        Ms. Black noted the bill included information on
   the Task Force on Appropriate Therapeutic Responses to
   Sexual Orientation convened by the American
10
   Psychological Association. She stated the Task Force
11
   conducted a review of peer-reviewed general literature
12
   on sexual orientation change efforts and issued a
13
   report in 2009.
        Ms. Black commented that the Task Force concluded
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   that sexual orientation change efforts can pose
16
   critical health risks to lesbian, gay, and bisexual
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that sexual orientation change efforts can pose critical health risks to lesbian, gay, and bisexual people. She stated the American Psychological Association (APA) issued a resolution advising parents, guardians, young people, and their families to avoid sexual orientation change efforts that portray homosexuality as a mental illness or developmental disorder and to seek psychotherapy, social support, and education services.

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Ms. Black also noted the bill additionally cites a position statement by the American Psychiatric

Association in March 2000, which stated that psychotherapeutic modalities to convert or repair homosexuality are based on developmental theories whose scientific validity is questionable.

Ms. Black mentioned that according to the data provided in the proposed bill, in the last four decades, reparative therapists have not produced any rigorous scientific research to substantiate their claims of cure; therefore, the American Psychiatric Association opposes any psychiatric treatment, such as reparative or conversion therapy, based upon the assumption that homosexuality is a mental disorder.

Ms. Black informed the Board that the proposed legislation included an article published in 2012 by the American Academy of Child & Adolescent Psychiatry, which stated that clinicians should be aware that there is no evidence that sexual orientation can be altered through therapy and that attempts to do so may be harmful.

Ms. Black stated the legislation would apply to mental health professionals defined as an individual who is licensed, certified, or otherwise authorized to administer or provide professional mental health care or counseling under the Professional Psychologists Practice Act; the Medical Practice Act; and the Social

Workers, Marriage and Family Therapists, and
Professional Counselors Act. It was referred to the
Health Committee on March 3, 2021.

Chairman Small questioned whether it would be appropriate for the Board to have an opinion to provide to the legislature. Ms. Black explained that the Board would participate in a bill analysis if the bill progressed toward enactment and advised if members wanted to provide their opinions now that it would have be in their individual capacity.

Ms. Black addressed House Bill 681, which would prohibit the enforcement of covenants not to compete in health care practitioner employment agreements. She stated the bill would apply to health care practitioners as defined by the Health Care Facilities Act, which includes an individual who is authorized to practice some component of the healing arts by a license, permit, certificate, or registration issued by a Commonwealth licensing agency or Board. She noted the bill was referred to the Health Committee on February 26, 2021.

Ms. Black informed the Board that the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs received reports that persons pretending to be from one of the health-related boards were contacting licensees by phone and

mail regarding the status of their licenses. She stated the scammers are altering their information that reflect the caller ID to appear as though they are from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Ms. Black also noted the scammers are threatening license suspension for failure to act and falsely claiming involvement with the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) and the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA). She provided reminders from BPOA concerning contact and personal information for licensees and applicants to follow.

Ms. Black mentioned that those who are the subject of an investigation or disciplinary action, will receive notice by certified mail and/or personal service and provided with a contact name and phone number. She informed everyone to contact their local police department or the State Police if they have been a victim of the scam. She noted a link on the Department of State's website under professional licensing to view the scam alert.

Dr. McAleer questioned whether it is appropriate for the Board to forward the announcement to the professional associations to make their members aware of it on their website.

18 Report of Board Chairman

19 [Richard F. Small, Ph.D., Chairman, announced the

20 Pennsylvania Psychological Association (PPA) is going

21 to have another virtual conference this year but no

22 | need for the Board to provide a presentation.

Dr. McAleer and Ms. Black will soon be presenting

24 at the PPA Doctoral Summit.

25 Chairman Small addressed his attendance at the

Association of State and Provincial Psychology Boards
(ASPPB) 2021 Midyear Meeting. He mentioned a bit of
controversy expressed among board chairs, where ASPPB
is not responsive to the membership and dictate more
than listen, particularly on the Examination for
Professional Practice in Psychology (EPPP).

Chairman Small mentioned boards in other states have similar problems, including residency and fighting against programs that are barely accredited or not accredited. He noted many of the issues with COVID exceptions and non-APA applicants had been resolved. He discussed licensure by endorsement in other states and believed ASPPB desired that a model be adopted by the different states.

Chairman Small stated APA was experiencing strong pressure to come up with an option to hold on to a master's level psychologist who are otherwise getting licensed as a licensed professional counselor (LPC) and had a two-day summit related to the value of the doctoral degree.

Chairman Small noted that an observer who attended the summit said APA never mentioned the word value of the doctoral degree even though that was supposedly the purpose, and the feeling was there is a lot of pressure on getting these master's in as

opposed to looking at what does a doctoral degree add beyond a master's degree.

