him as Board Counsel because he volunteered for a new regulatory group position created by the counsel division. He mentioned that he would be drafting regulations for their Board as well as eight other boards.

- Mr. Davis stated the massage therapists in cosmetology salons regulation was being jointly promulgated with the State Board of Cosmetology and should be jointly promulgated in the near future in the Pennsylvania Bulletin simultaneously. He reported that massage therapy has been done for quite some time, but the State Board of Cosmetology has been through a couple different board counsels. He noted that he is helping draft the Regulatory Analysis Form (RAF), and there was movement on that one.
- Mr. Davis informed Board members that licensure by endorsement under Act 41 was undergoing and internal review, and he was slightly rewriting the RAF after comments were received from regulatory counsel, noting the annex had not changed since Board approval.
- Mr. Davis addressed schedule of fees, noting he talked to the Policy Office about fees as well as those other two things on August 10, 2023, and he was

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drafting a regulation, which would include $112 for the Professional Licensure Augmentation Account (PLAA).
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Mr. Davis explained that it is a Bureau of
Professional and Occupational Affairs (BPOA) policy
that each board has to be self-sufficient, which
means the Board would have to pay back close to \$2.4
million. He mentioned that he was in active
discussions with the Policy Office and would provide
an update when available.]

   [Nancy M. Porambo, MS, LMT, CNMT, NCTMB, Chair, noted
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   the upcoming Federation of State Massage Therapy
   Boards (FSMTB) Meeting September 28-30 in San Diego,
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   CA. She addressed changes in bylaws, including
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   something as simple as communication.
        Chair Porambo noted that there is a presentation
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   by the California chapter, where all they want is the
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   names of the delegates so they can have communication
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   within, which would come before the actual delegate
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   membership for vote. She mentioned that is something
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   they rejected in the past and hoped there would be
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   more allowable open communication.
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        Chair Porambo stated there was also language in
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   the elections section that would be brought up that
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   is somewhat problematic, where there were two
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   sections of delegates of applicants for the board.
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She noted one section that has two people who are

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going into the vote and then the next section has three, so there are five people actually running for the board position.

Chair Porambo mentioned that the way they are handling the elections is not common, that the election goes off for the first two and whoever loses gets to be put into the second group to be elected again. She reported problems with that with respect to the California chapter again, bringing an amendment forward to be able to discuss why the election process is set up that way.

Chair Porambo stated being a part of the FSMTB Meeting was a good way to talk with people from other states and know what was going on with respect to the establishment law and other practices. She informed Board members that she would provide a report from the meeting in November.]

Nancy Porambo abstained from 17 voting on the motion.] \* \* \* 18 Miscellaneous 19 20 [Paul Keller, Board Administrator, addressed a 21 request regarding the current active count of 22 licensees. He reported there were 8,162 actively 23 licensed massage therapists. 24 Mr. Davis referred to prior Board discussion 25 concerning increasing fees because of lower licensee

1 counts, noting over 8,000 is where the Board has 2 been.

Chair Porambo asked whether a definite answer was received concerning payback of the debt.

Mr. Davis spoke with the Policy Office in August, but has not yet received a definite answer. He noted informing the Policy Office that massage therapy would probably lose licensees if they raise the renewal fee to \$360. He mentioned that the Policy Office was considering the current bureau policy, where each board is required to pay back the Professional Licensure Augmentation Account (PLAA).

Mr. Davis also noted prior Board discussion about massage therapy in high schools and massage therapy license via apprenticeship. He mentioned that the change would require some statutory changes, noting the Department of Education agreed.

Andrew LaFratte, MPA, Deputy Policy Director,
Department of State, noted discussing those items and
a potential pilot program mirroring what barber and
cosmetology have done from Act 55 of 2022. He agreed
that statutory changes would be required, where the
Board would need to open up their Practice Act to
allow students under the age of 18 to be able to
practice massage therapy.

Mr. LaFratte noted that the Policy Office is interested in the actual formal apprenticeship program idea for an alternative pathway to licensure, where students could achieve their 600-hour requirement without going through the traditional educational route. He mentioned that it may be a great alternative pathway for economically disadvantaged individuals who may be deterred from the profession due to the cost of a tuition.

