Chair Malady commented that the restrictions were put in place because nurses would be practicing unsupervised or be in practice areas where they would have access to drugs but does not apply to someone with strictly a mental health issue and does not have a dual diagnosis of any kind of drug impairment issue.

[Mary Powell, PhD, CRNP, CDCES, Associate Dean of Graduate Nursing Programs and Associate Professor, Widener University; introduced Andy A. Workman, PhD, Provost; Kim C. O'Halloran, PhD, Vice Provost for Academic Affairs and Strategy; Anne Krouse, PhD, MBA, RN-BC, Dean and Professor, School of Nursing; Mary Francis, PhD, CRNP, Director, AGACNP Program; and Jihane Hajj, DrNP, CRNP, Assistant Professor.

Dr. Powell presented to the Board to discuss
Widener University's proposals for a master's degree,
post-master's certificate, and a BSN-DNP adultgerontology acute care nurse practitioner. She noted
Widener built on their strong foundation with the
Board-approved family nurse practitioner program. She
noted developing three clinical courses in compliance
with the National Organization of Nurse Practitioner
Faculties (NONPF) essentials and competencies for the

1 adult-gerontology acute care nurse practitioner. She 2 noted necessary credits for the programs.

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Chair Malady commented that the Board is aware that Widener has very successful programs already being provided. She mentioned that NONPF essentials speak to independent practice and questioned whether Widener is making it clear to students that it is not part of what is allowed in Pennsylvania.

Dr. Powell noted utilizing NONPF competencies, which address independent practice on each of the clinical evaluations and present throughout the curriculum, where in Pennsylvania, nurse practitioners practice in collaboration with a Pennsylvania licensed physician but within the scope outlined in Pennsylvania.

Chair Malady questioned whether Widener would expand course curriculum to incorporate things like mental health issues.

Dr. Powell stated Widener University incorporates social determinants of health in their master's program regarding underserved populations and also promotes vaccine literacy throughout the curriculum. She mentioned having a course on current perspectives that could include some of those issues as well.

Dr. Coughlin questioned whether Widener has any

- 1 concerns identifying and having qualified preceptors 2 for students.

improve patient care and care outcomes, while
integrating nursing science with best practices
evidenced by other disciplines.

- Dr. Ochsenreither noted being confident that the blending of MSN and DNP programs with the newly created BSN-DNP CRNP track would result in a creation of nurse leaders and care providers who will transform health care, advancing the profession of nursing.
- Dr. Ochsenreither announced that the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE) informed them that the Division of Nursing at DeSales University has earned reaccreditation for 10 years and will expire in June 2031.
- Dr. Ochsenreither thanked everyone for their attention and efforts in reviewing the BSN-DNP CRNP track application.
- Chair Malady commended DeSales University on their proposal and is excited to see more psychiatric mental health programs.
- Dr. Kmetz questioned whether DeSales University
  had any difficulty finding preceptors or faculty for
  the program.
- Dr. Ochsenreither commented that it is difficult,

  but they were able to find preceptors, noting one

preceptor would have the ability to work across all of the programs, not only undergraduate and other graduates from their post-master's DNP program who would work in psych and continue to work in their psych program.]

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7 | Committee Meetings - RN/PN Practice, Education,

& Regulation/Advanced Practice

[Carole Clarke Smith, Esquire, Senior Counsel, referred to the revised Act 53 list for the Board's review, noting areas highlighted would be crimes removed from the list. She noted contraband would be limited to only the sections that deal with providing controlled substances, drugs, or drug paraphernalia.

Chair Malady mentioned the Board looked at very specific things and is fine with the revised list and removing those crimes.

Ms. Pachter Schulder read the crimes to be removed from the list for public members who do not have access for review: Ethnic intimidation; Threat to use weapon of mass destruction; False imprisonment; Causing or risking catastrophe if involving releasing poison gas; Criminal mischief; Theft of property lost, mislaid or delivered by mistake; Theft of services; Theft by failure to make required disposition of funds

