Kmetz, PhD, RN, Chair, called the meeting to order at 9:09 a.m. 8 9 * * * 10 Introduction of Board Members 11 [Linda L. 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Abstentions? 1 2 [The motion carried unanimously.] 3 * * * 4 Adoption of Minutes 5 [Linda L. Kmetz, PhD, RN, Chair, noted the Board did 6 not have minutes from the previous meeting to 7 approve.] 8 * * * 9 Report of Prosecutorial Division 10 [Chair Kmetz noted VRP Consent Agreement items 2 11 through 12.] * * * 12 13 [Chair Kmetz noted Mr. Schertz' Consent Agreement.] * * * 14 15 [Chair Kmetz noted Ms. Bellfy's item 13. 16 Wesley J. Rish, Esquire, Rish Law Office, LLC, 17 Counsel for the Respondent, was present regarding 18 item 13.] * * * 19 20 [Chair Kmetz noted Ms. Boyd's item 14.] * * * 21 22 [Chair Kmetz noted Ms. Evancho's items 15 through 23 18.] 24 * * * 25 [Chair Kmetz noted Mr. Sniscak's item 19.]

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1 * * * 2 [Chair Kmetz noted Ms. Tucker's items 20 and 21.] 3 * * * 4 Appointment - Introduction 5 [Michael McDonald, Policy Director, Department of 6 State, introduced himself and provided a brief 7 history of his professional background. He informed 8 everyone that the Policy Office works closely with 9 all the licensing boards and commissions to research 10 and develop policy initiatives, along with 11 researching other states. 12 Mr. McDonald noted they work closely with Board 13 Counsel to help review and draft regulations. Не 14 mentioned also working with people in the Governor's 15 Office and the Secretary of the Commonwealth to 16 implement their policy agenda. He offered to be a 17 resource for the Board on any ideas or concerns or 18 initiatives the Board may want to implement. Mr. McDonald thanked Board members for their 19 20 service to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.] * * * 21 22 Appointment - Immaculata University Proposal for 23 Establishment of the Master of Science in Nursing 24 Family (Individual Across the Lifespan) and Post-25 Master's Family (Individual Across the Lifespan)

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1 Nurse Practitioner Certificate

2 [Angela Tekely, EdD, Vice President for Academic 3 Affairs & Provost; Pamela Hudson, DBA, RN, Director 4 of MSN Program; Jane Tang, PhD, RN, NE-BC, Chair, Division of Nursing; Edward Walton, DHSc, CRNP, FNP-5 6 C, CWS, CFCS, Associate Professor, Family Nurse 7 Practitioner Track Coordinator; and Mary Powell, PHD, 8 CRNP, CDCES, Dean, College of Nursing and Health 9 Professions, appeared before the Board on behalf of 10 Immaculata University.

Dr. Powell stated Immaculata has a long tradition of providing nursing education and jumped into the fray with generic bachelor's education and then with master's education. She noted having a master's track in nursing administration or nursing education and a very fine regional reputation.

Dr. Powell noted that following a needs assessment a few years ago, it was determined that a family nurse practitioner program would serve students and the community very well. She reported Chester County to be the wealthiest county in the state but also has pockets of underserved populations.

24 Dr. Powell explained that the program is 44 25 credits at the master's level, and they are also

proposing a post-master's certificate. She noted the 1 2 credits can vary depending on the gap analysis and 3 what the needs might be of the student to assure the 4 student achieves the appropriate competencies. 5 Dr. Powell noted utilizing the American 6 Association of Colleges of Nursing's (AACN) 7 Essentials and new National Task Force Guidelines for 8 Nurse Practitioner programs to develop the curriculum 9 She also noted incorporating 825 clinical hours map. 10 to assure students are meeting the latest Essentials' recommendations that national bodies are 11 12 recommending. She stated they have three clinical 13 courses, each of 225 clinical hours and an immersion 14 practicum for 150 hours in accord with the new 15 Essentials for a total of 825. 16 Dr. Powell commented that they are looking 17 forward to moving ahead with the program pending 18 Board approval. 19 Chair Kmetz thanked Immaculata University for 20 creating a thorough proposal that was easy to read. 21 Dr. Powell commented that Susan Bolig and Wendy 22 Miller have been phenomenal to work with and noted 23 being grateful for the Board's assistance and 24 guidance along the way. 25 Ms. Malady requested information regarding

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1 faculty. Dr. Powell stated Immaculata has four 2 family nurse practitioners and one gerontological 3 nurse practitioner, along with support faculty who 4 teach other courses, policy, and research. She noted 5 Immaculata is developing and nurturing the relations they have and are building on their strong reputation 6 7 around the community. She felt confident with being 8 able to acquire prepared preceptors within the 9 networks wherein they have relationships.

10 Dr. Bucher asked whether they would be assisting 11 students in finding clinical sites and preceptors 12 because it is a challenge in a lot of the programs. 13 He commented that the clinical hours were a great 14 part of their proposal. Dr. Powell explained that it 15 is the responsibility of the faculty to put the seal 16 of approval on clinical sites and find preceptors. 17 She stated students come from a variety of 18 backgrounds and bring their own professional 19 networks, where they may have identified a preceptor 20 whose practice they respect, but every preceptor 21 would be vetted by the faculty so that the students 22 are absolutely not out on their own. 23 Ms. Pachter Schulder welcomed Immaculata

23 Ms. Pachter Schulder welcomed Immaculata 24 University to stay until after Executive Session but 25 noted a letter would be sent with the Board's

