Any abstentions or recusals? 4 5 [The motion carried unanimously.] \* \* \* 6 7 Appointment - Pennsylvania College of Emergency 8 Physicians (PACEP) - Licensure Discussion and Mental 9 Health Presentation [Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., Chair, mentioned being 10 11 impressed by some of the questions about mental 12 illness and medical licensure. Dr. Hall, Dr. Dunham, 13 and Dr. Kraus offered to provide a presentation. He 14 also mentioned the topic is being discussed at the 15 federal level at the Federation of State Medical Boards (FSMB) as well. 16 17 Ronald V. Hall, M.D., FACEP, President, 18 Pennsylvania College of Emergency Physicians, provided 19 a presentation regarding mental health and health-care 20 providers. He stated, over the last couple of years, 21 everyone has been reading and watching news about the 2.2 mental health of health-care providers with hospitals 23 being under-resourced and providers experiencing their 24 own grief of patients and family members who have died 25 from COVID.

Dr. Hall addressed the death of Lorna Breen, an 1 2 emergency medicine physician at New York Presbyterian 3 Hospital, who died by suicide in April 2020. Нe 4 stated her death emphasized the cultural issues in 5 health care about not being able to take a break from 6 their jobs or seek care and more importantly signaled 7 a turning point on how physicians address mental 8 health. He mentioned that the Lorna Breen Health-Care 9 Provider Protection Act resulted from her death. 10 Eleanor Dunham, M.D., MBA, FACEP, Pennsylvania 11 College of Emergency Physicians, stated the 12 Pennsylvania Board of Medicine and other licensing 13 bodies are obligated to protect the public from 14 impaired physicians. She commented that, in terms of 15 impaired physicians, they are talking about mental 16 illness and not substance abuse. She noted that a lot 17 of professional licensing bodies can conflict with the 18 Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), which seeks to 19 prevent discrimination against those who have 20 disabilities and psychiatric and mental illness. 21 Dr. Dunham noted the difference between illness 22 and impairment and provided definitions. She reported 23 that mental illness in the medical profession is known 24 and actually starts in the first two years of medical 25 school, where statistics show that at the end of the

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1 first year that 57 percent of medical students have 2 moderate-to-severe anxiety or at the end of the first 3 year 27 percent have moderate-to-severe symptoms of 4 depression.

5 Dr. Dunham also reported that medical students 6 are more likely than their peers, who are not in 7 medical schools, to seriously consider suicide but 8 less likely to seek mental help with only 22 percent 9 of medical students seeking help for depression and 10 only 42 percent seeking help for suicidal ideation.

Dr. Dunham noted medical residents report stress and burnout; and physicians often feel isolated, do not take care of themselves, and may start prescribing antidepressants or anxiolytics or use other avenues, such as substance abuse, gambling, and retail therapy.

Dr. Dunham noted that prior to the pandemic the 16 17 suicide rate among male physicians was 40 percent 18 higher than men in the general population and 130 19 percent higher in female physicians than the general 20 population. She stated every year 300 to 400 21 physicians and medical students die by suicide. 22 Dr. Dunham addressed barriers and stigma related 23 to mental illness for medical professionals. She reported that 30 percent of first- and second-year 24 25 medical students do not use mental health services for

1 fear of stigma, and many medical professionals will go 2 out of town to get the help and also pay cash for 3 mental health treatment rather than having a record on 4 their insurance database.

Dr. Dunham stated the fear disclosure is not 5 6 unwarranted because medical students, who have used 7 psychiatric services, have reduced prospects for residency placements. She also reported that 8 9 practicing physicians who disclose a history of 10 psychiatric disorders or counseling have had 11 discrimination in hospital privileges, health 12 insurance, and malpractice insurance.

Dr. Dunham mentioned that there are still medical licensure questions about psychiatric illness on applications and renewal forms in 2021 and vary depending on the state.

Dr. Dunham addressed grading in terms of mental health questions asked on various licensure questions, noting Pennsylvania is an "A" and means there are no mental health questions or maybe there is one or two straightforward current impairment questions that do not mention mental health.

Dr. Dunham noted that the American Psychiatric
Association (APA) stand with Pennsylvania and have a
2015 position statement recommending medical licensing

bodies not ask applicants about past diagnosis and treatment of mental disorders. She mentioned that the American Medical Association (AMA) in 2009 also proposed a resolution against medical licensing bodies' questions about past mental illness and was approved with wide support.

