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4 Regulation Update

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- 5 [Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel,
- 6 | noted 16A-5141 regarding the Nursing Education
- 7 | Programs Regulation would be addressed at 11:00 a.m.
- 8 during the Committee meeting. She reported no change
- 9 in 16A-5139 regarding the Volunteer License.
- 10 Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to 16A-5140
- 11 regarding the Child Abuse Reporting Requirements,
- 12 noting the package is still undergoing regulatory
- 13 review but moving through the process.
- 14 Ms. Pachter Schulder noted 16A-5143 regarding
- 15 Licensure by Endorsement under 63 P.S. § 6311 is also
- 16 undergoing regulatory review having been adopted by
- 17 | the Board in proposed form.
- 18 Ms. Pachter Schulder reported working on 16A-5144
- 19 regarding the CRNP Statement of Policy.
- 20 Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to the Draft Annex
- 21 | for 16A-5145 regarding CRNA Licensure. She informed
- 22 the Board that Ms. Wendy Miller was working with the
- 23 Budget Office to determine the projected fees, and
- 24 hopefully it would be in the draft package next month.
- 25 | She was hopeful that with the inclusion of the fee

information the Board would be able to approve sending the regulation out to stakeholders as an exposure draft at the next meeting.

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Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to 16A-5146 regarding Additional Continuing Education, which would be discussed as part of the Committee meeting later in the meeting. She noted the Board would be reviewing the Regulation and Draft Annex again to potentially be sent off to stakeholders.

Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed three elements for 16A-5147 regarding implementing the Nurse Licensure Compact (NLC). She noted prior discussion where the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) informed the Pennsylvania State Police that the FBI did not find the language regarding obtaining the federal background checks in the statute sufficient. The Board is still awaiting the written copy of that denial from the FBI. She stated the reason for the delay is a medical leave issue within the FBI. Until this issue is resolved, implementation of the Compact cannot move forward.

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted that the second piece of the NLC implementation involves the promulgation of draft fees for obtaining a multistate license. The fees are being worked on by Ms. Wendy Miller and the

Budget Office. She mentioned that every licensee who wants a multistate license is going to have to apply for one.

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Ms. Pachter Schulder commented that someone coming from a state that is not a Compact state and wants a Pennsylvania license would obtain a regular Pennsylvania license. Someone who wants a Compact license would apply for that and meet the requirements in the NLC and pay an increased fee over a regular license because of that extra criteria in the NLC.

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted prior Board discussion regarding Board/Bureau submission of a grant proposal for the technological costs associated with the Compact administration. She stated the Bureau is currently requesting information and would be submitting requests for the proposal on changes to the Pennsylvania Licensing System (PALS), and as a result, the Board advised the National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN) that the grant is on hold until the changes are made to the system.

Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed Act 53 of 2020 regarding crimes directly related to the profession. She noted the Best Practice Guide was published in the Pennsylvania Bulletin in December with the list of crimes and the explanation for their inclusion. In

addition, there was a direction added to each board website for specific crimes that are directly related.

Ms. Pachter Schulder mentioned that crimes of violence, sexual offenses, and drug trafficking offenses are listed specifically in the statute. She noted crimes that are directly related to the profession are on an individual list because the crimes vary by board.]

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11 | Pennsylvania Legislative Update

[Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted two bills for discussion, including the one previously mentioned this morning regarding the "physical presence" requirement, where House Bill 1861

(Act 73 of 2021) extended the waivers that were set to

17 expire on September 30 until March 31, 2022.

Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed item 113 under Miscellaneous regarding extension of the Temporary Practice Permit (TPP) for good cause shown. She stated the TPP issued under COVID for individuals to either work during the COVID pandemic or to those people who had a TPP in place at the time COVID hit and all of those people in between were continued until September 30, 2021.

Ms. Pachter Schulder informed the Board of a conversation with the Chair and Vice Chair wherein they discussed that the regulations permit licensees who have a TPP to request an extension for good cause which can be shown by working during the pandemic. They discussed whether ending these permits abruptly on September 30, 2021, could cause damage to the health system, especially with the Delta variant and transmission numbers in Pennsylvania. She explained that the Chair and Vice Chair determined that it would make sense to extend the permit for these TPP holders until March 31, 2022. She asked the Board for ratification of the Chair and Vice Chair's action.

Ms. Pachter Schulder mentioned that an element of the Chair and Vice Chair's decision was the requirement that the Board send a notification sometime in the middle of November or the beginning of December to advise the TPP holders of the need to complete their outstanding licensure applications with the Board no later than January 1, 2022, so that they can be processed by staff by the March 31, 2022, date eliminating any lapse in practice.]

