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   Appointment - Professional Health Monitoring
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     Program (PHMP)
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   [Kevin Knipe, MSW, LSW, CCDP Diplomate, Program
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   Manager, Professional Health Monitoring Programs,
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   introduced Julie Droddy, a new Co-Program Manager,
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   which was a decision by the Department of State (DOS)
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   and Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs
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   (BPOA) leadership.
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        Julie Droddy, Co-Program Manager, Professional
   Health Monitoring Programs, provided a brief history
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   of her professional background and noted looking
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   forward to working with all of the boards in the
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   future.
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        Mr. Knipe noted the importance of educating the
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   public about PHMP and presented to the Board to
22
   discuss PHMP's Opioid Replacement Therapy Policy.
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   He addressed common misconceptions whether it is a
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   licensure issue or the eligibility for PHMP where the
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   applicant would not qualify if the applicant were
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undergoing medication-assisted therapy such as buprenorphine or methadone. He mentioned that in October 2021, the Board asked him to look at PHMP's policy to see if any changes were appropriate.

Mr. Knipe explained that he focused most of his attention on the National Council of State Boards of Nursing's (NCSBN) recommendations for alternative programs and recommendations for various issues that nurses would suffer from, whether it is mental illness, substance use disorder, or both, specifically around the idea of opioid replacement therapy.

Mr. Knipe reported that an applicant identified as part of a high-risk population but who is appropriate to be monitored and able to work in their field once effectively treated would be accepted into PHMP. He explained that PHMP does not drive evaluation treatment recommendations but relies on the provider to make recommendations when they refer a licensee for an evaluation. He mentioned many nurses are already on medication-assisted therapy when they go to PHMP.

Mr. Knipe further explained that PHMP gathers information from the evaluator and their prescriber to make sure they are following the treatment plan of

their therapist and whomever is prescribing their buprenorphine or methadone. He stated buprenorphine is the drug of preference as it relates to treating opioid addiction, but PHMP does have a few individuals on methadone. He reported about 10% of their individuals are on buprenorphine but is seeing a general uptick.

Ms. Pachter Schulder explained that previously PHMP had a policy where individuals had to be off replacement therapy for a year in order to cease the PHMP and then the Board asked in October whether there was a certain amount of time a person could be on opioid replacement therapy and still not require any further monitoring.

Mr. Knipe explained that the existing policy is that PHMP monitors those individuals for five years; however, they can still petition on their own, but for PHMP to support the petition if the licensees remain on their medication-assisted therapy, they are monitored for five years and document their recovery and compliance with the agreement. He reported five years is the recommendation of NCSBN.

Mr. Knipe stated the key components of what the NCSBN was stressing, beyond it being a high-risk population, was to effectively ensure individuals

will hopefully maintain long-term sobriety and have
the necessary support through the monitoring programs
for that five-year period but also provides
monitoring programs like theirs with specific
guidelines on how to monitor those individuals,
including undergoing a neurocognitive test before
they return to work.

Mr. Knipe explained that individuals are treated the same whether it is buprenorphine for opioid addiction or Percocet because somebody has a chronic pain condition. He referred to literature suggesting some people on long-term opioids show some cognitive deficits and is why PHMP requires a neurocognitive assessment.

Dr. Bucher referred to correspondence the Board received from an addiction medicine provider concerned about someone entering nursing who has really changed their life and has been stable on a medication and monitored by their addiction provider who would have to enter the program and be monitored for five years and have the additional cost.

Dr. Bucher requested information regarding the process if someone has been stable on their medicine for five years and just becoming a nurse as to whether they would need five years of additional

monitoring.

Mr. Knipe stated the existing policy does not require all applicants to be referred to PHMP for assessment and that PHMP does not decide who must enter the program because that decision is made by the Board. He explained that PHMP's role in the whole process is to coordinate the evaluation and forward it with recommendations. He noted each case is based on its own merits, assessment, and records of documented verification of being in recovery but not an automatic five years.

Mr. Knipe stated PHMP would not typically recommend monitoring after their assessment for individuals with verified recovery from another state's program because there would be no reason for that.

Dr. Bucher mentioned the importance of educating the public and again referred to the correspondence where there is still a concern with the recommendation that a nurse be weaned off this medicine before they could be out of the program instead of it being considered as long-term replacement. He believed a lot of addiction providers who treat nurses think the policy is that they need to be weaned off replacement medication and

is not something long term. He noted being not sure whether that is explained to someone when they enter the program.

Mr. Knipe stated PHMP has specific letters explaining the process for people who are on opioids, including their right to petition the Board to be dismissed at any given point but would need documentation if PHMP does not support their dismissal. He reported working with a core group of treatment providers but never had the sense that they were confused over whether someone needs to be off the medication or not. He also referred to the correspondence but believed the person was specifically addressing a concern that an applicant would not receive a license if they were on buprenorphine.