7 Dr. Dunham also noted the Federation of State 8 Medical Boards state that there should not be any 9 questions about treatment or diagnosis of illnesses 10 but is not mandated and still up to each state to 11 decide.

Dr. Dunham explained that the Pennsylvania State Board of Medicine could help the future of physicians by emphasizing the importance of physician health, self-care, and treatment seeking for all health conditions on the medical licensing applications, state Board website, and other official Board communication.

Dr. Dunham mentioned that clarifying both in print and online that an investigation is not the same as a disciplinary undertaking, basically trying to remove the stigma is important. She noted the need to continue to examine the policies and procedures when a physician is impaired to protect the public but also to help and not hurt the physician in need of

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1 treatment.

2	Dr. Dunham mentioned the importance of being
3	aware of the potential burden any type of
4	investigation or disciplinary undertaking places on
5	the license by new or redundant regulatory
6	requirements.

7 Chair Woodland commented that the stressors of 8 the pandemic have only increased these issues and 9 thanked Dr. Hall and Dr. Dunham for the presentation 10 and is glad Pennsylvania is an "A" state and doing the 11 correct thing on the application process.

12 Dr. Silver noted being a former OB/GYN and 13 currently a practicing psychiatrist. She stated 14 mental health illness amongst health care providers is 15 not something to be ignored and is guite prevalent. 16 She referred to a book called Physician Suicide 17 Letters that talks about notes from physicians who 18 discuss their despair. She mentioned that oftentimes 19 they go unnoticed, because there is not a good 20 understanding or good avenues for physicians to seek 21 help without the negative consequences.

22 Chair Woodland commented that the numbers are 23 staggering being almost equivalent to two complete 24 classes of graduating students every year. He noted 25 the stigmata applied to mental health and people lying

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on questions, which is not what they want in their 1 2 providers either. He commented that one of the big 3 pushes from the federation is that they actually start to more proactively, at state board levels, start to 4 5 address mental health issues and wellness issues on a 6 bigger scale. 7 Commissioner Johnson suggested the presenters provide a link to the information to be shared as part 8 9 of their minutes or on our Board page. 10 Dr. Dunham noted the full presentation in the 11 references with links to many of the statistics. 12 Ms. Zerbe offered to also include the 13 presentation under the minutes from the meeting. 14 Chair Woodland again mentioned the importance of 15 raising awareness to the public and addressing the issue because of the provider shortage.] 16 \* \* \* 17 Report of Commissioner 18 19 [K. Kalonji Johnson, Commissioner, Bureau of 20 Professional and Occupational Affairs, noted 21 continuing to operate on the virtual platform through 22 March 31, 2022. He mentioned movement yesterday on 23 pending legislation regarding providing virtual 24 attendance to satisfy quorum requirements. He also 25 noted working to ensure the technology adequately

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reflects the new paradigm and will keep the Board 1 2 apprised as they move through the first guarter of 3 2022. Commissioner Johnson reminded everyone to update 4 5 their commonwealth username and password every 90 days 6 because the department will be relying on them in 7 greater detail with respect to Board travel through 8 the Commonwealth Out-of-State Travel Application 9 (COSTA) portal. Commissioner Johnson wished everyone a happy 10 11 holiday season and peaceful and restful new year. 12 Chair Woodland asked whether voting on the 13 motions be done electronically sometime in the 14 future.] \* \* \* 15 16 Report of Department of Health 17 [Denise A. Johnson, M.D., Physician General, 18 Department of Health, provided a COVID-19 update 19 utilizing data from Monday showing close to 25,000 20 cases over the weekend. She noted averaging 8,279 cases per day and a total of 1,843,137 cases. 21 She 22 reported hospitalizations are up with 4,501 patients 23 being hospitalized and 34,618 deaths. 24 Dr. Johnson reported seeing more respiratory 25 illnesses and hospitals being stressed, coupled with

29

staff from shortages and people out on quarantine. 1 2 She noted adult and pediatric ICU capacity is 3 somewhere between 11 and 15 percent. She stated 4 hospitals have been meeting and working 5 collaboratively with the Department of Health, Governor Wolf, legislators have continued to meet on 6 the vaccine task force facilitating vaccinations. 7 Dr. Johnson mentioned averaging 56,000 vaccines a 8 9 day with over 70 percent of Pennsylvania adults fully 10 vaccinated. She also mentioned over 300,000 pediatric 11 doses administered since November 2 and around 1.9 12 million booster doses. She informed everyone that 13 anyone 5 years old or older is eligible for the 14 vaccine and anyone 16 or older is eligible for the 15 booster.