received; Unlawful possession of retail or library 1 theft instruments; Theft of trade secrets; Theft of 2 3 unpublished dramas and musical compositions; Theft of 4 leased property; Theft from a motor vehicle; Theft of 5 secondary metal; Fraudulent destruction, removal or concealment of recordable instruments; Bad checks; 6 7 Rigging publicly exhibited contest; Defrauding secured 8 creditors; Fraud in insolvency; Receiving deposits in 9 a failing financial institution; Misapplication of 10 entrusted property and property of government or 11 financial institutions; Falsely impersonating persons privately employed; Contraband (This would be limited 12 13 to only these sections dealing with controlled 14 substances, drugs and drug paraphernalia.); Aggravated 15 cruelty to animals; Cruelty to animals; Open lewdness; 16 Obscene and other sexual materials and performances; Public exhibition of insane or deformed person; 17 18 Corruption of minors (This is already covered under 19 Sexual Offenses.); False report of theft or conversion of 20 vehicle; Application for certificate of title or 21 registration; Altered, forged or counterfeit documents and 22 plates; and Fraudulent use or removal of registration plate. 23 The Board discussed whether it desired to remove 24 "Aggravated cruelty to animals" and "Cruelty to 25 animals" and the connection between violence to people

and violence to animals.

Dr. Coughlin commented that her position would be to keep it on the list. She noted the connection would be there when looking at the profession where those who are able to abuse an animal builds foundation and support to keep it on the list.

Ms. Kerns stated she would be in favor of keeping it on the list because the language reads that it may constitute grounds to refuse to issue, suspend, or revoke but is not automatic.

Ms. Clarke Smith commented that nurses by definition cannot practice on animals and did not believe other health professions have those crimes on their list. She also mentioned it might be a struggle to get the regulation to move forward if those crimes stay on the list.

Ms. Pachter Schulder stated the list is what gives the presumption but is not a bar from the Board's consideration. She questioned whether the Board would remove it if it poses a problem for the regulation to move forward.

Dr. Coughlin commented that she did not want to prolong the regulation and would remove it after listening to the information as the Board could analyze it and see it for the safety of the public and

1 citizens.

Ms. Pachter Schulder commented that it does not remove the Board's ability to analyze those crimes later but just removes the presumption.

Maria C. Battista, JD, EdD, Director of Policy and Government Affairs, Pennsylvania Coalition of Nurse Practitioners, questioned when the amended list would be available online.

Ms. Clarke Smith informed Dr. Battista that the list would be available tomorrow.

Brendan Lynch, Esquire, Community Legal Services (CLS), thanked the Board for taking Community Legal Services' concerns seriously and considering revising the list. He appreciated the points Ms. Pachter Schulder made, where the Board would have the opportunity to review offenses.

Mr. Lynch stated many of the most commonly charged offenses seen at Community Legal Services are charged against a very wide number of people for a wide range of behaviors in a wide range of settings.

Mr. Lynch mentioned that the presumption would be a serious barrier to many people and strongly urged the Board to consider those crimes, especially some of the misdemeanor offenses, that would impose the barrier of presumption for people to overcome and

   addressed 16A-5140 regarding Child Abuse Reporting
22
   Requirements. She commented that the Board's proposed
23
   rulemaking received comments from the Independent
24
   Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and provided
25
   documents for the Board's review. She mentioned that
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the comments were primarily clarity edits and did not change it substantively.

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2.4

Ms. Montgomery addressed IRRC's first comment, where the Board did not amend subchapters C and H for certified registered nurse practitioners (CRNPs) and clinical nurse specialists (CNSs), asking why the application or continuing education requirements were not amended in those subchapters.

Ms. Montgomery commented that the courses get applied in the Pennsylvania Licensing System (PALS) to the individual's education profile, and when an individual renews a license, PALS checks to make sure a course was taken within the prior 24 months and applies it to all of the credentials a nurse would hold. She noted the same applies for RNs licensed by the State Board of Mursing and a certified nurse midwife licensed by the State Board of Medicine.

Ms. Montgomery suggested making amendments to the State Board of Nursing and State Board of Medicine section imposing the mandatory training requirements at § 21.508(b) for nursing to clarify. She suggested adding clarification in (b) to read, if a licensee holds more than one license or certificate issued by the Board or holds a license issued by another licensing board within the Bureau that requires

mandatory training in child abuse recognition and reporting, credit for completion of an approved course would be applied to both credentials.

2.2

Ms. Montgomery questioned whether the Board wanted to add clarifying language or cross references in subchapters C and H for CRNPs and CNSs.

