3 * * * 1 2 State Board of Psychology 3 June 6, 2022 * * * 4 [Pursuant to Section 708(a)(5) of the Sunshine Act, at 5 6 9:30 a.m. the Board entered into Executive Session 7 with Dana M. Wucinski, Esquire, Board Counsel, for the purpose of conducting quasi-judicial deliberations on 8 a number of matters that are currently pending before 9 10 the Board and to receive the advice of counsel. The Board began open session at 10:30 a.m.] 11 * * * 12 13 [Dana M. Wucinski, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted the 14 Board met in Executive Session prior to the meeting 15 for the purpose of conducting quasi-judicial deliberations on a number of matters currently pending 16 17 before the Board and to receive the advice of counsel. 18 Ms. Wucinski reminded everyone that the meeting was being recorded, and those who continued to 19 20 participate were giving their consent to be recorded.] 21 * * * 22 The regularly scheduled meeting of the State 23 Board of Psychology was held on Monday, June 6, 2022. 24 Catherine S. Spayd, Ph.D., Chair, called the meeting 25 to order at 10:30 a.m.

Katherine Bradley, Ph.D., Secretary, was not 1 2 present at the commencement of the meeting. 3 * * * Introduction of Board Members 4 5 [Catherine S. Spayd, Ph.D., Chair, requested an 6 introduction of Board members.] * * * 7 8 Approval of minutes of the April 4, 2022 meeting 9 CHAIR SPAYD: 10 Do we have any comments on the minutes 11 from the April 4 meeting? 12 I'll call for a motion to approve 13 the April 4, 2022 Psychology Board Minutes as written. 14 15 DR. MCALEER: 16 So moved. DR. DONGIOVANNI: 17 18 Second. 19 CHAIR SPAYD: Roll call vote. 20 21 2.2 Dr. Spayd, aye; Acting Commissioner 23 Claggett, aye; Dr. McAleer, aye; Dr. 24 DonGiovanni, aye; Ms. Harrison, aye; Dr. 25 Maynard, aye; Dr. Small, aye.

[The motion carried unanimously.] 1 * * * 2 3 Report of Board Prosecution 4 [Nathan C. Giunta, Esquire, Board Prosecution Liaison, 5 had nothing to report from the prosecutorial division. Mr. Giunta thanked the Board for allowing him to 6 7 join everyone at the Pennsylvania Psychological 8 Association (PPA) Conference.] * * * 9 10 Report of Board Counsel 11 [Dana M. Wucinski, Esquire, Board Counsel, addressed 12 House Bill 2607 of 2022 Prescription Privileges for 13 Psychologists that would amend the Professional 14 Psychologists Practice Act to define educational 15 requirements and scope of practice for prescribing 16 psychologists. Ms. Wucinski explained the bill would define the 17 18 collaborative agreement between the prescribing 19 psychologist and the provider and would identify the 20 formulary for medications that may be prescribed and 21 continuing education requirements for prescribing 2.2 psychologists. 23 Ms. Wucinski stated House Bill 2607 was created 24 in response to the growing national mental health 25 crisis and shortage of psychiatric specialists and was

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1	referred to the Professional Licensure Committee on
2	May 23, 2022. She referred to the Association of
3	State and Provincial Psychology Boards (ASPPB)
4	information showing five other states currently offer
5	prescriptive licenses to psychologists. She noted she
6	would reach out to Board members if asked to do a bill
7	analysis.

9	[Katherine Bradley, Ph.D., Secretary, entered the
10	meeting at 10:35 a.m.]
11	* * *
12	Chair Spayd informed Board members that she
13	invited Dr. Anthony Ragusea, who is leading the charge
14	to promote the bill, to do a presentation on the
15	history and to speak about regulations for the bill at
16	the next meeting on August 8. She commented that
17	other states have had a lot of different things
18	happen, including medical boards swooping in and
19	taking over.
20	Chair Spayd mentioned there are several lines in
21	the bill amending the Pennsylvania Professional
22	Psychologists Practice Act, and the Board needs to be
23	aware of it to continue to maintain some measure of
24	control over prescribing psychologists. She noted
25	that Dr. Ragusea informed her that the regulation had