Ms. Hertzler asked whether PHMP still holds to someone being off medication-assisted treatment (MAT) one year or if they have done the five years and the treatment is very successful, does PHMP make a recommendation for them to go back into nursing.

Mr. Knipe stated PHMP would fully support their dismissal from the program. He noted that most of them are working during the period of time that they are in the program, demonstrating safe practice, and

is just the idea of being able to monitor them. He commented that any new enrollee who is on opioids but could be weaned off within two years of monitoring and demonstrates one year of being drug free would be recommended for dismissal from the program even if the enrollee had entered into a five-year agreement.

Dr. Compher commented that dietitiannutritionists do not have the occupational hazard of
passing narcotic medications but do have the same
genetic risk of alcoholism and drug dependency and
asked whether they are eligible for PHMP.

Mr. Knipe explained that they would be eligible because they have the same monitoring requirements for dietitians as nurses and that they monitor all the healthcare professionals who fall under the Bureau. He mentioned there are little nuances as far as the monitored practice, but the professionals are all monitored the exact same way as far as treatment.

Mr. Knipe explained that PHMP receives referrals from the Professional Compliance Office, JNET, letters of concern sent to applicants, and reports from employers, treatment providers, and coworkers and persons in the individual's personal life. In addition, PHMP receives self-reports from individual licensees. He noted when PHMP receives a referral, it

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        Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel,
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   noted South College was before the Board twice
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   recently and requested information concerning the
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   differences in programs already approved and the
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   proposed ASN Program.
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        Dr. Hall provided a history of their institution,
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   noting it dates back to 1882 with their main campus
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   being in Knoxville, TN, along with having campuses in
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   multiple states, including Pennsylvania.
                                               She noted
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   being an approved educational enterprise in
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Pennsylvania since 2018 and applying for approval for

- 1 their first on-ground programs to be offered at their 2 Pittsburgh campus in 2021, which were approved. She
- 3 mentioned that this program was approved by the
- 4 Department of Education pending approval from the
- 5 Board of Nursing.
- Dr. Hall stated the institution is accredited by
  the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools
  Commission on Colleges as a level six institution,
  which is a doctoral granting level. She noted
  offering the ASN in 2023 in other states. She
- To offering the new in 2023 in other beates. She
- 11 reported having a strong history with their National
- 12 | Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX®) registered
- 13 nurse (RN) pass rate in 2022 with all campuses being
- 14 at 90% or above. She also reported that 2023 is
- 15 having the same results after the third quarter of
- 16 2023, where all their campuses were at a 98% pass
- 17 rate.
- Dr. Hall believed it was time to launch the ASN
- 19 program with all their success with other programs
- 20 and to help address nursing shortages, particularly
- 21 in Pennsylvania. She noted developing strong
- 22 clinical affiliation agreements with hospitals,
- 23 | including Allegheny Health Network, University of
- 24 | Pittsburgh Medical Center, Heritage Valley Health
- 25 Systems, and others.

Dr. Hall noted their ASN has hired a clinical coordinator who is already working with their clinical partners. She reported having a strong pool of applicants for faculty positions, both full-time and adjunct, and having an abundance of resources offered to students, including application programming interface (API) resources, investments in modern nursing equipment and labs, as well as simulation resources. She noted being committed as an institution to supporting the program and its growth.

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted prior discussion regarding § 21.102, where the regulations recommend one class per year, but their proposal has 40 students quarterly. She requested information concerning that issue and admissions for the Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) and Practical Nursing (PN) programs.

Dr. Cobourne explained that they started their first licensed practical nursing (LPN) cohort in October, noting all 6 students are progressing nicely throughout the 10-week quarter, and anticipate having 14 students start in the winter cohort. She reported having a total of 53 students in pre-nursing expected to enter the BSN portion in the spring of 2024.

Dr. Hall addressed quarterly starts, noting they have found historically, throughout all of their campuses, that quarterly starts are very beneficial if a student is unsuccessful in even one course to be able to go right back the very next quarter as far as knowledge retention and helping them stay on course. She noted students did not stay the course if they had to wait six months to a year and is why they implemented quarterly starts at all of their campuses.

Dr. Bucher asked whether South College anticipated any problems with recruitment of faculty and to explain the retention bonus for faculty. He also asked whether clinical sites provided a commitment of how many students they would take.

Dr. Cobourne reported currently having 99 full-time applicants and 35 adjuncts and believed supporting the institution would be relatively stable. She noted retention bonuses are based on outcomes to see how they progress from Q1 to Q2 and then continuing out throughout the program. She stated the clinical sites have not given them any restrictions at this time and that they would place students appropriately to meet course objectives.

Dr. Bucher requested information regarding the

loan-to-pay ratio in their budget and how they came up with the salary of \$94,515.

