Potter, PT, DPT, Chairperson, announced receiving notification that the state of Delaware will 17 18 begin issuing and accepting Compact privileges as of 19 September 20. She mentioned that the Board's Compact 20 activity would be more practical with more neighboring 21 states having Compact privileges. 2.2 Chair Potter stated that the Federation of State 23 Boards of Physical Therapy (FSBPT) also sent a letter 2.4 to the National Governors Association regarding 25 appointments to state licensure boards. She noted the

letter was in regard to guidelines for Governors to consider when making appointments to state boards.

Chair Potter stated that Governors should consider diversity, equity, inclusion, and belonging initiatives when looking for board candidates and review their guidelines for making appointments so that boards may become more representative of consumers of physical therapy rather than just the members of the profession that are being regulated.

Chair Potter noted the Federation of State Boards of Physical Therapy is also encouraging timely appointments to the licensing and regulatory boards because people are best served when there is a full complement of board members.

Chair Potter commented that she was not sure what happens to the letters or how they are distributed to the individual governors but wanted to make the Board aware of the effort.

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Report of Board Counsel - Regulations
[Thomas M. Davis, Esquire, Board Counsel, provided a regulatory update, noting the early exam regulation
16A-6522 and licensure by endorsement under Act 41
16A-6523 have been moving a little bit. He noted that he and Regulatory Counsel have passed the early exam

and continuing education (CE) back and forth a few
times regarding administrative changes, but she wants
a greater explanation as to why the Board has decided
to do what it is doing or why the Board chose to go in
one direction versus another.

Mr. Davis informed the Board that he was working on the changes and is hoping to have that to her by the end of the month.

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Mr. Davis addressed licensure by endorsement under Act 41 and said he is waiting to be provided with application numbers from last year but that regulation should also be moving in the very near future.

Mr. Davis provided an update on the child abuse regulation, noting it was published as final in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* on August 7, 2021, and is currently in full force and effect.

Ms. Grzybek thanked Mr. Davis for the report and working diligently on 16A-6522 and 16A-6523 and requested further information concerning the next step.

Mr. Davis explained that after the language is finalized with Regulatory Counsel, the package goes to the Office of General Counsel (OGC) for review. He noted the package then goes to the Office of Attorney

General for form and legality review and explained it
also must be approved by the Budget office, Policy
office, and a few other offices before finally going
to the Legislative Reference Bureau for publication in
the Pennsylvania Bulletin.

- Mr. Davis stated, upon publication as a proposed rulemaking in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, that publication starts the 30-day comment period. He explained that it is then brought back to the Board after the 30-day comment period, where he would inform the Board of any public comments and for discussion of any possible amendments.
- Mr. Davis commented that the child abuse regulation went quickly because every board at the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs (BPOA) is utilizing essentially the exact same rulemaking, so once they got that locked down, it has been moving very quickly.
- Dr. Campbell requested an update regarding the physical therapy (PT) Compact now that Delaware is going to be issuing privilege, noting legislation has passed but mentioned some hang-ups before the Board could start moving forward with writing regulations and issuing privileges.
- 25 Mr. Davis explained that there are issues

1 concerning the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI)
2 background check language and noted contacting an
3 individual at the Pennsylvania State Police last month

Mr. Davis stated the background check issue is not at the Board level right now and require legislative tweaking. He explained that the FBI has their own rules and regulations and trying to make them congruent with both the Pennsylvania State Police and the Department of State is a juggling act.

Mr. Davis believed that the legislature is more than aware of it because the background check issue affects several of the Compacts and is being worked on. He noted sending a copy of the PT Compact over to the Pennsylvania State Police, and they were transmitting to the FBI, trying to get a definitive answer as to what changes were needed in the language but had not heard a response as of yet.

Mr. Davis stated it is at the legislative level, and he would provide any information once he receives a response.]

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23 Appointment - Applicant, Jared Krater - Request for 24 3rd Attempt

25 | [Jared Krater presented to the Board to request a

- third attempt at the National Physical Therapy
  Examination. He informed the Board of stressors in
  his life over the past two years.
- Mr. Krater addressed his study plan to prepare 4 5 for the examination, including more emphasis on 6 musculoskeletal and anatomy sections of the actual exams and practical exams. He noted not being able to the Practice Exam and Assessment Tool (PEAT) because he has not been approved for the exam by the 10 Federation of State Boards of Physical Therapy (FSBPT) 11 but would be soon. He has been utilizing 12 Scorebuilders and the National Physical Therapy Exam 13 prep course.
  - Mr. Krater commented that he wanted to save a lot of the prep work until the month before he takes the exam, whether in October or January, to make sure it was fresh in his mind. He noted having a good friend, who is a physical therapist, and how this friend has been helping him but said he would get a mentor if he fails the exam again.

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Dr. Campbell appreciated Mr. Krater's desire to utilize PEAT because she personally feels they are the "best" because they utilize old exam questions. She emphasized the importance of understanding what the right answer is and why and to also understand why the

other answers are wrong. She recommended he utilize
the study mode and remember that all questions on the
National Physical Therapy Examination (NPTE) link back
to textbooks and should be a primary source.

Ms. Wolf asked Mr. Krater whether he would best excel in October or January given the life stressors, noting the difficulty of the exam because she helps prepare it.

