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                DR. COUGHLIN ASSUMED THE CHAIR
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   Appointment - Erie Institute of Technology Proposal
     for the Establishment of a full-time 15-month
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     Diploma Practical Nursing (PN) Program
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   [Paul Fitzgerald, Campus Director, Erie Institute of
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   Technology, thanked the Board for today's invitation
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   and reviewing the application for their practical
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   nursing program. He also expressed appreciation for
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   the Board's assistance and dedication through the
23
   application process over the last 18 months.
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        Mr. Fitzgerald provided a history of Erie
25
   Institute of Technology (EIT), noting it was founded
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in 1958 and is the oldest Erie Career and Technical 1 2 School. He stated EIT is dedicated to developing the 3 individual abilities of each student by providing them with the necessary skills and supporting knowledge to 5 meet the entry-level job requirements of their chosen 6 field.

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Mr. Fitzgerald stated EIT provides students with a combination of practical laboratory training, classroom instruction, and externship experiences with placement assistance for gainful employment.

Mr. Fitzgerald noted EIT offers several diploma and degree programs and ventured into the health care field in 2019 by adding programs in medical billing and coding, phlebotomy technician, and modified the medical equipment technician program.

Mr. Fitzgerald stated EIT was approached by Lake Erie College of Osteopathic Medicine (LECOM) in 2019 regarding the implementation of a practical nursing program due to the dire need of practical nurses in their hospitals, extended care facilities, and community agencies. LECOM offered their support in partnership throughout this process.

Mr. Fitzgerald mentioned that local schools in Erie offering a PN program have closed, including Erie Business Center and Fortis Institute, so EIT hired two nursing consultants to conduct a feasibility study
showing a PN program is needed, and the community
would clearly support the program.

Mr. Fitzgerald noted EIT moved forward in developing the practical nursing program and made a substantial investment in necessary equipment and resources.

Kimberly Pilker, MHA, BSN, RN, Proposed Practical Nursing Program Director, Erie Institute of Technology, addressed working with Dr. Johnson as a consultant regarding the rationale for the program and its potential effect on the community by working on the curriculum and application process, while Dr. Johnson worked on finalizing the feasibility study.

Ms. Pilker addressed the curriculum and educational mobility for students, noting the proposed 15-month 60-week practical nursing education program comprised of a total of 1,695 hours. She explained that the program has 5 levels that are 12 weeks long, consisting of 4 courses, with the exception of level 5, which has 3 courses, for a total of 19 courses for the entire program. She noted each level progresses in academic rigor and expected competencies.

Ms. Pilker noted 5 nursing courses with a skilled lab component in Levels 1 through 4, along with

simulation-based learning experiences in the first
level that is threaded throughout the curriculum. Shows a stated the clinical experiences would take place in nursing labs using 1 of 4 high-fidelity manikins, noting there are 10 nursing courses with a simulation component throughout the proposed curriculum.

Ms. Pilker addressed clinical experience through several affiliation agreements to provide a wide variety of health care settings, noting 8 courses with a clinical component in the proposed curriculum in levels 2 through 5.

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Ms. Pilker discussed the plan to utilize admission assessment as admission criteria enrollment and utilizing standardized exams such as Health Education Systems Incorporated (HESI) Specialty Exams.

Ms. Pilker stated the HESI Exit Exam would be administered on the day of the last course, and by utilizing standardized testing and HESI data, EIT would be able to determine individual students and the cohort performance to determine strengths and gaps in the curriculum leading to a consistent National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX) pass rate.

Ms. Pilker commented that once the proposal is approved, their first graduating class would be around the predicted rollout of the Next Generation NCLEX

- 1 (NGN). She noted supporting faculty in learning NGN
- 2 | through webinars and conferences, especially on how to
- 3 apply the clinical judgment model within the
- 4 classroom. She addressed software, computerized
- 5 testing, and homework assignments that would be
- 6 comprised of NCLEX questions.
- Ms. Pilker noted promoting critical thinking and
- 8 clinical reasoning ability into simulation by
- 9 utilizing active learning strategies and activities to
- 10 keep students engaged.
- 11 Ms. Pilker stated EIT has two articulation
- 12 agreements with local schools and is hoping to include
- 13 nursing, pending approval.
- 14 Dr. Coughlin requested more information regarding
- 15 obtaining the correct faculty and the size of the
- 16 | first cohort.
- 17 Ms. Pilker anticipated being able to obtain
- 18 | faculty with the appropriate education and experience
- 19 but is also prepared to develop the course within the
- 20 program to support fellow nursing instructors who
- 21 | would be transitioning into the nurse educator role.
- 22 Ms. Pilker explained that EIT plans on admitting
- 23 | 15 students per cohort for the first 2 years and wants
- 24 to limit the numbers to ensure a smooth transition of
- 25 the rollout of the program to be able to address any

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   organizational or programmatic issues that may arise
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   with a smaller base of students.

