Regulatory Counsel regarding the Continued Competency
and Licensure by Endorsement regulation.

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted she is amending the Preamble and Annex for 16A-5145 regarding CRNA licensure.

Ms. Pachter Schulder also noted the Board still has not received any word from the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) regarding federal fingerprint-based criminal background checks for 16A-5147 regarding the NLC. She reported the federal legislation for States Handling Access to Reciprocity for Employment (SHARE) Act is not moving through Congress and is in a hold pattern.

Ms. Pachter Schulder advised that the Bureau continues to move forward with making technological changes to the Pennsylvania Licensing System (PALS) so that the Board would be able to start issuing multistate licenses once the NLC is fully implemented. She mentioned there could be a new RN/CRNP combined application, an RN/CNS combined application, and eventually an RN/CRNA combined application.

Ms. Pachter Schulder explained that until the RN is issued the CRNP/CNS/CRNA certification would not

be able to be issued. She further explained that
waiting for information to process the certificate
would not hold up the RN process.

Ms. Pachter Schulder had no further update regarding the Commissioner's Crimes Directly Related to the Profession regulation.

12 Appointment - DeSales University Proposal for a

13 | Pediatric Primary Care CRNP MSN and Post-Master's

14 | Certificate Program

15 [Carol Gullo Mest, PhD, RN, ANP-BC, FAANP, Chair,

16 | Graduate Nursing Programs, presented on behalf of

17 DeSales University.]

18 Dr. Gullo Mest explained that the Pediatric

19 Primary Care CRNP MSN and Post-Master's Certificate

20 Program has an additional concentration in

21 developmental, behavioral, and mental health issues

22 | in pediatric populations.

Dr. Gullo Mest stated many families noted their

24 children were having severe developmental,

25 behavioral, and mental health issues during COVID and

- 1 prompted her to include the pediatric nurse
- 2 practitioner program. She mentioned the waiting time
- 3 | could be 24 months or more for accessibility to
- 4 providers who can address that issue in pediatrics.
- 5 | She stated the PNP could work in an outpatient
- 6 primary care practice but still give the overview and
- 7 | the treatment of developmental, behavioral, and
- 8 mental health issues.
- Dr. Gullo Mest addressed having a flex format,
 where students could come into the classroom live and
 provides an opportunity for applicants from across
 the country. She discussed requirements for
 certification and the addition of a 30-hour pediatric
- 14 psychopharmacology course. She noted having a
- 15 pediatric nurse practitioner with over 15 years of
- 16 experience who would be willing to oversee the
- 17 program. She also noted they have access to a
- 18 pediatric psychiatrist who is also willing to help
- 19 with some of the courses that focus on the mental
- 20 health needs.
- 21 Dr. Gullo Mest mentioned she would likely be
- 22 submitting an expanded curriculum to meet not only
- 23 the American Association of Colleges of Nursing
- 24 (AACN) Essentials but also the National Task Force
- 25 (NTF) Standards, which requires 750 clinical hours,

1 noting that would likely change before they launch
2 the program.

Dr. Gullo Mest stated many pediatric practitioners, both nurse practitioners and physicians, have agreed to take on their students, along with having a long-term agreement with the Children's Integrated Center for Success in Allentown. She noted KidsPeace in Allentown has a great opportunity to focus on behavioral and mental health needs of children's families in the community and does not only address the child. She also noted having accessibility to student health centers at Lehigh University and Lafayette College.

Ms. Pachter Schulder stated the Board issues certificates to CRNPs in specialties but approves CRNP Programs by the Consensus Model populations and therefore would be approving this program as a pediatric primary care program without the mental health subspecialty because the Board does not approve or disapprove subspecialties.

Ms. Pachter Schulder further explained that the program is approved following a Board vote and then whatever a student needs to obtain in order to get the subspecialty would be DeSales University's responsibility. She noted this program would be

listed on the approved list as a pediatric primary care program.

Dr. Compher commented that eating disorders and obesity are among the conditions that nurse practitioners are likely to respond to for which there are not a lot of resources and asked whether their education program would give them the background they need if no referral centers are around.

Dr. Gullo Mest explained that focusing on the issue of having psychopharmacology would be a big help and the eating disorders and things like that are all covered in the syllabi.

Chair Kmetz referred to the joint appointment faculty member who would be their program director and asked how many hours they would be devoting to their joint appointment versus the position as a program director. She also asked how they would use simulation in a hybrid format when recruiting students from across the country. She mentioned that their preceptors are all in Pennsylvania and asked how they would get preceptors in remote locations if they anticipate getting more of a student body from across the country.

