20 Report of Board Counsel

21 [C. William Fritz II, Esquire, Board Counsel,

22 provided a Status of Cases Report for the Board's

23 review. He informed Board members that there are no

24 disciplinary cases at this time. He noted three open

Ms. Richards noted the two main categories when reviewing expenses are administrative and legal costs. She stated that expenses are brought in through direct costs, timesheet-based charges, and licensee population. She referred to expenses in FY20-21 and FY21-22, noting the expenses for FY22-23 at the time of the report and as of this morning. She noted the budgeted amount for FY22-23 was more than adequate.

Ms. Richards addressed revenue and expenses showing a healthy projected balance in FY22-23 and  $\rm FY25-26.]$

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   Appointment - Prosecution Division Annual Report

     Presentation
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   [Carolyn A. DeLaurentis, Esquire, Deputy Chief
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Counsel, Prosecution Division, presented to the Board to provide a summary of the prosecution division's role and present annual numbers for 2022. She informed Board members that the Bureau of

Professional and Occupational Affairs provides

administrative and legal support to all 29 licensing boards and commissions, along with the counsel division and hearing examiners.

Ms. DeLaurentis explained that the Office of Chief Counsel is under the Governor's Office of General Counsel and is broken into several divisions. She noted the prosecution division works with the Bureau of Enforcement and Investigations (BEI), along with the Professional Compliance Office (PCO), and are tasked with receiving complaints, investigating allegations, ensuring public safety, and enforcing compliance with the acts and regulations of the 29 boards and commissions.

Ms. DeLaurentis noted prosecution has five senior prosecuting attorneys broken into five teams, along with 33 prosecuting attorneys. She noted Ray Michalowski is a senior prosecuting attorney and has nine boards and commissions.

Ms. DeLaurentis addressed the complaint process, noting complaints are received in any way and from anyone. She noted the Pennsylvania Licensing System (PALS) at pals.pa.gov is an easy way to submit a complaint online. She stated every single case is reviewed by an administrative assistant to determine jurisdiction.

Ms. DeLaurentis discussed levels of review, including whether the case is under their jurisdiction. She noted they have the ability to charge a licensee or close a case and file an order to show cause (OSC) if charging someone or issue citations. She stated that individuals are entitled to a hearing if charged and provided a summary of the hearing process, noting the hearing examiner's decision is a proposed decision and then the Board makes a final decision. She mentioned that the consent agreement process is where both sides are negotiating toward a resolution.

Ms. DeLaurentis stated their files are confidential and privileged under confidentiality statutes. She informed Board members that prosecution cannot disclose something within their files if it is not contained within the consent agreement presented to the Board.

Ms. DeLaurentis stated BEI not only conducts interviews, inspections, and obtains evidence but also serve subpoenas and orders and testify. She explained that everything gathered during an investigation is provided to the legal office and reviewed. She stated after the investigation, documents are reviewed by a prosecuting attorney to

determine if there is a violation of the act or regulations, where it is then decided whether to close the case or file charges.

Ms. DeLaurentis noted that disciplinary actions include immediate temporary suspension if someone is an immediate danger to the health and safety of the public. She stated automatic suspensions usually concern drug act violations or 302 commitments, and a petition for appropriate relief is when someone has violated a board order. She mentioned they also have the order to show cause and consent agreements.

Ms. DeLaurentis referred to 63 Pa.C.S. § 3109, where prosecution information is confidential and privileged under confidentiality statutes. She explained that Department of State investigations are deemed as noncriminal investigation records under the Right-to-Know Law. She reported that only their final action can be shared publicly.

Ms. DeLaurentis provided data as of January 3, 2023, noting the number of current open cases for the prosecution division overall is 13,154 and is down from last year at 15,141. She stated 16,084 cases were opened in 2022 and is down from 2021 at 18,363 cases. She reported closing 17,826 files in 2022 and is up from 2021, where 15,994 cases were closed. She

thanked the prosecution and counsel divisions, along with the Board, for their hard work in 2022.

Ms. DeLaurentis commented that the document she provided is a general report but similar to what the prosecution division provides to the General Assembly as their annual report. She informed Board members that the final report includes different types of case categories and would be available for review soon.