 College of Nursing, noting it to be a top-ranked R1
- 8 research university and land-grant university with
- 9 delivery sites throughout the state of Pennsylvania
- 10 and one of the largest producers of nurses of both
- 11 undergraduate and graduate levels.

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- Dr. Kitko noted Penn State offers degree programs
 from a traditional bachelor's degree to a second
 degree and an RN-BSN degree. She stated the current
 nurse practitioner program is a master's program for
 the acute care, primary, and family/individual across
 the lifespan options with a 100-percent certification
 rate of nurse practitioners across all three options
 - Dr. Kitko stated a task force was formed within the College of Nursing three years ago to develop a curriculum for these three options at the DNP level with the goal after approval from the State Board of

for the past two years. She noted also offering a DNP

practitioner level and move it solely to a DNP.

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Dr. Kitko noted the DNP curriculum is online and offered through the World Campus for Penn State with the plan that the three options would be offered. She stated the didactic pieces would be offered online with three in-person intensives with the goal to continue their expertise at the DNP level by offering courses online and with the nurse practitioner options as well.

Dr. Kitko commented that beyond the recommendations from NONPF and AACN, there is a need based on what students were asking for and from recruitment fairs to surveys that were given out to potential applicants. She addressed projected numbers where Penn State is bringing in around 40 students per year across all three options in their NP option and anticipates that transition to the DNP NP level as well.

Dr. Kitko noted that Penn State College of
Nursing and the University are fully committed to the
program and performed a national search for a director
of their DNP program and hired Dr. Tankimovich a
little over a year ago. She mentioned having access
to a multitude of instructional designers as part of
the delivery and development of the courses, along

with hiring a nurse recruiter to help with recruitment for all programs in preparation for growth.

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Dr. Kitko noted hiring a staff person dedicated solely to compliance to help ensure students are meeting all compliance requirements as well as any site requirements needed as part of the clinical hours associated with the program. She mentioned hiring a clinical placement coordinator who would also be able to teach and advise on the DNP projects as well.

Dr. Kitko also noted hiring two new faculty members within the Penn State College of Nursing with plans to hire an additional faculty member next year. She noted faculty are all either DNP- or PhD-prepared and would be moving over to teach in the DNP program.

Mariya Tankimovich, DNP, CRNP, FNP-C, CNE,
Associate Teaching Professor and Director DNP Program,
The Pennsylvania State University College of Nursing,
also thanked the Board for their time and allowing the
presentation.

Dr. Tankimovich directed the nurse practitioner program with over 500 students at the University of Texas, noting that the proposal for the BSN-DNP CRNP program is a solid, high-quality curriculum. She mentioned initiating the DNP NP program during her time at the University of Texas.

Dr. Tankimovich addressed the proposal to expand on the RN education and allow registered nurses to perform differential diagnoses and pharmaceutical and other treatment modalities under the supervision of physicians as the state of Pennsylvania requires.

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Dr. Tankimovich noted Family/Individual Across
the Lifespan would cover individuals across the
lifespan and would include the pediatric population as
well as pregnant women; Adult Acute Care and Adult
Primary Care practitioners would focus on adults in
different settings; and Adult Primary Care nurse
practitioners would focus on treating individuals in
primary care settings, as well as specialty offices
and outpatient settings.

Dr. Tankimovich addressed specific courses for Family/Individual Across the Lifespan with additional pediatric options and adult acute care. She also addressed the advanced physical examination course and simulation with standardized patient care for the primary care option and high-fidelity simulation for the acute care option.

Dr. Tankimovich addressed limitations followed according to the Pennsylvania State Board of Nursing rules and provided examples regarding pharmacology and courses for evidence-based practice. She noted

offering full-time and part-time studies.

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Dr. Tankimovich mentioned hiring faculty to support the number of students, noting the request to have DNP NP not only was a national movement but also because students are requesting the education.

Dr. Kitko noted not anticipating having an endpoint or having to cap enrollment but did note discussions concerning being able to secure rigorous clinical placements in terms of preceptors where the admissions committee is going to be very cognizant of where students are residing and their ability to secure clinical placements for them as well.

Dr. Kitko explained that there is a network of not only faculty at several campuses who still practice, but students have been in clinical sites for years to serve as preceptors. She noted faculty at several campuses would be teaching at various levels and be utilized to maintain the current network.

Dr. Coughlin questioned whether there is a BSN time requirement as far as knowledge to enter the program.

