He addressed 22 rules that would need to be in place, including 23 renting space and ensuring the meeting is available in 2.4 person and on Microsoft Teams. 25 Chair Woodland explained that his idea was to

invite students to their place of business and 1 2 facilitate using the hybrid model, where Dr. Yealy 3 could invite some of his University of Pittsburgh students and Dr. Ripchinski at Lancaster General 4 5 Health could have some of the residents and medical 6 students sit behind him in his office during public 7 session. Chair Woodland commented that he could borrow a 8 friend's office at Temple and do the same thing at 9

Temple and Penn without any problems, which would have less of an impact expense-wise for the Board and would not breach any security by using access through pa.gov.

Acting Commissioner Claggett stated the processwould work without any impact to the Board.

16 Chair Woodland suggested only one Board member 17 host a group at a time and invited both public members 18 as well as professional members. Dr. Yealy offered to 19 target the July meeting.]

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21 Report of Department of Health

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[Carolyn Byrnes, M.P.H., C.P.H., Department of Health, provided a COVID-19 update, noting 2,975,031 cases in the state of Pennsylvania as of June 15, 2022, which increased 2,165 on June 14, 2022. She reported 1,097

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1 hospitalizations and 45,580 deaths.

T	nospitalizations and 45,580 deaths.	
2	Ms. Byrnes stated the Centers for Disease Control	
3	and Prevention (CDC) is using COVID community levels	
4	to illustrate risk. She reported 47 of Pennsylvania's	
5	67 counties are green, 16 are yellow, and 4 are red as	
6	of June 16, 2022.	
7	Ms. Byrnes reported Pennsylvania administered	
8	over 22.3 million vaccinations with 73.4 percent of	
9	those 5 years of age or older who are fully	
10	vaccinated, and a United States average at 71 percent.	
11	On June 18, the CDC endorsed the	
12	Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP)	
13	recommendation that all children 6 months to 5 years	
14	should receive a COVID-19 vaccine.	
15	Ms. Byrnes noted also administering over 3.9	
16	million first booster doses and 586,478 second	
17	boosters.	
18	Ms. Byrnes addressed data from the CDC estimating	
19	that within the Department of Health and Human	
20	Services (HHS) region as of June 11, 2022, that 74	
21	percent of all COVID cases were due to the Omicron	
22	BA.2.12.1 variant and 12 percent due to BA.2. She	
23	reported BA.4 and BA.5 are increasing and comprised 14	
24	percent of cases. She stated vaccination is still	
25	expected to protect against severe illness,	

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1 hospitalization, and death. She mentioned 2 therapeutics are also available for preventing and 3 treating COVID-19 and details can be found on their 4 website.

5 Ms. Byrnes informed everyone that seasonal 6 influenza activity in Pennsylvania has decreased 7 significantly over the past few weeks. She reported a 8 total of 85,266 laboratory-confirmed influenza cases 9 have been confirmed in all 67 counties with a total of 10 65 confirmed influenza-associated deaths with 1 11 pediatric death.

Ms. Byrnes reported 40 states and Puerto Rico have reported at least one person under investigation (PUI), including Pennsylvania, with a total of 290 persons under investigation. She mentioned the hepatitis does not seem to be associated with COVID or COVID vaccinations.

18 Ms. Byrnes addressed monkeypox, noting cases have 19 been identified in 21 states and territories with more 20 than 2,500 cases from 37 countries, including 112 21 confirmed cases in the United States. She noted the CDC and Association of American Medical Colleges 2.2 23 (AAMC) recently requested the state boards assist in 2.4 sharing guidance on monkeypox with physicians. 25 Chair Woodland mentioned that there is

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information from the CDC and AAMC as far as a
 physician checklist for providers regarding diagnosis,
 evaluation, and management.

Ms. Byrnes reported two confirmed monkeypox cases in Pennsylvania as of June 16, 2022. She noted clinicians should consider monkeypox as a potential diagnosis and be referred to local public health or the Pennsylvania Department of Health at their Division of Infectious Disease Epidemiology at 717-10 787-3350.

11 Ms. Byrnes addressed the infant formula shortage, noting it to be largely driven by Abbott's product 12 13 recall. She informed everyone that Abbott resumed production on June 4, 2022, and restarted production 14 15 of EleCare aiming for an initial product release around June 20, 2022, but informed the Food and Drug 16 17 Administration (FDA) of a delay of product distribution of a few weeks due to severe weather and 18 19 flooding.