Ms. DeLaurentis addressed specific information for the State Architects Licensure Board, noting 97 cases were opened in 2022, which is down from 2021 at 193. She mentioned that an increase in cases opened may be due to that being a renewal year. She reported 145 cases were closed in 2022 and 95 in 2021 with 98 cases that are currently open for the Board. She stated 48 cases were Act 48 fines or citations and 1 suspension.

Ms. DeLaurentis mentioned that non-disciplinary actions are called Z codes and reported 72 warning letters in 2022, which is up from 24 in 2021. She explained that it probably relates to lapsed licenses, where warning letters needed to go out from the 2021 renewal and went out during the 2022 calendar year.

President Roller asked Ms. DeLaurentis how prosecution decides whether something is egregious or not in terms of their profession.

Ms. DeLaurentis explained that prosecution looks at prior comparable cases and decisions by the Board.

Mr. Michalowski further explained that the State Architects Licensure Board actually has warning letters for zero to six-month lapses for first offenses in its citation schedule, so a lot of the warning letters for the Board tend to be based on the actual schedule developed by the Board. He also stated the Board does not have a lot of egregious cases. He mentioned that case numbers would increase once they start enforcing continuing education when it becomes a part of the Board.

Mr. Michalowski noted the other portion of warning letters are from people who are on the edge of holding themselves out as architectural licensees, where prosecution works quickly to have them remove any inappropriate advertisements. He reported a lot of those appear to be inadvertent, where they do not know the word architect and architectural services are protected terms.

President Roller asked Mr. Michalowski how prosecution determines whether unlicensed practice in

terms of misrepresentation is serious or not.

Mr. Michalowski explained that the most common serious cases tend to be cases where somebody has left one firm and there is a dispute over alleged taking of documents from one firm to the other. He commented that the Board had an initiative to have the Department of Labor & Industry train their local inspectors to spot things like seal slapping and other seal violations that would be more serious.

Mr. Michalowski stated there are not a lot of complaints at the present time but something that is more technical would be sent to a contracted expert in architecture to help make the determination whether it was a violation and the depth of the violation committed.]

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President Roller commented that the National Council of Architecture Registration Boards Regional Summit takes place March 2-3 in Honolulu and the annual business meeting is in Tampa in June. He addressed proposals and asked whether Board members had any input regarding changing the makeup and expanding the diversity of the NCARB Board.

President Roller mentioned that he would be attending the meeting, along with Ms. McClenaghan and Mr. Piligian who are also planning to attend and would be voted on at the meeting in Tampa in June. He noted the Board would have to vote at the March or May meeting.

President Roller addressed regional alignment to reduce the regions from six to four regions with Region 2 being combined with Region 1.]

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18 Appointment - American Institute of Architects
19 Pennsylvania Update

20 [Stephen M. Swarney, JD, Executive Director, American

21 Institute of Architects Pennsylvania, informed Board

22 members that AIA is getting ready for a new

23 legislative session. He noted their Government

24 Affairs Committee met to discuss their legislative

25 survey.

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Mr. Swarney mentioned AIA is still going after continuing education and have been engaged in several discussions with interior design groups. He noted being open to discussion with colleagues to see if there is something AIA can do to benefit the design community. He stated AIA would again be looking at the statute of repose, indemnification, and codes this session.

Mr. Swarney noted AIA would be welcoming their new president, Roger Williams, from the northeastern part of the state and president-elect, Michael Metzger, from the eastern part of the state at an upcoming Board meeting.

Mr. Swarney announced an upcoming seminar that is part of their tri-state consortium. He mentioned having a good relationship with New York and New Jersey and informed everyone of an economic kickoff virtual meeting in a few weeks, where Dr. Anirban Basu would be discussing what to expect for the economy for the upcoming year and encouraged everyone to register.

Amal Mahrouki, Director of Legislative Affairs,

American Institute of Architects Pennsylvania,

addressed their Government Affairs Committee kickoff

call regarding the legislative survey results. She

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explained that AIA Pennsylvania does a legislative survey for all of their members at the beginning of each legislative session to ensure they are advocating on behalf of our entire membership. mentioned it was also open to nonmember architects and associate members or anyone aspiring to be an architect because they wanted to see what they felt AIA of Pennsylvania should prioritize. 