Ms. Montgomery stated IRRC suggested the Board provide that in future rulemaking, and she conferred with Deputy General Counsel, who does all of the regulatory work at the Office of General Counsel (OGC), noting it does not expand the scope of the rulemaking because the requirements apply and just adding a cross reference would not expand the scope of the rulemaking. She provided the Board with the options of either leaving it with the amendments suggested or also amending subchapters C and H.

Chair Malady recommended also amending the subchapters for clarity.

Ms. Montgomery will revise the final annex and draft the preamble and the rest of the regulatory documents and bring them back for a vote at a future Board meeting.

Ms. Montgomery referred to \$ 21.20 regarding Licensure by examination and by extension \$\$ 21.28(f), 21.131(d) and (e), 21.150, 21.155(f), and

21.723(b)(3). She noted the Board asked the applicant to submit proof of completion of 3 hours of training; however, it is the approved course provider who actually submits the completion data, and IRRC has asked the Board to revise these sections for clarity.

2.4

Ms. Montgomery provided the suggested response, where each section would be amended in the final-form rulemaking to require the applicants to complete the required training and/or "cause to be submitted" the proof of completion of the mandated reporter training. She is also suggesting an amendment where the Board would not issue or renew a license unless they have received an electronic report from an approved course provider documenting attendance or participation by the applicant or licensee.

Ms. Montgomery referred to § 21.501 regarding definitions where IRRC points out that it would improve clarity to use the defined term "person responsible for the child's welfare" in the definition of "perpetrator," specifically in subparagraphs (i) (D) and (ii) (D).

Ms. Montgomery noted that the definition of "perpetrator" was copied verbatim from the Child Protective Services Law but IRRC believed it would improve clarity. She provided a revised definition of

"perpetrator."

Ms. Montgomery noted changes to "serious physical neglect," where IRRC points out that the phrase "when committed by a perpetrator" was left out of this definition and asks the Board to revise the definition to include the omitted language. She stated the Board originally omitted the language to not dissuade individuals from making a report if they did not know who was responsible or imply that they had a duty to determine whether the individual would be considered "a perpetrator."

Ms. Montgomery stated she amended the definition to include the omitted language and made other suggested edits that provide additional clarity that a mandated reporter is not required to identify the person responsible in order to make the report.

Ms. Montgomery noted the next comment from IRRC is that the Board did not include provisions that were included in the Child Protective Services Law at § 6311(b)(2) and (3). She noted an individual still has to make a report even if someone does not know who is responsible for suspected child abuse.

Ms. Montgomery noted making paragraph 1 the general rule and the addition of (2) nothing in this subsection shall require a child to come before the

mandated reporter to make a report of suspected child
abuse and (3) nothing in this subsection shall require
the mandated reporter to identify the person
responsible for the child abuse to make a report of
suspected child abuse.

2.3

- Ms. Montgomery addressed another comment where the Board omitted language included in § 6314 of the Child Protective Services Law that requires mandated reporters to make certain materials subject to the court available to law enforcement officials in the course of investigating cases of child abuse. She mentioned IRRC suggested the statutory language be added to § 21.503, which she did.
- Ms. Montgomery addressed IRRC's comment in § 21.508(a), where the Board did not address how applicants taking the training document and report completion of the training and suggested clarifying (a) by including the same language as (b), where individuals applying to the Board for an initial license shall have completed at least 3 hours of training in Child Abuse Recognition and Reporting requirements which has been approved by the Department of Human Services and the Bureau as set forth in § 21.509.
- Ms. Montgomery commented that the Board is clarifying that the Board would not issue a license or

- certificate unless the Bureau has received an
  electronic report from an approved course provider
  documenting the attendance or participation by the
  applicant or the applicant has obtained an exemption
  under Subsection (c), which would be added to
  \$ 21.508(a) to be consistent with \$ 21.508(b).
  - Ms. Montgomery referred to § 21.131(b), where a registered nurse is not required to meet the continuing education requirements on the first renewal immediately following license, noting IRRC wants to know how the Board would implement the child abuse training requirement.

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- Ms. Montgomery stated there was no exception in the Child Protective Services Law (CPSL) that would excuse an RN from complying with mandated training requirements the first time they renew. She addressed PALS functionality, where it was programmed to look back 24 months to see if the licensee completed a course.
- Ms. Montgomery commented that an individual who is in an April cohort who takes the training and is licensed somewhere during a normal renewal period would be outside the normal 24-month period when they renew.
- Ms. Montgomery recommended amending § 21.131(b)

to provide an exception for the mandatory continuing
education and child abuse recognition and reporting to
read, "an applicant applying for initial licensure in
the Commonwealth would not be required to meet the
continuing education requirement on the first renewal
immediately following licensure, except for the
mandatory continuing education in child abuse
recognition and reporting required under § 21.508(b)."