MS. PACHTER SCHULDER:

Establishment of a Diploma Practical Nursing Program
[Because Temitope Oladatun, MSN, RN, Chief Executive
Officer and Program Director, Dotlen Academy of
Science, experienced technical difficulties, the Board
deferred Dotlen's presentation until after the
Lansdale School of Business presentation.]

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Appointment - Lansdale School of Business Proposal to offer an Evening/Weekend Practical Nursing Program [Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel, reminded the Board that it approved Lansdale's Program in 2019 as well as its request to admit four cohorts of 20 students in June 2021. She noted that Lansdale is here today requesting approval for the addition of two separate cohorts of 30 students each for an evening and weekend program.

Gary Guldin, MSN, EdM, RN, Director of Nursing,
Lansdale School of Business, provided an overview of
the Proposal and addressed the need for an evening or
weekend program from the very beginning when they
started recruiting for day classes. He noted
receiving many requests for an evening or weekend
practical nurse program and creating a waiting list.

Mr. Guldin commented that they have faculty, and all of the classrooms used during the day for nursing

are open during the evening and weekend, along with
all of the facility and all of the equipment. He
noted clinical sites are interested, and the program
is almost the exact same program they have full-time
for one year but would offer the program part-time for
two years because of the interest of people who want
to be a practical nurse but cannot enroll full-time.

Chair Malady requested clarification as to how many students graduated from the program and how many tested.

Mr. Guldin noted that they just graduated the first class of 13 students with a pass rate of 66 percent. He mentioned that one student failed but is a special situation because she was deployed and did not get to finish all of her Assessment Technologies Institute (ATI) testing. He commented that she was not really ready to take it but was being deployed and wanted to at least take a chance.

Mr. Guldin explained that some students who have failed a class dropped back to the next cohort. He noted that students who did not pass go through virtual ATI to help prepare for the exam.

Dr. Coughlin asked whether there was any preparation for the National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX) while in the courses. Marlon

Keller, President, Lansdale School of Business,
explained that the whole last term is focused on
taking boards and finishing up the curriculum, noting
ATI is started about two weeks prior to graduation.

- 5 Mr. Guldin further explained that there is ATI
 6 through their whole program, but the virtual ATI
 7 really prepares them when they have a coach and
 8 everything that helps them prepare for the NCLEX,
 9 which starts about 2 weeks before graduation and lasts
 10 for 12 weeks.
 - Mr. Keller noted that probably eight or nine graduates have received their Authorization to Test (ATT) at this point.
 - Dr. Kmetz noted a concern with the amount of lapsed time between graduation and testing.

 Statistically, the longer the wait, the less likely the student will pass, noting the early passers have a 66 percent.
 - Ms. Pachter Schulder asked whether Lansdale was requesting approval for two cohorts for the evening and weekend. Mr. Guldin commented that two cohorts would be the maximum because they are going to extend it and will start only two cohorts a year. He again mentioned the huge interest and a waiting list of people and believed there would be more students in

the evening program.

Mr. Guldin addressed faculty for the evening and weekend, noting a number of current faculty have expressed interest in also picking up some evening classes, and other faculty have expressed interest. He noted being comfortable with having faculty to start this program and hiring two more part-time faculty would be sufficient.

Dr. Kmetz asked how many students were in the program. Mr. Keller commented that the total number of students in the program is 69, with four full-time and five part-time faculty.

Dr. Kmetz asked how many faculty would be hired if the Board would grant permission for evenings and weekends. Mr. Guldin noted the addition of two parttime faculty for the first group and then another full-time faculty and maybe two part-time when the second group starts.

Ms. Pachter Schulder asked how much time there is between the graduation date and submission of the NEV to the Board. Mr. Keller commented that students are encouraged to get a 90 percent or higher on the predictor for ATI and will receive that right away if they do that prior to the graduation date, and those who do not are encouraged to go to virtual ATI and get

the greenlight.

Dr. Coughlin asked whether there was a business relationship between the proposed clinical sites because the form letters are identical. Ms. Hertzler also noted the letters were identical, where one letter was signed and had the person's credentials listed, and the other one did not, as the letters are usually set up and computer generated. Mr. Guldin commented that Harborview and Foulkeways are two different facilities but may have adopted the previous generic form letter.

Mr. Guldin commented that Lansdale hoped to start the evening program on December 7, 2021, in order to keep the evening and day on the same schedule but would switch to March and September if it is delayed.]

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Appointment - Dotlen Academy of Science Proposal for
Establishment of a Diploma Practical Nursing Program
[Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel,
noted the request for approval of the Dotlen Academy
of Science for Establishment of a Diploma Practical
Nursing Program.

