Kmetz, PhD, RN, Chair, exited the meeting 19 at 9:34 a.m. for recusal purposes.] \* \* \* 20 21 VICE CHAIR COUGHLIN ASSUMED THE CHAIR 22 23 Appointment - UPMC St. Margaret School of Nursing 24 Request to Increase Enrollment 25 [Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel,

informed Dr. Lake that the Board received their
materials and asked her to discuss their proposal to
increase enrollment and how it fits in with pass
rates and provisional status.

Santa Ann Lake, EdD, RN, CNE, Director, UPMC St. Margaret School of Nursing, informed Board members that UPMC's plan was to increase enrollment by 50 percent after looking at the need for increased nursing and recognized that was not an option after receiving provisional status but wanted to petition to increase by 15 percent.

Dr. Lake stated UPMC St. Margaret was placed on provisional status in 2021 due to a 73.3 percent National Council Licensure Examination® (NCLEX®) pass rate and that they would remain on provisional status due to a 78.72 percent pass rate in 2022, noting one student failed after waiting eight months to test.

Dr. Lake addressed multiple assessment measures to ensure adequate resources and personnel to support an increase in enrollment, including maximizing space, increasing staff, a student success and engagement manager, and clinical sites. She explained that she is requesting 3.5 full-time equivalents (FTEs) to manage clinical and classroom support for 18 total additional seats.

Dr. Lake commented that one other student has not tested but was provided resources. She mentioned they cannot track and monitor without the temporary practice permit (TPP) to see if someone tested and was not successful and were unaware the student had not tested, where they believed they has 80 percent going into the last quarter.

Dr. Lake further discussed the role of the student success and engagement manager, including student assessment and barriers and helps coordinate the academic support program, to be an advocate for students and faculty. She also addressed recruitment of faculty.

Ms. Pachter Schulder informed Dr. Lake that the Board would deliberate on the matter and vote after Executive Session and that she would also receive a letter regarding the results. She explained that the Board has received requests from other programs on provisional status and has tabled those requests pending the accomplishment of full approval status.]

[Linda L. Kmetz, PhD, RN, Chair, reentered the meeting at 9:46 a.m.]

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CHAIR KMETZ RESUMED THE CHAIR

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Appointment - Request for an Extension of Provisional Status - Prism Career Institute [Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel, informed Prism Career Institute that the Board is aware of the 2021-2022 pass rate for Prism at 70.77 percent with 130 test takers, 76.02 percent in 2020- with 171 test takers, and 2019-2020 at 73.15She requested Prism Career Institute discuss the information received from their consultant. 

Khadijah Williams, RN, Assistant Director of Nursing, Prism Career Institute, informed Board members that their consultant, Carol Duell, RN, has been instrumental in assisting with the program overall by reevaluating practices, systems, and policies by aligning their philosophy and program learning outcome and making it more cohesive.

Ms. Williams addressed the curriculum, noting Board members previously raised questions of inflation concerning grades. She stated Ms. Duell provided feedback to manage and increase grade and weight categories to strengthen and create more integrity. She also noted Ms. Duell provided feedback concerning remediation and testing to mimic

the NCLEX®.

Ms. Pachter Schulder asked whether Ms. Williams being the Interim and Latisha Hayes, DNP, APRN-BC, Director of Nursing, returning in several months had any impact on implementing the consultant's suggestions. She also requested information regarding whether Ms. Duell would be reviewing what is being implemented and not just making the recommendation.

Ms. Williams explained that Dr. Hayes is aware of Ms. Duell's recommendations and was a part of the process. She informed Board members that Ms. Duell would be helping throughout the process and not just providing recommendations to be able to streamline everything more appropriately.

Ms. Williams noted Prism utilizes Mountain
Measurements to find weaknesses, where they have
created more opportunities for remediation and
training, along with the Assessment Technologies
Institute (ATI) to provide more resources.