not emphasized this because they did not want to 1 2 complicate the bill.] 3 * * * 4 Report of Board Chairperson 5 [Catherine S. Spayd, Ph.D., Chair, thanked Dr. 6 DonGiovanni, Dr. McAleer, and Dr. Small for joining 7 her and Mr. Giunta in presenting at PPA. She noted presenting on disciplinary actions of the State Board 8 for the Pennsylvania Psychological Association with 9 10 the goal of demystifying that process and hopefully 11 assuring ethical and reasonably competent 12 psychologists, where there was nothing to worry about if the rules were followed. 13 14 Chair Spayd provided an update from the ASPPB 15 Meeting in April. She addressed master's level 16 accreditation, where the American Psychological 17 Association (APA) is in the process of determining how 18 to develop a model act to accredit master's level 19 licensure. She reported that 17 states allow a 20 master's level license at some level and all vary by degree of scope of practice and level of supervision 21 22 versus independent practice. 23 Chair Spayd mentioned another point of interest, 24 where Missouri does their prelicensure criminal 25 background check and offers that before starting their

1 graduate program so individuals thinking about a 2 career as a psychologist will know ahead of time if 3 their past crimes would prohibit them from practicing 4 the profession. She noted the pro side is the lack of 5 available mental health services in general and the 6 idea there will be more mental health practitioners.

7 Chair Spayd addressed her virtual attendance at 8 the ASPPB Town Hall Meeting regarding the Examination 9 for Professional Practice in Psychology (EPPP) Part 2, 10 which is being proposed by ASPPB to be its standard. 11 She noted seven jurisdictions are currently using it 12 and Minnesota is in the process.

13 Chair Spayd stated the cost of the exam has been 14 reduced to \$450 from \$600 with a \$30 practice exam 15 She mentioned ASPPB is advocating taking the option. exam at the end of graduate school, which they believe 16 17 would result in a higher pass rate because knowledge 18 would be fresh. She also mentioned it helps separate the cost by rolling it into someone's student loan if 19 20 it is prelicensure.

21 Chair Spayd commented that content validity is 22 the most important to ASPPB because they do not 23 believe predictive validity is the purpose of the exam 24 and believe criterion validity is an unattainable 25 thing.

Chair Spayd mentioned there has been a lot of 1 2 work and focus on test bias because the EPPP in the 3 past has been criticized for bias for different racial 4 groups and different socioeconomic status (SES) 5 groups. She noted the most recent study was a 6 differential item function analysis and 32 items were 7 flagged as potentially bias, where 4 of them were 8 removed.

9 Chair Spayd noted ASPPB's concern that they would 10 have less defense in a lawsuit if they made the EPPP 11 Part 2 optional. She reported ASBBP has not made a 12 final decision whether to mandate the test or make it 13 optional.

14 Chair Spayd stated that not many people had taken 15 the test but anectodal evidence suggested the test 16 takers believed it was valid and reflected real-life 17 situations. It will take many years before there is 18 enough information gathered to see if EPPP Part 2 19 predicts disciplinary rates because of the low rate of 20 discipline in psychology in general. She also noted 21 the test is multiple choice that had been taken down 2.2 to three item choices.

Dr. Bradley addressed the absence of any kind of criterion validity, where having a single content validity is great but how do they know if it is really

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doing anything more effective than the multiple choice 1 format in the first section. 2 3 Dr. Bradley also addressed reducing the items to three, where they may be having difficulty coming up 4 5 with a viable fourth option because reducing below 6 four options is getting into more of a shaky 7 psychometric situation. Dr. McAleer noted being fairly positive about 8

9 ASPPB's whole approach and believed ASPPB is pumping 10 the brakes and going in the right direction to allow 11 more time for discussion and to address some of the 12 important issues.

Dr. DonGiovanni provided an item of interest, where several jurisdictions on ASPPB's website post licensees who do not renew.

16 Dr. DonGiovanni announced the ASPPB Annual 17 Conference will be held in National Harbor, MD, in 18 October.

Spayd, Ph.D., Chair, referred to the 5 recommendation by Pearson VUE to use two forms for the 6 7 Pennsylvania Psychology Law Examination versus three. 8 Ms. Stuckey noted Board members decided to reduce 9 it from four to three but did not discuss two and is 10 on the agenda for review. 11 Dr. McAleer commented that Pearson VUE is the 12 expert and is willing to agree with whatever is 13 recommended.] CHAIR SPAYD: 14 15 I'll make a motion that we accept the 16 Pearson VUE recommendation to reduce the 17 PPLE to two forms.
