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The regularly scheduled meeting of the State

Board of Dentistry was held on Friday, June 12, 2020.

John F. Erhard III, D.D.S., Chairman, called the

meeting to order at 9:06 a.m. Roll call was taken.

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For the Board's Information/Discussion - American
Board of Dental Examiners, Incorporated

(ADEX) - Typodont in Dental Hygiene Clinical
Licensing Examination/ADEX - Typodont in Dental
Periodontal Scaling Clinical Licensing Examination

[John F. Erhard III, D.D.S., Chairman, thanked
everyone for attending the teleconference. He
addressed a recent press release by the American Board
of Dental Examiners, Incorporated (ADEX), regarding a
manikin tooth that is going to be employed in the
periodontal section of the dental examination and in
the scaling section of the dental hygiene exam.

Chairman Erhard referred to prior discussion at the May meeting, where the Board wanted to require a licensure examination for dentists' and dental hygienists' initial licensure. He noted a review of comments to waive examinations completed for this year's licensure cycle, although the Board felt that an examination was essential and in the best interest of Pennsylvania dental patients.

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Chairman Erhard provided a summary of what was approved for a dentist license, which included acceptance of the CompeDont tooth as a reliable and valid substitute for a live patient for the candidate evaluation in the restorative and filling aspect of their examination, some of which was based on the recommendation of an independent psychometrician and testing of over 500 candidates at 6 dental school examination sites.

Chairman Erhard addressed advice from the psychometrician to eliminate the periodontal exercise field test, because the periodontal skills portion for dentists as a dentist exam was not essential and was not a procedure that those who had graduated from dental school within the last five years performed on a routine basis. He stated the procedure was assigned to hygienists, along with scaling, pocket measurement, and tooth polishing skills.

Chairman Erhard noted, in light of the COVID-19 situation, this year's hygiene candidates were granted a provisional hygiene license until a live patient examination was deemed practical. He noted there had

not been alternative manikin teeth available at that
juncture, and the requirement to take the examination
after site and facial availability was possible to
allow these candidates the legal amount of time to
prepare for the examination while at the same time
providing an opportunity for employment and more time
to hone their skills.

Chairman Erhard addressed the new typodont ADEX recently made available as a manikin tooth for the scale, polishing, and pocket determination portion of both the dentist and dental hygiene examination and noted the task of deciding whether to accept this new tool as sufficient for determining competency.

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Chairman Erhard noted he is a license examiner, has read all of the Assessment of Clinical Skills (ACS) technical data and had telephone contact with ADEX and the Commission on Dental Competency Assessments (CDCA) leadership as well as with Dr. Ellis Hall regarding this aspect of the license. He provided results of the testing that he considered failing.

Chairman Erhard also addressed the ultrasonic scaler, noting that it would not be universally available for hygienists or dentists due to the overall results. He also noted a study related to

COVID and the amount of aerosols, air droplets that are released using an ultrasound in the field.

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Chairman Erhard mentioned the CompeDont tooth that matches very closely to a natural tooth regarding calculus, stain, and pocket depth. He noted the proposed typodont tooth does not mimic a real tooth nearly as closely as the CompeDont restorative tooth mimics the real tooth.

Chairman Erhard noted discussion during the last meeting, where periodontal skill for the dental exam even with the use of live patients was not considered psychometrically relative. He mentioned testing agencies will have the ability to conduct live patient hygiene examinations in August and September of this year, which will allow candidates the opportunity to improve their skills, be employable, and prepare for what is in the competency-type examination to become more skilled and satisfy the Board's charge to protect the citizens of Pennsylvania.

Chairman Erhard encouraged Board members to consider becoming an examiner.

Dr. Lugo questioned whether anyone had a personal experience with these teeth to say the data was fair and suggested setting up a clinical experience for Board members, hygienists, and dentists.

Chairman Erhard agreed with Dr. Lugo and will contact CDCA and ADEX.

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Chairman Erhard noted the Board needed to determine whether to accept this new periodontal manikin for an examination or whether they felt that the results were not reliable and valid.

Ms. Murray commented that the study was more about the quality and characteristics of the manikin tooth, unlike the previous CompeDont study that had a comparative on dental exam results with the patient and with the CompeDont tooth.

Chairman Erhard agreed, noting side-by-side testing with the CompeDont tooth, with results that were a couple percentage points one way or the other, which gave him and a lot of other people confidence in the validity of the restorative portion of the dental exam.

Chairman Erhard commented that there was not enough positive data on this tooth, noting the people who developed the well-recognized CompeDont tooth are already close to releasing a hygiene-type tooth in the future.