Ms. Williams addressed testing scores, grade point average (GPA), and NCLEX® results per cohort. She commented that the Test of Essential Academic Skills (TEAS) passers as well as the failures of the first-time NCLEX® testing were similar concerning

scores but noted passers had a slightly higher score
as opposed to the failures with the English component
and would be looking at possible adjustments. She
noted having about five students in both day and
evening classes, where English is not their first
language.

Ms. Williams addressed GPA data where someone with a 3.0 had better success but noted that is not always consistent and would require more research. She mentioned the recommendation by the Board to have a consultant, where Ms. Duell provided a lot of perspective and insight on improving the curriculum overall.

Ms. Pachter Schulder requested information regarding remediation efforts for English as a second language students and students with lower math and science scores.

Ms. Williams explained that instructors are alerted once they recognize English to be an issue for students and offer individual tutoring sessions. She noted ATI provides resources for students who have English as a second language. She mentioned that students with a low math or science score are identified early by their TEAS score and are provided weekly remediation with Prism personnel at the

beginning of the program for added support.

Ms. Williams addressed Prism's 21-day provisionary status, where once a student passes the TEAS and admission testing, they are assessed for 21 days free of charge, looking for issues that may prevent them from being successful. She stated students are invited to reapply at a later time if they have issues that would impede their success.

Chair Kmetz reminded everyone that the exam year by regulation is calculated October 1 to September 30 and that is the standard by which every school is evaluated.

Ms. Williams addressed tutoring, noting Prism has instructors who are registered nurses and teaching assistants who are licensed practical nurses who assist with tutoring. She explained that case studies are utilized to discuss the overall content or subject matter regarding what they are learning so principles are understood.

Chair Kmetz asked whether Prism has made any progress in looking at reliability and validity of their test items through data.

Ms. Williams explained that Prism is in the early stages of the consultation relationship, but validity of test items is on the agenda to be recognized and

1 addressed. She addressed customizing and creating 2 test items.

Carol Duell, MSN, RN, PN Program Coordinator,

Eastern Center for Arts and Technology, commented
that she has been working with Prism since midOctober, where grade inflation was a concern and they
relied on too much remediation. She also noted the
need for additional face-to-face instruction and
making the curriculum more concise.

Ms. Pachter Schulder asked whether recommendations were made to help students succeed on the exam who had the prior curriculum and are set to graduate soon.

Ms. Duell noted recommending ATI Live Review for students in the program soon to graduate. She mentioned the framework of the curriculum is almost completed and that they would start reviewing the actual theory and presentation of the four nursing courses, along with the Next Generation and electronic exam system at the beginning of January.

Dr. Coughlin requested information concerning cohorts and class size.

Ms. Williams explained that Prism has four cohorts during the day and three in the evening, noting a reduction in class size to 30 and under

after the recommendation from the Board. She

commented that the Prism Admissions Committee decides

who is eligible for the program, along with having

the 21-day provisional status. She addressed Prism

Career Services regarding the tracking and graduation

process and Prism Student Services for students who

have issues and concerns.

Ms. Pachter Schulder informed Ms. Williams that the Board would deliberate on Prism's request during Executive Session and appreciates Prism hiring a consultant and trying to effectuate Ms. Duell's recommendations. She noted the Board would vote after Executive Session whether to continue the provisional status.]

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Appointment - Clinical Agency Site Approval Process for the State Board of Private Licensed Schools
[Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted prior Board discussion concerning State Board of Private Licensed Schools (SBPLS) under the Department of Education and what role they have with enterprise programs and their review on behalf of the Department of Education for licensed practical nurse (LPN) and registered nurse (RN) programs.

Nicole Campbell, MATL, Division Chief, Division

of Law Enforcement Education and Trade Schools,

Pennsylvania Department of Education, informed Board

members that she and Wendy Miller and her team had

conversations regarding PN programs where the State

Board of Nursing believed the SBPLS was scrutinizing

certain aspects of PN programs that they were not.

Ms. Campbell stated all of their licensed schools offering PN programs have been mandated to submit a new program application for their existing program this August so it can be approved under the SBPLS. She mentioned that the SBPLS's regulation covers more of the educational components and business activities, whereas the State Board of Nursing is providing the expertise of the curriculum and structure of that education. She reported joining forces and getting programs approved under SBPLS licensure.