Dr. Hall stated South College has not raised undergraduate tuition in five years and has been able to stay the course. She noted the importance of being competitive and comparing their tuition and cost of the institution to all private institutions in the region. She believed the \$94,515 would be the full program if students did not have any tuition or credit transfer but noted the tuition for seven quarters would be only \$48,000.

Dr. Hall addressed the \$94,500 number regarding ASN salary. She reported seeing tremendous market evaluation across the states for South College, which includes the potential for initial sign-on bonuses and tuition reimbursement that hospitals and clinical partners are offering as part of the packages in recruitment. She noted looking at many things when talking about salary and not just the starting bedside rate.

Dr. Hall reported bedside rates have also gone up across the state and that there is a willingness to retain nurses in their communities to try to stop the aggressive movement to travel situations and encourage students to stay local to their community.

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Dr. Bucher mentioned the importance of informing students that \$95,500 should not be their expectation when they finish.

Ms. Pachter Schulder informed South College that the Board would deliberate during Executive Session and welcomed them to stay or attend virtually, noting they would also receive a letter from the Board regarding the results.]

25 overview of Orleans Technical College program.

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Mr. Brutton informed the Board that Orleans
Technical College is an accredited career and
technical institution that has been offering career
and technical education programs since 1974. He
noted being accredited by the Accrediting Commission
of Career Schools and Colleges (ACCSC). He stated
their interest in an LPN program speaks to a larger
plan of institutional growth at the college moving
into the direct healthcare space, starting with the
short-term program in medical assisting and then
looking to offer a practical nursing program, which
brought them before the board.

Mr. Brutton addressed the need for a practical nursing program in the Greater Philadelphia area. He mentioned working closely with local partners to develop clinical partnerships to ensure they are covering the full-scale and scope of care as it relates to an LPN program.

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted Orleans Technical College did not have an administrator when the proposal was sent to the Board but have an implementation date planned for April 2024 and asked for an update concerning the hiring of an administrator.

Mr. Brutton reported having a job posting for a

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- nursing administrator, realizing there is a six-month start date based on the date of hire and the administrator being approved by the Board. He noted they are just getting ready to post and are looking to begin interviewing and sourcing candidates within the next couple of weeks.
  - Mr. Brutton explained that part of their hiring plan for the institution is to hire a nursing administrator to run the day-to-day operations of the program and hire additional full-time faculty to accompany students on clinical rotation.

- Dr. Caputi commented that she is willing to continue working with Orleans Technical College and Mr. Brutton.
- Chair Kmetz asked how the school would handle the faculty if they do not have the same beliefs Orleans generated.
  - Mr. Brutton stated there are core principles not transferable based on who is in that role, and faculty skillset and what is expected of faculty would be upheld by the institution despite who is in that particular role.
  - Dr. Caputi noted that she would support new faculty and explained how she came about her philosophy, knowing they have to take that on and own

1 it with the flexibility of knowing that person is the 2 one who will implement the curriculum and the 3 program.

Chair Kmetz asked how the tuition of \$26,875 for the program comports with other similar programs in their region. She also requested information concerning ratios because year five seemed a bit off.

Mr. Brutton explained that they are in the middle of neighboring schools as far as tuition. He noted they are looking to expand the program in year five but not exceed more than a 1:25 ratio.

Chair Kmetz asked for confirmation that there was not any clinical in the Taking Care of the Adult course.

Dr. Caputi stated clinical is in all those courses.

Chair Kmetz requested information about Public Health Management Corporation, a clinical site, noting their average daily census is by visit and asked how many visits they would be doing to have enough patient visits to meet the needs of the students. She noted that clinical placement for obstetrics and gynecology (OB/GYN), pediatrics, and mental health content are difficult to find in all types of programs and requested clarification that

there are a sufficient number of clients so each
student would have exposure to that population
because these clinical experiences are required in
the regulation.

Mr. Brutton explained that Public Health
Management Corporation is one of the largest
outpatient facilities in Philadelphia and their daily
census is enough to support their students receiving
clinical experience in the multiple areas. He stated
one of Public Health Management Corporation's Primary
Care Centers is an OB/GYN site, so all the patients
seen at that particular facility are OB/GYN patients
and would enable students to have adequate experience
in that environment.

Dr. Caputi apologized to Chair Kmetz, noting
Nursing 218 does not have any clinical and was a
typo. She noted there are only 2 didactic hours, and
the heavy clinical semester is Nursing 210
fundamentals, so part of the care of the adult is
just didactic to get them ready to set the stage for
adult health but will have heavy clinical in the
third semester with 282 clinical hours.