Ms. Lutz mentioned the importance of being aware of the waivers that were granted to be extended for the duration of this COVID-19 emergency plus an

additional 90 days thereafter. She suggested focusing 1 2 on now and the current state of emergency, and in the 3 event there was another outbreak afterwards, to deal with it then. She questioned whether this was 4 5 something the Board wanted to consider for this period 6 or if it was better in the interest of the health, safety, and welfare of the public to wait until traditional clinical exam and testing sites are again available.1 10 * * * 11 DR. JASPAN 12 I would like to make a motion that the 1.3 Board accept the typodont option during 14 the extent of the COVID-19 emergency and 15 extensions thereof pending further 16 evaluation of effectiveness of the test. 17 CHAIRMAN ERHARD: 18 Do I have a second? 19 MR. JOHNSON: 20 I second the motion. 2.1 CHAIRMAN ERHARD: I will send it out for discussion. 2.2 2.3 motion is to accept this trial tooth for 2.4 the dental hygiene clinical license 25 examination. Is there any discussion?

9 Discussion 1 2 [Chairman Erhard suggested all audience comments be 3 read and not opening it up to audio input.] 4 CHAIRMAN ERHARD: 5 The motion was made and seconded to 6 accept the typodont tooth exam as a testing means for this period for dental hygiene clinical license examination. 9 "Yes" would be to accept. To choose 10 "no" would be to reject it. 11 12 Erhard, no; Jaspan, yes. 13 DR. SULLIVAN: 14 Noted the typodont restorative part has 15 been really vetted and is still in the 16 process and noted concerns that the 17 periodontal and hygiene typodont tooth 18 is in the early stages. It concerns me 19 that we are going to make our vote on 20 this report of 30 people, some of whom 21 were students. 2.2 MR. JOHNSON: 2.3 I know from the state's perspective, we 2.4 are relying on the Board's substantive 25 experience in determining whether the

Board is comfortable in moving forward with this particular exam as it relates to the hygiene portion. My opinion is that sample size is limited. Limited sample size was not conclusive. Taking those two factors into account, I probably would not vote in favor of this particular typodont exam with the clinical hygiene portion.

10 MS. HUGHES:

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Commissioner, I think at this point you have seconded the motion that was made to approve the use of this typodont, and you just indicated how you are going to vote or how you might vote. I think that maybe we need to withdraw the motion and start fresh, just for a matter order.

MR. JOHNSON:

Maybe my understanding was incorrect. My understanding was that we were moving to vote on the use of this portion. was seconding to move procedurally to vote, and the vote can be yea or nay. In seconding the motion, my seconding

was to actually to forward the whole

process, not a vote of approval. I may

have misconstrued the motion. In that

respect, I would rescind my second.

DR. JASPAN:

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Since I made the original motion, let me clarify my thought process of the motion to accept for this emergency period.

Rather than what our previous position was is that if we were going to just delay it until they can put an in-person exam in place, which at this point, I would agree because we have a little bit of knowledge from this limited sample but trying to move on so that these recent graduates and other applicants for the Board could proceed in a more reasonable time frame just temporarily until we have more information.

That is why I suggested that we only do it for emergency purposes until we get more information. I wanted to clarify my thought process there.

24 MR. STAUFFER:

I wanted to make a comment that we have

12 received a number of comments in 1 Q&A, and I think it might be important 2 3 to bring them to the public before we continue this vote. 4 5 MR. JOHNSON: 6 I would also like the Board Chair to be 7 able to respond to those comments, so I would hold on the comments until we 8 9 confirm that he is back and able to 10 participate. 11 DR. LUGO: 12 In terms of the order, we are in the 13 middle of a vote and now we are going back to discussion. I believe we have 14 15 to get out of the vote. MS. LUTZ: 16 17 I believe the commissioner has rescinded 18 his second, so we are still, I believe, 19 in the motion. There was a motion made. 20 We are waiting on a second and then we 21 have discussion. 22 MS. HUGHES: 23 Second. 2.4 MS. LUTZ: 25 Now, we can have discussion all over

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again, so if you want to open it up to the questions from the public, I believe we can do that at this point.

MS. MURRAY:

I was just curious whether it is possible to just hold off on any vote until some of the other dental hygiene programs have this experience.

My second thought was, I am just curious how it would work if we move forward with this vote as a temporary measure, even though we have, according to the study, 30 people who responded to the survey study, how it would work that our dental schools could be part of this study to add to it.

DR. SULLIVAN:

It was my understanding that when we approved the provisional licenses for dental hygiene, that was in response to this COVID-19 pandemic and that this would give hygiene candidates an opportunity to hone their skills and then be able to take the test. We were giving them that opportunity. When we

talk about approving this exam, this typodont tooth for the exam, I do not see the relevancy because we have already given a provisional license and also with the governor's systems in place, that has also addressed the COVID-19 issue.

