* * * 1 2 State Board of Physical Therapy 3 July 24, 2023 * * * 4 5 [Pursuant to Section 708(a)(5) of the Sunshine Act, at 10:00 a.m. the Board entered into Executive 6 7 Session with Thomas M. Davis, Esquire, Board Counsel, 8 for the purpose of conducting quasi-judicial 9 deliberations and to receive advice of counsel on 10 matters upon which the Board would later vote. The 11 Board returned to open session at 10:30 a.m.] * * * 12 13 The regularly scheduled meeting of the State 14 Board of Physical Therapy was held on Monday, July 15 24, 2023. * * * 16 Official Call to Order 17 18 [Cynthia L. Potter, PT, DPT, Chairperson, officially 19 called the meeting to order at 10:42 a.m.] * * * 20 21 Roll Call of Board Members 22 [Cynthia L. Potter, PT, DPT, Chairperson, provided a 23 roll call of Board members.] * * * 24 25 Introduction of Attendees

1 [Thomas M. Davis, Esquire, Board Counsel, provided an 2 introduction of attendees. 3 * * * 4 Approval of minutes of the May 4, 2023 meeting 5 CHAIR POTTER: 6 Are there any additions or corrections 7 to the minutes? Hearing none. 8 Is there a motion to approve the 9 minutes? 10 DR. CAMPBELL: 11 So moved. CHAIR POTTER: 12 13 Is there a second? 14 MR. ROBB: 15 Second. CHAIR POTTER: 16 It has been moved and seconded to 17 18 approve the minutes as presented. We will do a roll call vote. 19 20 21 Potter, aye; Campbell, aye; Grzybek, 22 abstain; Mackell, aye; Reddy, abstain; 23 Robb, aye; Ruby, abstain; Wolfe, 24 abstain. 25 [The motion carried. Geraldine Grzybek, Sirisha

Reddy, Craig Ruby, and Krista Wolfe abstained from 1 2 voting on the motion.] 3 4 Appointment - Introduction 5 [Michael McDonald, Policy Director, Department of 6 State, introduced himself and provided a brief 7 history of his professional background. He informed everyone that the policy office assists all of the 8 9 licensing boards and commissions to review and draft 10 policy initiatives, along with reviewing legislation. 11 Mr. McDonald noted they work closely with Board 12 Counsel to review and draft regulations and other 13 strategies and policies the Board would like to 14 implement. He offered to be a resource for the Board 15 concerning research and questions on other 16 jurisdictions. 17 Mr. McDonald thanked Board members for their 18 service to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. 19 Dr. Campbell commented that it takes over two 20 years to get policies from start to finish and 21 several steps in the process that take a long time. 22 Mr. McDonald explained that many of those steps 23 are out of their control, because people need to 24 weigh in on policies and regulations. He noted being 25 aware of the length of time it takes to get those

1 across the finish line and that counsel is looking at 2 how they can expedite some of those issues and 3 policies.

Chair Potter asked whether it would be
appropriate for the Board to modernize and update
language in the Physical Therapy Practice Act because
it dates from 1975.

Mr. McDonald stated the Board could make those 8 9 changes and the Office of Policy could be 10 participants in the legislative process. He noted that changes to the act would have to be enacted in 11 12 the legislature, but they could work with the 13 legislature to recommend changes to practice acts or legislation that may impact licensees or the Board. 14 15 Mr. McDonald also mentioned that they could take 16 ideas from the Board to their partners in the General 17 Assembly because there is a process for requesting 18 legislative changes or recommending legislative 19 proposals. 20 Chair Potter welcomed and thanked Mr. McDonald