Ms. Campbell stated PN programs are different than their other programs that require the use of remote site locations. She explained that their remote sites are hands-on facilities that allow students to practice skills that would otherwise not be able to be in a school environment. She noted that PN students who may not always be going to that same remote location have space at the clinical site

of their choice or be offered the services for training on the skills.

Ms. Campbell addressed discussion with Nancy
Decker, Vice Chair, SBPLS, to create ways to not
burden the school or the site. She stated many sites
are not going to be interested in having the SBPLS
come into their facilities requesting documents
because all of that has been approved by the State
Board of Nursing or Department of Health.

Ms. Campbell explained that the SBPLS would typically request a Certificate of Occupancy and Facility Floor Plan, which the Department of Health would have obtained; signed Written Agreement; and Surety Agreement. She explained that the SBPLS is looking at accepting the State Board of Nursing's approval of that site.

Ms. Campbell noted that once the school is approved for the program by the SBPLS, during their licensure renewals and compliance audits, they would be further asking for confirmation of those approved sites. She asked whether the SBPLS would be able to have access to the Education Program Portal and Information Communication Channel (eppiccNURSE) or need to use the school's sign-on in order to be able to receive confirmation of the approved sites.

Ms. Campbell also wanted to confirm with the Board of Nursing values the SBPLS's visit and whether the Nurse Board has an interested in them continuing to do that. The Board indicated that it desired the visits to continue.

Ms. Campbell also asked whether there was a standard clinical site agreement because of concern as to whether the site or the instructor for the school is responsible for the student when on clinical sites. Ms. Pachter Schulder noted that clinical agreements are private agreements between the program and the clinical site. She commented that the clinical site would be responsible for a slip and fall but believed the responsibility for the nursing care provided by the student would be the nursing education program.

Wendy Miller, MSN, RN, Executive Secretary, stated the responsibility for the patient stays with the facility and the nurse assigned to care for that patient, but the school and instructor are responsible for the student in terms of oversight and evaluation of the student.

Sue Petula, PhD, MSN, RN, NEA-BC, FRE, Nursing Education Advisor, commented that they always refer to regulations in terms of requirements but that the

agreements typically are written. She noted there is no standard format, but faculty is responsible for students and the facility for patient management. She noted there could be a shared issue if there is an error and the standard of care is not being followed by a faculty member or individuals were not oriented to the exact student policy and procedure.

Maribeth Wilt-Seibert, Counsel, SBPLS, agreed with the explanation and believed that confirms SBPLS's stance that they do not understand the need to make visits to institutions that have already been approved in eppiccNURSE but would ask for copies of the agreement as part of the process and rely on the eppiccNURSE notation to say the institution itself is licensed.

Ms. Campbell addressed the site visit, where the school is responsible for providing SBPLS with the Certificate of Occupancy, Facility Floor Plan, and Site Agreement, in addition to maintaining surety on that location and paying a site visit fee. She noted SBPLS would conduct a site visit and have a tour of the facility to ensure everything is safe, space is adequate, and look for possible concerns with students in the facility. She commented that their site visit is surface compared to qualifying for a

Certificate of Occupancy and the Department of Health's approval.

Dr. Petula noted this is something the Board looks to SBPLS to address and is unlike what nursing addresses. She stated the Board receives detailed information and makes a site visit for an initial program.

Dr. Petula addressed eppiccNURSE for ongoing programs in terms of new agencies being submitted, where programs could identify sites. She mentioned there was an efficiency issue, where programs were getting approvals by postal service and taking 45-60 days, and eppiccNURSE created an efficiency for site approval within 24-48 hours. She noted the Board approves sites electronically and an Excel spreadsheet identifying all Board approvals for clinical agencies is also available. She provided a list of what the Board looks at during a site visit.

Dr. Petula commented that the additional requirements of SBPLS are not part of the Board's regulations and were a comfort and assurance to the Board that requirements were meeting student needs.

