3 * * * 1 2 State Board of Psychology 3 February 6, 2023 * * * 4 5 [Pursuant to Section 708(a)(5) of the Sunshine Act, at 9:30 a.m. the Board entered into Executive Session 6 7 with Tyesha C. Miley, Esquire, Board Counsel, for the 8 purpose of conducting quasi-judicial deliberations on 9 a number of matters that are currently pending before 10 the Board and to receive the advice of counsel. The Board returned to open session at 10:30 a.m.] 11 * * * 12 13 The regularly scheduled meeting of the State 14 Board of Psychology was held on Monday, February 6, 15 2023. Catherine S. Spayd, Ph.D., Chair, called the meeting to order at 10:30 a.m. 16 * * * 17 18 Approval of minutes of the December 5, 2022 meeting 19 CHAIR SPAYD: 20 Approval of the minutes for December 5. 21 Does anyone have any comments 22 regarding the minutes? 23 [The Board discussed corrections to the minutes.] 24 CHAIR SPAYD: 25 Any other comments on the minutes? Do

1 we have a motion to approve the minutes? 2 3 DR. DONGIOVANNI: 4 I'll approve as amended. DR. SMALL: 5 Second. 6 7 CHAIR SPAYD: 8 Thomas, are you going to do a roll 9 call? 10 11 Spayd, aye; Claggett, aye; Erickson, 12 aye; DonGiovanni, aye; Harrison, aye; 13 Small, aye. 14 [The motion carried unanimously.] 15 * * * [Tyesha C. Miley, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted the 16 17 meeting was being recorded, and those who continued 18 to participate were giving their consent to be 19 recorded. 20 Ms. Miley also noted the Board met in Executive 21 Session to have attorney-client consultation and for 22 the purpose of conducting quasi-judicial 23 deliberations.] 24 * * * 25 Roll Call of Board Members

1 [Thomas Leech II, Board Administrator, provided a 2 roll call of Board members.] 3 * * * Introduction of Attendees 4 5 [Thomas Leech II, Board Administrator, provided an 6 introduction of attendees.] * * * 7 8 Report of Acting Commissioner 9 [Arion R. Claggett, Acting Commissioner, Bureau of 10 Professional and Occupational Affairs, addressed new 11 functionality in the Pennsylvania Licensing System 12 (PALS) called Act 35, which provides expedited 13 application review for service members, veterans, and 14 military spouses. He stated that application types 15 included in the expedited review are initial applications, renewal applications, and reactivation 16 17 applications. 18 Acting Commissioner Claggett noted Act 35 gives 19 them the ability to waive the initial application fee 20 for spouses when they are required to move due to 21 military orders. He mentioned that the fee waiving 22 functionality in PALS is not available and that 23 refunds would be issued. 24 Acting Commissioner Claggett noted Act 35 also 25 has directed them to create a military crosswalk

explaining how military experience transfers over to 1 2 licensure and is available on the Board web pages. 3 Acting Commissioner Claggett stated Act 35 also 4 gives them the ability to provide temporary permits 5 for applicants whose military experience may be 6 lacking something needed for licensure.] * * * 7 8 Report of Board Chairperson 9 [Catherine S. Spayd, Ph.D., Chair, noted today to be 10 Dr. DonGiovanni's final meeting and thanked him for 11 his participation. 12 Chair Spayd informed everyone that plans are in 13 place for the Board to present at the 2023 14 Pennsylvania Psychological Association Convention. 15 She noted that she and Dr. Small would be providing a presentation titled, The Times They are Changing and 16 17 The Evolving Landscape of Psychology Licensure. She 18 noted they would be reviewing master's level licensure, the Examination for Professional Practice 19 20 in Psychology (EPPP) expansion, and the Psychology 21 Interjurisdictional Compact (PSYPACT) expansion. 22 Chair Spayd addressed the Association of State 23 and Provincial Psychology Boards (ASPPB) Chair 24 meeting. She reported Pennsylvania to be a stable 25 state because of uproar in other states about

removing legislation and boards and governors having 1 2 the authority to change an application for licensure. 3 Chair Spayd noted Puerto Rico is the only 4 jurisdiction that does not use EPPP mandatorily but 5 does provide it optionally for licensure so people 6 can have portability. 7 Dr. Small requested approval to attend the 2023 8 Pennsylvania Psychological Association Convention be 9 placed on April's agenda.] * * * 10 11 Report of Board Prosecution 12 [Heather J. McCarthy, Esquire, Senior Board 13 Prosecutor, on behalf of Nathan C. Giunta, Esquire, 14 Board Prosecution Liaison, had no specific report 15 from prosecution but offered to answer any 16 questions.] * * * 17 18 Appointment - Prosecution Division Annual Report 19 Presentation 20 [Carolyn A. DeLaurentis, Esquire, Executive Deputy 21 Chief Counsel, Department of State, informed Board 22 members that she is now the executive deputy chief 23 counsel for the Department of State but is presenting 24 to the Board on behalf of the prosecution division in 25 her former role to provide the presentation.