Dr. Johnson noted the CDC's Health Alert Network 16 (HAN) issued a health alert on COVID-19 vaccinations 17 18 in pregnancy in September. It was noted that pregnant 19 people are more severely impacted with COVID and have 20 seen increased deaths. She noted 22 deaths in August 21 and reported an increase in stillbirths as well as 22 preterm deliveries. She noted working on educating 23 people that the vaccine is safe and effective in 24 pregnancy and can significantly improve the outcome. 25 Dr. Johnson addressed the Omicron variant, noting

1 it to be in most states and is taking over because it 2 has such high transmissibility. She reported about 40 3 percent of sequenced variants in the United Kingdom 4 (UK) were Omicron.

Dr. Johnson noted continuing to get the word out, 5 helping people get vaccinated, and making sure they 6 7 are collaborating with schools and community groups with pop-up clinics. She mentioned a lot of 8 pharmacies are having pediatric or family clinics. 9 She reported making people aware of other treatments 10 11 available, especially monoclonal antibodies but 12 infusion sites are having difficulties getting enough 13 staffing to have those available.

Dr. Johnson noted closely watching the approval process for the new oral antivirals that should be coming online and will be updating information as soon as it is available.

Dr. Johnson informed everybody that there is a critical blood shortage and requested those in good health to donate blood.

21 Dr. Johnson reported an increase in flu rates 22 over last year and reminded everyone to get their flu 23 vaccine, COVID vaccine, and booster.

24 Chair Woodland asked Dr. Johnson for an update on 25 opioid use disorder and gun violence.

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Dr. Johnson commented that Pennsylvania did a lot of work on the opioid epidemic, but the pandemic has really set things back tremendously. She noted people have more mental health issues that can cause them to self-medicate and a lot of stressors and difficulty in terms of accessing services.

7 Dr. Johnson reported a lot more fentanyl in the 8 drugs that are used, not only in opioids but also 9 contaminating stimulants as well. She also reported 10 an increase in stimulants as well as other drug use 11 that has gone up tremendously. She also noted seeing 12 a wider demographic, especially in African Americans 13 and Hispanics in this past year that is skyrocketing.

Dr. Johnson mentioned that gun violence is a priority for the governor and the administration and noted an uptick in violence. She noted continuing to work on getting all groups to agree on some priorities to move forward.]

20 Report of Committee on Health-Related Professionals
21 and Review
22 [Donald M. Yealy, M.D., noted that the committee
23 continues to work together on specific health-related
24 professional questions that come across the Board and
25 to provide input and guidance to the legislative arm

when they are being considered. He noted the 1 2 commonwealth is modernizing its approach to health-3 related professions in how they certify licenses. 4 Chair Woodland mentioned the expansion of the 5 Board with a permanent seat for a physician assistant 6 and another physician.] \* \* \* 7 8 Report of Committee on Legislation/Policy Development 9 and Review 10 [Donald M. Yealy, M.D., noted the committee provided 11 input on some recent legislation being considered by 12 the commonwealth but noted their role is distinctly different from the actual creation of it and are just 13 14 providing feedback on a variety of actions.] \* \* \* 15 16 Report of Committee on Licensure Qualifications - No 17 Report \* \* \* 18 Report of Vice Chair - No Report 19 20 \* \* \* Report of Board Chair 21 22 [Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., Chair, informed 23 everybody that the COVID Task Force is still up and 24 running and working diligently. 25 Chair Woodland mentioned referencing the

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Association of American Medical Colleges (AAMC) 1 2 workforce data on information regarding future provider workforce. He noted the importance of 3 4 focusing on the state to consistently keep good 5 trainees because of the potential workforce projected 6 shortage in the future. He discussed recent data on 7 physician retention in state of residency training, 8 noting Pennsylvania ranks at about 50 percent.