Ms. Campbell noted they would still be continuing the school site visits and the only ones they do not see them adding any additional value in their site

visits are the clinical sites that have already received other approvals.

Dr. Petula commented that the continuum of care is across the lifespan from birth through senescence and has gone far beyond the walls of an acute care facility because there are only certain experiences that could be garnered there. She stated that experiences in home health, community health, and public health have expanded.

Dr. Petula stated the majority of universities and colleges have very few PN programs and that PN programs are now mainly in vocational centers, technical schools, and private licensed schools. She noted clinical agencies are sometimes hard to come by for many PN programs and have clinical site coordinators often making the arrangements. She mentioned seeing more clinical site coordinators because of the complexity and nature of clinical agencies and academic practice partnerships.

Nancy Decker, Vice Chair, SBPLS, commented that SBPLS is not looking to the SBPLS to have their staff make visits to all of the clinical sites. She stated they that they visit the school and check out classrooms but do not go to clinical sites for any program. She noted it is through affiliation

agreements that the schools submit showing they have an affiliation agreement with that facility, but there is not a site inspection of every facility that schools use.

Ms. Campbell stated the clinical sites are oftentimes externships rather than courses where the teacher is present and the lab skills are being taught onsite, so a lot of their clinical sites are built on externships, which they would not visit.

Ms. Miller asked whether the SBPLS does any type of site visit for clinical sites that have an instructor in a program within a private licensed school.

Ms. Campbell explained that they would do a site visit if they are not out on externship because it would be classified as a remote location and require a site visit. She stated they are looking to classify the PN clinical sites more as externships because of all of the additional paperwork and approvals that have been received.

Dr. Hunsberger agreed with considering clinical sites to be like an externship, noting PennWest University has two campuses and 15-20 different clinical sites and may decide to not want to have clinical students there because of all of the site

visits.

Dr. Coughlin commented that the sheer number to visit all of the sites would create a hurdle and agreed that multiple visits to a site would be unnecessary. She noted being comfortable with students having a clinical instructor present.

Ms. Pachter Schulder commented that SBPLS can treat them like an externship but still have their policy written in such a way that there is an understanding for the PN and RN clinicals where they are not externships but are, in terms of the inspection procedure, being treated the same way as externships.

Ms. Campbell commented that they would issue a policy memorandum for the PN programs enabling them to say in lieu of the requirements for a PN program as a remote site and have conditions and state the rationale for why that was permitted.

Ms. Decker addressed student complaints, noting they only review complaints that apply to their regulatory oversight but would see a complaint through and follow up on any complaints concerning inadequate clinical sites. She noted complaint procedures could be found in the school catalogue, and a Clinical Affiliation Agreement is signed with

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1 every clinical agency.

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Ms. Pachter Schulder asked whether the SBPLS was looking for a motion and suggested the State Board of Nursing understands that the SBPLS will treat clinical sites for nursing programs similar in terms of inspection to how it treats externships for other programs licensed by private licensed schools.

Ms. Wilt-Siebert stated the Board could either wait for the policy to be written or take action at this time with the understanding of being in accordance with the policy that they intend to issue.

Ms. Pachter Schulder asked Board members whether they wanted to vote today on an understanding or wait until the January Board meeting to actually see the draft policy, and Board members agreed to wait until the policy is drafted.]

- Ms. Pachter Schulder informed Board members that in making those changes, it was noted that other provisions in § 21.413(d) included "intravenous" so additional amendment to the Annex is required. She recommended that subsection (d)(1) would read, "the specific amount of conscious sedation medications has been ordered in writing by a licensed physician or certified registered nurse practitioner and a licensed physician or certified registered nurse practitioner is physically present in the room during administration."
- Ms. Pachter Schulder also referred to (d)(2), and recommended that it be amended to read, "written guidelines specifying the medications that the registered nurse may administer in a particular setting are available to the registered nurse." She stated the Board already has Volunteer Health License regulations but would need to make amendments in accordance with changes to the 2014, 2007, and 2004 laws.

Ms. Pachter Schulder had nothing new to report on 16A-5141 regarding Nursing Education Programs.