Ms. Mahrouki reported the number one issue coming out of the survey is encroachment on a practice of architecture. She mentioned the importance of highlighting, understanding, and reporting the unlicensed practice of architecture and would like to do more continuing education for members. She mentioned AIA is excited to review comments to see if there is any type of policy solution AIA could make and discuss with legislators.

Ms. Mahrouki addressed the second issue concerning building code uniformity and accessibility. She noted the need for an update to the Uniform Construction Code this session. She noted there was a Commonwealth Court opinion issued that invalidated the 2021 accessibility codes in Pennsylvania, and 2018 is the only accessibility that is currently enforceable. She stated AIA has been

working with the Senate Labor & Industry Committee
looking at legislation that would require the
adoption of the accessibility code in the statute.

Ms. Mahrouki discussed the third issue concerning green buildings and sustainability, noting the Committee on the Environment is excited about those issues and making sure AIA is encouraging the most sustainable and cleanest design possible for their members and citizens.

Ms. Mahrouki noted the fourth issue was regarding affordable housing and community development. She stated a Housing and Community Development
Subcommittee was started last session and is looking at communities more holistically to ensure they have more affordable housing.

Ms. Mahrouki informed Board members that AIA is meeting with the Interior Design Legislative

Coalition of Pennsylvania (IDLCPA) to find common ground as they move into this legislative session.

She mentioned that mandatory continuing education is a huge priority for AIA.

Ms. Mahrouki noted work had been started in the Senate regarding the legal reform issues and Statute of Repose Bill, noting she and Senator Laughlin are working on a cosponsor memo to be published shortly.

She reported also looking at having the AntiIndemnification Bill started in the House last year introduced this session.

Mr. Piligian requested more information concerning the accessibility standard.

Ms. Mahrouki noted AIA has been working on accessibility provisions within the accessibility code in Chapter 11 of the International Building Code (IBC). She stated they were automatically adopted at the beginning of each year and published in January. She noted the 2021 accessibility provisions were adopted at the beginning of 2022, but a court decision noted those to be unconstitutionally adopted.

Ms. Mahrouki commented that they did not have any review by any legislative body, noting the Review and Advisory Council typically reviews codes and then they are implemented into the Uniform Construction Code.

Ms. Mahrouki informed everyone that the only enforceable accessibility code is 2018 and does not mean someone cannot design to 2021 accessibility standards. She noted AIA is working with Senate Labor & Industry to find a way to have some type of regular adoption of the accessibility codes similar

to how they adopt the rest of the building codes.

President Roller addressed public member vacancies and asked those who may know someone who is interested in serving on the Board to move those individuals forward.]

Thomas Jefferson University Integrated Path to
Architectural Licensure (IPAL) Presentation
[John Dwyer, March, Thomas Jefferson University
College of Architecture and the Built Environment,
Chair, Department of Architecture, stated IPAL is
very much something in alignment with their
objectives and mission. He noted the future of work
is a big focus for the university and professionalism
is important, as they had many years through their
Bachelor of Architecture Program.

Mr. Dwyer mentioned being excited about the possibility of IPAL being a contributor to diversifying their profession, providing the ability to create more space for students to work while they are in school, and give them more resources and mentorship on the professional side. He stated their Advancement Council Committee of about 31 local architects would help toward placing students in a stronger way because it allows internal scholarship

opportunities and is already starting to generate itself in conversations around IPAL.

Mr. Dwyer stated Thomas Jefferson University would be honored to have the support of the Board and also need the support of the Board to do this through NCARB. He mentioned approaching the final stages of putting together an IPAL application to NCARB and starting to assemble some of the letters of support from member firms, advancement council, and the institution and welcomed a letter of support from the Board as well.

Mr. Dwyer stated NCARB requested a written narrative of what the process may be for gaining approval. He asked Board members for a letter of support and a short articulation of how the process works. He noted they are hoping to submit their application around the same time the university gives them approval for the new curriculum in late April.

Mr. Fritz requested Mr. Dwyer send an example so he and President Roller could review it and create something that would meet their requirements and then place that on the next agenda for the March 28 meeting.

President Roller commented that candidates have been approved through the Board before, but it is the