Mr. LaFratte provided Mr. Davis with information from a few different states, where at least six states offer some sort of formal massage therapy apprenticeship program that could be counted toward the requirement for licensure. He noted that the minimum age to enter an apprenticeship program is 18 years of age for a student in other states.

Mr. LaFratte mentioned that there are also different sponsorship requirements with having a mentor for all of the different states. He explained that a mentor would have to be a licensee who is active at least three years in the practice to become a mentor and then they can take on someone as an apprentice.

Mr. LaFratte offered to assist with drafting some plans, including online and classroom requirements.

He referred to requirements during COVID, where there
was the ability to get 100 hours of online
instruction in anatomy, physiology, kinesiology, and
pathology, along with 25 hours of online instruction
in professional ethics or business.

- Mr. LaFratte stated maybe a proposal could be drafted with a 600-hour apprenticeship program, where 125 hours would be outside of the classroom or online instruction and the remaining 475 could be a mix of in-class and out-of-classroom instruction. He offered to look at examples from other states and put different options together.
- Ms. Hicks referred to prior discussion concerning the 100 hours, where a lot was learned through COVID, and the governor wanted schools to continue through with the online process. She noted missing the opportunity to make those regulation changes, where the Board would now have to make a legislation change but asked whether the Board would be more lenient with just allowing some of the online routes to make the education a little bit more lined up with some of the other states.
- Mr. Davis explained that the Board has an active regulation regarding massage therapy virtual education, which would allow a certain percentage of

1 the 600 hours of initial education to be via distance
2 education.

Mr. Davis noted that the regulation would not require a legislative change, but apprenticeships and allowing massage therapy programs in high schools probably would require a legislative change. He commented that they should be treated as three separate things entirely.

Mr. Davis reported that six states at some point allowed for apprenticeships, and of the six that have apprenticeships in their laws and regulations, only four of them are actively allowing for licensure via apprenticeship, so it seems to be the way of the massage profession to move away from apprenticeships more than it is toward them.

Mr. Davis also noted FSMTB confirmed that and pointed out the Model Practice Act. He referred to Section 301, where it talks about being 18 years of age and schooling but does not discuss apprenticeships.

Chair Porambo commented that representatives from Associated Bodywork & Massage Professionals (ABMP) or the American Massage Therapy Association (AMTA) would be able to provide information regarding what they are working on with various states. She noted there

1 are a few states actively pursuing it but would check 2 with Debra at the FSMTB Meeting next week.

Ms. Hicks commented that the old form of apprenticeship used to be just following a mentor, but the U.S. Department of Labor has a very different outline. She reported multiple states are using this for nursing, where it would actually help schools because the education has to come from an actual education institution.

Ms. Hicks explained that it is not like taking the 500 or 600 hours depending on the state requirement of education but is allowing a workforce where they understand more of the job tasks and can do what they do not allow in an externship. She also noted it allows more on-the-job experience and is helping to fill the workforce.

Ms. Hicks mentioned that it does not have to be the only route in a state and they should look at new models. She referred to Florida's model, where they did not go through a formal training and believed that is why they are doing away with that. She noted that Missouri just adopted an apprenticeship program, where their state board actually dictates the education component, and Alabama adopted a program working with nursing colleges and helping with the

workforce.

Chair Porambo commented that there was very little accountability with apprenticeship programs, where there was not an overseeing body that would check on the instructors to make sure that they were following through. She mentioned that there needs to be some checks and balances with having a strong apprenticeship program, which would obviously be a school.

Chair Porambo thanked Mr. LaFratte, noting that she would like him to pursue it further and come up with a plan to increase licensees in the state.

Mr. LaFratte informed Board members that he would work with counsel to put together some general framework and options and requested the Board provide feedback before the final version. He mentioned that discussions are still ongoing regarding the licensure fee and PLAA and offered to provide an update within the next few weeks.

Mr. Davis read an email he received from FSMTB concerning apprenticeships and offered to place it on the agenda for the next meeting.]