Ms. DeLaurentis presented to the Board to provide 1 2 a summary of the prosecution division's role and 3 present annual numbers for 2022. She informed Board 4 members that the Bureau of Professional and 5 Occupational Affairs provides administrative and 6 legal support to all 29 licensing boards and 7 commissions under the legal support of the 8 prosecution division, counsel division, and hearing 9 examiners. She noted the mission is to protect the 10 health and safety of the public and the integrity of 11 the profession. 12 Ms. DeLaurentis explained that the Office of 13 Chief Counsel is under the Governor's Office of 14 General Counsel and assigned to the Department of 15 State, noting the prosecution division is one division under the Office of Chief Counsel. She 16 17 noted the prosecution division works with the Bureau

18 of Enforcement and Investigation (BEI), along with 19 the Professional Compliance Office (PCO).

Ms. DeLaurentis stated BEI, PCO, and prosecution are all tasked with receiving complaints, investigating allegations, ensuring public safety, and enforcing compliance with the acts and regulations governing the 29 licensing boards and commissions.

1 Ms. DeLaurentis stated the prosecution division 2 is the largest division under the Office of Chief 3 Counsel for the Department of State. She explained 4 that there are five senior prosecuting attorneys She informed Board members that 5 assigned to teams. Heather McCarthy is the senior prosecutor for their 6 7 Board, along with Paul Jarabeck; Ray Michalowski; 8 William Newport; and acting senior prosecutor, Karl 9 Geschwindt for the other boards and commissions. She 10 mentioned there are currently 32 prosecuting 11 attorneys serving under the senior attorneys, 12 including Board liaisons.

13 Ms. DeLaurentis addressed the complaint process, 14 noting complaints are received from any source but 15 prefer complaints be submitted through the 16 Pennsylvania Licensing System (PALS) at pals.pa.gov 17 because it is the most efficient. She noted 18 prosecution also accepts complaints from sister 19 agencies, federal agencies, law enforcement, and 20 through media reports.

Ms. DeLaurentis discussed levels of review, including jurisdiction checks, noting administrative assistants review every complaint to see if it falls under one of the 29 boards and commissions. She mentioned complaints are referred to the appropriate

agency if prosecution does not have jurisdiction. 1 2 Ms. DeLaurentis stated that prosecution works 3 with BEI inspectors and investigators to determine 4 the most efficient use of resources. She noted 5 investigations may include interviewing witnesses and 6 gathering documents. She addressed the various 7 levels of review and whether there was a violation. 8 She explained that matters could be closed if there 9 is not a violation of the act or regulation and 10 direct attention to other cases.

Ms. DeLaurentis discussed the post-investigation process, where attorneys may need to make charging decisions based on evidence by filing an order to show cause or a citation. She noted there is a hearing process, which is similar to a regular trial, where both sides are able to present evidence and legal arguments.

18 Ms. DeLaurentis noted that the hearing examiner 19 usually issues a proposed adjudication if it goes to 20 a hearing examiner and then it goes to the boards and 21 commissions for their final decision because they 22 have the ultimate authority for discipline. She 23 addressed consent agreements, where both sides are 24 conducting negotiations and trying to reach a 25 resolution and present that to the Board, where the

1	Board could accept or reject the agreement.
2	Ms. DeLaurentis addressed the prosecution
3	division's role at Board meetings, including
4	presenting consent agreements and listening to
5	concerns of the Board. She pointed out that
6	prosecution has a confidentiality statute that
7	applies to their files, where all of the content
8	within their files is confidential under the law
9	unless presented publicly and is why prosecution
10	cannot speak on some matters except for the final
11	action.
12	Ms. DeLaurentis stated BEI conducts
13	investigations and interviews, gathers evidence, and
14	conducts inspections for certain boards. She noted
15	the role of the investigators is fact gathering and
16	serving subpoenas, orders, and letters. She

17 mentioned that prosecution has subpoena authority, 18 but BEI does not have search warrant authority and is 19 limited.