Dr. Gullo Mest stated the individual would be

transferred to full-time faculty. She explained that students are required to attend class at times, and it is not 100% online. She mentioned that a lot of times they have contacts with certain providers who could be a preceptor, where they reach out to them and get their curriculum vitae and information.

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted the Board would deliberate on this matter during Executive Session and welcomed them to continue attending the meeting virtually. She also noted the program would receive a letter from the Board advising of the results.]

Appointment - Fayette County Career & Technical
Institute - Extension of Provisional Status-Year 4
[Susan C. Lewis, MSN, RN, Practical Nursing Program
Director, Lorie Filitsky, and Elizabeth Shaw, BSN,
RN, Faculty Member, presented on behalf of Fayette
County Career & Technical Institute to discuss their request for an extension of the program's provisional status.

Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel, referred to Fayette County Career & Technical Institute's pass rate of 66.67% for the 2022-2023 examination year, noting fluctuations in the past few years with some good quarters, like quarters 3 and 4 in the last examination year over 75%. She requested information regarding the program's planned changes to improve their pass rate.

Ms. Lewis noted a lot of instructor turnover was part of the problem. She addressed the new curriculum change and reported seeing improvements with the new curriculum and implementation of remediation. She mentioned developing a professional development plan for their instructors and focusing on teaching methodologies to help improve student outcomes.

Ms. Lewis addressed their action plan, including a new faculty orientation plan with mentors to assist new instructors, along with developing a faculty evaluation tool focusing on the eight National League for Nursing (NLN) competencies for novice nursing instructors. She reported having the same three instructors but mentioned the difficulty in finding another instructor and people who are prepared to teach Next Generation NCLEX® questions and case

studies.

Ms. Lewis addressed Fayette's pass rate turnaround with the implementation of Assessment Technologies Institute (ATI) and preparation for the Next Generation NCLEX® and believed they are on the upswing.

Ms. Pachter Schulder asked when Ms. Lewis plans on implementing the faculty development changes. Ms. Lewis stated they would be implementing some of those faculty development changes immediately before they put it in their policies and procedures. She noted their new term starts in January and have already had a few professional development in-service days to start the formative assessments and different teaching methodologies. She also mentioned having an instructional coach to help in real time as well.

Dr. Hunsberger asked whether they traced students who have been unsuccessful back to exams within the program.

Ms. Lewis noted utilizing many ATI modules and students scoring better on their proctored exams with the use F.A. Davis and Osmosis. She mentioned considering using another test exam and working on finding a cost-effect test bank system.

Dr. Hunsberger asked Ms. Lewis to consider

sending faculty to training to write their own questions because many questions in commercial item banks can be found on the internet.

Dr. Hunsberger noted being impressed with Fayette and appreciated their professional development plan to invest not only in their curriculum but also their instructors.

Ms. Pachter Schulder informed Ms. Lewis that the Board would discuss the extension of provisional status in Executive Session and welcomed her to continue to attend in person but noted she could attend virtually and would also receive a letter from the Board.]

Appointment - Great Lakes Institute of Technology Extension of Provisional Status-Year 6

[Cindy Atwell, Practical Nursing Program Director,
and Dawne Pelky, RN, Practical Nursing Program

Instructor, presented on behalf of Great Lakes

Institute of Technology's request for an extension of
its provisional status.

Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted that Great Lakes Institute's pass rate is currently at 66.67%, with pass rates of 57.14% in the first quarter, 77.78% in the second quarter, 0% in

the third quarter and 62.50% in the last quarter and requested an update in terms of the closure of the program and what is being done for students.

Ms. Atwell reported all four students passed their National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX®) on their first attempt in the September 2023 graduating class. She noted changes have been made to the curriculum with ATI and it is working. She also noted utilizing F.A. Davis, where instructors are no longer making up their own exams. She mentioned working closely with students and have added tutoring. She noted a class would be graduating in December and then one more class of 10 students graduating in March 2024, which would be the end of the program.

Dr. Hunsberger commented that it is much better for faculty to learn to write their own questions and have a program going from easier questions to more difficult questions to have more success. He also mentioned that all commercial item bank questions are available online, and students could see the questions ahead of time.

Dr. Hunsberger requested more information regarding simulation and student satisfaction surveys with the simulation. Ms. Pelky stated they have been

doing more simulation, especially with maternity and other things like cardiac and respiratory problems with Lucy.