20 Ms. Byrnes stated the Department of Health (DOH) 21 has been working closely with the United States 22 Department of Agriculture (USDA) and the Pennsylvania 23 Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) Program and local 24 agencies to ensure consistent information flow. 25 Ms. Byrnes mentioned the Department of Health

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1 communicated through multiple product updates for WIC 2 recipients with as many as 17 substitutions. She 3 noted the federal government is bringing in shipments 4 of baby formula from other countries.

Ms. Byrnes provided an update regarding gun
violence. She stated the DOH has a Division of
Violence Prevention that runs the Pennsylvania Violent
Death Reporting System, which was established to
collect and disseminate accurate data of all violent
deaths in the target areas using the CDC's guidelines.
Ms. Byrnes addressed the sexual violence

12 prevention and education program and funding to the 13 Pennsylvania Coalition Against Rape. She also noted 14 having a Violence Dashboard, which is an interactive 15 tool designed to display aggregated statistics for 16 discharges and deaths.

Ms. Byrnes addressed PA Dashboard data for 2019, 17 18 where PA hospital discharges showed 141 firearm self-19 harm hospitalizations, 919 firearm assault 20 hospitalizations, 547 Pennsylvania deaths by homicide 21 with a firearm, and 968 by suicide with a firearm. 22 Ms. Byrnes noted Governor Wolf established a 23 Special Council on Gun Violence in August 2019 that 24 released a report in March 2020, including 35 25 recommendations for prevention. She stated Governor

Wolf has prioritized investing in community-lead gun 1 2 violence prevention efforts through the Pennsylvania 3 Commission on Crime and Delinquency Violence Intervention and Prevention grant program. 4 Ms. Byrnes reported \$15.7 million funded 40 5 6 projects through the grant program in December 2021 7 and another \$23 million was announced for a second round of grants in January 2022. She stated Governor 8 9 Wolf is calling on the General Assembly to pass 10 meaningful gun safety legislation. 11 Chair Woodland informed everyone that the Board 12 is going to invite someone to speak at the July 2022 13 meeting on gun violence progress, especially as it 14 relates to providers.] * * * 15 16 Report of Committee on Health-Related Professionals -17 No Report * * * 18 Report of Committee on Legislation/Policy Development 19 20 and Review - No Report [Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., FACOG, Chair, noted 21 22 there would be an update on committee structure later 23 in the meeting.] 24 * * * 25 Report of Committee on Licensure Qualifications -No

25 1 Report 2 * * * 3 Report of Vice Chair 4 [Donald M. Yealy, M.D., Vice Chair, noted continuing 5 to have ongoing dialogue amongst the committee members 6 on issues discussed during the meeting and individual 7 inquiries from around the commonwealth.] * * * 8 9 Report of Board Chair [Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., FACOG, Chair, addressed 10 11 the Tulsa shooting on June 2, 2022, noting it 12 highlighted the issue of gun violence and safety as a 13 health care crisis but also workplace violence. Chair Woodland stated the American Journal of 14 15 Managed Care in June 2022 reported 75 percent of the 16 nearly 25,000 workplace assaults occur annually in 17 health care settings, but only 30 percent of nurses 18 and 26 percent of emergency physicians have reported 19 these incidents of violence. He noted the importance 20 of enhancing workplace safety issues. 21 Chair Woodland commented that Surgeon General 22 Vivek Murthy's advisory brought up health care 23 burnout, resignation, and workforce issues, along with 24 the projected provider shortage. He mentioned that 25 the AAMC has been talking about this shortage for many

1 years but expanded it to not only include clinical 2 providers but also the 3 million essential lower wage 3 health care workers and projected a shortage of nearly 4 140,000 physicians by the year 2033. He also provided 5 a summary of the recommendations.

6 Chair Woodland informed everyone of a webinar on 7 June 23, 2022, "Women in Medical Professional 8 Regulation" on the Federation of State Medical Boards 9 (FSMB) website, which is a historic review by Dr. Lois 10 Nora regarding women in medicine as it relates to 11 licensure and regulation.