Ms. Montgomery commented that the system would not prompt an individual to take the course again if a licensee had taken the course within the prior 24 months, noting it depends on initial licensure and when their first renewal occurs.

Ms. Wendy Miller further explained that when an applicant for licensure by endorsement applies in August and does the child abuse at that time, the system will randomly assign the licensee to a renewal cohort that is less than two years, so they would not exceed the two-year renewal period. She stated if they were assigned to the October 31 renewal cohort, when that October 31 renewal comes up, PALS looks back to the 24 months.

Ms. Wendy Miller stated if the child abuse requirement noted in August is within 24 months of that October 31 renewal, PALS will recognize that

requirement to have been completed; however, if in the 24-month lookback, it would be outside the 24 months when the renewal is submitted, the licensee would receive an auto-generated message from PALS that the mandatory child abuse must be completed as a condition of renewal.

Ms. Montgomery noted IRRC also raised concerns with § 21.508(c) relating to exemptions, where standards for documentation and evaluation are vague, noting the subsection does not specify if the exemption is limited to one biennial renewal period, and the process for notification of approval or denial is not stated. She mentioned similar comments were made to other boards.

2.3

Ms. Montgomery stated most boards find it difficult to establish standards for acceptable documentation because it varies depending on what the reason is the person is asking for an exemption; however, most boards will grant an exemption if the requirement is duplicative of other training they took or unnecessary under the circumstances and provided an example.

Ms. Montgomery suggested amendments to address all of the comments by clarifying that for purposes of licensure renewal any exemptions for training must

1 have been completed during the relevant biennial

2 renewal period. She noted the clarification was added

3 to subsection (c)(1), which is for individuals who

4 take comparable training under the Public School Code.

5 | She mentioned the second one is for people the

6 Department of Human Services requires to do the

7 training.

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Ms. Montgomery suggested amending paragraph (3), where the applicant submits documentation acceptable to the board demonstrating why the applicant or licensee should not be subject to the training or CE requirement. She noted the amendment adds that the Board may grant the exemption if it finds that completion of the training or continuing education requirement is duplicative or unnecessary under the circumstances but is not enough that the applicant or licensee states that they do not include children in their practice.

Ms. Montgomery noted the addition of subsection (d), where exemptions granted under subsection (c) are applicable only for the biennial renewal period for which the exemption is requested. She mentioned that if an exemption is granted, the license or certificate would be issued or renewed, as applicable. She stated if an exemption is denied, the applicant or licensee

would receive a discrepancy notice by email notifying
them of the need to complete an approved course or
submit additional documentation in support of their
request for an exemption.

2.4

Ms. Montgomery noted IRRC pointed out a typographical error in § 21.721(c) suggesting the term "submit" should be deleted, which has been done. IRRC also pointed out clarity issues in the Annex and Regulatory Analysis Form.

Ms. Montgomery will add cross references for CRNPs and CNSs to the draft Annex and draft the Preamble with the responses to IRRC's comments and bring it back to a future Board meeting for a vote.

Ms. Pachter Schulder explained the process, where Ms. Montgomery will bring those back, the Board will adopt those as final before going through the regulatory process again.

Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed extension of the waivers, where the current thinking is that it would be extended through the September date. She mentioned notifications will be posted on the Board's website and the Department's website for licensees and noted ongoing discussion regarding email blasts if not extended.

Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed the importance of

notifying individuals who received temporary practice
permit extensions that went 90 days past the emergency
declaration date will be expiring.

Marc Farrell, Deputy Policy Director, Department of State, announced that the online Pennsylvania Legislative Services noted House Bill 854 passed unanimously by the Senate, which extends waivers till September.

Director, Senate Consumer Protection & Professional
Licensure Committee, further explained that the Senate
is currently debating the Resolution, which would
effectively terminate the Disaster Declaration, but an
arrangement has been made between the Governor's
Office and leaders in both chambers that House Bill
854 would go back over to the House and extend most of
the waivers tied to the Disaster Declaration through