Chair Kmetz referred to the policies and procedures applying to faculty beliefs as they have not hired any faculty. Dr. Caputi offered to rewrite

that section to make it clear and work with the
director if they believe it would not be clear to the
faculty how to achieve that learning competency. She
also offered to remove the one part of the course
description at the end and have some additional
explanation in other areas.

Ms. Hertzler asked whether they have a simulation lab because it states that no simulation would be used. Mr. Brutton explained that they have a medical skills lab fully outfitted with simulation manikins and equipment. Ms. Hertzler asked whether that would be utilized for role playing or virtual simulation for courses that do not have the clinical because they will have the higher clinical the next quarter. Dr. Caputi stated bringing the lab or the clinical into the classroom would be appropriate kinds of modalities to use in that course.

Ms. Hertzler noted OB-GYN, pediatrics, and mental health are difficult to get placements but are necessary to complete any nursing education program. She asked what would happen if Orleans cannot place all of the students and do not have a simulation experience.

Mr. Brutton explained that Public Health

Management Corporation has set aside a facility that

- Dr. Burns stated Saint Vincent College has been a
- 14 | private, Catholic, Benedictine, liberal arts college
- 15 in southwest Pennsylvania since 1846 and is
- 16 accredited by Middle States.
- 17 Dr. Burns addressed faculty, noting Saint Vincent
- 18 established a small nursing curriculum committee
- 19 comprised the Dean of the Boyer School with the Dean
- 20 of the School of Arts, Humanities, and Social
- 21 Sciences, as well as some faculty from the Boyer
- 22 School. She noted Saint Vincent faculty and
- 23 administration would be coming together with three
- 24 experienced faculty and educators who have agreed as
- 25 independent consultants to help formulate the various

versions of the program they have established.

Dr. Burns believed there would be a potential pipeline once approved, noting the faculty who have been helping put the curriculum together have indicated they would help teach courses to get the program implemented, possibly for the first two years of the program.

Dr. Burns stated Saint Vincent College would be utilizing Independence Health System. She noted the key area for OB would be Westmoreland Hospital because they see 1,200 deliveries a year. She stated PSYCH would be through Independence Health System from a community health perspective, along with UPMC Western Psych for clinics not usually seen in a community hospital setting, as well as some of the chronic psych disorders and pediatrics. She noted students would also be going to Children's Hospital in Pittsburgh and that there is not a limit on the number of students who could enroll.

Dr. Burns stated Saint Vincent College's intent is to create an immersive curriculum where students are confident, comfortable, and able to transition.

Dr. Burns addressed simulation, noting they have a skills lab, two simulation rooms with the debriefing room, a full directory of part-task

trainers, and low-fidelity and high-fidelity manikins
that are immediately available. She also noted
having a human anatomy lab, which is a human cadaver
lab, as well as a 3D anatomy table. She stated the
sciences are using the lab facilities and that they

6 have been in a partnership with Carlow University for 7 the past several years.

Dr. Burns addressed feedback from students, where they have been only on the Saint Vincent campus and identify as Saint Vincent students, but their degree is from Carlow and desire a degree from Saint

Vincent.

Ms. Pachter Schulder asked whether that would sever the relationship with Carlow or whether it would be limited.

Dr. Burns stated it would be a partnership that would go into sunset after the class that was admitted in the fall graduate. She noted they would have two parallel programs on the campus for several years and would begin admitting students in the fall of 2024 if approved. She stated the first year of the curriculum is designed to accommodate students coming in and being comfortable in college and choosing nursing and then would start nursing courses in their sophomore year.

Dr. Burns addressed clinical simulation, noting up to 30% of the clinical experience would be simulation because they wanted to have flexibility to be able to design the courses to meet the needs of the students. She mentioned that they would decide on a vendor after proper review. She addressed the importance of communication, prioritization, time management, and delegation.

Ms. Pachter Schulder asked Mr. Guiser to address Saint Vincent College's budget.

Mr. Guiser provided information that shows the effective change in their current budget as a result of the nursing program, including a tuition line item and an institutional financial aid line item, noting nursing students would be subject to the same financial aid awarding as traditional students.

Mr. Guiser noted having a \$39,000 tuition face value but also offering every single undergraduate student institutional financial aid that averages about 65% and is institutional pre-federal, state, or other outside aid, which is merit and need based.

Mr. Guiser addressed the implementation of the Bearcat Advantage Program for low-income families of \$60,000 or less Pell eligible. He also mentioned other fees associated with all students would be room

and board.

Father Taylor stated there are facilities in place to begin this program, if approved, in August. He mentioned science programs that share the potential nursing program are all growing and that they have been working with an architect to plan a new building dedicated primarily to nursing estimated to be at \$15.9 million.

Father Taylor reported already raising \$7 million and having two grant requests out for another \$3 million. He mentioned they have not begun general fundraising yet but feels good being about two-thirds of the way in requests. He mentioned the quality of their facilities is high at Saint Vincent and intend to keep the same quality as they continue to grow. He commented that they continue to be good stewards of the gifts given them and continue to invest in their students with those gifts.