9 Chair Woodland mentioned Mr. Dillon approached 10 him regarding attending the Federation of State 11 Medical Boards Annual Meeting in New Orleans in April, 12 noting there would be further discussion about that 13 and determining delegates in the future.

14 Chair Woodland again referred to the current 15 stressors on the hospital system and the emphasis on 16 telehealth by the Federation of State Medical Boards 17 and how telehealth is being used, noting it will 18 affect them in the future regarding state boundaries 19 and licensure and other issues.

20 Chair Woodland addressed the impact of COVID on 21 surgical subspecialties. He stated the first thing 22 they did was buckle down on personal protective 23 equipment (PPE) when COVID hit, which limited their 24 PPE utilization on elective surgical procedures. He 25 mentioned that the bigger issue now is with the

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current staffing structure in the areas of surgery, 1 2 respiratory therapy, and all over the hospital from a 3 standpoint that COVID has put a stressor on that. 4 Chair Woodland asked everyone thank first-line 5 providers in health care for their services and 6 encourage them to stay in health care.] \* \* \* 7 8 Report of Board Counsel 9 [Dana M. Wucinski, Esquire, Board Counsel, referred to 10 House Bill 1862 regarding institutional licenses. She 11 stated the bill is consistent with the request of the 12 Pennsylvania Medical Society (PAMED) that was on the 13 agenda a couple meetings ago, along with The Hospital 14 and Healthsystem Association of Pennsylvania (HAP), 15 requesting the Board make permanent the temporary 16 COVID waiver allowing holders of institutional licenses to practice in more affiliated facilities. 17 18 Ms. Walter commented that the bill is meant to help with hospital shortages throughout the state, 19 20 noting regulations would have to be amended if the 21 bill passes. 2.2 Ms. Wucinski addressed House Bill 1956 regarding 23 anesthesiologist assistants. She stated the bill 24 would create licensure for anesthesiologist assistants 25 who are currently not licensed in Pennsylvania and

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outlines the education, training, and scope of
 practice for the license.

Chair Woodland mentioned that he presented the bill to their chair of anesthesiology for an opinion, where the entire department, almost universally, said they need a further breadth of service providers for anesthesia, and it would be very helpful.

8 Ms. Walter referred to Senate Bill 762 regarding 9 the Medical Care Availability and Reduction of Error 10 (MCARE) Act concerning an enhanced informed consent 11 for breast implant patients.

12 Ms. Walter addressed the Physician Assistant Modernization Act. She noted Act 79 of 2021 will 13 14 increase Board members by one physician assistant and 15 one physician, supervision does not require onsite presence for personal direction, and chart review 16 17 requirements have changed. She also noted that the 18 supervising physician would now determine 19 countersignature requirements except in certain 20 circumstances. 21 Ms. Walter mentioned that there is specific 22 authorization in the Act for delegates to submit a 23 written agreement on behalf of a physician and 24 physician assistant, unlike in the prior provision in 25 the Medical Practice Act, where written agreements are

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1 now effective upon submission. She noted provisions 2 for the Board to review 10 percent of all written 3 agreements submitted to the Board and the Board office 4 has executed the review process as required in the 5 Act.

6 Chair Woodland commented that the breast implant 7 bill is really a mirror of the Food and Drug 8 Administration (FDA) recommendations regarding breast 9 implants and is updating old news.

Ms. Walter referred to Senate Bill 923 regarding the prohibition on telemedicine for certain medications on the list kept by the FDA, including Suboxone and other medications for treatment and areas of health care.

Dr. Johnson mentioned the importance of being flexible in terms of treatment with the opioid epidemic. She referred to Suboxone being on the list, also noting the importance of expanding options for patients, especially in hard-to-reach areas.

20 Chair Woodland agreed with Dr. Johnson and noted 21 being cautious about unintended consequences and being 22 very careful about access to care and too vague on 23 things providers use to reach people, especially with 24 the issues of mental health and substance use 25 disorders.]