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1 decision or they may attend the meeting virtually.] 2 * * * 3 Regulation Update 4 [Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel, 5 noted a Regulations Committee Meeting at 11 a.m. to 6 discuss the Nursing Education Program regulations. 7 Ms. Pachter Schulder noted Ms. Megan Castor is working on 16A-5139 regarding the Volunteer License 8 9 regulation. 10 Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed 16A-5143 regarding 11 Continued Competency and Licensure by Endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. 6311, noting the final form was 12 13 approved by the Board last month and has been sent to 14 regulatory counsel for review. 15 Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed 16A-5145 regarding 16 CRNA Licensure, noting the proposed form regulation 17 has also been sent to regulatory counsel for review. 18 Ms. Pachter Schulder noted 16A-5146 regarding 19 Opioid Prescription and Education and Organ Donation 20 Education is being reviewed by the Office of Attorney 21 General and has been approved by the Governor's 22 Budget Office, Policy Office, and Office of General 23 Counsel. She noted the Office of Attorney General 24 submitted a question and she would write a response 25 and return it to the Attorney General's Office.

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1 Ms. Pachter Schulder stated it would be published 2 in proposed form after approval. She informed organ 3 donation organizations of this progress because they 4 wanted to make sure that all the modules are ready. 5 She mentioned there would be a 30-day public comment period and then come back to the Board again. 6 She 7 noted the effective date would be extended because 8 the modules would not be ready.

9 Ms. Pachter Schulder had no new progress to 10 report for 16A-5147 regarding the Nurse Licensure 11 Compact (NLC). She noted the importance of the 12 criminal background check (CHRC) language being 13 approved by the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) 14 so that it could be incorporated into the statue by 15 the legislature. She stated without that, the Board 16 could not move forward with full implementation. She 17 also indicated that with statutory authority perhaps 18 the Board would issue temporary regulations to assist 19 in the implementation of the Compact.

Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed the technology piece required for full implementation and indicated that in addition to building a new licensure class, the licensure system will have to be able to toggle back and forth between a multistate license and a single state license because if someone were to be

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disciplined, change their primary state of residence, or go into an alternative discipline program, that individual would not be able to have a multistate license anymore. She mentioned that the person who changes the primary state residence would have to get a new multistate license for Pennsylvania.

7 Ms. Pachter Schulder noted federal legislation 8 has been introduced called the States Handling Access 9 to Reciprocity for Employment (SHARE) Act that would 10 allow the FBI to provide criminal background check 11 information to the states and allow sharing of 12 information between states or between Compact 13 members. She reported the legislation has not moved 14 significantly.

15 Ms. Pachter Schulder explained that the proposed 16 CHRC language would require all health care 17 practitioner applicants to obtain a federal 18 background check in order to obtain a license. Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed the Bureau of 19 20 Professional and Occupational Affairs (BPOA) 21 regulation regarding Crimes Directly Related to the 22 Profession. She noted the Board received a packet of 23 comments to review.] * * * 24

25 Pennsylvania Legislative Update - Legislation

1 Affecting Nurses/Nursing

2 [Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel, 3 noted several bills were introduced, but the Senate 4 is not supposed to be back until September, and the 5 House may also not be coming back until September. She noted Senate Bill 83 would amend the current law 6 7 for medical marijuana. She stated there are 8 currently no specific provisions to allow for 9 certified registered nurse practitioners (CRNPs) to 10 prescribe medical marijuana but that is included in that bill. 11

12 Ms. Pachter Schulder reminded everyone that even people who are prescribed medical marijuana may hold 13 14 a professional license; however, if the individual 15 has an impairment, whether it be from prescribed pain medication or alcohol impairment, the individual 16 17 cannot practice. She stated that under the rules for 18 the Professional Health Monitoring Program (PHMP), 19 that just having a prescription for medical marijuana 20 is not ipso facto evidence that a person has an 21 impairment. 22 Ms. Pachter Schulder noted House Bill 1530 23 increases access to school nurses, psychologists, 24 social workers, and nurses.

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted House Bill 1431

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involves work-related compensation for hospitalized
 or quarantined frontline workers.

3 Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed House Bill 1403 4 regarding nursing school accreditation. She 5 explained that the language would remove the 6 requirement for regional accreditation. She noted 7 the requirement only appears in the licensed 8 dietitian nutritionist (LDN) and clinical nurse 9 specialist (CNS) sections of the Professional Nursing 10 Law but needed to check to see if it also appears for 11 certified registered nurse anesthetist (CRNAs). She 12 stated the statutory provisions for RNs, LPNs, and 13 CRNPs require an accredited program while the 14 language for LDNs and CNSs require regional 15 accreditation. She noted that the Board suspended 16 enforcement of its practice that controlling institutions possess regional accreditation in light 17 18 of the federal regulations that said the United 19 States Department of Education (USDOE)-recognized 20 programs are properly accredited. 21 Ms. Pachter Schulder stated the USDOE 22 incorporated all of those regional accreditors within 23 the USDOE accreditation. She explained that it may 24 be necessary for LDNs and CNSs and possibly for the

25 CRNA regulations to be amended if the bill were to be

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1 enacted.