Dr. Burns stated the Department of Nursing now established at Saint Vincent will combine a BSN program with the already Doctor of Nurse Anesthesia Practice (DNAP) program in place. The CRNA program admits 30 students every year.

Dr. Bucher commented that he was happy to see their proposal discussing education on implicit bias

and transgender and focusing on the caring aspects of things because nurses are sometimes faced with being advocates for less fortunate individuals.

Dr. Burns noted looking forward to teaching that course because it is a very broad span of vulnerable populations, also including geriatrics.

Ms. Pachter Schulder informed Saint Vincent
College that the Board would deliberate during
Executive Session and welcomed them to stay or attend
virtually. She also noted they would receive a

Ms. Pachter Schulder reminded the Board that it had previously tabled the program's request to add a

presented on behalf of Lansdale School of Business.]

weekend and evening cohort in light of the program being on provisional status for failing to meet the minimum pass rate. She noted that the program's pass rate for the 2022-2023 examination year exceeded the minimum pass rate. She asked Lansdale School of Business to provide information on how it intends to use the program's facilities, clinical sites, and faculty to accomplish the goal of having evening and weekend students.

Ms. Spiezio informed Board members that they have worked very hard with students to get off provisional status. She addressed the need for an evening/weekend program, noting many students are working a full-time job during the day. She also mentioned that organizations within the community are asking for the program to take some of their good employees who are nurse aides and have them become LPNs. She noted their facility has a traditional side and offers associate degrees and short-term diplomas, where evening school is already in operation for other Lansdale programs other than nursing.

Ms. Spiezio stated they have been very blessed with instructors for their day program and already have nurses with both MSNs and BSNs who are

interested in teaching in the evening/weekend program.

Ms. Johnson noted also interviewing an assistant director who is ready to take the position.

Ms. Spiezio addressed changes within the program in addition to new policies and procedures, including test taking strategies, starting NCLEX® prep right away, and prep at the end as well. She reported the majority of students in the last two cohorts have tested within two weeks of graduating.

Ms. Leitch commented that it is a very fulfilling moment when they see the fruits of their labors as instructors and working hands on with students directly to be a part of that lifechanging event. She noted that many of the students come from socioeconomically deprived areas and is an impetus for them to change their lives. She mentioned it to be rewarding to see the success rate and how their numbers have exponentially improved.

Chair Kmetz asked whether there were any issues with clinical sites. Ms. Spiezio explained that their clinical sites are all willing to open up to evenings and weekends. She mentioned they are currently working with St. Luke's Hospital to have students on the med-surg floor.

Ms. Johnson mentioned that some of the clinical sites may want them to come in a little bit earlier to be able to help them more and may have to juggle some timing on clinical days but are aware of that.

Chair Kmetz asked whether their acute-care hospitals are likely to hire LPNs in acute care. Ms. Spiezio explained that St. Luke's would hire LPNs. She noted they do have rotation with Doylestown Hospital and that Tower Health does hire LPNs for their urgent care, so students do get to experience urgent care.

Ms. Johnson mentioned that Chester County is hiring a lot of LPNs, and there would be a lot of opportunity for students who are open to traveling.

Ms. Leitch reported many of their clinical sites are hiring their graduates, noting that to be good evidence of the caliber of students that they are putting out to graduate.

Chair Kmetz informed Lansdale School of Business that the Board would deliberate in Executive Session and welcomed them to stay or attend virtually. She also noted they would receive a letter with the results.]

2 | [Matthew Eaton, Director of Operations, Bureau of

3 Professional and Occupational Affairs, and Medical

4 | Marijuana Advisory Board (MMAB) designee, explained

5 | the MMAB makes recommendations to the Secretary of

6 | Health regarding potential changes under the Medical

7 Marijuana Act (MMA). He noted the changes could

8 | include whether to change the types of medical

9 professionals who can issue certifications to

10 patients; whether to change, add, or reduce the types

11 of medical conditions which qualify as serious

12 | medical conditions under the MMA; whether to change

13 the form of medical marijuana permitted under the

14 MMA; or how to ensure affordable patient access to

15 | medical marijuana.

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Mr. Eaton addressed the process: MMAB making recommendations first; the Board would have to vote whether to recommend CRNPs' inclusion in the list of professions who can certify patients for medical marijuana; and then, if the Board approves, the second step would be for the MMAB to a draft report by the Regulatory Subcommittee related to the findings. He noted the reports may also include findings on recommendations not approved, or other

issues, other MMAB activities, general information,

and updates to the program itself.

Mr. Eaton explained that the reports would be presented to the MMAB for adoption at the next scheduled regulatory public meeting once they are drafted. He stated any adopted reports would be provided to the Secretary of Health, the Governor, the Senate, and the House of Representatives, and will be public record under the Right-to-Know Law.