My question is am I wrong when I say that. I thought that is what we have responded to. I just wonder why we would not treat this as a response to COVID-19 too.

DR. JASPAN:

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Again, the reason for my motion was that I thought while this was far from definitive, it is better than turning untested people out there to work on the public with not having knowledge of a skill, so this would give us some basis of do they have enough skills to work on the public.

DR. CASEY:

I understand the position on that matter too, but let us do the devil's advocate. What happens if the student has to

struggle with that tooth and the tooth

does not present to be accurate or the

tooth is not proven to be a standard of

somewhat to give the student an

advantage.

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Which is more dangerous, damaging, and detrimental to the public and the students. If there are typodont concerns on this model, I feel like I want to wait for the better CompeDont tooth. Giving a provisional license and leaving that wide open until the exam exists live, we have to think of students getting a patient and schools responding to COVID-19 precautions and guidelines. This may put the timeout so long that then what other skills would they have to actually do the exam.

MR. JOHNSON:

It was the presence of direct supervision as well as the fact that this was not an open-ended provisional license. This provisional license was only intended for the duration of the

emergency declaration with the understanding and reasoning being that the governor's decision to end the emergency declaration would then allow us to revert back to the functions of the exam before COVID-19. This is not a provisional license in perpetuity. I would just ask for clarification from the Board.

In terms of the process here, I think we should be voting on whether to accept the typodont, not voting to accept the typodont. The vote is a binary function, so you are either in opposition or you are in affirmation of the decision.

I think the motion should be amended to reflect that we are voting to either accept or not accept this particular examination at this time.

DR. CASEY:

Do we reject the typodont tooth at this time and what was presented to the hygiene to take the exam under the governor's orders was acceptable.

17 DR. JASPAN: 1 2 Given the recent discussion and thought 3 process, I would like to, even though I believe what I said before, I think in 4 5 the presence of what is going on now, I 6 withdraw my motion. 7 MS. LUTZ: We are at the point now where the motion 9 was rescinded, so we need to start over. 10 Is there anyone who is prepared to make 11 a motion, followed by a second, followed 12 by discussion, and followed by a vote? CHAIRMAN ERHARD: 1.3 14 Dr. Jaspan has rescinded his motion. Wе 15 are looking for a new motion, as the 16 commissioner said, regarding acceptance 17 or if you oppose typodont tooth for 18 periodontal exam, such as the hygiene 19 and dental. If we need to separate them 2.0 out, I will ask counsel, but that is 2.1 what we are looking at. 22 We need a motion. 2.3 MS. HUGHES: 24 I will make that motion.

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DR. CASEY:

18 I will second it. 1 2 CHAIRMAN ERHARD: 3 The motion is to accept or reject. Hughes, are you accepting the typodont 4 5 tooth or rejecting it? 6 MR. STAUFFER: 7 While you were offline, there was some discussion, before voting during the 8 9 discussion period, looking at some of 10 the Q&As that come in. Is that 11 something we are still doing? 12 CHAIRMAN ERHARD: I have no idea what I missed. I will 13 14 rely on the Board secretary to comment 15 on that. DR. CASEY: 16 17 I believe once the motion is made and 18 seconded, it opens to discussion. 19 believe that is protocol, correct? 20 MS. LUTZ: 21 That is correct. 22 CHAIRMAN ERHARD: 23 Did we get a second? 2.4 DR. CASEY: 25 We are rejecting this, correct?

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1 CHAIRMAN ERHARD: 2 That is the motion Dr. Casey made to 3 reject. Do we have a second? MS. HUGHES: 4 5 I am sorry, I misunderstood. I thought 6 the motion was to accept. I thought the motion that Attorney Lutz announced was to accept or utilize or authorize the 9 use of the manikin for testing for this 10 cycle. That is the motion I would 11 support and make. 12 MS. LUTZ: 13 The motion currently on the table is to 14 accept the typodont for this testing 15 cycle. 16 We need a second. 17 MS. MURRAY: Second. 18 19 CHAIRMAN ERHARD: 2.0 For any further discussion, I will 2.1 clarify. It is to accept the use of 2.2 this typodont manikin for hygiene and 2.3 dental periodontal testing. 2.4 We have a motion and we have a 25 second. We are voting to accept the

proposed typodont tooth for the exams

during this period for both exams, the

hygiene and the dental testing.

Any further discussion?

DR. FUNARI:

I am going to explain where my vote is going to go. I have been a member of a national certifying board for my specialty, and I have been involved in development of different aspects of that exam. That usually involves a number of psychometric testing where we would introduce new items and use it in the test process for comparative reasons.

