteristic rash associated with monkeypox.

Ms. Byrnes stated risk to the general public is low, but individuals should seek medical care immediately if you develop a new unexplained skin rash or lesions on any part of the body with or without fever and chills and avoid contact with others.

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Ms. Byrnes addressed the infant formula shortage, noting it to be largely driven by Abbott's product recall, supply chain issues, and market-based issues outside of the control of the Department of Health.

Ms. Byrnes stated the federal government is the primary regulatory jurisdiction over the companies that produce the formula and have been using the Defense Production Act to ensure access to all the resources needed to produce formula. She also stated the Biden administration recently launched Operation Fly Formula and expect shipment will transport the equivalent of 1.5 million 8-ounce bottles of formula.

Ms. Byrnes stated the Food and Drug

- 13 Ms. Byrnes stated the FDA is reporting shortages
- 14 of General Electric (GE) Healthcare intravenous (IV)
- 15 contrast media. She referred to a letter to GE
- 16 | Healthcare customers on April 19, where they were
- 17 | rationing orders after a COVID-19 lockdown temporarily
- 18 | shut down a production facility in Shanghai, China.
- 19 Ms. Byrnes informed everyone the Department of
- 20 Health issued a health alert regarding a global
- 21 shortage on May 16 that is expected to last through
- 22 June 2022. She reported manufacturers also provided
- 23 instructions on how facilities can make a single-dose
- 24 | vial into multiple doses.
- 25 Ms. Byrnes noted May is Lyme Disease Awareness

Month, and the Department of Health has a free webinar on the training website at pa.train.org for anyone interested in getting continuing medical education (CME). She stated additional resources are available for health care providers on their website.

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Ms. Byrnes noted May is also Mental Health
Awareness month and reminded everyone to take care of
themselves and look out for others. She mentioned
mental health resources are available on the pa.gov
website.

Chair Woodland thanked Ms. Byrnes for the presentation. He recognized what the state, country, and the world has gone through with COVID and asked everyone to take a moment to reflect upon the 44,000 deaths. He commented that the State Board of Medicine, along with the Department of Health, helped to open access and preserve access to providers in a meaningful way during this time and very much appreciate the activities and actions of everybody on the Board. He thanked the Department of Health for their blast regarding the IV contrast.

Chair Woodland addressed the public's reaction to monkeypox, noting that herpes is still a real thing and is not necessarily monkeypox.

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   review, it can relay that to staff in order to keep
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   the process of granting the license moving forward.
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He mentioned that if there are any cases where the committee does not feel comfortable or it disagrees on the acceptability of the pathway, then the cases go to the full Board. He reported two or three such cases since the last meeting.

Dr. Yealy commented that having vigorous conversation is healthy for the Board and who they serve, noting this is one of the areas where the Board is tasked to use consistency and flexibility at the same time.

Chair Woodland stated the Board is blessed to have Mr. Dillon as a public member and expressed appreciation for his ability to help with all the issues.]

22 | mentioned the feature speaker was Dr. Rachel Levine,

25 He informed Board members that Dr. Levine gave a

shout-out to the Pennsylvania State Board of Medicine.

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Chair Woodland mentioned there were speakers on protecting the public in times of turmoil and what is ahead in medical regulation, along with provided some ideas of what things looks like for the future.

Chair Woodland noted a report on COVID as well as the opioid epidemic by Regina LaBelle, who is the director of the Addiction and Public Policy Initiative at the O'Neill Institute for National and Global Health Law at Georgetown.

Chair Woodland stated the panel discussion about telemedicine and updates on the United States Medical Licensing Examination (USMLE) was helpful.

Chair Woodland addressed concurrent sessions on trends in continuing medical education, diversity, equity, and inclusion and physician sexual misconduct as well as digital credentials; communicating with licensees; and North Carolina Regulatory Immersion Series.

Chair Woodland addressed the importance of communicating with licensees and medical students. He mentioned FSMB asked the Board to consider State Board of Medicine Meetings be hosted by different educational institutions throughout the state, so people know what the Board does and the importance.

Chair Woodland noted a panel discussion about bending the truth, misinformation, and disinformation. He also noted a session on physician health and well-being. He addressed a presentation by the chief clinical officer of Google, Dr. Michael Howell, who spoke about healthcare technology and healthcare data collection, including on devices, and what the implications to licensure qualifications are on the state realms of an international type, if not global type, of resource.

Ms. Wucinski also addressed her attendance at the FSMB Annual Meeting. She reported significant changes to the USMLE since 2020. She noted pandemic disruption with emphasized collaboration with medical schools, faculties, and students at the local level. She stated USMLE expressed their appreciation to state medical boards for their flexibility and patience.

Ms. Wucinski addressed a shift in reporting of Step 1 from a score to a pass/fail. She explained that the outcome for Step 1 taken before January 25, 2022, would be reported in a numeric and pass/fail; but Step 1 taken after January 2022 is only going to be reported in a pass/fail.

Ms. Wucinski noted USMLE has opted the four-test limit but gives the boards the ability to request an

additional attempt. She reported Step 2 Clinical
Skills is still up in the air. She noted improvements
to the clinical skills assessment and with the
existing USMLE series.

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Ms. Wucinski noted there has been a diversity, equity, and inclusion aspect of the USMLE, along with working in enhancing practices related to the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). She noted the FSMB House of Delegates adopted a landmark formal policy on physician sexual misconduct in 2020. She discussed recommendations given by FSMB.

Ms. Wucinski addressed pandemic-related development with waiver discussion amongst other states and reported Pennsylvania is ahead of the game.

Chair Woodland mentioned that he has been pushing for more involved from everyone with the Federation of State Medical Boards. He noted being nominated as one of the candidates for the board of directors for the Federation of State Medical Boards and secured a two-year spot on the board of directors.

Chair Woodland noted FSMB came out with its annual report looking at data of the physician workforce in the country and provided a copy for the Board's review, along with the website.

Chair Woodland informed everyone that the

American Medical Association (AMA) came out this past
month with their 2021 Telehealth Survey that has
overlying implications for the Board when looking at
licensure and qualifications to better understand

Chair Woodland mentioned the growing issue in the state of Pennsylvania of gun violence and is planning to orchestrate a special presentation with Ms. Hunter.

Mr. Dillon also addressed his attendance at the Federation of State Medical Boards Meeting. He discussed spending time with public members from other jurisdictions, often talking with them about the chemistry of the boards and how well public members are accepted. He believed the vast majority of the public members felt the way he does as a public member, noting there is a lot of support for non-healthcare individuals being involved with this process.

Chair Woodland again noted being appreciative of Mr. Dillon's perspective and concepts, noting it to be an important part of the Board.]

25 [Shana M. Walter, Esquire, Board Counsel, addressed

House Bill 2401 of 2022 under the Health Care Facilities Act that would allow nurse practitioners and physician assistants to order home health care services.

Ms. Wucinski commented that Board counsel would reach out to Board members to get their position if they are asked to do any type of bill analysis.

Ms. Wucinski referred to House Bill 2419 of 2022, which addresses telehealth psychiatric and advanced practice professional supervision requirements in outpatient psychiatric clinics. She noted many behavioral health providers moved to an entirely virtual model to make mental health services more accessible during COVID, stating the legislation is going to help outpatient psychiatric clinics meet demand and address shortages.

Dr. Ripchinski commented that one of his staff members brought it to his attention that House Bill 2419 never defined treatment staff member in 2018. He noted it was an interesting find because not knowing whether treatment staff member includes a nurse, or a front desk person would affect the hours a psychiatrist would have to be participating for oversight.]