Mr. Eaton noted the MMAB does not amend laws, and if the law does change based on MMAB's recommendations, the current chair, Acting Secretary of Health Debra Bogen, still has a year from that time to approve the recommendation.

Mr. Eaton stated the MMAB is looking to the State Board of Nursing to draft a letter supporting the recommendation that certified registered nurse practitioners also have the ability to certify a patient for medical marijuana based upon their education and training.

Mr. Eaton explained that the goal is to make lives easier for patients and believes nurse practitioners certifying patients would expand medical marijuana access and make it easier for patients to get the medicine they need.

Mr. Eaton also reported recent approval of the

- same authorization for licensed podiatrists in the
  state. He emphasized that it is only a
  recommendation, and the MMA has not changed. He
  noted podiatrists cannot certify medical marijuana at
  this time but that they would be drafting a report
  and adding podiatrists to the list.
  - Ms. Pachter Schulder asked whether there is any education having to do with medical marijuana that CRNPs receive while they are in school.

Dr. Bucher addressed the importance of safe prescribing and education and referred to a study in the Annals of Internal Medicine comparing nurse practitioners and physicians safe prescribing showing no difference. He believed there was current legislation talking about requiring education for nurse practitioners, physician assistants, and physicians on prescribing marijuana. He noted Pennsylvania is surrounded by states allowing nurse practitioners to prescribe marijuana. He believed nurse practitioners would be able to prescribe marijuana safely and improve access to care.

Adele Caruso, DNP, CRNP, Pennsylvania Coalition of Nurse Practitioners, commented that the study even showed slightly improved outcomes with nurse practitioners and prescribing.]

2 Committee Meetings - Stakeholder Updates
3 [Dr. Kmetz asked stakeholders to come before the
4 Board to discuss their legislative priorities and
5 successes.

Angelarosa DiDonato, DNP, CRNA, stated the Pennsylvania Association of Nurse Anesthetists, represents about 3,300 CRNAs and 500 students in the state. She noted Pennsylvania is one of the largest states of CRNAs in the country and that their mission is to advance the professionalism of the profession, promote quality of care, advocate for their students and members, and to educate. She reported Pennsylvania to be in a unique position and the keystone of education in the country when it comes to CRNAs.

Dr. DiDonato stated they educate about 13% of all the CRNAs nationally, noting that Pennsylvania has 14 schools with 3 developing schools. She mentioned that people come from all across the country to train in Pennsylvania.

Dr. DiDonato noted that their legislative priority is Senate Bill 899, which was introduced by Senator Judy Ward and has bipartisan support and is a full scope of practice bill. She reported 37 states

- 1 have gotten rid of all kinds of supervisory language.
- 2 | She noted their current regulations do not accurately
- 3 reflect what goes on in practice. She noted a lot of
- 4 CRNAs in Pennsylvania are practicing without an
- 5 | anesthesiologist present because facility regulations
- 6 say they need to practice with a proceduralist
- 7 physician.
- 8 Dr. DiDonato mentioned that it looks like CRNAs
- 9 are being supervised by those physicians but really
- 10 are not. She noted specialists are kind of siloed to
- 11 their own specialty and never held liable for
- 12 anesthesia outcomes, so they are not really
- 13 | supervising. She reported many facilities also
- 14 utilize the opt out that went on for the three years
- 15 during the pandemic and had really good results with
- 16 it. She noted the legislature had a little bit of a
- 17 | pilot program and it worked, so they might as well
- 18 just do the full scope.
- 19 Dr. DiDonato noted also having some advanced
- 20 practice registered nurse (APRN) legislation and are
- 21 | in conjunction with their nurse practitioner
- 22 | colleagues and clinical nurse specialist colleagues
- 23 that allows CRNAs, CRNPs, and CNSs to use the APRN
- 24 | title. She stated it is not a scope bill and does
- 25 | not change anything else because it is just a title

recognition bill. She noted cosponsorship is still being circulated and is hoping to see that introduced in 2024.

Ms. Pachter Schulder stated the Board has adopted regulations in proposed form for CRNAs and are going through the regulatory review process. She noted being in the process of making revisions to those regulations now, and the Annex would come back to the Board if there were any substantive changes.

Tom Dougherty, III, Government Relations

Specialist, Pennsylvania State Nurses Association
(PSNA), provided an update on their legislative goals
for the upcoming year and where they are currently at
with their organization. He referred to Senate Bill
25, noting it also has a congruent bill in the House
at House Bill 1825, which is the nurse practitioner
full practice authority legislation. He again noted
Senate Bill 25 would remove collaborative agreements
between a physician and a nurse practitioner (CRNP) to
allow CRNP's to be able to practice to their full
extent. He noted PSNA, alongside their Care for PA
Partners, went to the Capitol on October 17 to
introduce the House version of Senate Bill 25.