Temitope Oladatun, MSN, RN, Chief Executive Officer and Program Director, Dotlen Academy of

- 1 | Science, provided a summary of his professional
- 2 | background. He informed the Board that he was adjunct
- 3 | faculty for a practical nursing program in Broomall in
- 4 Delaware County and is the President and Chief
- 5 | Executive Officer for Dotlen Network Incorporated,
- 6 which was an organization he set up in 2003 and became
- 7 | a private licensed school in 2011.
- 8 Mr. Oladatun commented that he currently runs the
- 9 nursing assistant training program and has been
- 10 approved for IV therapy for diagnostics. He noted his
- 11 | sole role as the Program Coordinator when it is fully
- 12 functioning. He mentioned having a school director
- 13 and intending to hire a qualified board-approved
- 14 | faculty member to run the program. He noted he would
- 15 be offering assistance because of having more than 20
- 16 years of experience in areas like laboratory and
- 17 preparing students for the NCLEX® exam.
- 18 Ms. Pachter Schulder asked how many students and
- 19 faculty members Mr. Oladatun is anticipating. Mr.
- 20 Oladatun explained that he would start with a student
- 21 | intake of 20 and will hire a full-time faculty member
- 22 and have part-time faculty members for the clinical
- 23 aspect once he has 20 students.
- 24 Ms. Pachter Schulder requested more information
- 25 | concerning the fee structure since, according to the

Proposal, there is no financial aid available. Mr.
Oladatun commented that the program would be paid
directly by the students, where tuition would be
\$16,500 for the 12-month program, a registration fee
of \$75, and books and supplies would be provided at a
cost of \$700.

Mr. Oladatun noted the utilization of Assessment Technologies Institute (ATI) Live package for each student for successful graduation and completion of the program at the cost of about \$450. He mentioned that cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) training would be required before the start of clinical at \$85, a \$50 graduation fee for students who successfully complete the program, and an \$80 liability insurance fee for a total program cost of \$17,940.

Chair Malady asked Mr. Oladatun how the program would be financed or whether he is waiting until students commit to the program and then have enough money to start it. Mr. Oladatun explained that students will have the option of a monthly payment plan or use a private student loan. He stated the corporation has enough money to run the program beyond the first year. He mentioned that no student would be kicked out because of inability to pay, but their NEVs may not be submitted to the Board until debts are

paid.

Ms. Pachter Schulder asked Mr. Oladatun whether he had a systematic evaluation plan and how the curriculum would be evaluated once students commence testing. Mr. Oladatun addressed previous experience with a program he ran in Montgomery County, where the admission requirement was 50 percent and had a systematic plan that more than 80 percent of students would be able to successfully pass the NCLEX.

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted the admission requirement of a 50 percent rate on the Test of Essential Academic Skills (TEAS) score but asked what he is anticipating for a passing score for each course. Mr. Oladatun commented that a 75 percent pass rate would be required. He noted deciding to use TEAS as an entrance exam and having small classes and a well-equipped laboratory and being in partnership with Widener University for the simulation program.

Mr. Oladatun noted students would be required to have a high school diploma or General Educational Development (GED) and some college would be a plus, communicate in the English language, and be able to engage in patient care.

Dr. Kmetz asked whether Mr. Oladatun anticipates a large portion of students to be English as a

Secondary Language (ESL) students and what support would be available. Mr. Oladatun commented that there would be ESL students in Montgomery County and Delaware County. He noted that students who struggle with the English language can have remediation and help from two nonprofit organizations within the radius of the school that provide help to Latino and immigrant communities.

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Dr. Coughlin asked whether Mr. Oladatun had any concerns with identifying instructors and a full-time staff because of identifying the students first before having the faculty onboard. Mr. Oladatun commented that he received tons of resumes and would be getting faculty from colleagues and prior coworkers, noting he could have competent Board-approved faculty based upon his needs once he starts admitting students. He stated that he would add faculty at least a minimum of one month before the beginning of the program. He mentioned he currently has a full-time and part-time nursing assistant program and IV therapy course for nurses.

Mr. Oladatun addressed clinical settings for the students at two Genesis long-term care facilities at the Sanatoga Center and East Norriton for basic nursing skills, AristaCare at Meadow Springs for med-

surg skills, a rehabilitation unit in East Norriton,
mental health training at a community mental health
facility, acute care knowledge at Suburban Community
Hospital, and simulation and pediatric experience at
Widener.

2.0

Mr. Oladatun addressed having a consultant review the curriculum and provide a crosswalk and how he plans on ATI being 10 percent of the course completion process.

Ms. Hertzler asked Mr. Oladatun whether he would continue to be an adjunct instructor for the other school. She expressed concern with students who fall behind in their monthly payments not being able to take the NCLEX until it is paid being less likely to pass because of the time from graduation to testing.