2	Ms. Pachter Schulder noted House Bill 1249 is a
3	tax credit of \$2,500 a year for three years for new
4	nurses, teachers, and police officers.
5	Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed Senate Resolution
6	143. She noted it is setting up an Artificial
7	Intelligence Task Force and talks about the use of AI
8	in healthcare. She provided an article regarding
9	whether nurses can be replaced with AI.
10	Ms. Pachter Schulder noted Senate Bill 822 would
11	set up a nurse health program. She discussed
12	differences between the nurse health program and
13	PHMP. She noted it to be a nurse health program as
14	opposed to PHMP but that it is still the same system
15	that requires a contract with a peer review peer
16	group that is going to administer with the assistance
17	of PHMP. She explained that the only place there may
18	be a difference is the discussion about various
19	treatment options and various situations.
20	Ms. Pachter Schulder stated PHMP relies upon an
21	evaluation which indicates how long the licensee
22	needs to be evaluated. She mentioned that the co-
23	sponsorship memo mentions reducing costs but noted
24	the bill does not address costs.
25	Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed Senate Bill 817

regarding primary care preceptor community health 1 2 centers, which allows nursing schools to participate 3 in having students go to those centers. 4 Ms. Pachter Schulder noted Senate Bill 247 is the 5 Patient Safety Act, where it would be a 2:1 patient 6 to staff ratio for neonatology and 4:1 ratio for 7 surgery. She mentioned a previous bill that set ratios for certain inpatient facilities. 8 The 9 rationale in favor of the bill is to reduce staff 10 workload and improve patient care. The rationale 11 against is the detriment to the patients who will not 12 be able to be treated/admitted when the facility 13 reaches its limit. 14 Ms. Pachter Schulder noted Senate Bill 100 15 concerns improving Lyme Disease testing and 16 coverage.] * * * 17 18 Report of Board Chairperson 19 [Linda L. Kmetz, PhD, RN, Chair, referred to the 20 the National Council of State Boards of Nursing 21 (NCSBN) Annual Meeting in August, noting no one from 22 the Board is running for elected office.] 23 24 Report of Acting Commissioner 25 [Arion R. Claggett, Acting Commissioner, BPOA,

20 advised that BPOA licensing staff moved to 2525 North 1 2 7th Street in Harrisburg on July 10, 2023. He noted 3 walk-in hours are 8:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. He also 4 noted the Board's website has been updated and a 5 notification has been emailed to all licensees. Нe 6 stated their mailing address is the same and to 7 continue to utilize the post office box. 8 Acting Commissioner Claggett also advised that 9 Board meetings would continue to be held at One Penn 10 Center until further notice. 11 Chair Kmetz thanked everyone who assisted with 12 the move.] 13 * * * Report of Committees - Probable Cause Screening 14 15 Committee [Sue E. Hertzler, LPN, noted the Probable Cause 16 17 Screening Committee moved on three Petitions for 18 Appropriate Relief, eight Petitions for Mental and 19 Physical Evaluation, and zero Petitions for Immediate 20 Temporary Suspension.] * * * 21 22 Report of Committees - Application Review Committee 23 [Kristin Malady, BSN, RN, noted the Application 24 Review Committee met several times via email and 25 moved those cases forward in the process.]

She 3 mentioned that things went well overall, and the 4 eppiccNURSE functions in PALS are working and 5 similar. Ms. Miller thanked all the prelicensure and 6 CRNP program directors for their patience concerning 7 any problems. She encouraged anyone who continues to 8 have difficulty to contact the Board.] 9 10 [Arion R. Claggett, Acting Commissioner, Bureau of 11 Professional and Occupational Affairs, exited the 12 meeting at 9:56 a.m.] 13 * * * 14 [Linda L. Kmetz, PhD, RN, Chair, exited the meeting 15 at 9:56 a.m. for recusal purposes.] * * * 16 VICE CHAIR COUGHLIN ASSUMED THE CHAIR 17 * * * 18 19 Appointment - Great Lakes Institute of Technology 20 [Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel, 21 informed everyone that Mr. Christopher Nickell, MS 22 Ed, Chief Executive Officer, is before the Board 23 regarding approval of a new director, status of the 24 teach-out plan, and pass rates. She requested 25 information on the new director, noting

1 qualifications require the individual to have a 2 bachelor's degree. She also noted the three quarters 3 pass rate was 65.22% with a 77.78% pass rate for the 4 third quarter, 57.14% for the second quarter, and 5 57.14% for the first quarter.

6 Mr. Nickell informed Board members that he has 7 determined the program is not fixable because of the historic National Council Licensure Examination 8 9 (NCLEX®) pass rates, curriculum, leadership, and the 10 faculty. He noted submitting the teach-out plan to 11 the Board and the accreditation agency. He reported 12 losing one student to a serious medical emergency 13 since that teach-out plan, but the student would be 14 returning and would again have all students intact.

15 Mr. Nickell reported 21 of 21 students remain 16 since that teach-out plan was announced. He stated 17 the prior program director walked out and attempted 18 to take all of the faculty with her on June 30. Нe 19 noted several of those faculty members remained, 20 along with a nurse at Great Lakes since 2019 who 21 would be leading the program for the next eight 22 months.

The Board questioned Mr. Nickell on whether there are any Bachelor of Science (BSN)-prepared nurses on the faculty to serve as the program director. Mr.

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Nickell noted that there are two BSN instructors on staff along with another full-time instructor but indicated that the staff and the administration preferred the longer tenured non-BSN prepared instructor.

6 Mr. Nickell noted having three cohorts left with 7 four students who would graduate at the end of 8 September, seven at the end of December, and the 9 remaining 10 at the end of March, with only two of 10 those 21 remaining students academically at risk. Не 11 reported nine students graduated in July with two of 12 those passing the NCLEX® and seven scheduled through 13 the end of this month into August.

14 Mr. Nickell stated pass rates have gone up, the 15 program has been stable, and students and faculty are 16 He further explained that their pass rate is happy. now in the mid-70s, and the Assessment Technologies 17 18 Institute (ATI) process has made the improvement. Нe 19 noted the sonographer tutor has been engaged with 20 nursing students and helping them on science-specific 21 material.