Dr. Tankimovich explained that Adult-Gerontology requires practitioners to have two years of working experience but Family Care does not.]

- Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to 16A-5143
- 16 | regarding Continued Competency and Licensure by
- 17 | Endorsement, noting it was sent for regulatory review
- 18 on July 22, 2021.
- 19 Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to 16A-5144
- 20 regarding the CRNP Statement of Policy. She noted
- 21 having conversations with Maria Battista on behalf of
- 22 | the Pennsylvania Coalition of Nurse Practitioners
- 23 (PCNP) as to whether it is necessary to still have
- 24 that amendment, where Dr. Battista advised that PCNP
- 25 still believed the Statement of Policy amendment was

required, and she would be moving forward with that.

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Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to 16A-5145
regarding CRNA Licensure. She noted forwarding the
draft of the Annex to a former Board member, John
O'Donnell, who agreed to work with the Pennsylvania
Association of Nurse Anesthetists (PANA) as well as
her regarding any missing information or
clarification.

Ms. Pachter Schulder stated Wendy Miller is also evaluating the amount of work it would take to process CRNA applications and would be working with the Budget Office to provide fees needed for the CRNA regulation package. She noted using the model of certified registered nurse practitioners (CRNPs) and clinical nurse specialist (CNSs) to determine that fee.

Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to 16A-5146 regarding Additional Continuing Education and provided a draft of the Annex for the Board's review. She noted a meeting with an organ donation group tomorrow to discuss the Annex. She mentioned that the Organ Donation piece requires one-time CE as opposed to the Opioid Education for CRNPs with prescriptive authority and Child Abuse for all licensees.

Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to 16A-5147 regarding the Nurse Licensure Compact (NLC) and

provided a proposed Annex. She noted one of the issues is that there is no fee yet for a multi-state license. She mentioned that there would be a different fee for a multistate license than there would be for regular endorsement or examination applications because of the additional review that is required under the Compact.

Ms. Pachter Schulder again noted that Ms. Miller would be working with the Budget Office to determine what the fees would be based upon the amount of work for the applications. She mentioned that anybody who wants a multistate license is going to be required to apply for a multistate license and is the procedure that the National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN) recommended and is used by all of the states after joining the Compact.

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Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) background checks and a call with the Pennsylvania State Police (PSP) where PSP relayed that the FBI said that the language in the Compact is not acceptable. She noted a request on July 23 to have that denial be done in writing but is still awaiting that denial letter. The call included Representative Jesse Topper, representatives from the Department, PSP, the Executive Directors of the House

and Senate on both sides of the aisle, and Counsel representing NCSBN and the Federation of State Medical Boards on the legislation.

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Ms. Pachter Schulder said that the FBI has advised that it had not approved the use of FBI background checks for any state. She mentioned that some states have separate legislation where any of the information from the criminal background check from the FBI cannot be shared with anyone other than another governmental institution or entity.

She stated the second difficulty is that the FBI requires all applicants for licensure - not just multistate licensure - be required to do the FBI background check. Ms. Pachter Schulder commented that when initially asked, neither the legislature nor the administration favored having everybody apply for a general background check due to the time involved in conducting a federal background check versus a state background check.

Ms. Pachter Schulder stated that once the denial letter is received, there will be further conversations to see if there is any desire on behalf of the sponsor and the Committees and the administration about whether there should be standalone legislation with regard to the issues that the

FBI identified.

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Ms. Pachter Schulder noted that notwithstanding being in a holding pattern on the FBI background check portion, the Board is working on a draft regulation with an eye toward sending out an exposure draft.

Ms. Pachter Schulder stated the only portion of the Compact that could be implemented now is to permit licensees from other states to work here after September 30. She informed the Board that NCSBN recommended not to do that because it would mean that out-of-state licensees would be permitted to work in Pennsylvania under the Compact, but Pennsylvania licensees would not be able to go to other states.

Ms. Pachter Schulder mentioned that Ohio plans to implement their Compact in January 2023, and their legislation was adopted around the same time as Pennsylvania's.

Ms. Pachter Schulder mentioned NCSBN has been great in telling the Board what to expect and assisting with implementation. She noted the Medical Compact legislation was passed in 2018 in Pennsylvania and still had not been effectuated because of the FBI background check issue.

Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed the NCSBN information technology (IT) part of the Compact, where

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NCSBN has a grant for member boards that assists with
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   the costs of making technological improvements to
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   interface with the Compact's technology.
   mentioned the previous determination where the Board
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   was not able to apply/accept the grant but explained
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   that the Department's contract Counsel has advised
   that the Board is able to apply for/accept the grant.
        Ms. Pachter Schulder noted meetings with NCSBN's
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   IT people, the Board's IT people, and IT developers