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Mr. Krater commented that he did not want to push it off again but would understand if he was given until January because it would give him four months. He would know he was taking the exam in January and push through it, but at the same time, would not mind trying to power through over the next month and a half as well.

Chair Potter informed Mr. Krater that the Board would act on his request today, and he would hear from the Board administrator.

Mr. Krater asked whether he could request to take the exam a fourth time if he fails the third attempt.

Chair Potter informed Mr. Krater that FSBPT allows six attempts; however, regulations only allow three attempts in Pennsylvania.]

Kalonji Johnson, Commissioner, Bureau of 24 Professional and Occupational Affairs, announced the 25 expiration of the COVID-19 emergency declaration on

September 30, 2021. He informed the Board of the return to in-person meetings beginning October 1, 2021, at Penn Center. He noted all Commonwealth of Pennsylvania employees will require masks and observe the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) guidelines.

Commissioner Johnson announced the ban on physical travel has been lifted and requests for regional or national conferences are being accepted. He encouraged Board members to submit paperwork early due to staffing shortages. He mentioned the allowance of two members for physical travel but encouraged virtual attendance. He reminded everyone that a formal motion and vote for travel requests must be on the record as part of the Sunshine Act requirements.

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Chair Potter questioned whether there has been any progress with the request for information (RFI) or request for proposal (RFP) regarding continuing education.

Commissioner Johnson stated they are continuing to formalize the RFI and have completed their initial review of the continuing education (CE) requirements for each of the boards and would be happy to share that information at the next meeting. Dr. Campbell requested more information concerning returning to in-

person meetings and whether there is any capacity as
far as a technology perspective and an opportunity for
any guests to participate virtually. She mentioned
students, candidates, and visitors are driving across
the state for 10 minutes of the Board's time, which is
not an effective use of their time and travel
resources.

Commissioner Johnson commented that it would involve some form of legislation change in half of the boards because it is a legislative provision within the practice act. He noted the General Assembly was aware of that burden and working on solutions, and there was not much the Board could do. He explained that currently, Penn Center is not wired for a virtual type of platform, but they are working on acquiring the proper technology.

Dr. Campbell mentioned prior discussion during the Board meeting concerning the PT Compact, where Mr. Davis indicated the issue is a legislative one and related to FBI background checks. She asked Commissioner Johnson whether he had anything else to add about the PT Compact for all of the boards.

Commissioner Johnson noted Mr. Davis to be correct, stating the United States Department of Justice is about as stringent with their information

sharing policy as it gets and have put a strangle hold 1 2 on most, if not all, of the Compacts because of the 3 data transfer protocols they require as opposed to what is envisioned in any of the Compact charter 4 5

Ms. Grzybek referred to the User Guide for Boards, Commission Members, and Non-Commonwealth Travelers, dated April 13, 2021, regarding traveling guidelines and questioned whether it is the resource everyone should be referring to when making travel plans.

Commissioner Johnson commented that it should be the updated document but would provide the Board with the correct information. He mentioned it to be the specific site of the online process through the cost of travel portal.

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[Geraldine M. Grzybek, PT, GCS, Secretary, addressed 20 the upcoming Federation of State Boards of Physical 21 Therapy Meeting Delegate Assembly October 21-23, 2021.

22 She informed everyone that a Candidate Forum will be

23 conducted on Thursday, October 21, 2021, with the

24 Delegate Assembly on October 23, 2021. She stated one

25 job of the assembly is to elect future leadership and proudly announced the Board's own Cindy Potter from
Pennsylvania as a candidate for secretary, along with
Tina Baum from South Dakota, who is also running for
that position.

Ms. Grzybek noted Ruggie Cunizares of Oregon and Steven Scherger of Minnesota are on the slate for treasurer; Ellen Donald of Florida and Elizabeth Locke from Virginia for director; and Ron Barredo of Tennessee and Deborah Richardson Peter of the Virgin Islands for a nominating committee member. She stated the candidate forum will be conducted for another opportunity to hear from the candidates and interview the candidates on Thursday, October 21, 2021, with elections on October 23, 2021.

Ms. Grzybek addressed four motions to be brought forward at the Delegate Assembly Meeting, including an update of the bylaws. She noted the FSBPT is looking at the rules of the delegates and to further clarify across the leadership forum, the annual meeting, and delegate assembly. She stated the proposed bylaws also include a provision for annual elections to be held online. She noted the third revision in the bylaw changes is that submission of annual reports will be conducted annually without a specific requirement to be reported in conjunction with the

meeting.

Ms. Grzybek stated motion number two looks at adoption of areas of focus, including examinations; membership; states' rights, responsibilities, and professional standards; education; leadership; and organizational and financial stability.

Ms. Grzybek discussed motion number three, which would rescind the requirement for an annual review of areas of focus. She stated currently the areas of focus represent the activities required to achieve the mission of the FSBPT. She noted the areas of focus rarely change, much like the mission and vision of the FSBPT. She noted the FSBPT Board of Directors pledge they would engage the membership in discussion prior to adoption should a change be recommended.

Ms. Grzybek noted the fourth motion proposes to increase the FSBPT Board of Directors stipend from \$10,000 for the board president and \$5,000 for all other members of the Board to \$16,000 for the president and \$8,000 per member of the board. She mentioned that the stipends have been in place since inception in 1998. She stated they are considering the stipend amount be reviewed as a matter of policy and submitted in the annual budget.

Ms. Grzybek encouraged Board members to review