Ms. Pachter Schulder informed Great Lakes
Institute of Technology that the Board would
deliberate in Executive Session regarding its
continuation of provisional status and the request to

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appoint a non-BSN prepared nurse to serve as program 1 2 administrator.] 3 * * * 4 [Linda L. Kmetz, PhD, RN, Chair, reentered the 5 meeting at 10:05 a.m.] * * * 6 7 CHAIR KMETZ RESUMED THE CHAIR * * * 8 9 Appointment - Joseph F. McCloskey School of Nursing -10 Extension of Provisional Status 11 [Tina VanBuren, DNP, MSN, RN, CCNS, Director of 12 Nursing, and Jennifer Jones-Lapp, DNP, RN, NEA-BC, 13 Director of Strategic Development, presented on 14 behalf of Joseph F. McCloskey School of Nursing. 15 Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel, 16 noted a 100% third quarter pass rate, a 66.67% second 17 quarter pass rate and a 0% first quarter pass rate 18 for a total pass rate for three quarters of 63.89%. 19 She requested more information regarding the 20 improvement in hopes of it continuing into the next 21 quarter. 22 Dr. VanBuren indicated that the improvement was 23 due to the leadership and the requirement to take the 24 Virtual ATI Comprehensive Predictor and Content 25 Mastery Exams. She addressed the practicum for

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1 seniors that was used at the end of the semester, 2 along with a comprehensive predictor that was 3 administered before finals. She mentioned McCloskey 4 required students to obtain a minimum of a 93% 5 percent pass probability to pass on the Virtual ATI Comprehensive Predictor and other content areas 6 7 through medical-surgical. She reported that at least 8 half the students got the 93% or above.

9 Dr. VanBuren stated faculty became employees of 10 the hospital but were not permitted to work through 11 the summer because of being contracted. She noted 12 keeping tutors online during the summer to work with 13 students who did not have the minimum of 93% or did 14 not work up through med-surge in Virtual ATI.

15 Dr. VanBuren noted that anybody who did not reach 16 the 93% probability to pass by the end of May was 17 required to go through all of Virtual ATI up to and 18 including the comprehensive exam to obtain the "green 19 light." She noted the majority of the students with 20 the exception of three students have been in the area 21 of the "green light." She reported 16 out of 16 22 graduates who tested in the third quarter passed the 23 NCLEX[®] and have license numbers in PALS for an annual 24 total of 30 who graduated.

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Dr. VanBuren reported having specific test dates

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on all students except for two. She noted two people 1 2 did not meet the criteria of the 93% probability to 3 pass including the Comprehensive Predictor. She 4 stated students who take their exam first are better 5 students. She noted having the same exact faculty 6 this year as last year and having high expectations 7 with continuing to build on their current practices 8 and the weekly report with Virtual ATI.

9 Dr. Jones-Lapp reiterated that students who did 10 not hit the 93% were mandated to go to tutors and 11 required to meet a certain grade, which helped them 12 understand the curriculum and the content.

13 Dr. Jones-Lapp noted that Lehigh Valley Health 14 Network would be investing millions of dollars in 15 their school and relocate them across the street to the old hospital to have a nursing school that would 16 hold up to 200 students. She stated Alvernia 17 18 Pottsville is their dual enrollment program and doing 19 all of the prerequisites for our students, where only 20 33 credits are required for their bachelor's degree. 21 Dr. Jones-Lapp commented that the Lehigh Valley 22 Health Network has invested in them, and they have 23 many plans to bring back to the Board once they come 24 off provisional status for evening and weekend 25 programs. She noted being able to offer tuition

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1 waivers, where Lehigh Valley Health Network employees 2 could go to school for free. She stated they would 3 love to petition to come off provisional, noting 4 quarter three is in the 60s but currently over a 50 5 percent pass rate at 100 percent with the current 6 students.

7 Chair Kmetz requested more information regarding 8 their leadership team continuing to develop and grow 9 effectively. Dr. VanBuren stated she runs the 10 academic part of things, and Dr. Jones-Lapp handles 11 the strategic areas. She noted the predecessor was 12 doing all that as one person without any experience 13 as a director of a nursing program. She addressed 14 her and Dr. Jones-Lapp's roles and the balance with 15 having experience running nursing programs and being 16 a chief nursing officer.

17 Dr. Jones-Lapp also addressed faculty as part of 18 their leadership team and one of their biggest 19 growths was empowering them, which she believed to be 20 the reason they have retained 100% this year. She 21 commented that having standard work and processes 22 needed to run a unit is also needed to run a school. 23 Chair Kmetz requested information concerning 24 grade inflation. Dr. VanBuren noted reviewing 25 syllabi, adjusting it in the winter semester, and

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1 then making it more standardized in the fall. She 2 also addressed earning points with remediation and 3 mandatory tutoring.

4 Dr. Jones-Lapp addressed conversations with 5 Alvernia to ensure students were having true lab and 6 asked that they go away from some of the electronic 7 learning. She reported seeing a huge change with 8 incoming juniors, where they all had different grade 9 scales and landed at different places, which would 10 also help coming into this year.

11 Dr. Hunsberger asked how questions were being chosen for the final examination and whether faculty 12 13 has been sent for continuing education or training. 14 Dr. VanBuren addressed utilizing the Assessment 15 Builder from ATI and using validated questions from a 16 variety of sources. She noted faculty is encouraged to change questions to not be exactly the same as in 17 a test bank but to meet the objectives. 18

Dr. Jones-Lapp noted sending two faculty members to ATI concerning test writing and simulation courses for certification to grow their overall development. Dr. VanBuren noted sending four people to a conference, noting some of the main training is how to interpret the results of their exam, along with having a full consulting day scheduled.

