Jason E. McMurry, Esquire, Commission Counsel, on behalf of K. Kalonji Johnson, 10 Chairperson, Deputy Secretary for Regulatory 11 Programs, officially called the meeting to order at 10:30 a.m. 12 13 * * * 14 [Jason E. McMurry, Esquire, Commission Counsel, noted 15 the meeting was being recorded, and those who 16 continued to participate were giving their consent to 17 be recorded. * * * 18 Roll Call of Commission Members/Introduction of 19 20 Attendees 21 [Amanda Li, Commission Administrator, provided a roll 22 call of Commission members and introduction of 23 attendees.1 24 25 Approval of Minutes

5 1 MR. MCMURRY: 2 The first item on the agenda is 3 approval of the minutes of the December 4 16, 2022 meeting presented to the 5 Commission members prior to the 6 Commission's meeting this morning. 7 Are there any corrections or notations on those? 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   [Carolyn A. DeLaurentis, Esquire, Deputy Chief
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   Counsel, Prosecution Division, presented to the
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   Commission to provide a summary of the prosecution
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   division's role and present annual numbers for 2022.
   She informed the Commission members that the Bureau
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6
   of Professional and Occupational Affairs provides
7
   administrative and legal support to all 29 boards and
8
   commissions, along with about 37 prosecuting
9
   attorneys, about 18 counsel attorneys, and hearing
10
   examiners. She noted professional licensing protects
11
   the health and safety of the public and protects the
12
   integrity of the professions.
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        Ms. DeLaurentis explained that the Office of
14
   Chief Counsel is under the Governor's Office of
15
   General Counsel, noting the prosecution division is
   one division under the Office of Chief Counsel.
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the Professional Compliance Office (PCO).

Ms. DeLaurentis stated the group is tasked with complaints, investigating allegations, ensuring public safety, and enforcing compliance with the acts and regulations that govern the 29 boards and

noted the prosecution division works with the Bureau

of Enforcement and Investigation (BEI), along with

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commissions.

Ms. DeLaurentis stated the prosecution division

- 1 has five senior prosecuting attorneys and is broken
- 2 | into five teams, noting each team has a senior
- 3 prosecuting attorney. She also noted Karl Geschwindt
- 4 is an acting senior prosecutor and also the
- 5 Commission liaison. She also mentioned Paul
- 6 Jarabeck, Heather McCarthy, Ray Michalowski, and
- 7 | William Newport are all senior prosecutors.
- 8 Ms. DeLaurentis addressed the complaint process,
- 9 noting complaints are received from any source. She
- 10 stated the most efficient way to file a complaint is
- 11 on the Pennsylvania Licensing System (PALS) at
- 12 pals.pa.gov and easy to access through Google. She
- 13 | noted prosecution also accepts complaints from law
- 14 enforcement, sister agencies, media reports, and the
- 15 | Pennsylvania Justice Network (JNET).
- 16 Ms. DeLaurentis stated the Bureau of Enforcement
- 17 and Investigation (BEI) has the ability to
- 18 investigate matters and gather facts but do not make
- 19 decisions on any violations or cases. She discussed
- 20 levels of review, including jurisdiction checks, to
- 21 make sure they are being efficient with time and
- 22 money.
- Ms. DeLaurentis noted that cases are reviewed
- 24 after the investigation to determine whether any
- 25 charges need filed or the case can be closed. She

addressed charging decisions that include an order to show cause or citations. She stated the individual is entitled to a hearing if charged and the hearing examiner issues a proposed decision but then the boards and commissions make a final decision. She noted boards and commissions also makes the final decision for consent agreements.

Ms. DeLaurentis informed Commission members that investigations by their office are confidential and privileged under confidentiality statutes, where prosecution cannot disclose something within their files if it is not contained within the document presented to the Commission.

Ms. DeLaurentis explained that BEI is not law enforcement and does not have search warrant authority but does have subpoena authority. She noted BEI is

Ms. DeLaurentis stated BEI not only conducts interviews, inspections, and obtains evidence but also serve subpoenas, orders, letters and also testify. She noted BEI does not have unlimited authority, and some boards are supposed to comply based upon their governing regulations and statutes if BEI asks to see their records but other boards do not.

Ms. DeLaurentis addressed the post-investigation process, where reports and evidence are provided to the legal office and reviewed to see whether to close the case or file charges. She noted they have the ability to file immediate temporary suspensions if someone is an immediate danger to the health and safety of the public and automatic suspensions that usually concern drug act violations and 302 commitments.

Ms. DeLaurentis noted they also have the ability to file orders for examination, petitions for appropriate relief when someone has violated a board order, orders to show cause, and consent agreements. She stated the levels of discipline include revocations, suspensions, probations, reprimands, fines, remedial education, and cost of the investigation.

Ms. DeLaurentis referred to the confidentiality statute under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3109, where all prosecution information is confidential and privileged and are noncriminal investigation records under the Right-to-Know Law. She mentioned the only information public is the final action of the agency.

Ms. DeLaurentis explained that information could be shared with other licensing boards, law

enforcement, and other agencies in furtherance of investigative efforts.

Ms. DeLaurentis provided data as of January 3, 2023, noting the number of current open cases for the whole division is 13,154 but less than last year at over 15,000. She stated 16,084 cases were opened in 2022 and is down from 2021 at 18,363 cases. She reported closing 17,826 files in 2022 and is up from 2021, where 15,994 cases were closed. She thanked the prosecution and counsel divisions and the Commission for their hard work in 2022. She mentioned the numbers include notary and the Pennsylvania Navigation Commission but do not include charities.

Ms. DeLaurentis informed the Commission that an annual report is issued to the General Assembly that includes case categories and would be available soon. She addressed specific information for the State Navigation Commission, noting 5 cases were opened in 2022 and 5 cases were closed. She reported 2 open cases, noting the Commission licensee population is following the rules.

Ms. DeLaurentis informed Commission members that there was no discipline last year, noting 3 of the cases were prosecution not warranted and 2 were

1 | warning letters. She mentioned that warning letters

He noted being impressed with all 18 candidates concerning qualifications and that the decision was based on small items and information after the interviews.
 - Mr. Sullivan also thanked Ms. Li for all of her work providing the volumes of information. He mentioned that every application was reviewed, noting the difficulty they had narrowing it down. He commented that he is looking forward to working with the selected candidates in the future.
 - Mr. James also thanked Ms. Li. He noted having a nicely diverse group of candidates and is looking forward to working with them.]