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted the importance of the

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted the importance of the Board to ensure that the remaining students are getting an education that would prepare them for the practice of nursing. She commented that having them return again several more times may not be in their interest or even in the Board's interest in light of the closure after the March term. She stated the Board is going to deliberate during Executive Session in terms of the length of the extension and welcomed Great Lakes Institute to participate virtually but also noted they would receive a letter from the Board concerning their decision.]

[Khadijah Williams, MSN-ED, RN, Director of Nursing;

Jessica Bellerby-Williamson, Student Services; and

Jeffery Mann, Campus Director, presented on behalf of
Prism Career Institute's request for an extension of

5 its provisional approval status.

Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel, commented that the Board is pleased with the 2022-2023 76% NCLEX® pass rate level given that the prior year the pass rate was 70.77% but needs Prism Career Institute to get to the 80% level.

Dr. Williams acknowledged not getting to 80% last year but noted they began working with a consultant to help ensure their curriculum is in alignment with the blueprint for NCLEX® for student success. She believed they are seeing the fruits of the consultant's recommendations, including grade percentages being at least 85-90% assessment based and enhancing PowerPoints, along with utilizing F.A. Davis.

Dr. Williams addressed the percentage of exam questions versus other types of measurement where exam percentage is about 35%, final and midterm 25%, along with ATI assignments. She mentioned the importance of ensuring that most of the grade is through assessments.

Dr. Kmetz asked whether there was a relationship between the students' quality point average (QPA) and first-time NCLEX $^{\circledR}$ pass rate.

Dr. Williams explained that they researched that over the years, and it varied and was not consistent. She discussed utilizing Mountain Measurements and enhancing topics in the curriculum that were issues for students. She noted working with ATI and F.A. Davis to ensure they are maximizing resources for students with critical thinking and clinical judgment. She also discussed utilizing test banks as a guide.

Dr. Kmetz asked whether any feedback was received from students regarding why they were unsuccessful passing NCLEX® the first time. Dr. Williams stated a lot of the feedback is anxiety and not reading the question. She mentioned assisting students with the testing environment and managing time on questions in their testing strategy course.

Dr. Hunsberger asked whether Prism Career

Institute administers exams through ATI and whether
there is a review at the end of the program.

Dr. Williams noted utilizing the Canvass Learning Management System, along with proctored exams through ATI. She noted they have an ATI three-day review,

which will be paid by the school effective January 2, 2024.

Ms. Hertzler asked whether students are now testing sooner.

Dr. Williams noted they promote that student should test as quickly as possible because they are less likely to pass if they wait. She mentioned having a career service representative who works with students directly through the testing process.

Mr. Mann thanked the Board for their support and Ms. Hoffman for her assistance with the Education Program Portal and Information Communication Channel (eppiccNURSE). He also thanked the Board for their suggestion of getting a consultant.

Dr. Williams mentioned not being in contact with the consultant recently but noted hiring an academic coordinator in July 2023 to ensure they are meeting guidelines and recommendations. She addressed students who have taken the test since October, noting 22 takers and 19 who passed with 11 outstanding and 9 graduates who graduated in the previous cohort.

Ms. Pachter Schulder advised that the Board will deliberate in Executive Session and welcomed them to continue to listen but that they would also receive a

letter from the Board regarding their decision. She anticipated the Board would have them return sooner than the next examination year.

Mr. Mann referred to an item on the docket from the Department of Education in July 2024, where Prism Career Institute would have to reduce program hours from 1560 to 1500. He stated those 60 hours are used for preparatory math and test-taking strategies.

Ms. Pachter Schulder explained that those are federal regulations of the U.S. Department of Education and not something the Board could control. She stated programs have made a request to the Board to consider increasing the number of hours from 1500. She noted the legislature would have to do that because the required hours are set in the statute. She encouraged anyone who feels strongly about the need to change the minimum education hours to contact their legislators about such a change.

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted the U.S. Department of Education had not implemented the regulations previously and may or may not enforce them on July 1. She mentioned that programs who need to decrease their number of hours may have to submit a curriculum change in order to obtain the Title funding. She explained that if the federal regulation is

implemented by the USDOE and there is not a statute
change, then affected programs would need to get that
curriculum change to the Board.]

Miscellaneous - Appointment - Orleans Technical
College Proposal for Implementation of a
Pre-licensure Practical Nursing Program
[Rodney Brutton, Campus President; Elvis Falbo,
Consultant; and Linda Caputi, EdD, MSN, RN, CNE,
ANEF, Nursing Education Consultant, presented on
behalf of Orleans Technical College.

Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted that this application was on the agenda last month, but the matter was tabled because the information provided during the presentation to the Board was different than what was in the written proposal. She noted the Board also had questions about the various clinical sites for student experiences in Obstetrics (OB) and maybe Med-Surg. She asked Orleans Technical College to explain where these clinical experiences are going to take place.

Mr. Brutton outlined Orleans' simulation plan as it relates to OB, pediatrics, and mental health. Mr. Falbo advised that Orleans would be purchasing simulation equipment for the pediatrics program with

manikins and software, along with Laerdal Scenario

Cloud. Mr. Falbo noted they would be utilizing mid
fidelity manikin, along with tapping into the Laerdal

Scenario Cloud for scenarios for OB.

Mr. Falbo indicated that they would be using standardized patients for mental health because it increases fidelity for the student and greater interaction. He referred to plan B regarding the budget, faculty development, and training. He stated all of the simulations would be following the International Nursing Association for Clinical Simulation and Learning (INACSL). Mr. Falbo noted a pre-brief and actual simulation done by a facilitator simulationist would be provided, along with a robust debrief.

Mr. Brutton addressed staff and faculty, noting not only the nurse administrator but all full-time faculty would be trained at Drexel University's simulation program. He noted the Practical Nurse program is not expected to start till June 2024 and would be purchasing the equipment within the next couple of weeks to ensure the equipment is on site. He also noted that provides time to hire faculty and staff and build out the simulation lab.

Chair Kmetz asked whether any of the faculty

would be simulation certified or whether there is a plan to have somebody simulation certified on the site. Mr. Brutton explained that it is part of the staff development through Drexel University where the nurse administrator as well as all full-time faculty would be trained through Drexel's simulation program.

Dr. Hunsberger asked whether they had a nurse educator's input regarding the proposed Practical Nurse program. Dr. Caputi stated she would continue to work with staff as they hire the director and faculty regarding item writing and the importance of knowing how to write different level test questions and active learning.

Dr. Kmetz requested information concerning obtaining acute care hospital partners. Mr. Brutton noted reaching out to several area hospitals for acute care clinical experience but none of them were interested in practical nursing program partnerships and have partnered with the PHMC outpatient ambulatory care setting to allow students to get that clinical or practical experience in those specialty areas to include mental health, pediatric nursing, and OB. Dr. Kmetz encouraged Orleans to continue to periodically reach out because the market trend is seeing more and more LPNs coming back into acute care

and may open up more interest.

Chair Kmetz referred to total clinical hours and asked what percentage would be by simulation in acute care and via outpatient. Mr. Brutton stated 50% would be simulation and the remaining 50% with outpatient until they find acute care. He noted students would not receive any medical-surgical, operating room, or emergency room experience unless they supplement that through simulation.

Mr. Falbo stated there are simulation scenarios available where they could tap into acute settings and apply that to the LPN level.

Dr. Hunsberger asked how many students would actually go through it with simulation being at 50%. He also asked whether they are prepared for the cost of simulation. Mr. Falbo addressed best standards when performing simulation and mentioned keeping it simple so the ratio is not as big to help increase learning.

Mr. Brutton stated they are focusing on simulation as it relates to pediatric, mental health, and OB care and not the entire program.

Chair Kmetz asked where they would get medical-surgical experience caring for adult clients. Dr.

Caputi explained that it would be in the clinic and

outpatient areas where they have rehab that the patients would go to before they are discharged.

Mr. Brutton provided examples of facilities, including St. John Neumann and Fox Subacute that offer all of the scope of care for those who are in a rehabilitation or extended care facility.

Dr. Hunsberger expressed concern with students being prepared in rehabilitation facilities because clients need 3 hours of therapy a day, where 3 out of the 8 hours would not be with patients. He also stated students would not see changes in conditions because those patients have already made it through the acute care stage.

Dr. Caputi commented that there is a lot of experience students can receive from rehab, subacute care, and transitional care. She also mentioned some of the long-term care facilities have challenging patients. She mentioned that acute care facilities are not hiring LPNs onto those acute care floors but that the director would constantly look for facilities. She noted they may have to do more acute care kind of scenarios and simulations in the simulation lab with an adult simulator at that point as well until they are able to get into an acute care facility. She noted they would be utilizing in-

person face-to-face simulation and no virtual simulation would be used in the program.