25 of Senate Bill 25 and that Representative Guenst and

Mr. Dougherty noted the Bill to be an exact copy

Representative Khan introduced the bill. He mentioned looking forward to continuing to push the Bill through the Pennsylvania House and Senate as they work closely with the Board and coalition partners.

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Mr. Dougherty further explained that it would remove collaborative agreements from prescriptive authority. He mentioned that one of the nice parts about removing that barrier is that it would allow for fluid staffing levels in rural areas.

Mr. Dougherty addressed House Bill 106, Patient Safety Act. He stated PSNA, alongside coalition partners, met with senators and read a press release from the American Nurses Association. The American Nurses Association, alongside PSNA, also supports the Nurse Staffing Standards for Hospital Patient Safety and Quality Care Act, which is House Resolution 2530, which would establish minimum nurse-to-patient ratios for every hospital. ANA supports nurse staffing ratios as a solution to solve the current crisis. Ιn addition to establishing minimum nurse-to-patient staffing requirements at the national level, House Resolution 2530 will help examine best practices for nurse staffing and provide whistleblower protections for nurses who cannot advocate for the safety of

their patients. Mr. Dougherty noted that is the first time ANA has ever come out in support of staffing ratios.

Mr. Dougherty addressed LPN Legislation and noted this past Thursday the PSNA Government Relations

Committee voted to recommend to the PSNA Board to support working LPN legislation that Senator Culver's office is introducing. He noted PSNA now represents LPNs and RNs in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and plans to support further initiatives that advance the LPN profession.

Mr. Dougherty explained that legislation being drafted would allow for LPNs to pronounce the death of a patient with a valid Do Not Resuscitate (DNR) in a licensed hospice. He noted PSNA looks forward to working with Senator Culver's office to ensure the legislation benefits the entire nursing and healthcare workforce.

Mr. Dougherty mentioned an area that he is interested in moving PSNA toward is elder abuse. He reported around one in six people 60 years and older experience some form of elder abuse according to a World Health Organization 2022 study. He noted PSNA will be working very closely potentially with Representative Tarik Khan to pursue further

legislation to protect vulnerable aging populations as the cases of elder abuse are on the rise.

Dr. Caruso reported, on behalf of the

Pennsylvania Coalition of Nurse Practitioners, that

Senate Bill 25 and House Bill 1825 are going forward.

She mentioned they had an exciting release on Capitol

Hill, noting it was well received with Representative

Guenst and cosponsor Tarik Khan. She is hoping to

have energy and enthusiasm from the CRNPs and to re
engage their base to get things going into the next

session.]

13 Regulations Update

[Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel, informed Board members that the status of regulations has not changed since she reported last month. She noted 16A-5139 Volunteer License regulation is back to being worked on by Regulatory Counsel to determine whether it will be one package or multiple packages but sent to the legislative committees and IRRC at the same time for the multiple boards that are involved.

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted working on comments received from Regulatory Counsel for 16A-5141 regarding the Nursing Education Programs.

Ms. Pachter Schulder stated the Board approved 16A-5143 in final form in June 2023, regarding Continued Competency and Licensure by Endorsement and is with Regulatory Counsel.

Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to 16A-5145 regarding CRNA Licensure, noting she would be working on comments from Regulatory Counsel.

Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed 16A-5146 regarding Opioid Prescription and Education and Organ Donation Education. She noted the regulation was published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, but the Board received no comments. She noted the Board is awaiting comments from the legislative committees and the Independent Regulatory Review Commission.

Ms. Pachter Schulder mentioned that any comments received from the Independent Regulatory Review Commission were informal, asking more about the process of other boards that are required to comply with the various laws. Ms. Pachter Schulder explained that as the Board goes through the regulation process and receives comments, then the other boards will start promulgating theirs as well. She noted CRNPs are required to certify on their renewal that they have the opioid education and are required by way of law to comply with the prescribing

requirements. She also noted the Board has determined the education CRNPs receive about prescription includes the opioid prescription curriculum that was adopted by the Board and has already been implemented.

Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed Organ Donation Education, noting she spoke to the federally approved organ donation organizations in Pennsylvania, and they anticipate the modules discussed with the Board would be available in January, so that education will be able to be obtained.

Ms. Pachter Schulder had nothing new to report concerning 16A-5147 regarding the Nurse Licensure Compact. She noted the Department is still awaiting information from the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) because they still have not approved the proposed language for an FBI-based criminal background check. She noted it to be a requirement of the Nurse Licensure Compact (Compact), where anybody who wants a Pennsylvania multistate license needs to apply for that license and have an FBI-based criminal background check. She noted the Board still does not have the legislative authority to do that. She explained the process, where the FBI would need to approve that language, then the statute would need

to be changed to include that particular language, and then that piece could be resolved.