Mr. Oladatun commented that he would be there full-time. He explained that any student who goes away for more than 90 days would be put in a remediation program to help them prepare for the NCLEX®-PN Exam. He noted studies have shown that students will retain at the same capacity they exit the program after 90 days. He stated that anyone not scheduled to test after 90 days of graduation would be required to take a two-week remediation program at no charge to the student.

Commissioner Johnson asked Mr. Oladatun what happens to students who do not finish their studies or if there is nonpayment and the student would not be able to sit for the NCLEX®. Mr. Oladatun explained that students will finish their studies and graduate, but it is a private licensed school, and they have to fulfil their own commitment. He noted any debt would be turned over to collections after six months, where the student will have to pay the school before they can say the student successfully completed all the programs and send the NEV to the State Board of Nursing to qualify for an ATT.

1.3

Mr. Oladatun addressed work sponsorships in the area, where students can work for employers who will pay their tuition and noted a lot of practical nursing openings in Montgomery County. Mr. Oladatun stated that Genesis is going to sponsor their students and their own employees to complete the program and follow whatever the Department of Health requires from Dotlen Academy graduates to be able to work, which would be between the graduate and the employer. Mr. Oladatun addressed tuition refunds, where Dotlen Academy will only charge from the last day of attendance unless the student spent more than 50 percent of the time in the program. He commented that the program is 1,545

hours, so students who go beyond 50 percent, according to the Pennsylvania Department of Education, may not be eligible. He noted that the \$75 application fee is nonrefundable because of processing fees.]

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Appointment - Discussion with PHMP and PNAP Regarding
Temporary Waiver of Direct Supervision Requirements
[Carole Clarke Smith, Esquire, Senior Board Counsel,
reminded the Board that people started to work from
home in March 2020 due to COVID and that impacted the
operations of the PHMP. She noted that licensees who
were deemed "appropriate to work from home" could not
comply with the direct supervision provisions in the
Board's monitoring agreements in the Voluntary
Recovery Program (VRP) and the Disciplinary Monitoring
Unit (DMU).

Ms. Clarke Smith explained that requests to modify this provision for participants in the PHMP programs were reviewed with the Chair and Vice Chair during virtual meetings. Their actions were placed on the Board's next agenda for ratification.

Ms. Clarke Smith stated the modification allowed active and continuing overview by the monitor to

determine if the monitor's directions were being followed, immediate availability of the monitor for necessary consultation, and regular consultation on a weekly basis.

Ms. Clarke Smith further explained that the order was tied to the Governor's COVID-19 disaster declaration and the extension has ended, so the order as written and issued is out of date. She mentioned that there are still people working from home and in limbo right now, given that some of the other waivers issued by the various boards were extended until September 30 and then again until March 31, 2022.

Ms. Clarke Smith requested the Board's input regarding extending that again for the people who are still working from home with revised monitoring terms and tying it to the current March 31 end date. She noted Mr. Knipe and Ms. Megon were also invited to attend the meeting because they are the ones who are implementing the modified orders.

Joann Megon, RN, PNAP Executive Director, reported about 25 licensees were given permission to work from home, but that number is currently down to maybe 5 or 6.

Chair Malady noted being inclined to extend the order until March 31 and see where they are down the

2 Ms. Megon commented that there were no violations 3 or relapses from the clients they monitor and working

4 from home went very well.]

Ms. Megon noted recent discussion on that topic during a PNAP Board of Directors Meeting, where they opted to defer to the Board and PHMP as far as how those cases are handled. She stated that PNAP makes sure the licensees have been evaluated by an addictionologist, and PHMP furthers that with neuropsych testing to make sure they are safe to practice. She mentioned that it is a good option for some licensees, but PNAP needs a decision on how long they should be monitored.

Kevin Knipe, MSW, LSW, CCDP Diplomate, Program
Manager, Professional Health Monitoring Program,
commented that it is something that is worth further
consideration as far as looking at existing policy.
He mentioned that there are some longstanding
participants who are going through the monitoring
program well beyond the typical three-year period.

Mr. Knipe could not recall what the NCSBN recommendation was relative to the guidelines that they published a few years back relative to best practices for alternative programs but believed they had them fall under the high-risk group, which included individuals who were maintained on medications for chronic pain.

Mr. Knipe believed that their recommendation was that there could be some consideration given to dismissal if they appeared to make satisfactory progress after being monitored for five years.

2.0

Mr. Knipe commented that PHMP needs to look at it from the perspective of those who are on opioids for chronic pain because they present the same issues for PHMP, and the policy is the same with them. He noted that PHMP cannot take the position that they can verify a best practice on monitoring while the participants are being maintained on a medication that can be abused and cause dependency issues.