Ms. Pachter Schulder informed McCloskey that the 1 2 Board would review their information during Executive 3 Session and make a determination about extending the 4 provisional status.] * * * 5 6 Appointment - Fayette County Career & Technical 7 Institute - Extension of Provisional Status 8 [Susan C. Lewis, MSN, RN, Practical Nursing Program 9 Director, presented on behalf of Fayette County 10 Career & Technical Institute. 11 Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel, 12 advised that Fayette County Career & Technical 13 Institute has a three quarter pass rate of 65.71% 14 with a last quarter pass rate that increased to 77.8 15 The second quarter pass rate was 40%, and percent. 16 the first quarter pass rate was 76.92%. Ms. Lewis attributed the pass rates to their 17 18 transition with Cheswick campus students. She noted 19 the turnover rate for teachers was 100% but believed 20 the current faculty are highly invested in the 21 students, including a third faculty member who was 22 hired in July. 23 Ms. Lewis addressed the pass rate, noting six 24 students passed and scored at least a level 2 or 25 above for ATI and level 2 or above on their

comprehensive, but those who failed were around level 1 2 She noted she has been evaluating and watching 1. 3 the outcome data and in discussions to get them to a 4 level 2. She reported not getting the most highly 5 qualified students but believed they have potential. 6 She stated students graduating in September are 7 scoring at a level 2 or above.

8 Ms. Lewis addressed ATI Lab Review in August and 9 NCLEX[®] Review prep classes. She noted being hopeful 10 with retention of the faculty and scores at a level 2. She mentioned that the correlation is unremarkable 11 12 looking at the pass rates and the level students are 13 achieving. She noted almost everyone who gets a 14 level 1 is not passing on the first time and she 15 would be focusing on getting that changed to a level 16 2 by making sure all are getting the information from 17 the courses.

18 Ms. Lewis addressed curriculum changes with the 19 addition of more content and lab in almost every 20 course and every level that they are then applying to 21 the clinical setting. She stated the first full 22 class that would have the full curriculum, all of the 23 lab and the ATI scores, would be the next March 24 class. She also noted that the September cohort has 25 had at least nine months of implementation of the new

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1 curriculum.

2	Ms. Lewis reported having one person who needs to
3	test from the class that just graduated and one from
4	the Cheswick campus. She noted all their courses and
5	test banks are based on the Next Generation.
6	Chair Kmetz asked how they adjusted course hours
7	and what data analytics were utilized. Ms. Lewis
8	explained that they were spending too much time on
9	specific courses that were not valuable because they
10	could not get all the content from their syllabus
11	into that course. She noted using Mountain
12	Measurements and ATI Analytics along with test bank
13	questions. She believed there was a lot of grade
14	inflation and extra points prior to the new team,
15	where emphasis is now put on tests. She noted that
16	the complexity of the questions and courses need to
17	change and would start with the ATI levels.
18	Ms. Lewis commented that changes needed to be
19	made because there were too many ways for students to
20	pass who were not ready and did not know the content.
21	Chair Kmetz requested information concerning
22	faculty development. Ms. Lewis explained that they
23	have a staff member for the entire school who works
24	specifically with faculty development. She noted
25	working on how to create an effective rubric and

using that during registered nurse (RN) service days 1 2 to work directly with faculty. She noted the 3 Executive Director for their program is really 4 invested in faculty development and provided 5 literature.] * * * 6 7 [The Board recessed from 10:53 a.m. until 11:02 a.m.] * * * 8 9 New Business - 2023 NCSBN Basic Board of Nursing 10 Investigator Training (BBONIT) CHAIR KMETZ: 11 12 We need a motion that we are suggesting 13 that two people from BEI go to Basic 14 Board of Nursing Investigator Training. 15 MS. MALADY: 16 I'd like to make a motion to send two 17 people from BEI to the 2023 NCSBN Basic 18 Board of Nursing Investigator Training. DR. COUGHLIN: 19 20 Second. 21 CHAIR KMETZ: 22 All those in favor? Opposed? 23 Abstentions? 24 [The motion carried unanimously.] * * * 25

New Business - 2023 NCLEX Conference 1 2 [Linda L. Kmetz, PhD, RN, Chair, encouraged everyone 3 to participate at the 2023 NCLEX Conference since it 4 is available virtually.] * * * 5 Regulatory Committee Meeting 6 7 [Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel, 8 addressed 16A-5141 regarding Nursing Education 9 Program regulations and the provisions that have 10 changed since the Board originally adopted the 11 regulations. She advised that she is hoping to have 12 the last piece of data for the Regulatory Analysis 13 Form completed by the end of next week so that the 14 package could be reviewed by regulatory counsel in August. She thanked the Advisors, especially Dr. 15 16 Petula, for obtaining a lot of background information. 17 18 Ms. Malady thanked Ms. Pachter Schulder for an 19 amazing piece of work. 20 Ms. Pachter Schulder explained that the 21 regulation package removes and replaces the three 22 separate chapters for the Nursing Education Program 23 and puts them into one consolidated chapter. She 24 noted it also amends existing sections of the 25 regulation that are impacted by the consolidation.

 She referred to the definition of "comprehensive nursing assessment," which is being added to § 21.1
 because it is used in 21.942(b)(4) addressing RN and PN general content requirements.

5 Ms. Pachter Schulder noted input was received 6 from the stakeholders as the regulations were being 7 written. She stated the definitions of "examination 8 year" and "systematic evaluation plan" are being 9 moved from the definitions in § 21.1 to § 21.901 10 because they solely relate to education matters.

Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to standards in § 11 12 21.915, specifically subsection (a) which requires 13 programs to achieve the minimum pass rate and the 14 definitions of "minimum pass rate" and "examination 15 year" in § 21.901. She noted the examination year for CRNP would be June 1 through May 31, while the 16 17 examination year for pre-licensure programs would 18 remain as October 1 through September 30. Adding a 19 minimum pass rate for CRNP programs would impose a 20 similar requirement on all programs. She noted that 21 because CRNP programs are divided by specialty, the 22 minimum pass rate would be based on the annual 23 results on the certification examination. She noted § 24 21.915(a) delineates 12 program standards that are 25 based on more specific provisions. For example, §

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1 21.915(a)(2) addresses programmatic and controlling 2 institution accreditation/authority to operate 3 addressed more fully in § 21.916.

4 Ms. Pachter Schulder noted that § 21.916(a) 5 applies to existing nursing education programs and 6 requires that all pre-licensure programs obtain 7 programmatic accreditation within 5 years. Currently 8 all RN programs and all the CRNP programs hold that 9 accreditation and more than 54 percent of PN programs 10 hold programmatic accreditation. She addressed 11 subsection (b) regarding new programs and includes 12 the same five-year timeframe. Ms. Pachter Schulder 13 referenced ancillary provisions in §§ 21.921(b)(15) 14 regarding documentation from the accreditor 15 evidencing the submission of a candidacy application 16 for programmatic accreditation, 21.915(a)(2) and 21.916(d) regarding mandatory removal of the Board's 17 18 approval where a program is denied or fails to maintain programmatic accreditation. 19

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted the standard in § 21 21.915(a)(3) that requires programs to be housed within controlling institutions that are authorized to provide nursing education in PA. Ancillary provisions include the definition of controlling institution for each program type in §§ 21.901 and

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1 21.921(b)(14) as discussed last meeting, which 2 enables PN programs such as private licensed schools 3 to be authorized by the Pennsylvania Department of 4 Education rather than be accredited. 5 Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed the requirements 6 of having a systematic evaluation plan and 7 remediating identified deficiencies in Paragraph (4), 8 ensuring that both their didactic and their clinical 9 education are taught according to evidence-based 10 practice in Paragraph (5) dovetailing with § 21.941(b), enforcing written policy requirements in § 11 12 21.915(a)(6) and ensuring faculty maintain current 13 competency in the areas in which they teach 14 dovetailing with §§ 21.934(a)(1)(iii), (2)(iii) and 15 (3) (iii) and (d) and 21.936(b), relating to faculty and staff 16 qualifications and responsibilities. 17 Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed Paragraph (8) 18 which requires programs to ensure that faculty, 19 facilities, and clinical agencies are sufficient to 20 meets the needs of students enrolled. She noted that 21 as of June 30, 2023, there were 89 RN programs, 57 PN programs, and 115 CRNP programs housed in 31 colleges 22 23 and universities. She explained that in addition to an 24 advanced practice core, CRNP education includes population 25 focused competencies in six particular clinical specialty

1 areas based upon NCSBN's Consensus Model. The Board 2 discussed that subspecialities are approved by their 3 broader populations. She suggested the Board discuss 4 subspecialties such as Emergency, which is part of 5 the Family Across the Lifespan population, at a later 6 date and whether certifications should be by 7 subspecialities. The initial consensus was to 8 continue licensing by population specialty and not 9 subspecialty.

10 Ms. Pachter Schulder noted Pennsylvania has almost 7,000 faculty members in RN/PN programs and 11 12 over 30,000 students. She also noted CRNP programs 13 as of January 1 have 816 faculty members and almost 14 7,000 students. She mentioned the importance of 15 programs having faculty, facilities, and the clinical 16 agencies, along with maintaining and monitoring pass rates. 17

18 Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed the standards in 19 21.915(a)(11), the requirement to provide timely 20 notifications of the program changes, Paragraph (12) 21 requiring compliance with the regulations, and 22 subsection (b)(1) which continues the prohibition 23 against programs utilizing students to meet the 24 staffing needs of health care facilities. She 25 addressed paragraph (2) requiring

preapproval from the Board for having more than two 1 2 administrators within an academic year unless there 3 is an absolute emergency. She mentioned that 4 administrator turnover was a key factor identified in 5 program performance. She discussed violating Board 6 regulations on standards of care and the addition for 7 a program not engaging in fraud, deceit, advertising, 8 promotion, or influence in Paragraph (3) dovetailing 9 with the standards and prohibitions for RNs in § 21.18 10 and PNs in § 21.148.

Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to § 21.921 11 12 regarding establishment and what people need in order 13 to establish new programs, which tracks many of the 14 provisions in current §§ 21.51 and 21.172, noting the 15 addition of 14 and 15, previously discussed, 16 pertaining to controlling institutions and 17 accreditation. She noted the deans asked that the 18 Board not include geographic location need in § 19 21.921(b)(1), currently required, because students in 20 these programs come from everywhere, which was 21 removed by the Board. 22 Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed letters of 23 commitment from the controlling institutions, 24 identification of the type of program, the number of

25 students that are anticipated for the five years,

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clinical resources, and student to faculty ratio 1 2 required by § 21.921(b)(2). She noted the reduction 3 in the timeframe that programs must send proposals to 4 the Board from 15 months, previously discussed, to 12 5 months in § 21.921(b) and the expansion of the time to 6 hire an administrator or faculty in subsection (c). 7 She discussed the requirement to provide 8 organizational charts with the proposal in subsection 9 (b) (5) so the Board can see where the program fits 10 within the controlling institution.

Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed the congruence of 11 12 the program's mission goals and learning outcomes in § 13 21.921(b)(7). She referred to a comment asking why 14 the Board requires this congruence as it stymies 15 creativity by programs. She explained that this information is critical because it is the controlling 16 17 institution that ultimately confers the degree, certificate or diploma, not from the nursing program. 18 Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to a question 19 20 asking why the Board has to approve clinical agencies 21 in 21.924 and provide information about these 22 agencies in §§ 21.915(b)(8) and 21.923(f), noting the 23 Board must ensure that clinical agencies have a 24 sufficient census for the number of students in the 25 program and ensure the correct balance of didactic

1 and clinical experiences.

2	Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed the hiring of the
3	administrator, which is at least six months, and
4	faculty, one term prior to commencement of the class,
5	in § 21.921(b)and asked the Board for its opinion
6	about when the period starts. The Board discussed
7	the distinction between "the first intended admission
8	of students" and the "first advertisement of intent
9	to establish a program." Ms. Pachter Schulder
10	questioned whether "the first advertisement of intent
11	to establish a program" is an email to the students
12	who are currently in programs or prior graduates who
13	expressed previous interest or whether there are
14	actual advertisements. The Board decided to set the
15	trigger as "the first advertisement of a new program"
16	when there are actual advertisements. She noted that
17	once the vote occurs, the program may advertise and
18	recruit students but not admit them.
19	Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to § 21.921(e)
20	about the timing of the facility review. She
21	reminded the Board of a previous discussion about
22	whether it should occur when the proposal is
23	submitted or following the vote to approve an RN or a
24	PN Program. The Board decided to conduct the review
25	after the Board votes to approve since the review is

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1 to confirm the information within the proposal and 2 already will have received sketches or pictures of 3 the facility.

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted once the Board votes 4 to approve CRNP programs, they go directly to full 5 6 approval status without a facility review. She 7 explained that they do not need a facility review, 8 even though colleges and universities at the RN/PN 9 level need a facility review, because all the CRNP 10 programs have a prelicensure program, so they already 11 underwent a facility review. She noted the 12 organizational requirements and additional 13 establishment provisions in §§ 21.922 and 21.923 track 14 current regulations.

15 Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed § 21.914, 16 discontinuance of program and interruption of 17 program. She stated when a program approval is 18 removed or when there is a decision to close, the 19 program has to submit a program completion plan under 20 subsection (a) and under subsection (b) a Program 21 Closing Summary, within three months of that 22 notification, that contains the items in subsection 23 (b)(1)(i)-(xix). Programs are also required to have a 24 plan for current students, need to notify students of 25 the plan, and make arrangements for a permanent

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1 retention of students' records.

2	Ms. Pachter Schulder reported no additional		
3	changes were made to § 21.917, relating to minimum		
4	student program requirements including completion of		
5	math and physical science courses in order to		
6	commence a program and a license or temporary		
7	practice permit to be admitted into a CRNP program,		
8	since the last draft was discussed. She recommended		
9	that subsection (a)(2) be amended to include "a		
10	privilege to practice" to cover multistate licensees.		
11	She explained that under the NLC, a multistate		
12	licensee will be able to practice in Pennsylvania		
13	under a Compact privilege and that they are not going		
14	to have a license in Pennsylvania but would have a		
15	privilege or authorization to practice by way of that		
16	privilege. She recommended adding this modifying		
17	language throughout the regulation package where only		
18	a license is referenced.		
19	She noted in § 21.917(b) that the number and size		
20	of admissions should be determined by the		
21	educational, clinical, facility and financial		
22	resources unless a program has been placed on		
23	provisional status and is restricted from making		
24	these determinations as outlines in § 21.912(c).		
25	Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed § 21.941, noting		

1 this provision addresses general curriculum

2 requirements for RN/PN and CRNP programs. She stated 3 that the Advisors diligently reviewed the national 4 nursing education standards as established by the American 5 Association of Colleges of Nursing, National League of 6 Nursing, the National Council of State Boards of Nursing's 7 Model Acts and Rules, and the National Council's Licensure 8 Examination RN and PN Practice Analyses and Test Plans and 9 Quality and Safety Education for Nurses Competencies. She 10 noted that any change to §§ 21.941-21.944 is just to address those national standards. 11

12 Ms. Pachter Schulder referred § 21.945 regarding 13 clinical experience. She noted that there are no 14 additional changes since the last review to the RN/PN 15 provisions but recommends a change for CRNP programs in § 21.945(f)(1) based upon the National Task Force 16 17 (NTF) standards that require 750 hours in direct 18 patient care. She noted it should not be a hardship 19 for the Board's regulation increasing from 500 to 750 20 because all of the programs hold programmatic 21 accreditation, and this is one of those standards. 22 In addition to the change in the clinical 23 experience hours, the NFT standards of CRNP faculty 24 has also been incorporated into § 21.932(b)(2)(i). 25 That standard changes the teacher-to-staff ratio from

1:6 to 1:8. There is no change to the ratio for RN/PN 1 2 programs. She noted that these provisions provide 3 for a tradeoff in terms of additional burden. 4 Dr. Hunsberger expressed concern with sending 5 students to other places, where students would only receive 50 percent of medical-surgical experience. 6 7 Ms. Wendy Miller commented that it is in the regulations that allow them to make that 8 9 determination because a 1:15 ratio may not always be 10 appropriate. She noted the importance of looking at clinical facilities and looking at their outcomes and 11 12 the faculty-to-student ratio to determine if the 13 course objectives and ultimately end of program 14 objectives can be met.

