The Board returned 11 to open session at 10:30 a.m.] * * * 12 13 The regularly scheduled meeting of the State 14 Board of Massage Therapy was held on Tuesday, 15 September 20, 2022. Nancy M. Porambo, MS, LMT, CNMT, NCTMB, Chair, Professional Member, called the meeting 16 17 to order at 10:30 a.m. * * * 18 19 [Thomas M. Davis, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted the 20 meeting was being recorded, and those who continued 21 to participate were giving their consent to be 2.2 recorded. 23 Mr. Davis also noted the Board met in Executive 24 Session prior to the Board meeting for the purpose of 25 conducting quasi-judicial deliberations and to

receive advice of counsel on the matters upon which 1 the Board would later vote.] 2 3 * * * Introduction of Board Members/Attendees 4 5 [Chair Porambo requested an introduction of Board 6 members and attendees.] * * * 7 8 Approval of minutes of the August 9, 2022 meeting 9 CHAIR PORAMBO: 10 Let's continue with approval of the 11 Board minutes from August 9, 2022. 12 Are there any changes to the minutes? Do I have a motion? 13 14 MR. STRAWSER: 15 I make the motion. 16 MS. DOUGLAS: 17 I second the motion. CHAIR PORAMBO: 18 19 Thank you. 20 21 Porambo, aye; Claggett, aye; Nelson, 22 aye; Douglas, aye; Hicks, aye; Keth, 23 aye; Strawser, aye. 24 [The motion carried unanimously.] * * * 25

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1 Report of Board Regulatory Counsel

[Thomas M. Davis, Esquire, Board Counsel, referred to 2 3 the Regulatory Status Report, noting movement since 4 the last meeting for 16A-725 regarding the massage 5 therapists in cosmetology salons proposed regulation. 6 He stated the package was sent to the Office of General Counsel (OGC), Office of the Budget, and 7 Office of Policy and Planning on August 26, 2022, and 8 9 received comments from OGC.

10 Mr. Davis noted a 2014 amendment to the 11 Cosmetology Law, where massage therapists could practice in cosmetology salons. He mentioned that as 12 13 per the cosmetology practice act, cosmetology 14 included the massaging; cleansing; stimulating; 15 manipulating; exercising; or similar work on the scalp, face, arms, hands, or upper part of the body. 16 He noted that no physical barriers separating the 17 18 areas used for massage therapy from the areas used 19 for cosmetology or esthetics are required when a 20 massage therapist performs massage services that a 21 cosmetologist or esthetician is authorized to 22 perform.

23 Mr. Davis addressed OGC's comment in which OGC 24 wanted to know exactly what the "upper part of the 25 body" means. He explained he could not find a

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1 definition for upper part of the body in the 2 Cosmetology Act or regulations but would talk to 3 Cosmetology Board Counsel to see if there is 4 something in case law that defines upper part of the 5 body.

6 Mr. Davis addressed OGC's second comment 7 regarding the minimum room size of 120 square feet. 8 He stated the Board's regulations do not specifically 9 list a minimum room size for all massage therapy 10 rooms, but noted the cosmetology regulations list a 11 minimum room size of 60 square feet for each 12 additional licensee.

Mr. Davis mentioned that the Board discussed thi 13 issue several years ago and, after discussing it with 14 15 the Cosmetology Board, determined 60 square feet was not enough for a massage therapist and decided to 16 17 require a minimum of 120 square feet for each massage 18 therapist practicing in a cosmetology or esthetician 19 salon, and noted this requirement is in the Board's 20 proposed regulation for massage therapists practicing 21 in cosmetology/esthetician salons. He noted that OGC 22 asked where the number came from, and he noted it to 23 be a recognized industry standard, based on the size 2.4 of the standard massage therapy table.

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Mr. Davis requested information be brought to his

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attention if anyone on the Board, or an association 1 2 representatives have any additional information with 3 regard to 120 square feet being and industry standard.] 4 * * * 5 Report of Board Counsel 6 7 Adjudications and Orders 8 MR. DAVIS: 9 Number 4 on the Board's agenda. These 10 are all the Adjudications that were discussed in Executive Session. I know 11 12 how the Board is looking to vote on 13 these, so I have prepared motions. 14 Based on the Board's discussions 15 in Executive Session, I believe the 16 Chair would entertain a motion to adopt as final the Proposed Adjudication and 17 18 Order in the Matter of the Application 19 for a License to Practice Massage 20 Therapy of Raegan Akers, Case No. 22-21 72-002941. 2.2 CHAIR PORAMBO: 23 Do we have a motion? 24 MR. CHAIR PORAMBO: 6 7 Thank you. 8 9 Porambo, aye; Claggett, aye; Nelson, 10 aye; Douglas, aye; Hicks, aye; Keth, 11 aye; Alumbro Shade, abstain; Strawser, 12 aye. [The motion carried. Imelda Alumbro Shade abstained 13 14 from voting on the motion.] * * * 15 16 Correspondence 17 [Thomas M. Davis, Esquire, Board Counsel, addressed 18 correspondence received from Carolyn Hubert-Black, a 19 licensed massage therapist in Pennsylvania, on August 20 4, 2022, requesting the Board consider creating a 21 massage therapy apprenticeship program as an 22 alternative way to obtain licensure. 23 Mr. Davis noted Ms. Hubert-Black cited examples 24 of a few states that have apprenticeship programs 25 currently. He responded, stating that the Board was