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted 16A-5143 regarding Continued Competency and Licensure by Endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 6311 was published in the Pennsylvania Bulletin on December 10 and is now in the public comment period. She mentioned the Board would re-deliver the package to the Legislative Committees and IRRC and then receive comments from those entities when the Legislature returns the third week in January as this is a sine die year.

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted 16A-5144 regarding the CRNP Statement of Policy was adopted today in final as amended.

Ms. Pachter Schulder informed Board members that 16A-5145 regarding CRNA Licensure was approved but fees needed further discussion with the Revenue

1 Office.

Ms. Pachter Schulder informed Board members that 16A-5146 regarding Additional Continuing Education was sent to Regulatory Counsel for review on June 10.

Ms. Pachter Schulder had nothing new to report on 16A-5147 regarding the Nurse Licensure Compact (NLC) because she had not received any further information from the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) regarding approval of mandatory language. She reminded everyone that the language would need approved by the FBI, then passed as an amendment to the NLC by the legislature and signed by Governor Wolf. Thereafter, the regulatory and technology pieces can proceed.

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs (BPOA) regulation regarding Crimes directly related to the profession were published on November 19. She informed Board members that the package would come back to the Board for their review.

Ms. Miller strongly encouraged everyone to complete their renewal as soon as possible, particularly if they have not done the mandatory 2 hours of Child Abuse Recognition and Reporting Continuing Education because receiving confirmation from a Board-approved provider takes time.

Ms. Miller encouraged everyone to review their answers before submitting their renewal application. She reported a larger than normal group of licensees submitting renewals and answering no to having completed their required continuing education. She noted that causes the licensee to get an autogenerated email from the system requiring the upload of documentation that also changes the renewal of those licenses to a manual process. She stated licenses should automatically renew once their documentation matches.

Ms. Miller mentioned that she and the Advisors have been working very hard to get the Prelicensure Annual Report and CRNP Annual Report released on December 1. She addressed issues with program directors regarding the Prelicensure Annual Report, noting IT is aware of issues and working on it.

Ms. Miller reminded everyone to go to their program's registration page for both CRNP and

1 prelicensure to review and update the information.

9 from October 1, 2021, through September 30, 2022.

10 | She provided documents for the Board's review. She

11 | noted the five-year NCLEX® results are on the Board's

12 website and included in the report with the update

13 for this examination year. She also noted the

14 information is available on the National Council of

15 | State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN) website.

16 Ms. Miller mentioned the RN pass rates for

17 | Associate Degree in Nursing (ADN) programs, Bachelor

18 of Science in Nursing (BSN) programs, and Diploma

19 programs are broken down by credential earned. She

20 also provided a document looking at different states

21 and the United States averages broken down by

22 quarter, along with an updated list of Board-approved

23 Programs for RNs and PNs.

Ms. Miller reported five Associate Degree in

25 Nursing programs, five BSN programs, and six Diploma

programs were on provisional status in the 2020-2021 exam year. She reported four RN programs would be coming off of provisional status based on 2021-2022 results. She reported 11 ADN programs, 9 BSN programs, and 4 Diploma programs are on provisional for the 2021-2022 exam year. She reported 12 of those programs are on year 1, 10 are on year 2, 1 on

year 3, and 1 program over 5 years.

- Ms. Miller reported 22 PN programs are on provisional status for the 2020-2021 exam year and 9 are coming off. She noted 1 program has been on provisional status for 8 years, 2 programs have been on provisional status for 7 years, 1 program has been on provisional status for 3 years, 1 program has been on provisional status for 3 years, 1 program has been on provisional status for 5 years, and 1 for over 5 years for 2021-2022 exam year.
- Ms. Miller addressed how Pennsylvania pass rate results compare with other states, noting Pennsylvania is sixth in the country for the number of RN and PN programs. She stated the average pass rate for 2021-2022 is 79.92 percent nationally and 84.37 percent for Pennsylvania. She noted the United States total of first-time RN test takers for the 2021-2022 exam year was 186,204 and 8,168 for Pennsylvania. She reported the pass rate average for

BSN graduates educated in Pennsylvania was the highest at 85.8 percent, Associate Degree graduates were at 82.20 percent, and Diploma graduates at 81.94 percent.

