Chair Porambo thanked Mr. McDonald for the presentation. She asked Mr. McDonald to stay for the Report of Board Counsel to possibly answer some questions.]

Report of Board Counsel

[Thomas M. Davis, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted prior Board discussion regarding apprenticeship programs in high schools. He stated that Act 55 of 2022 relates to both barbers and cosmetologists and allows for the study of barber and cosmetology in high schools and noted that the Board asked if the same could be done with massage therapy. He provided information from licensee Carolyn Hubert-Black at a previous meeting for the Board's review. He noted he also reached out to the Pennsylvania Department of Education with regard to this topic.

Mr. Davis informed Board members that he did not believe that the implementation of high school massage therapy education was something the Board could effectuate through regulations because the Barber and the Cosmetology Acts are somewhat

different than the Massage Therapy Act and he
addressed the differences. He opined that the only
way to establish a massage therapy program in high
schools would be through legislation. He commented
that the Board has talked about the possibility of
trying to get more people interested in the
profession.

Mr. McDonald stated the idea of apprenticeships for this licensee population had not been discussed expressly, but the policy office looked at encouraging and increasing access to programs like apprenticeships across professions to expand workforce development across the Commonwealth. He noted the possible need for a legislative change. He will follow up with colleagues at the Department of Education and explore options.

Chair Porambo suggested adding the topic to the next Board meeting to inform everyone of any updates.

Nina M. Kottcamp-Long, LMT, NCMT, Director of
Holistic Health and Wellness, Harrisburg Area
Community College, noted that providing massage
therapy to someone under the age of 18 requires a
guardian or parent to be in the room and asked how
that would reflect if they were teaching and whether
a change in the regulation would be required as well.

Chair Porambo noted there is anatomy, physiology, and pathology weaved into the cosmetology program, so it may very well be that a high school student under the age of 18 may be able to take a program from a theoretical standpoint to get the anatomy, physiology and have the practicum until after they have graduated to become an adult 18, and they can maybe attend an adult education program.

14 Regulatory Report

[Thomas M. Davis, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted prior Board discussion about two proposed regulations: 16A-727 regarding licensure by endorsement and

Attorney Davis noted previous discussion with regard to competency, which applicants for licensure prove by achieving a passing score on the MBLEx. He stated that to obtain a license in the Commonwealth, you need to have completed a 600 hour-program and pass the national exam, which is currently the MBLEx.

25 He noted that in years past, the Board would

examination; and 16A-729 regarding fees.

sometimes receive applications for licensure from individuals who completed 600-hour courses and completed a national exam, but never got licensed anywhere, and supposedly never worked anywhere, but were still relying upon the national exam that they passed ten years ago to prove competency, which is perfectly acceptable under the current laws and regs. But he stated that the Board has discussed amending its regulations with regard to proving current competency, especially in light of the fact the Board's regulations, with regard to reactivation of a license after a period of more than five years, would require completion of another MBLEx.

Attorney Davis stated, regarding current competence and licensure by endorsement under Act 41, practice in another jurisdiction had to be proven while under a license in good standing for a period of at least two of the last five years. There had been previous discussion that, with regard to initial licensure, the Board may add something to the regulations stating that the individual applying for initial licensure by examination must have passed the MBLEx within the past five years. He stated that proposed amendment has now bounced between the General Revisions and Licensure by Endorsement under

Act 41 regulations in an attempt to find the most appropriate vehicle for that amendment.

Attorney Davis proposed removing the language from the Act 41/Endorsement regulation package and moving it back to the General Revisions regulation package, which would allow him to get it done via a different and more appropriate regulation package while simultaneously streamlining the Act 41/Endorsement regulation.

Attorney Davis stated under Act 41, one must have current active licensure in another jurisdiction.

However, when the Board receives an application from an individual who has allowed their license to expire, the Board has oftentimes been able to issue a license after review of the applicant's education and exam score. These are often individuals who passed the MBLEx or other acceptable examination 10, 15 years ago. Should the Board begin accepting exam scores from only the last five years, that would make it harder for those individuals to obtain licensure.

Attorney Davis suggested amendment of the language slightly to say that the five-year requirement only applies to those who are trying to obtain initial licensure - those who have never held licensure anywhere else - thereby allowing the Board

to accept old exam scores from individuals who have
been working as licensed massage therapists in other
jurisdictions. Accordingly, the new five-year-rule
would only apply to individuals who have never held a
license in another jurisdiction.

He inquired if the Board would want him to continue down this road of trying to find a way to effectuate the five-year rule or does it want to continue doing what it is currently doing, which is accepting exam scores from however long ago. Board members had questions and comments, but ultimately indicated it no longer wished to add the proposed five-year rule to its regulations.

Attorney Davis will delete the proposed five-year rule for exam scores from both the Act $41/{\rm Endorsement}$ regulation as well as from the General Revisions Regulation.

There was discussion with regard to increasing fees for PLAA repayment. The matter would be placed on the next meeting agenda.

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Attorney Davis noted the MT Annual Report is an annual report that must be provided to the General Assembly. He indicated that in the past, Carolyn De Laurentis, when she was still with the prosecution department, presented the annual report for the year 2022 to the Board at one of its meetings. She has now provided the Board with a full, written report.

He provided a few highlights of that report which noted 9,263 licensees for this Board which has dropped to 7,000-plus based on BPOA numbers. The report noted 149 cases were opened in 2022 and at the time of the report, there were 127 current open cases, 160 cases were closed in the year 2022 and the average age to close the case in days was 304. Attorney Davis indicated that 23 of those cases ended in a simple fine under Act 48, 17 individuals were suspended, in 20 cases prosecution was not warranted, and a warning letter was sent in 53 cases. Anyone wanting a copy of that report was asked to contact the Board.

Attorney Davis discussed the Massage
Establishment Licensing Bill. He noted that House
Bill 1241 of 2023 was last discussed at the June 2023
meeting, and said it is the same as HB 2899 of 2022
which was discussed at the November meeting. It is

called "Providing for the Licensure of Bodywork

Facilities," and it is described as "an act providing

for the licensure of bodywork facilities, imposing

powers and duties on the Department of State and

prescribing penalties."

The Board had previously discussed the bill being referred to the House Professional Licensure Committee on May 24 of 2023. He reported it was in Committee and there had not been any movement since. He suggested that, should anyone wish to have input on this Bill, they should contact their local representative.