aware of other states having apprenticeship programs 1 2 because their practice act allows for apprenticeship 3 programs, whereas the Pennsylvania Massage Therapy Act does not discuss apprenticeship programs. 4 Mr. Davis also provided Ms. Hubert-Black with 5 6 minutes from the Board's August 5, 2020 meeting, 7 where the Board briefly discussed apprenticeship programs at and the chair at that time mentioned that 8 Florida was most likely eliminating their 9 10 apprenticeship program after experiencing some 11 issues. He suggested Ms. Hubert-Black discuss the 12 issue with an elected representative but also offered 13 to have the issue added to the agenda. Chair Porambo asked Ms. Hubert-Black if she would 14 15 like to address the Board. 16 Ms. Hubert-Black commented that there are a lot 17 of individuals doing massage therapy who have not 18 attended massage therapy schools. She noted 19 researching other states with apprenticeship programs 20 and seeing what was working and not working. She noted apprenticeship to be an alternative for those 21 22 who cannot attend a traditional school because of 23 their occupation, family, or other reasons and 24 suggested the addition of apprenticeship programs 25 would also cut down on the unlicensed practice of

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1 massage therapy as well as criminal activity in the 2 industry.

3 Ms. Hubert-Black also noted apprenticeship programs would benefit massage therapy because it 4 5 would be an alternative for people to become licensed 6 and increase the overall number of licensees since 7 there is a decline of massage therapists. She asked the Board to consider apprenticeship, noting if it 8 9 does not work, the Board has the power to make 10 changes.

11 Ms. Hicks commented that anyone practicing massage without any training is practicing without a 12 license. She noted that more alternatives for 13 14 education or hybrid programs is something most states 15 should be thinking about but suggested it has to be done through a school and proper channels. She said 16 17 that anyone practicing massage without a license 18 should be reported.

Ms. Douglas noted not being opposed to the idea of an apprenticeship program but was not clear of how that would work. She also was not sure whether the average massage therapist could give someone the education and background needed to become a massage therapist because a lot of information has changed. Mr. Strawser expressed concern with the quality

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of "education" involved with an apprenticeship and 1 whether it would be to the level needed for state 2 3 requirements because most schools are anywhere from 4 500 to 900 hours of mostly in-person training. 5 Ms. Keth commented that a straight apprenticeship 6 program would not work due to anatomy, physiology, 7 and pathology education required to be a licensed massage therapist. She mentioned it could be part of 8 9 a hybrid program at some point but would have to be 10 part of a hybrid program at some point but it would 11 have to part of an accredited program with 12 apprenticeship as a different component instead of some of the lab work. 13

14 Ms. Hicks mentioned that apprenticeship would 15 help students transition into the workforce and help 16 individuals understand their career a lot sooner than 17 if they just learned massage in a classroom. She 18 noted the importance of an educational component 19 being there and possibly being required to also take 20 the Massage & Bodywork Licensing Examination (MBLEx) 21 like everyone else. She believed apprenticeship 22 would help the staff shortage in the industry 23 nationwide and that schools would also help. 24 Ms. Alumbro Shade agreed with the importance of

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having knowledge and education, noting someone can

1 learn the practice of treatment but that it is really 2 useless without education.

Acting Commissioner Claggett noted apprenticeship to be a good idea but more research would be needed with maybe a comparison of other states to see what other states do and to possibly have another conversation in the future.

8 Ms. Hubert-Black addressed research she found 9 regarding education. She explained that an 10 apprenticeship years ago was like on-the-job 11 training, but apprenticeship is a lot different now 12 because it is regulated by Board members and every 13 apprenticeship program she researched for massage 14 therapy is about hours. She explained that it is a 15 15-month program, where the licensed massage 16 therapists have to apply and fill out an application 17 with the Board.

Ms. Hubert-Black informed Board members that 18 apprenticeships typically require 310 hours of hands-19 20 on instruction, 300 hours of clinical client services, 125 hours of anatomy and physiology and 21 22 kinesiology, 120 hours in technique, 50 hours of 23 massage therapy techniques and skills, 40 hours of 24 pathology, 40 hours of ethics and business, 15 hours 25 of sanitation in a combination with cardiopulmonary

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21 resuscitation (CPR), and the MBLEx. 1 2 Chair Porambo thanked Ms. Hubert-Black for bringing the information forward to the Board's 3 4 attention and asked her to give the Board an 5 opportunity to take a look at things and see how other states are addressing it.] 6 7 * * * 8 Correspondence 9 Waiver Requests 10 MR. DAVIS: 11 Moving to Waiver Requests, which are 12 number 12 through 20 on the Board's 13 agenda. I have the package for these 14 motions based upon discussions in 15 Executive Session.