1 Acting Senior Prosecutor, presented the Consent 2 Agreement for Case No. 22-65-007384.] 3 MR. DAVIS: 4 Now that we've heard the presentation 5 of the Consent Agreement, are there any Board members who would like to reenter 6 7 Executive Session to further discuss 8 this particular matter? Hearing none. 9 Based on the Board's discussions in Executive Session, I believe the Chair 10 11 would accept a motion to approve the 12 Consent Agreement in the following 13 matter: Case No. 22-65-007384? 14 MS. GRZYBEK: 15 So moved. 16 CHAIR POTTER: 17 Is there a second to the motion as read 18 by counsel? DR. RUBY: 19 20 I'll second it. 21 CHAIR POTTER: 22 The motion has been moved and seconded. 23 We will do a roll call vote. 24 25 Potter, aye; Campbell, aye; Grzybek,

Craig John Edson, PT.] * * * 5 Report of Board Counsel - Regulations 6 7 [Thomas M. Davis, Esquire, Board Counsel, informed Board members that the Office of General Counsel 8 9 approved early exam and continuing education for 10 clinical education at 16A-6522 on June 16 and then sent it to the Office of Attorney General. 11 12 Mr. Davis noted receiving a tolling memorandum 13 from the Office of Attorney General with questions 14 and explained that a tolling memorandum is the 15 vehicle through which the Attorney General's Office 16 inquires whether the Board can do what they are 17 attempting to do under the law. He mentioned that he 18 has 30 days to answer that memorandum but is just 19 about done. He explained that it should be published 20 shortly in the Pennsylvania Bulletin once the Office 21 of Attorney General approves it and he would notify 22 the Board of the 30-day comment period. 23 Mr. Davis also noted movement the Board's 24 regulation with relation to the Physical Therapy 25 Compact legislation and he is currently putting

1 together the annex for the next Board meeting. He
2 reminded everyone that the regulation is held up
3 because of the need for legislation regarding the FBI
4 background check.

5 Dr. Campbell asked whether Mr. Davis had any 6 conversations with the commissioner's office 7 concerning the delay of data sharing out of the 8 Pennsylvania Licensing System (PALS) or a new system. 9 Mr. Davis explained that Commonwealth Procurement 10 hasreceived a few quotes and he noted a committee has 11 been formed to review those quotes.]

13 Report of Board Counsel - Miscellaneous 14 [Thomas M. Davis, Esquire, Board Counsel, addressed 15 House Bill 1491 regarding expanding direct access to 16 physical therapy. He noted the prime sponsor is 17 Representative Pat Gallagher and the bill has been 18 put forward in the House. He provided a memorandum 19 written by the bill's cosponsors that read: 20 Currently physical therapists may treat patients 21 without a referral from their licensed physician for 22 up to 30 days after the first treatment was given. 23 In most cases, there is no need for an individual to 24 see a primary care physician before seeing a physical 25 therapist, so making an additional trip for a

1	referral prior to the 30-day time frame is
2	unnecessary and time-consuming. I plan to introduce
3	legislation to timeframe this deadline from 30 to 60
4	days to save individuals' valuable time and money.
5	This change gives individuals longer direct access to
6	physical therapy, during which many of their issues
7	may be solved. The legislation also removes a
8	redundant and unnecessary certificate of
9	authorization to practice physical therapy without a
10	referral from a physician.
11	
12	Mr. Davis stated House Bill 1491 was referred to
13	the House Professional Licensure Committee on June
14	22, 2023, and he explained that hepresented it to the
15	Board for general awareness. He encouraged anyone
16	who wished to have their voice heard regarding the
17	pending legislation to contact a professional
18	organization that represents their interests or local
19	representative.
20	Mr. Davis provided an overview of the annual
21	report from prosecution to the General Assembly. He
22	noted Carolyn DeLaurentis, the deputy chief counsel
23	for the prosecution division, presented this same
24	information to the Board at a past meeting and
25	mentioned at that time of her presentation she