When I look at this study that is being used to justify the acceptance of this test platform, it is limited in scope. It was commissioned report. If you go down to the conclusion, the last paragraphs states that while there are some favorable aspects to this, it was equally skewed to positive and negative. Their last comment is not withstanding this conclusion, the data also suggests that the patient-based demonstration of

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clinical skills remains superior
comparative option. I do not feel this
test has been validated enough in a
clinical setting to accept it. I am
afraid that if we now establish a
precedence to accept this, albeit under
extraordinary circumstances, that that
is going to be the precedence to move it
forward in the ongoing years without us
having confidence in it as a test model.

I understand the ethics of testing on a live patient and I am torn on that. I also have great sympathy for what is happening to our students as they come out. It is going to affect the residents coming into my training program because they are not going to get licensed, and our institution mandates that they get licensed before they start their program.

I do not feel what is being presented as an alternate has been validated as a legitimate test platform.

MS. GROODY:

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I think this typodont does have

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limitations. The study was small. 1 2 are saying that a patient is better, but 3 if we give people a provisional hygiene

office.

license, then that calendar keeps ticking until they find a patient and

can test. I feel like that is worse.

MS. LUTZ:

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The motion that was made was to accept the use of the typodont manikin tooth for both exams during this period, which would be throughout the duration of the pandemic, depending on how many cycles it lasts. That is how I read the waiver that was received by the governor's

DR. CASEY:

I have one comment for the dental part of it for getting licensure to go on the programs. He questioned whether a dentist who graduates from a university, one of our state schools, applies to a program in either our state or in an adjacent state or anywhere in the United States, will not be given a license to go into that program; thus, if a student

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is applying to either a specialty program in oral surgery, they will not be allowed into the program or is there any type of special provision. It is my understanding these students have already been accepted in a program. they being allowed to still enter with the exception of they still have to make up part of the exam.

DR. FURNARI:

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In my particular case, the institution has accepted the candidates for residency training, but the requirements for them to actually start patient care is that they have a valid Pennsylvania state dental license. That is an institutional requirement, and that is what we are trying to get overturned or at least set aside for this year considering the extraordinary circumstances with COVID-19.

The implication is there are some people out there who cannot go into private practice. There are other ones who cannot go into training. It impacts a lot of different areas. It impacts me personally. I have also been a Board examiner, and I have been involved with the process of validating things, and I personally am uncomfortable that this has not been validated. I understand that not testing somebody is as bad as testing somebody on a platform that has not been validated.

10 DR. CASEY:

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I believe by the second week of July, all of the Pennsylvania dental schools will have completed their licensure testing minus the periodontal scaling skills, so they will be eligible for a license if they pass the exam. We waived the periodontal for this year, so if they passed everything else, they do not have to take the periodontal.

CHAIRMAN ERHARD:

The vote on the motion is to accept this typodont tooth for the dental hygiene periodontal scaling portion and the dentist periodontal scaling portion of the licensure examination if it is

offered by the testing agency.

Can we start with the roll call now?

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[Mr. Stauffer read questions and comments from the audience that included hygiene directors being in agreement that the typodont exam should be used for the class of 2020, the comment of students having difficulty finding a patient who is willing to participate in the exam because of COVID-19, a question of whether permission was already given because of the waiver, a comment that ADEX has accepted the dental hygiene typodont exam for 2020, and a request of acceptance of the typodont exam for the time during the COVID-19 pandemic.]

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CHAIRMAN ERHARD:

I think we are pretty clear on where we are going here. The motion was to accept it. A "yes" vote is you accept the typodont tooth during this COVID-19 period. A "no" would be to continue with the recommendations that we sent to the governor's office from our May meeting.

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Erhard, no; Johnson, no; Casey, no;

Funari, no; Goody, yes; Hughes, yes;

Jaspan, yes; Lugo, yes; Matta, no;

Mountain, no; Murray, yes; Sizemore,

yes; Sullivan, no.

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Seven to reject and six to accept.

[The motion carried.]

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[John F. Erhard III, D.D.S., Chairman, thanked the Board for the intense, informative deliberation. He was hopeful that the Board entertain accepting reliable, vetted, identifiable typodont teeth to eliminate live patient treatment, which is more thical and safer.

Chairman Erhard announced that this was his last meeting with the Dental Board. He commented on how much he respected his appointment to Board Chair and leaves the Board with extreme confidence in its continued success. He mentioned being proud of Board members who responded to his request to participate in MOM-n-PA. He commended staff and Commissioner Johnson. He wished the Board good health and happiness.

Board members thanked Chairman Erhard for his

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   quidance and exemplary leadership during his time
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   serving the commonwealth. They also thanked him for
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   being an awesome colleague and friend.]