Chairman Small noted discussion concerning threats made to members.

Ms. Harrison discussed outbreak sessions at ASPPB, where they were able to speak with members from other states to get an idea of how they governed and what new rules were being planned. She noted it to be beneficial if ASPPB collected best practices and placed them on their website or sent out quarterly reports on new or innovative practice that a state is doing that other states could join.

Dr. Spayd addressed the legal update of the presentation, where the attorney discussed the impact of COVID last year and making a distinction between executive orders. She also noted discussion regarding the use of free speech becoming more common for respondents in professional cases.

Dr. Spayd addressed variability among states concerning the acceptance of an anonymous complaint or not and questioned whether Pennsylvania accepted the same.

Mr. Giunta explained that Prosecution reviews each anonymous complaint and forwards them for investigation. He noted that every ounce of contact

- is sometimes made up, and there is no way to verify or bring a witness in or support the allegations. He commented that a full investigation is still performed to the best of their ability. He noted that sometimes anonymous also means a person will give their information but do not want to appear for a hearing.
  - Ms. Harrison mentioned a concern that came up in the group, where they were recreating their board because it had been disbanded by a previous governor and questioned whether Pennsylvania laws allow for that. Ms. Black explained that the Board is created through an act, so there would have to be legislation passed in order to repeal it.

- Dr. McAleer noted ASPPB discussion concerning changes and adjustments as a result of COVID and residency requirements and issues the Board may have to deal with in the future when many of the universities went to virtual learning.
- Dr. McAleer also mentioned face-to-face supervision versus telehealth and the importance of the documentation required by the applicants if these issues happened as a result of COVID and executive orders.
- Dr. McAleer noted discussions regarding the validity of EPPP, noting ASPPB believed there are true

threats against licensure and the regulation of all professions. He noted ASPPB identified the patchwork of state-by-state regulations that really call into question the integrity of the practice of psychology and all that goes into that including education and training.

Dr. McAleer mentioned ASPPB is trying to be the repository of central approach for education and training of supervision and for the EPPP Part 1 concerning knowledge demonstration and EPPP Part 2 concerning competency of one's skill set. He stated ASPPB is in the process of a yearlong internal review and self-study to try to make them more of an appreciated and valued organization.

Chairman Small mentioned an article in American Psychologist that knocked the EPPP terribly, noting a response that was limited to 1000 words that ASPPB made and then a rejoinder from the authors of the original article. He stated the self-examination was fascinating, because it was not just the perception of people outside but sometimes the perception of people from the various boards and whether they are receptive.

Chairman Small addressed an issue among board chairs, where Pennsylvania is not requiring EPPP-2 but

an individual might move back to another state that is requiring it, and ASPPB will not allow you to take the course due to security. He stated the board chairs were all in agreement as to why a few more would compromise the security when others were already taking it. He commented that ASPPB is going to take that into consideration after receiving letters from some of the board members.

Dr. McAleer noted the importance of each profession demonstrating its competency, knowledge base, and consistency in terms of training models being consistent from state to state, which makes it harder to argue that they are capricious and arbitrary.

Chairman Small stated COVID created exceptions governors have given, including allowing all continuing education CE to be online. He mentioned being careful with matters like the residency requirement, where a presenter stated individuals could not get the residency through no fault of their own. He commented that through no fault of their own is totally irrelevant to protecting the public and believed there would be a lot of opposition.]

14 as well as the requirement for an advisory committee

15 | within the Board directed to address the provision of

16 licensure for behavior analysts.

Commissioner Johnson noted speaking to the policy concerns with regard to ensuring that licensure for this specialization did not deleteriously affect the individuals that practice for those professions and also provide for applied behavior analyst (ABA) or

22 applied behavior analysis.

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Dr. DonGiovanni requested an update on when restrictions may be lifted. Commissioner Johnson noted there had been no formal announcement lifting

restrictions in time for the next scheduled meeting.

He mentioned that some restrictions were lifted with

respect to travel but not Board-specific travel. He

stated employees are still encouraged to perform

duties remotely via telework when possible and this

would extend to Board members. He did note that

associations are starting to converge again.

Dr. McAleer questioned whether some hearings were starting to be in person. Ms. Black explained that hearings were initially being scheduled virtually but individuals could motion to have it conducted in person. She mentioned seeing an Order for the Board scheduling it in person and stated she could reach out to the Office of Hearing Examiners for direction on the status of in-person vs virtual hearings.

Dr. Spayd questioned whether there was any discussion in Pennsylvania about changing legislation to have online virtual meetings.

Commissioner Johnson stated the Policy Office has been engaged in tracking all of the emergency provisions and conducting a comprehensive analysis of regulatory suspensions put into place over the last 12 months. All will be informed of a developed technique to take the best qualities of the virtual meetings and merge them with returning to work.]