1 promised to provide the Board with a written report. 2 3 Mr. Davis noted receiving that report and 4 disseminating it to Board members that showed 28,042 5 active licensees with 82 opened cases, 79 current 6 open cases, 88 closed cases, and average time to 7 close a case was 325 days. Mr. Davis noted the Board had 26 cases in which 8 9 prosecution was not warranted, 36 cases that ended in 10 a warning letter being sent out, 13 professional conduct cases, 26 DUIs, and 10 fraud cases in the 11 12 practice of the profession. 13 Mr. Davis stated the report is public information 14 but not on the Board's website. He noted providing 15 an overview of the largest numbers, noting the rest 16 are less than 1 percent of the cases. He encouraged 17 anyone who wished to have a copy to email the Board 18 or contact him.] * * * 19 20 Report of Board Chairperson 21 [Cynthia L. Potter, PT, DPT, Chairperson, addressed 22 her attendance at the Federation of State Boards of 23 Physical Therapy Model Practice Act Workshop in 24 Alexandria, VA, along with Board Administrator 25 Michelle Roberts. She noted the American Physical

Therapy Association (APTA) Pennsylvania Chapter 1 2 President, Scott Voshell was in attendance as well. 3 Chair Potter informed everyone that the 4 Federation of State Boards of Physical Therapy has 5 updated the Model Practice Act to provide 6 jurisdictions around the country with some model 7 language as a resource for those updating or changing 8 their practice acts.

9 Chair Potter explained that the purpose of the 10 FSBPT Model Practice Act Workshop was for both 11 jurisdictional board members and APTA chapter 12 presidents to look jointly at the practice act, 13 compare it to the model language, and have a 14 discussion on areas that may need to be improved.

15 Chair Potter also addressed the Federation of 16 State Boards of Physical Therapy Leadership Issues 17 Forum, noting Michelle Roberts is their delegate for 18 federation meetings this year and attended on the 19 Board's behalf.

Ms. Roberts informed Board members that she would be sending out an email regarding voting delegates and requested feedback from Board members for October.

24 Chair Potter commented that the main purpose of 25 the FSBPT Leadership Issues Forum is to get feedback

13 from jurisdictions about Board issues. 1 2 Dr. Campbell noted being identified as the 3 alternate delegate for October because Ms. Grzybek 4 and Dr. Wolfe were in a gap regarding terms. She 5 mentioned that she would give up that appointment if 6 other Board members were interested. 7 Mr. Davis suggested placing that on the agenda 8 for the next meeting because the Board should not be 9 voting on anything that is not on the agenda but also 10 noted the Board could amend the agenda and have a 11 vote for the alternate.] CHAIR POTTER: 12 13 Is there a motion to amend the agenda 14 to add voting for an alternate delegate 15 to the annual FSBPT Meeting? 16 MS. GRZYBEK: So moved. 17 18 DR. CAMPBELL: Second. 19 CHAIR POTTER: 20 21 It has been moved and seconded to amend 22 the agenda. We will do a roll call 23 vote. 24 25 Potter, aye; Campbell, aye; Grzybek,

DAVIS: Based on the Board's discussions in 21 22 Executive Session, I believe the Chair 23 would accept a motion to ratify the 24 Education Committee's decision to grant 25 the requests of the following

individuals permission to take the 1 2 National Physical Therapy Exam a Third 3 Time: Oksana Seiple, Madison Novotny, 4 Madisson Bear, Emily Ledyard, Eduardo 5 Garnica, Alyssa Cairns, Zachary Muye. Grzybek, PT, GCS, volunteered to assist 8 with the committees. 9 Dr. Campbell requested the addition of another 10 person on the Education Committee and Probable Cause 11 Screening Committee. 12 Mr. Davis noted that the Board could amend the 13 agenda to have that vote or wait until the next 14 meeting. 15 Dr. Campbell provided an overview of the 16 Education Committee's responsibilities, including 17 reviewing requests for a third attempt that take 18 approximately 10 or 15 minutes per applicant. She 19 also provided an overview of applicants via Act 20 41endorsement. 21 Dr. Campbell addressed the role of the Probable 22 Cause Screening Committee, noting they review any of 23 the immediate actions that prosecution would like to 24 have done and provided an example. She noted that 25 anyone on the committee and involved with individual