Ms. Pachter Schulder stated the Board is looking at temporary regulations to implement the Compact, just in a way to explain to people how they take their Pennsylvania license and switch it over to a multistate license in Pennsylvania. She noted that PA multistate licensure requires an application and could not just switch current licensees from a single state to a multistate because Pennsylvania never required a federal criminal background check.

Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed the technology side, where work has been done to enable the Board to be able to implement the criminal background check and issue multistate licenses. She noted work has been done to prepare a document so the provider can go ahead and try to start working on making changes and additions to the PALs licensure system so that once the legislation is in place, the Board would have the technological capability to issue multistate licenses.

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted the Department partially implemented the Compact, and because licensees who hold multistate licenses in other states do not have to tell the Board or the

Commonwealth they are practicing here, the 1 2 Commonwealth does not have ways to know how many 3 nurses have availed themselves of that license. 4 explained that e-Notify is something the Department 5 recommended and told employers and schools that it is an option available but that the Board does not 6 7 collect any of that information. Ms. Pachter Schulder informed Board members that 8 9 the Annex and Preamble for the Commissioner's 10 regulation on Crimes Related to the Profession are 11 being drafted. 12 Dr. Bucher asked whether there was any other 13 avenue for the FBI approval other than another 14 letter. Ms. Pachter Schulder explained that there is 15 a back-and-forth dialogue between the Department and 16 the FBI, but the dialogue continues. She noted there is the federal States Handling Access to Reciprocity 17 18 for Employment (SHARE) Act introduced in Congress, 19 which would provide for federal background check 20 authority, so they would not need any state 21 legislation if the federal legislation went through.] 22 Pennsylvania Legislative Update

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted it to be the same thing for Senate Bill 941 for staffing flexibility for licensed addiction treatment programs, which was introduced on October 16.

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Ms. Miller stated the 2021-2022 NCLEX exam year results were distributed to the prelicensure nursing education programs, who had until Friday, October 27, to review their results and notify the Board of any errors on their reports. She mentioned that Kelly Hoffman has been assisting programs to correct their reports because students pick the wrong program from the dropdown and are on the wrong program report.

Ms. Miller stated they would have individual program results, the aggregate data, and how Pennsylvania compares with national trends for the December Board meeting as usual. She reported a positive trend that of the 24 RN programs on provisional following the 2021-2022 exam year, with one program closing, only one program would remain on provisional.

Ms. Miller also noted that of the 18 PN programs on provisional status following the 2021-2022 exam year, there are 10 PN programs coming off provisional, 8 PN programs continuing on provisional status, and 5 PN programs coming onto provisional status. She stated the Board would begin seeing the programs on provisional for three or more years starting at either the December or January Board meeting. Ms. Miller mentioned there was a lot of

concern going into April 1 about the effect of the Next Generation NCLEX®, but there does not appear to be any negative effect on NCLEX® pass rates.

She thanked Ann Marie Zvorsky for her hard work and dedication during her time with the Board as a Nursing Practice Advisor and then as a Nursing Education Advisor and wished her luck in her retirement.

Ms. Miller mentioned the Board presently has
Kelly Hoffman as their Nursing Education Advisor
assisted by Dr. Sue Petula as their Nursing Education
Advisor annuitant and Leslie House and Sue Bolig as
Nursing Practice Advisors. She also mentioned Dr.
Peggy Witmer is assisting as a Nursing Practice
Advisor Annuitant. She noted completing interviews
for an additional Nursing Education Advisor position
and is currently in the human resources (HR) process
for that.

Ms. Miller informed Board members that they would be posting the Nursing Education Advisor position recently vacated by Ann Marie and the vacant Nursing Practice Advisor position and encouraged anyone who is interested in a unique challenge to watch for the Nursing Practice Advisor and Nursing Education Advisor positions to be posted. She stated both

advisor roles require a master's degree in nursing and at least five years of practice in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Ms. Miller further explained that the Nursing Education Advisor needs at least three of those years to be spent in teaching or administration in an accredited professional prelicensure nursing education program. She stated the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania offers flexible telework arrangements to qualified candidates.

Ms. Miller mentioned that the nursing education program functions in the Education Program Portal and Information Communication Channel (eppiccNURSE) were transferred into PALS. She mentioned that the Advisors have been working with program directors and the controlling institution administrators on access. She noted that PALS and eppiccNURSE are very similar in terms of the questions being asked, but the format looks a little different. She mentioned that the Advisors have been assisting people with user guides until everybody gets used to the format and are working on getting user guides posted to the website for nursing education programs.

She stated Advisors are also working on changes in PALS that would allow prelicensure nursing education programs to download lists of current
