information from a revenue standpoint. She compared previous renewal years, noting continued growth in the licensee population.

Ms. Witmer reported an increase of 4,454
licensees from FY15-16 to FY17-18 and an increase of
3,400 licensees from FY17-18 to FY19-20. She noted
there were 62,199 licensees as of the date the report
was prepared on March 30 with a decrease of 6
licensees this morning, giving a total of 62,193.

Ms. Witmer asked what the difference is in the rental listing referral license between RR and SR.

Ms. Linsenbach explained that the RR type is a corporation and SR is a sole proprietor.

Ms. Witmer noted revenue for FY19-20 and FY20-21. She mentioned the Board normally renews in May of even years, which would have been May 2020, but due to COVID, the license renewal period was extended through August 31, 2020. She reported a biennial total of revenue of \$8,089,200.66. She noted 96 percent of revenue is from renewals and applications and the other 4 percent varies.

Ms. Witmer reported expenses in FY19-20 of \$3,873,442.19, FY20-21 of \$3,761,554.62, and \$2,563,674.90 as of March 30. She noted the Board incurs expenses through direct costs, timesheets, and

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licensees. She mentioned an increase in expenses as of this morning to $2,616,012.46. She noted the Bureau of Finance and Operations (BFO) is increasing the budget this year to $4,132,000.
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Ms. Witmer reported Commission revenue is a steady source of income and keeping in line with expenses.

She provided a projected balance of \$6,121,272.05.

Ms. Witmer noted Board member expenses for FY19-20 of \$17,720.33, FY20-21 of \$11,024.83, and currently at \$5,041.69. She noted BFO is going to continue the \$35,000 budget.]

10 [Juan A. Ruiz, Esquire, Commission Counsel, noted the 11 invitation the Commission received from eXp Realty.

Christopher Beadling, President, Pennsylvania
Association of Realtors, mentioned PAR continues to
communicate with their 39,000 members regarding the
renewal cycle that ends next month and informed
everyone of a resource page on Pennsylvania
Association of Realtors (PAR) website to assist
members.

Mr. Beadling recognized Ms. Linsenbach and her team for their efforts in creating videos explaining the online license renewal process. He noted PAR was glad to hear the General Assembly and that governor approved another 3-month waiver for livestream continuing education.

Mr. Beadling stated PAR would continue to

advocate for Representative Todd Polinchock's House

Bill 1849, which would create an allowance for

livestreaming continuing education while the

Commission approves its revisions to their general

regulations. He mentioned PAR continues to be willing

to work with everyone regarding the provisions to the

general regulations as the process moves forward.

Mr. Beadling mentioned April is Fair Housing

Month and that he is hosting a webinar on April 19

with Richard Rothstein, the author of The Color of

Law: A Forgotten History of How Our Government

Segregated America. He invited everyone to attend the webinar.

Mr. Beadling stated PAR's legal team developed a flowchart explaining services and support to help realtors better understand fair housing. He noted PAR's legal hotline attorneys field numerous calls on the issue on a monthly basis, and the association is working to provide members with resources. He noted Hank Lerner also posted an article about fair housing.

Henry (Hank) Lerner, Esquire, Chief Legal
Officer, Pennsylvania Association of Realtors,
referred to the prior conversation with the Commission
at the last meeting regarding broker supervision and
the lanes of the broker and agents. He stated PAR put

together some internal thoughts based on the prior
discussion with the Commission and conversations with
schools and comments from the PAR hotline. He noted
PAR developed a broad proposal that gave everybody
flexibility on topics.

2.3

Mr. Lerner commented that teaching with case studies is the most effective, noting regulations are vague on supervision and what exactly that means. He stated the actual case shows the hazards of doing something and shows that somebody got caught and fined.

Mr. Ruiz asked whether PAR would be requesting a case for each of the six topics.

Mr. Lerner explained that the six topics were based on what the Commission felt were problems, and the subtopics would be cases from the Commission.

Mr. McGettigan referred to PAR's letter, where the course must contain at least three topics, whether a 3- or 4-hour course, and noted the importance of each school teaching the same thing, rather than each school having a different idea of brokerage responsibility.

Mr. Lerner explained that the six topics would be sort of a pick and choose for each school, where one school might choose topics one, two, and three; and

another school might choose topics three, four, and six. He mentioned it would be efficient to identifying which topics by a check box or request at the top of the form.

Mr. McGettigan mentioned the importance of licensees being able to identify the course.

Mr. Lerner explained that one course approval would be submitted for each course.

Ms. Rubin thanked PAR for their work and providing the input upfront so the Commission could be proactive. She expressed concerned regarding allowing schools to decide the topics, where agents may just take the same things over and over again. She noted being more comfortable with specific topics that have to be included in the mandatory courses, so the Commission knows they did the job of educating and teaching when someone who has a violation comes before them.

Mr. McGettigan commented that Mr. Ruiz or Mr. Michalowski would have to carefully choose cases for the topics and any reference to any company or individual be redacted before using that case.

Mr. Ruiz mentioned utilizing a final adjudication and order or a consent agreement that has been accepted and are public documents but agreed the

material should be redacted.

Ms. Rubin disagreed, noting the violations are from actual people and that it would be powerful to have names and faces with the cases since it is public knowledge.

Mr. McGettigan also commented that competitors would use that information against individuals. He believed those who have violations and have been called out and paid by a fine, continuing education, or probation should not be made public for teaching purposes.

Mr. Lerner stated PAR may be willing to work with the Commission to actually turn specific cases into generic statements of policy because people are going to look up redacted cases and try to figure out who it is anyway. He offered to have the Commission write that up if they wish.

Mr. Ruiz believed the best way to develop something would be to take the actual cases, create a summary, and leave identifying information out but have actual fact patterns. He mentioned the biggest hurdle is going to be identifying the cases and would work with prosecution and Mr. Michalowski, where they may be able to combine a few topics together and come up with one solid topic.

Ms. Rubin recommended having a mandatory course specific to brokers of record and managers and one specific to licensees to cover the material in one course that applies to both of them.

Mr. McGettigan mentioned that Maryland has special courses for a broker of record and managers that are mandatory for those two groups. He also noted it does not have to be one specific course, where 12 of their 15 hours are mandatory subjects. He commented that the Commission is out of time to even get one and suggested putting it in their rules and regulations meeting for the following licensure period.

Ms. Rubin suggested the Commission vote on the topic. She noted every renewal period only had one specific topic and three renewal periods that had a mandatory topic and recommended there again be one mandatory topic.

Mr. McGettigan reported employment and licensure rules and broker supervisory duties and policies were the most important issues discussed at previous meetings.

Ray Michalowski, Esquire, Senior Commission Prosecutor, recommended the Commission decide on something, noting the law requires 14 hours and authorizes the Commission to make a mandatory course.

Mr. McGettigan commented that broker supervisory duties, policies, and risk management covers a lot of stuff seen every day out in the field as brokers and could certainly be the choice this time.

Ms. Rubin suggested placing the subtopics of advertising and property management under broker supervision if broker supervision is kept as the topic.

Ms. Linsenbach asked whether Mr. Michalowski was suggesting or supporting the idea of a separate course for brokers and sales agents.

Mr. Michalowski commented that other states and other boards that have a supervisory structure do that, and it would be a good thing to do in the future but believed it to be too late to come up with one of those right now that just applies to brokers.

Mr. McGettigan stated it was in the best interest of the licensees to decide and figure out the how in the future. He commented that three topics were not necessary, and the broker supervisory duties and what was covered on the last page would provide more than enough to do 4 hours of mandatory versus 3 hours.]