Ms. Miller stated Pennsylvania graduates were higher in all categories than the national average. She reported BSN graduates averaged 82.5 percent, Diploma programs at 78.11 percent, and Associate Degree programs at 77.40 nationally. She reported Pennsylvania was sixth in the number of PNs educated in their jurisdiction. She noted the pass rate for the 2021-2022 PN exam year was 80.09 percent nationally and 81.41 percent for Pennsylvania.

Ms. Miller noted the United States total of first-time Practical Nursing test takers was 46,435 with 1,845 educated in Pennsylvania. She stated the five-year pass rates for RNs and PNs, which includes the United States average, and the updated Board-approved lists would be available today or tomorrow on the Board's website. She also noted other statistics are available on the NCSBN website, such as the number of RNs broken down by BSN, ADN and Diploma programs.

Ms. Pachter Schulder further addressed pass rates and the importance of comparing Pennsylvania to other

states. She mentioned that every state controls
their own nursing education and could have some
effect. She noted the Board has been active in
discussions and making recommendations for programs
on provisional status and has included the national
statistics so that the Board and licensees could see
how Pennsylvania is doing.

Ms. Miller commented that there are a lot of different variables that determine a graduate's probability of passing, and NCLEX® is a legally defensible standard for competency necessary for state entry into practice. She stated a new version of the NCLEX®, the Next Generation, is being instituted and has undergone extensive study and revision to better measure clinical judgment. She noted being hopeful that graduates would test sooner since changing the eligibility period to test back down to 90 days about a year ago.

Ms. Miller noted that the NCSBN Board of Directors voted at the December 2022 meeting to uphold the current passing standards for the NCLEX®-RN and PN Examinations when the Next Generation NCLEX® is launched on April 1.

Ms. Miller addressed processing times and the process that permits graduates are able to apply up

- to 90 days prior to completing the program. She
  explained that in a new process once an application
  and the NEV submitted by a Pennsylvania-approved
  program match, eligibility is communicated
  electronically to Pearson VUE, and if the applicant
  is registered with Pearson VUE, Pearson VUE will
  issue the Authorization to Test (ATT).
  - Ms. Miller stated the Board receives a report for those who are not registered with Pearson VUE, so the Board can notify applicants to register with Pearson VUE and are made eligible to test now within a few days.

- Ms. Miller addressed other aspects required for licensure, including the mandatory 3 hours of Child Abuse Continuing Education and criminal background checks. She informed Board members that the eligibility, TPP, and the issuing of the license for Pennsylvania graduates is down to a matter of days.
- Ms. Miller addressed NCSBN statistics regarding the correlation between program completion and the time to test that showed a slow steady decline in pass rates that starts 60 days from graduation, but it is not until beyond 120 days that pass rates drop to 80 percent and below for RNs. She mentioned PNs do not drop below 80 percent until 360 days following

graduation.

Ms. Miller mentioned that out-of-state graduates are not included in the automated process because educational equivalency must be determined so the application for licensure is processed in a more traditional manner but is hopeful that processing time would also decline when staff has less to manually review.

Leslie House, MSN, RN, Nursing Practice Advisor, addressed the Individualized Supervised Practice

Pathways (ISPP) program for dietitian-nutritionist

licensure experience, noting it to be an additional option for graduates who would like to sit for the

LDN exam but did not get picked for an internship or have a graduate degree.

Ms. House stated those pathways were not accepted previously but the Board now understands that there is not much difference in what they were accustomed to as far as their education. She stated the only difference is that the Accreditation Council for Education in Nutrition and Dietetics (ACEND) is giving individuals another opportunity so someone does not have to wait to continue their education with their internship component and meet eligibility requirements for the certification exam without

1 delay.

2 Ms. House mentioned that the initial concern was 3 that those pursuing this option were not being 4 followed as closely as those selected for the other 5 internship tracks.