Ms. DeLaurentis noted BEI testifies to the results of their investigations and inspections. She also noted they have inspection authority for six of the boards and document authority, where some boards have regulations that require cooperation but not everyone complies and charges may be filed for

1 failure to comply.

2	Dr. Erickson asked whether the psychologist has					
3	the right to a copy of the complaint to know what is					
4	in the complaint or who made the complaint.					
5	Ms. DeLaurentis explained that the complaint is					
6	part of the confidential file and not shared as part					
7	of their routine practice. She mentioned that					
8	complainants sometimes ask to remain anonymous as					
9	well. She stated BEI usually interviews the					
10	complainant first and asks for a release of records,					
11	which would allow the psychologist to know who filed					
12	the complaint if signed by the complainant.					
13	Ms. DeLaurentis addressed post-investigation,					
14	where BEI provides all of the evidence to					
15	prosecution. She noted BEI gathers facts and					
16	evidence and do not make any decisions and is the					
17	role of attorneys. She stated that prosecuting					
18	attorneys and legal analysts review the investigation					
19	report to determine whether there was a violation of					
20	the act or regulation to decide whether to close the					
21	case or charge.					
22	Ms. DeLaurentis addressed immediate temporary					
23	suspensions, where someone is an immediate danger to					
24						
	the health and safety of the public, and is different					

suspensions include 302 commitments, orders for
examination, and drug act violations. She also noted
petitions for appropriate relief are when someone has
violated a board order.

5 Ms. DeLaurentis stated that levels of discipline 6 include revocations, suspensions, probations, 7 reprimands, fines, remedial education, and cost of 8 the investigation.

9 Ms. DeLaurentis referred to the confidentiality 10 statute under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3109, where prosecution and 11 investigative files are deemed privileged and 12 confidential under the law. She explained that 13 Department of State investigative files are deemed 14 noncriminal investigative records and exempt from 15 disclosure under the Right-to-Know Law.

Ms. DeLaurentis stated that information could be shared with other agencies in furtherance of investigative efforts but only their final action could be shared publicly, including final adjudications and orders, final consent agreements, and final letters.

Ms. DeLaurentis provided data as of January 3, 23 2023, where the number of open cases for the 24 prosecution division was 13,154, which is down from 25 2022 at 15,141. She stated 16,084 cases were opened

in 2022 and is down from 2021 at 18,363 cases. She 1 2 reported closing 17,826 files in 2022 and is up from 3 2021, where 15,994 cases were closed. She thanked 4 the prosecution division, counsel division, hearing 5 examiners, BEI, and Board for their group effort. Ms. DeLaurentis informed Board members that an 6 7 annual report is issued to the General Assembly, 8 which includes a breakdown of case categories, and 9 would notify Board Counsel when the report is 10 finalized.

Ms. DeLaurentis addressed specific information 11 12 for the State Board of Psychology, noting 140 cases 13 were opened in 2022, which was close to 2021 at 130. 14 She reported 110 cases were closed in 2022 and is an 15 increase from 2021 at 94. She noted 141 cases were 16 open as of January 3 and is up from last year at 111. Ms. DeLaurentis referred to disposition of closed 17 cases, including discipline and non-discipline. 18 She 19 mentioned that the State Board of Psychology is 20 generally a compliant Board with not a lot of 21 discipline issues. She reported 1 fine in 2022 and 2 22 in 2021, 1 reprimand, and 2 probation cases. 23 Ms. DeLaurentis addressed Z codes and explained 24 that they are internal codes used to close matters in

25 their case management system. She reported 14 code

Z18s, which are warning letters, in 2022 and 4 in 1 2 2021. She stated that warning letters are not 3 discipline but help maintain the integrity of the 4 profession and remind people to follow the rules. 5 Chair Spayd requested information concerning a 6 discrepancy in the 8,002 active licenses identified 7 in the report and 6,410 reported in the budget for 8 last year. 9 Ms. DeLaurentis explained that the licensing 10 information is pulled through PALS, and she would have to check with the Bureau of Finance and 11 12 Operations (BFO) regarding how they determine license 13 population. She mentioned there are some differences 14 in what BFO is counting for their purposes and PALS 15 and offered to review the differences in the license counts and get back with Board Counsel. 16 17 Chair Spayd thanked Ms. DeLaurentis for the 18 presentation.] * * * 19 20 Report of Board Counsel - No Report * * * 21 22 Report of Board Administrator - Applications to 23 Request Approval to Sit for the Psychology 24 Licensing 25 Examination