Mr. Knipe stated that he would also recommend the five years of satisfactory progress when looking at developing a protocol similar to what NCSBN was saying was a best practice. He noted that participants are also put through a comprehensive evaluation at the end of their monitoring that may include a repeat neurocognitive test just to verify, and he thinks it is worth consideration to allow those individuals to graduate if all checks out.

Mr. Knipe mentioned the importance of legal guidance to make sure there are no concerns. He noted it would be okay with VRP cases because the VRP cases say no less than three years of monitoring. He stated

that he did not know if there are any of the DMU
orders still out there but suspected that there are
orders that specifically state a licensee cannot have
their probation lifted until they are one-year drug
free and would be happy to have a discussion with
Legal Counsel.

Mr. Knipe noted the need for further discussion and some type of amendment of those orders to allow for such a change in policy.

Chair Malady commented that the Board wished to proceed on something like that and would appreciate if PHMP would take another look at those cases.

Mr. Knipe offered to explore that issue for the Board.]

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16 Report of Board Chairperson

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[Kristin Malady, BSN, RN, Chair, thanked nurses and noted appreciation for their hard work and continued care of all of the citizens of Pennsylvania.

Chair Malady also acknowledged the hard work of Commissioner Johnson, Ms. Wendy Miller, Ms. Pachter Schulder, and Board staff. She reported Pennsylvania has over 300,000 various nurses in the state with complex issues concerning licensure, education, and practice, and appreciates all the work managing all of

those licensees and bringing everything together.

Chair Malady stated that her goal on the Board is to foster a collaborative culture with education programs and thanked the stakeholders for their comments and views. She noted the Board wants to hear from them and work together and compromise.]

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8 Report of Commissioner

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[K. Kalonji Johnson, Commissioner, Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs, echoed Chair Malady's sentiments of appreciation to licensees and stakeholders who have been instrumental in reigniting the collaboration. He noted the last 18 months have been difficult as individuals have been saddled with the everyday traumatic stressors of working alongside the isolation of being in a virtual environment and appreciated all of their patience.

Commissioner Johnson commented that the Board has been active in discussions of how to continue to improve the system and continue to build better support functions in PALS so problems and concerns are identified and finding fixes for those problems to be more efficient.

Commissioner Johnson reported regulatory suspensions and waivers that were in place on

September 30, 2021, have been extended until March 31, 2022. He noted that some of the physical travel prohibitions have been relaxed, and Board members may travel physically to regional and national conventions but encouraged virtual participation for public health and safety, noting virtual participation allows all Board members to attend and only two members for physical travel.

Commissioner Johnson stated that travel requests have to be put on the agenda and approved and voted on by the Board for administrative approval due to amendments to the Sunshine Act. He recommended everyone submit travel requests to Ms. Cindy Miller as soon as possible for processing because of staffing shortages and difficulties procuring accommodations.]

17 | Committee Meeting

[Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel, referred to the Draft Annex for 16A-5146 regarding continuing education. She stated the Annex addresses the organ and tissue donation recovery process education and the opioid education for CRNPs with prescriptive authority and was drafted in consultation with the organ donation and recovery process organizations that have been federally approved in

Pennsylvania.

2.3

Ms. Pachter Schulder reported that unlike the opioid education, which must be taken every renewal period by CRNPs with prescriptive authority, the organ donation education is a one-time education that is required of registered nurses (RNs), practical nurses (PNs), clinical nurse specialist (CNSs), CRNPs, volunteer licenses, and certified registered nurse anesthetists (CRNAs) once that class is established. Licensed dietitian nutritionists (LDNs) are the only class of Nurse Board licensees that are exempt from this requirement because there is no organ donation component within the LDN scope of practice.

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted that pursuant to Section 8628 of Act 90 of 2018, under proposed §§ 21.131(a.1), 21.156(b.2), 21.605(b), and 21.822(f), within five years of initial licensure or licensure renewal, the licensee, except for LDNs, shall complete at least 2 hours of continuing education in organ and tissue donation and recovery when it goes into effect. Those two hours can be counted toward the 30 hour continuing education requirements for RNs, CRNPs, and CNSs.