12 Chair Woodland addressed his attendance at the 13 FSMB Annual Meeting, noting FSMB adopted policies on 14 medical disinformation; telemedicine; diversity, 15 equity, and inclusion (DEI); and emergency 16 preparedness and response. He noted that what the 17 FSMB has adopted as far as policy could be found in 18 his report.

19 Chair Woodland mentioned discussion regarding a 20 common demographic dataset that would be used in most 21 state boards now to have comparable information from 22 each state as it goes forward.

23 Chair Woodland stated emergency preparedness
24 became critical during the time of the pandemic, where
25 responsible state licensure was ramped up quickly but

safely for individual citizenship and communities. 1 2 Chair Woodland noted he provided the CDC-AAMC 3 monkeypox information, including the clinician's 4 checklist, along with their website in his report.] * * * 5 6 Report of Board Counsel 7 [Shana M. Walter, Esquire, Board Counsel, addressed Senate Bill 1258 of 2022 regarding the creation of a 8 9 licensure class of anesthesiologist assistants. She 10 noted they are doing their part by providing a bill 11 analysis as requested by the legislative office 12 related to several issues that have been identified by 13 various sources. Ms. Walter informed Board members of a notice on 14 15 the Department of State website regarding a scam 16 concerning licensed professionals across the country. 17 She reminded everyone that licensees would never be 18 contacted for payment over the phone and to not 19 provide personal or financial information. She stated 20 BPOA initiates disciplinary action through the 21 administrative process and provides papers through 22 certified mail or by hand delivery. She recommended 23 everyone contact their local or state police 24 department if they have been a victim of the scam. 25 Chair Woodland commented that anesthesia is one

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of the priority places in most of the institutions 1 2 where everyone is really struggling, where enhancing 3 help for anesthesia friends is something that would be very positive in their own institution. 4 Ms. Walter addressed a question by a Board member 5 6 as to whether there has been much pushback from the 7 State Board of Nursing over the anesthesia assistants' program since they govern the certified registered 8 nurse anesthetists (CRNAs) and offered to ask Ms. 9 10 Pachter Schulder whether they have a position on record.1 11 * * * 12 For the Board's Information/Discussion - Old 13 Business/New Business 14 15 [Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., FACOG, Chair, addressed adjustments of committee assignments. He noted Dr. 16 17 Yealy is the chair of the Probable Cause Screening 18 Committee, Dr. Valigorsky is the second participant, 19 and Dr. Silver is the alternate. 20 Chair Woodland noted Mr. Eisenhauer is the chair 21 of the Committee on Allied Health-Related 22 Professionals, Dr. Ripchinski is the cochair, and Mr. 23 Dillon is also on the committee. Chair Woodland noted the Committee on 2.4 25 Legislation/Policy Development and Review is still

chaired by Dr. Silver, but Dr. Ripchinski is going to 1 2 be substituting for Dr. Yealy. 3 Chair Woodland noted the Committee on Licensure 4 Qualifications is still chaired by Mr. Dillon, along 5 with Mr. Eisenhauer and Dr. Yealy. 6 Chair Woodland addressed committee response time 7 and asked committee members to get back to the Board 8 administrator and counsel as quickly as possible.] 9 * * * 10 Public Comment 11 [Shana M. Walter, Esquire, Board Counsel, referred to 12 a comment in chat from Susan DeSantis, PA-C, 13 Pennsylvania Society of Physician Assistants, 14 requesting an update on changes in the Pennsylvania 15 Licensing System (PALS) regarding written agreements 16 and some instructions on the State Board of Medicine 17 website regarding written agreements. 18 Ms. Walter noted being aware of the questions posed by Ms. DeSantis and by other individuals 19 20 relating to the change in language and will have a 21 response probably within the next 7 to 10 days.] * * * 22 23 Upcoming Meetings 24 [Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., FACOG, Chair, noted the 25 next scheduled meeting is on July 26 and referred to

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the remaining 2022 meeting dates for the Board's 1 2 review. He encouraged Board members to contact Ms. 3 Hunter with any conflicts of those dates for quorum 4 confirmation. He also noted 2023 Board meeting dates are February 7, March 7, April 18, May 23, June 20, 5 6 July 18, September 12, October 24, and December 12.] 7 * * * 8 Adjournment 9 CHAIR WOODLAND: 10 I need a motion to adjourn this meeting. 11 DR.