Chair Kmetz stated the Board is trying to determine the student's exposure to medical-surgical adult health because they have to be able to practice to the full extent of their licensure and meet regulations for education.

Dr. Caputi referred to the transitional care, rehab, and subacute care. She again noted they could work on augmenting with simulation and maybe do more standardized patients as an adult even before they get a manikin until Mr. Brutton finds agencies willing to host LPN students.

Dr. Hunsberger expressed concern with there being a need for the program in their community if they are unable to find a medical-surgical unit.

Mr. Brutton referred to their application and feasibility study and said that there is a clearly identified need for LPNs, not only by their clinical partners but also external employer partners. He also reported their outreach identified a number of interested job seekers who would be interested in joining their practical nursing program. He thought their existing partners covered the scope of care, including med-surg, so additional outreach would be

made and specifically asking about the scope of care the Board is requesting.

Ms. Pachter Schulder again asked where they anticipate acute care experiences coming from, noting they only mentioned a long-term care nursing facility. Dr. Petula commented that long-term care certainly has a variety of very complex patients, but the concern is to make certain that the program evaluates the skill mix because LPNs do need to be under the supervision of an RN and not paired with another LPN. She referred to the National League for Nursing, noting it has an excellent Simulation Innovation Resource Center.

Ms. Pachter Schulder questioned whether the employers or the individuals who responded to their survey concerning the need for LPNs are the ones that have made clinical opportunities available to their students.

Mr. Brutton noted Ms. Pachter Schulder to be correct, stating that St. John Neumann is an adult long-term care facility, as well as Fox Subacute.

Ms. Pachter Schulder informed Orleans Technical
College that the Board would deliberate during
Executive Session and welcomed them to continue
listening virtually but also noted they would receive

18 [Ms. Pachter Schulder referred members to NCLEX® Pass

19 Rate Results for further discussion. She noted the

20 RN pass rate for the national average is 86.74, and

21 that Pennsylvania was 90.70, and for the PN, the

22 | national average was 84.49 and Pennsylvania was

23 83.34. So noted that there are many more states that

24 are catching up or have caught up and maybe even

25 surpassed Pennsylvania's pass rate which in the past

was in the top ten.

Chair Kmetz indicated that this was addressed at NCSBN's Annual Meeting by Phil Dickison due to the nationwide concern that NCLEX® was going to be more difficult with the advent of the NextGen version.

Nonetheless, the pass rates superseded anything that the licensing boards ever thought they would, and it was pointed out very succinctly that when the COVID years are taken out, the pass rates on the NCLEX® are the same as they were before COVID in terms of results.

It was noted that there are students who are not good test takers, students who are anxious, and that the idea with a clinical judgment model is these nurses need to better prepare to be able to make clinical judgment. Also the Covid challenges affected different programs in different ways, and different programs came up with different strategies to compensate—some which were very successful and some which were not so successful. It was also noted that it is still a question that has to be answered through additional research of the performance of these individuals in the clinical arena.]

25 | English Language Proficiency Examinations Update

[Leslie House, MSN, RN, Nursing Practice Advisor, updated the Board about English Language Proficiency (ELP) Examinations and reported that NCSBN has not issued an update since the Board last discussed these examinations in 2020. The Board discussed whether it should accept at-home versions of ELP examinations, which it currently does not.

Ms. House explained that ProctorU and Yardstick merged and have increased their ability to be more precise in the security of their options. She indicated that the available option for the additional security when a person is testing on their at-home computer is called Live+, advanced software with human oversight and validation to create a testing environment that prevents cheating, reduces workload, and ensures an equitable experience for test takers. Proctors continuously monitor the session and have active interventions if misconduct does occur and a comprehensive reporting system that goes along with that.

Ms. House indicated that it also detects patterns of suspicious activity like extra movement or someone else entering a room and that an interventionist would be brought into the session to determine if there is a situation and would follow through by

making the company aware of it. All else would remain the same with regard to testing at home.

She reported that NCSBN CEO Phil Dickison, did a presentation regarding remote proctoring form at the Midyear Meeting for 2021 and indicated this is time to begin researching it more and putting things into action as it is becoming more prevalent.

Ms. House was asked to provide additional information about whether other boards of nursing have decided to allow the at home option. She was also asked to ascertain which of the Board-approved providers include a similar Live+ action as an alternative.

Ms. House noted that CGFNS announced on its website that at-home versions of the test would not be accepted. Ms. Pachter Schulder indicated that a list of all the exams currently approved by the Board are listed on the Board's website.]