Ms. Pachter Schulder directed the Board's attention to § 21.133(a.1), which she reported

requires education on the clinical aspects of the 1 2 donation and recovery process. The modules were 3 developed by the organ procurement organizations. The content includes education on the tissue donation 4 5 process, the organ donation process, patient and 6 family perspectives, vascularized composite allografts, death by neurologic criteria and explaining brain death to families, compassionate family care and communication, clinical donor 10 management and intensive care unit and operating room 11 care. In proposed $\S 21.134(11)$, the Board would add 12 activities sponsored by the organ procurement organizations defined in 20 Pa.C.S. § 8601 to the list 13 14 of approved continuing education sources. 15 Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to § 21.283(b)(4), 16 noting CRNPs with prescriptive authority not only have 17 to complete the organ donation piece but also complete 18 2 hours of Board-approved education in pain management or the identification of addiction and 2 hours of 19 20 Board-approved education in the practice of prescribing or dispensing of opioids within one year 21 22 of obtaining prescriptive authority and are required

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Ms. Miller mentioned that the User Guides on how to submit an online application and how to submit an online change form have been posted on the website under Application Forms and Information, along with a step-by-step guide with screenshots.

Ms. Miller noted the 2020-2021 NCLEX exam year ended on September 30, 2021, and the results have been distributed to programs. She stated that programs have been informed that they have until the 29th to review the report and notify the Board of any errors, after which the Board will finalize the results and have a more thorough discussion at the December meeting regarding potential trends and causative factors. She mentioned the pass rate is down 3 percent nationally and that Pennsylvania will see a similar trend.

Ms. Miller addressed testing sites, which have been very closely monitored and tracked by NCSBN. She reported all Pennsylvania testing centers were operating at 100 percent by May.

Ms. Miller commented that the 2020-2021 exam year testing center operations should not be an issue, and they would be looking more at trends and additional

causative factors. She commented that programs needed to continue some of the adaptations made due to COVID into that exam year with online simulation, etc., and those are things that will need to be taken into account when looking at the results.

Ms. Miller stated that programs would be notified following the December meeting as to whether they are on provisional status or coming off provisional status due to the pass rates and encouraged them to start looking at their programs according to the regulations and developing a plan for improvement. She commented that the Board is going to have appointments with programs that will be placed on provisional status at the December and January meetings on their petitions to extend that status.

Ms. Miller noted interviews are starting within the coming week for two open Nursing Practice Advisor positions and that the Board is happy to have Kelly Hoffman, MSN, RN, as a new Nursing Education Advisor.]

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21 New Business

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22 | [Wendy J. Miller, MSN, RN, Executive Secretary,

23 addressed English Language Proficiency (ELP)

24 Examinations. She stated that Board regulations

25 require the Board to select the ELP examination and

the passing standards. Ms. Miller mentioned that the Board has always relied on guidance from NCSBN as far as tests and passing standards because of their extensive norming exercises on all of the ELP exams.

2.2

Ms. Miller reported a proliferation of ELP exams on the market, and because of the proprietary nature of those exams, NCSBN is not able to continue to do the same norming exercises, and the Board is going to have to establish their own passing standards.

Ms. Miller mentioned that NCSBN is developing recommendations and standards for ELP exams and guidelines of how to establish a passing standard in lieu of these norming exercises. She noted also gathering information about the new ELP exams to bring information in front of the Board regarding exams that are available and establishing a passing standard for those exams.

Ms. Miller commented that some of the new exams and some of the exams on the Board's list have developed at-home versions of the exam, which was done as an adaptation to COVID. She mentioned the need for more information concerning the security, validity, and reliability of the at-home tests.

Ms. Pachter Schulder commented that many of the at-home tests have a separate monitoring program,

whether it is ProctorU or another system that actually proctors while taking the test at home.

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Ms. Miller reported many variations from test to test in the degree of proctoring and noted the importance of security and considering whether or not the at-home versions have the same validity and reliability as test centers.

Chair Malady asked whether other boards are required to do the same thing and whether there is a standardization across other boards regarding tests and what is being accepted.

Ms. Pachter Schulder stated the Board of Medicine allows the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL). She mentioned the Occupational English Test (OET), noting the United States Medical Licensing Examination (USMLE) for medicine requires OET Medicine. She reported there was an OET for Nurses and for others as well and would be investigating why that is not on their list.

Ms. Miller could not provide a timeframe of when NCSBN guidelines would be published but noted they would be in the updated version of the Resource Manual on the Licensure of Internationally Educated Nurses.]

- 24 needs. She mentioned the concern across the country
- 25 where rural areas have limited resources available to

individuals.

Dr. Rainer stated the specialty in emergency nurse practitioner has been evolving over the last five years, noting that the American Academy of Emergency Nurse Practitioners has published a lot of data validating that the family nurse practitioner forms the basis of the practice because it was across the lifespan.

Dr. Peoples noted that it was becoming a specialty, and the need to have people certified in emergency medicine was definitely there.

Ms. Pachter Schulder asked whether students in the program take the Family Nurse Practitioner exam as well as taking the Emergency exam. Dr. Peoples explained that it is a post-master's program, so they would not be admitted into their program unless they are licensed and credentialed as a Family Nurse Practitioner.