15 Sue Petula, PhD, MSN, RN, NEA-BC, FRE, Nursing Education Advisor, explained that the decision where 16 17 to send students is based upon the agreement between 18 the program and the clinical agency, and if the 19 clinical agency is approved, then it is probably 20 based on the discretion of the faculty as well as the 21 administration of that facility to decide safe 22 staffing ratios and clinical ratios for students. 23 Ms. Wendy Miller commented that the facility is 24 responsible for that patient and also has to set up 25 their parameters for what they would accept in order

1 to allow a clinical group there. She noted the Board 2 does not want to give a number that may or may not 3 fit a program's situation, but the program must still 4 do their due diligence with the clinical agency to 5 decide how student and patient needs are being met. 6 Dr. Petula further added that the Board looks at

7 whether the placements conflict with other programs 8 that may have students there simultaneously. It is 9 reviewed by the Board when a clinical agency form is 10 submitted, and the Board looks to the administrator 11 or clinical coordinator regarding the conflict and 12 appropriate placement questions. She stated there is 13 a responsibility that rests with the program in 14 addition to the agency, but the Board made a decision 15 previously that it did not want to be restrictive.

16 Chair Kmetz noted having served on NCSBN's Model 17 Act & Rules Committee, and the Committee did not put 18 a ratio in there when they rewrote the Model Rules, 19 so there is nothing at the national level.

Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed changes to nursing education programs in § 21.925. She stated that under subsection (a), the Board has to be notified within 30 days prior of any change to the name of the program, change of the accrediting body, controlling institution's authority to operate, discontinuance of

1 the program, and faculty turnover of more than 25
2 percent.

3 Ms. Pachter Schulder also addressed things that 4 require preapproval in subsection (b), noting 5 preapproval for course content is only required if 6 required by § 21.946. She mentioned that 7 notification about changes to ownership or 8 administrative structure and changes in 9 administration status were originally only going to 10 be required for programs on provisional status, but it is now recommended that those also require 11 12 preapproval. She explained that the Board needs to 13 know an accreditation status change that goes to 14 provisional, revoked, or removed. She explained that 15 if a program is on provisional status with the Board, 16 that program could be on provisional with the accreditor, and the accreditor may take an additional 17 18 action, as has occurred with a program recently, that 19 the Board should be apprised of.

Ms. Pachter Schulder stated whether a program would need to submit a new proposal as a result of the changes is governed by subsections (e), (f) and (g). The addition of a program with a different scope of practice requires the submission of a new proposal; however, the addition of degree types or

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1 certification specialties would require submission of 2 a new proposal; however, the documentation required 3 would be limited where the previously submitted 4 documentation still applies.

5 Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed curriculum content changes in § 21.946, noting that the Board was asked 6 7 by stakeholders why curriculum changes have to be 8 submitted and preapproved by the Board. Thev 9 suggested that programs be able to submit the changes 10 to the Board and be allowed to put the changes into 11 place before the Board's approval, but if the Board 12 then finds something wrong with that curriculum, then 13 before the next academic year it gets changed.

14 Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to § 21.946(b), 15 where the Board decided that a nursing education 16 program that meets all of the following requirements 17 can implement the curriculum changes prior to Board 18 approval but must present the changes to the Board 90 19 days in advance: the program has to be on full 20 approval status as defined in § 21.901, hold 21 programmatic accreditation pursuant to § 21.916(e), 22 have active faculty organization pursuant to § 23 21.923(g), and an institutional review committee that 24 reviews program curriculum recommendations and 25 actively engages in a review of a systematic

1 evaluation plan specified in § 21.981(b).

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted that the Board did not agree with stakeholders that the review of curriculum by the institutional curriculum review committee is sufficient because the Board makes curricular determinations, and not all institutional committees have the same depth of knowledge about a specific curriculum.

9 Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to § 21.934, which 10 requires that interprofessional faculty members only teach clinical courses within their area of 11 12 expertise. She noted prior Board discussion of tying 13 clinical interprofessional faculty to the students' 14 scope of practice and asked how that can be 15 accomplished. She noted that under subsection (d), 16 interprofessional faculty shall only teach 17 nonclinical nursing courses within their scope of 18 expertise.

Dr. Kmetz noted the curriculum determines what is in that course, not the interprofessional faculty person, so whatever they are teaching, they have a curriculum that they have to teach. She recommended that the Board not tie the specialized instruction to scope of practice because someone teaching the content in a nonclinical course has to be an expert

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1 in that content.

Ms. Wendy Miller concurred, expressing that she did not think interprofessional faculty members are going to talk about the scope of students' practice, and, instead, the nursing faculty would be responsible to make limits clear.

7 Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to § 21.911(d) 8 regarding the requirement that full approval is 9 required to add practice locations, curriculum plans 10 of study, delivery methods, cohorts or program 11 options, enrollment increases, and specialties or 12 degrees. She asked whether the Board wanted to add 13 the clause, "unless provided specific approval by the 14 Board" to cover special exceptions. She mentioned 15 that at last month's meeting a program asked to 16 eliminate its summer break. The Board permitted this 17 change but only after the program made a presentation 18 to the Board because the program was on provisional 19 status. She asked whether the Board wanted to give 20 themselves wiggle room. She noted the prohibition is 21 generally there, where the Program is going to have 22 to meet the bar and have specific approval, but as a 23 general rule, the programs are not going to be able 24 to do that. The Board concurred.

25

Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed § 21.912, noting a

1 list of Board restrictions on programs placed on 2 provisional status and asked whether there were other 3 Board restrictions. She also asked whether there 4 should be a maximum time that a program can be on 5 provisional status under (d). 6 Mr. Rawdin noted most states give the Boards the 7 discretion to make that determination. 8 Ms. Wendy Miller stated the main positive is 9 tying the length of time the Board expects 10 improvement to the length of the program. She noted 11 that a 12-month PN program may be able to have a 12 total curriculum overhaul that produces a difference 13 in a year's period of time, whereas a 4-year BSN 14 program would take 4 years.] 15 DR.