38 \* \* \* 1 2 For the Board's Information/Discussion - Old/New Business - Election of Officers for 2022 3 DR. DOMEN: 4 5 Looking at the chair position, do we have a nomination? 6 7 MR. All those in favor, say yea. Any nays? 13 Any 14 abstentions or recusals? 15 Congratulations. 16 [The motion carried unanimously.] \* \* \* 17 For the Board's Information/Discussion - Board 18 19 Committee List 20 [Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., Chair, addressed 21 committee assignments, noting the Committee on Health-2.2 Related Professionals will be led by Mr. Eisenhauer, 23 along with Dr. Yealy; the Committee on 24 Legislation/Policy Development and Review will be led 25 by Dr. Silver; and the Committee on Licensure

[The motion carried unanimously.] 1 \* \* \* 2 3 Public Comment 4 [Susan DeSantis, PA-C, Pennsylvania Society of 5 Physician Assistants, mentioned working over the last 6 two months to keep their physician assistants (PAs) up 7 to date in terms of changes that occurred with Act 78 8 and Act 79. She noted issues with technology and using the online platform with the written agreement, 9 which was in place from April with the language that 10 11 was accurate for April but not accurate after the 12 change. The online Written Agreement Change Form is 13 currently online, which is identical to the previous 14 past paper version that is not reflective of the Act. 15 Ms. DeSantis further explained that individuals 16 are uncertain on how to complete the form to reflect 17 what they are doing as a new start or when they are 18 going to change because of the way the form is 19 structured, where you have to do 100 percent every 10 20 days and if you are out of school for a year or have 21 the same specialty for a year, it does not give a way 2.2 to reflect that. 23 Ms. Walter commented that an update to the 24 Pennsylvania Licensing System (PALS) regardless of the 25 implementation of Act 78 and Act 79 is going to be

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1 limited or may not be able to occur at all because 2 they are currently looking at another system for 3 licensing.

She noted that any physician assistants who have 4 5 any questions on how to complete a form that reflects 6 the prior version of the Medical Practice Act and how 7 to reconcile that with the current version may contact 8 Ms. Zerbe and her staff as well as her and Dana. She 9 also offered to engage in additional discussions about 10 the Written Agreement Change Form and what they can do 11 given the technology.

12 Ms. DeSantis further explained that in a 13 facility, they are looking at modifying their 14 electronic medical record (EMRs) so the PAs are not 15 required to have 100 percent of their charts forwarded 16 to the physicians and changing their bylaws and 17 looking at information technology (IT) changes, but 18 when they hire a new person, they open the Written 19 Agreement Form, get to the countersignature section, 20 it only gives them the choice to say that 100 percent 21 of their charts will be countersigned in 10 days, but 22 in that particular facility for that particular 23 physician and PA relationship, they are looking to 2.4 make a reduction, which was approved in Act 79, but 25 they cannot because of the form.

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Ms. DeSantis is investigating ways for those individuals to be able to tell you they are looking to reduce this even though the PALS form is blocking that out as a choice. She asked how can they tell you, whether it is the change form and follow up or can they do that as an addendum as a second attachment to the original written agreement.

Ms. DeSantis addressed PAs being in a situation 8 9 where they are only having 10 percent of their charts 10 signed instead of 100 percent. She noted they are 11 brought before the Board if there is an issue for a 12 review, questioning why they do not have all of their 13 charts signed, because your written agreement says 14 that you are supposed to and they are saying Act 79 15 said I could reduce this but tried to reduce it but 16 could not tell you that in PALS.

Ms. DeSantis noted understanding PALS is a problem and going to a new system but is just trying to help the PAs on how to answer that question.

20 Commissioner Johnson recommended providing more 21 information and allowing them to do the job they are 22 entrusted to do within the scope of the existing 23 statutory parameters that have been laid out. He 24 suggested being creative in how she communicates the 25 information to them and they are going to have to be

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1 equally creative in the way they pull that information 2 out of the documents provided and they will make it 3 work until they get to the new system where this will 4 not be an issue.

5 Commissioner Johnson noted a comment from Ms.
6 Marshall in chat with respect to that conversation and
7 questions about the informational webinar.

Commissioner Johnson commented that when they 8 9 engage in the actual request for proposal (RFP) 10 process that it will be a public process, and there 11 will be opportunities to engage stakeholders. Нe 12 stated that they fully intend to engage all 13 stakeholders with respect to not only informing them 14 of the RFP process but making sure they are working 15 with them to develop a new platform that is intuitive 16 and easily communicative with respect to individuals across all 29 boards and commissions. 17

18 Chair Woodland thanked everyone for their help 19 and assistance over the last year. He noted looking 20 forward to seeing everybody in the New Year and wished 21 everybody a happy holiday season.]