Chair Malady commended Thomas Jefferson
University for their strong presentation and proposal
and appreciated the crosswalks with the American
Association of Colleges of Nursing (AACN) Essentials.
She asked whether Thomas Jefferson University is
having difficulty finding clinical sites, noting
Drexel also has a program but is having difficulty

finding clinical sites.

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Dr. Peoples stated that nurse practitioners have historically had difficulty finding clinical sites. She noted that she and Dr. Rainer both practice in the Emergency Room at Jefferson, which would be a benefit with 14 Thomas Jefferson University Hospital Emergency Rooms and 6 or 7 Urgent Care Centers.

Dr. Zukowsky commented that Dr. Peoples and Dr. Rainer are exemplary nurse practitioners and emergency room experts and have the support of their attending physicians in the emergency room for the program.

Dr. Zukowsky commented that it is going to be a challenge to choose 4 people for the part-time program when 128 people responded.

Dr. Zukowsky stated that Senior Director for Budget Planning, Katherine White, has modeled out how the program will expand with the hopes of increasing enrollment numbers.

Chair Malady thanked Thomas Jefferson University for their presentation.]

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22 Regulation Committee Meeting (Continued)

23 [Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel,

24 addressed comments the Board received from the deans

25 of the Nursing Programs at the University of

- Pennsylvania, the University of Pittsburgh, and 1 2 Pennsylvania State University regarding the nursing 3 education regulation (16A-5141). First, the deans 4 commented that many of the programs are already 5 regulated by the University's accrediting bodies. 6 They questioned what would be necessary for the Board, either at an establishment level when they first start a program, or when they are just changing their program, or whether they are changing track or changing specialties. They recommend that there be a 10 11 reduction in redundancies, whether that is prior 12 approval for curriculum changes or perhaps alignment 13 with NCSBN standards or making part of approval be in 14 the Annual Report, rather than done at the time when 15 it is originally being offered. 16 The deans also requested that the Board regulate 17 out-of-state programs that use clinical sites in 18 Pennsylvania, requiring them to register in 19 Pennsylvania and also be approved by the Pennsylvania 20 Board. She explained that the Board distributes 21 quidance to inform the out-of-state programs that the 22 preceptors must be licensed in Pennsylvania, but the
- Ms. Pachter Schulder asked Dr. Petula to educate

Board does not have the authority to license or

approve out-of-state programs.

the Board on accrediting bodies and standards for RN,
PN, and CRNP programs as well as the roles of
university or program committees, faculty committees,
institutional review committees, and systematic
evaluation plans to provide the Board with a basis to

start working on the regulation.

- Sue Petula, PhD, MSN, RN, NEA-BC, FRE, Nursing Education Advisor Annuitant, noted the importance of being cognizant of the changes in the nursing environment when reviewing the regulation and referred to the NCSBN's Delphi Study that was published last year. She also referred to the American Association of Colleges of Nursing Essentials as the real driving force in terms of nursing education.
- Dr. Petula stated that NCSBN has updated its Model Rules that are followed by many boards. She referred to the Next Generation NCLEX® Clinical Judgment Measurement Model, noting it would be implemented in April 2023 for both RN and PN programs.
- Dr. Petula explained that the driving force behind the Next Generation NCLEX® was to measure clinical judgment, which came from Szweda and Kavanagh at the Cleveland Clinic, where they did a study of 5000 nurses and found that only 23 percent of new graduates had well-honed clinical judgment. She also

noted a new accreditor, the Commission for Nursing Education Accreditation (CNEA), which falls under the umbrella of the National League for Nursing.

2.2

Dr. Petula addressed curriculum changes that require Board approval when going through the regulations, noting what has been proposed compared to what is in the current regulations is pretty much the same. She mentioned programs have pointed out things, particularly within collegiate community colleges at baccalaureate levels, and is perhaps something the Board should look at and consider.

Dr. Petula referred to § 21.83 and § 21.204 regarding PN programs, where an alteration in program philosophy, the program purpose, objectives, or anything that affects the integration of material into the total curriculum require changes and come before the Board.

Dr. Petula noted the Advisors looked at what nursing accrediting bodies require through the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE) that accredits baccalaureate and higher degree programs; the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN) that accredits all program types at the prelicensure level and graduate level; and the newly approved commission under The United States Department

of Education (USDOE), which is the Commission for Nursing Education Accreditation (CNEA).

Dr. Petula stated NCSBN did a survey and looked at how many programs are accredited of over 4000 nursing education programs within the United States and its territories. She addressed Pennsylvania programs, noting 42 percent of PN programs are accredited through ACEN and 10.6 nationally, and 100 percent of RN programs are accredited by a national nursing accrediting body. She noted 32 baccalaureate programs are CCNE accredited, and 7 are ACEN accredited.

Dr. Petula discussed accreditor differences, noting all of them ask the program whether they require Board approval or notification and discussed differences between CCNE, ACEN, and CNEA.

Dr. Petula addressed other states and a conversation she had with NCSBN's Nancy Spector identifying information regarding curriculum changes. She mentioned a survey of nurse boards asking whether their board requires nursing education programs to submit curriculum changes, where 32 states responded with answers, from submission of major curricular changes to just notification if the program is accredited.

Dr. Petula commented that boards in many states are aligning with the accrediting body requirements to eliminate duplication of efforts. She noted that some accredited programs are exempt all together, and some states where a Board only needs to be notified of very specific changes, including change in delivery or length of the program.

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Dr. Petula explained that a systematic evaluation plan is usually an organized continuous analysis of all nursing education programs. She noted a rigorous plan of systematic evaluation would include a specific measure of levels of achievement, appropriate assessment methods, regular intervals for assessment, sufficient data to inform the decision-making and how data was analyzed, and documentation. Dr. Petula stated that faculty committees evaluate curriculum and then it is embedded within the systematic evaluation plan. She mentioned that universities and colleges often have a two-step process. She noted the general curriculum committee looks at curriculum from an institutional perspective to make sure the curriculum carries out the admission to the college and general education requirements. Dr. Petula addressed a more specialized curriculum such as nursing would undertake because they are the specialists in that

area and would do a rigorous review in a similar way to make certain that the curriculum is meeting the professional standards of care.

Dr. Petula referred to a study from NCSBN regarding evidence-based indicators that was published in July 2021, identifying 18 quality indicators, 11 warning signs, and 8 program outcome measures. She noted quality indicators where 2 of the 18 that were related to curriculum emphasized that there should be quality and safety standards for patient care within the curriculum.

Dr. Petula commented that the other element was that the curriculum itself should emphasize critical thinking and clinical reasoning skills, which is the direction the NCLEX® is moving. She noted a lot is related to ongoing systematic evaluation plan review and faculty and consistency of leadership within the program, as well as having comprehensive support services.

Dr. Petula noted a key warning sign related to curriculum was teaching to the exam, where it needs to be a curriculum that is not solely based on teaching to the NCLEX® but on the depth and breadth of nursing.

Dr. Petula noted another interesting component was the overreliance on simulation to replace clinical

experience.

Dr. Petula mentioned that within the comments from the deans, there was a citation related to Guidelines to Prelicensure Nursing Programs published through NCSBN in February 2020. She noted it to be an expert panel that consisted of representatives from boards of nursing, College of Nurses of Ontario, National League for Nurses (NLN), AACN, and the Organization for Associate Degree Nursing, and NCSBN staff.

Dr. Petula noted the issue to be that they really referred to the quality indicators and to the warning signs, and within that Guideline, they make suggestions as to the need to be conscious of those, measure for those, and how to avoid those.

Dr. Petula stated that the Model Rules that were recently published get into the very specifics of two items - establishment of prelicensure programs and APRN programs and ongoing continuing approval. She stated that all of the documents are tremendous references that can support the Board in many of its decisions going forward. She noted clinical experience cannot be replaced with 100 percent simulation, and there has to be direct patient care.

Dr. Petula noted that they are suggesting that

any particular clinical should be no more than 50 1 2 percent and talked about nursing administrator leadership turnover, where there should be no more 3 than three in a five-year period.

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Dr. Petula stated they talk about 35 percent of staff should be full-time in a nursing program and fully support national nursing accreditation as well as institutional accreditation if within a college or university setting.

Ms. Pachter Schulder commented that a copy of the Delphi study from before COVID and the new July 2021 study could be sent out for the next agenda.

Ms. Pachter Schulder commented that in light of Dr. Petula's report, for the next meeting they would be examining whether for an existing program that is not on initial or provisional approval, there may be changes to existing programs that could be implemented before total Board approval, such as advertising of a program but not admitting any students while waiting for program approval.

Also, where an existing program may want to add a new specialty or add a new degree type, perhaps not all of what would normally be required for establishment would have to be duplicated because some of that may have already been reviewed. For new degree

types, it may just be necessary for the programs to detail the additional courses and faculty.

The Board discussed that it would be interested in continuing to explore areas to make it easier for a fully approved program by the Board to make changes.

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted that faculty approvals at clinical sites generally only take about three business days.

Chair Malady noted the importance of continuing to move forward and listen and compromise on some of those issues.
