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2 Report of Board Chair

3 [Luanne K. Chubb, O.D., F.A.A.O., Chairperson, noted

4 | the Accreditation Council on Optometric Education

5 (ACOE) still has a call for comments posted. She

6 informed everyone that the optometric residency

7 program standards are being revised. She mentioned

 β attending the meeting in St. Louis in April and that

9 the public comment or individual licensee comment

10 period would be open until September 5 for revision

11 of standards. She noted the information can be found

12 on the American Optometric Association's (AOA)

13 | website.

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Chairperson Chubb further explained that she would not be addressing any questions or comments as a Board and any concerns or comments should be emailed individually.

Chairperson Chubb addressed her attendance at the Association of Regulatory Boards of Optometry (ARBO) in Alexandria, VA, in June. She noted it to be the first face-to-face meeting since 2019 but only had 57 board representatives. She mentioned having in-depth one-on-one discussions on regulatory topics in optometry nationally and internationally. She noted the ARBO Board of Directors, representatives from the

National Board of Examiners in Optometry (NBEO), and CEwire were in attendance.

Chairperson Chubb mentioned that ARBO recognized the outstanding service of Dr. Ken Lawenda, who passed away this year. She noted that he served on the Vermont Board of Optometry, the California Board of Optometry, and in British Columbia.

Chairperson Chubb stated ARBO also gave information about the Council on Optometric Practitioner Education (COPE) courses, noting they processed over 6000 COPE-approved courses this past year.

Chairperson Chubb reported ARBO approved over 2000 COPE activities from June 2022 to June 2023 and presented four online regulatory webinars open to all board members. She offered to have Ms. Chappelle provide information to anyone who would like to attend, noting registration is included in their Board fee.

Chairperson Chubb also noted the ARBO dashboard was redone regarding regulatory information for states to access and is offering to assist Board administrators with getting access to the passwords.

Chairperson Chubb stated the meeting topics were started out by Dale Atkinson, an attorney whose

practice predominantly deals with regulatory matters.

She noted he was on the Federation of Associations of

Regulatory Boards (FARB) over 30 years and discussed

regulatory activities, education and accreditation,

disciplinary action, legislation and applications,

and development and administration of license exams

and license transfer programs.

Chairperson Chubb informed everyone that ARBO
Board of Directors convened a six-person task force
in 2022 proposing and outlining suggestions of a
model practice for optometry and resource documents
for their member boards to promote public protection
in the role of optometry; to allow increased mobility
of licensed applicants; to have standardization of
terminology and regulation from jurisdiction to
jurisdiction; and to have consistency in legal
decisions on licensure renewal, discipline, and other
board activities.

Chairperson Chubb noted state boards individually had discussions about actions that were going on in their jurisdictions. She addressed a National Board Examination Review Committee (NBERC) presentation by Dr. Terri Haley regarding a three-day review of the national licensing exam parts I, II, and III for discrepancies or concerns, psychometric information,

and statistical approval of board scores. She noted they also evaluated the content, the reliability, and changes being made in the national boards.

Chairperson Chubb noted the Optometric Education (OE) TRACKER Committee presented and informed everyone that states are using OE TRACKER to track credits required by the state and provide a means for licensees to pay an application fee and have their continuing education courses listed on their website. She further noted that OE TRACKER breaks credits down by categories to show how someone is meeting those credits.

Chairperson Chubb noted the Council on Endorsed Licensure Mobility for Optometrists (CELMO) discussed endorsement for license mobility for optometry. She explained that CELMO is an option for people to consider who are applying for licenses in other states to provide the documentation to make it easier to transfer and is available through ARBO.

Chairperson Chubb addressed an update from the National Board of Examiners in Optometry presented by Dr. Jill Bryant, where candidates would only be identified by their OE TRACKER number and no longer by the last four digits of their Social Security Number. She noted part II would now only have full

case reports and no longer have mini cases or solo items in that testing. She stated the laser and surgical procedures exam would continue to be a standalone exam.

Chairperson Chubb mentioned that Dr. Richard
Castillo was introduced as the senior director for
part III, which has been renamed to the Patient
Encounters and Performance Skills (PEPS) exam. She
stated Dr. Castillo presented a lecture on surgical
techniques in optometry, noting 10 states currently
have laser privileges and 14 states have minor
procedure, minor surgery, and injectable privileges.

Chairperson Chubb mentioned being a member of the Accreditation Council on Optometric Education. She reported 25 optometry schools are now under the evaluation and accreditation of ACOE with 270 residency programs and 2 technician programs. She noted Rocky Mountain University of Health Professions College of Optometry to be the newest school and began enrolling students in May 2023.

Dr. Berson asked whether the NBEO report contained any information regarding low pass rates.

Chairperson Chubb explained that schools are expected to address their pass rates. She noted NBEO standards and questions have not changed in

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difficulty but have encouraged schools to develop
study guides and to be more in depth in addressing
scores, including looking at their curriculum.]

Mr. McDonald stated the staff also keeps track of legislation that may impact the Board or the licensee population. He also noted working closely with Board Counsel and regulatory counsel to review and draft regulations. He offered to provide solutions to Board issues and assist with policies that may benefit licensees and the citizens of Pennsylvania.

Mr. McDonald encouraged Board members to reach out to him or Deputy Policy Director Andrew LaFratte as a resource for any questions or concerns.

Mr. McDonald thanked Board members for their service to the licensees and citizens of the

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        Ms. Montgomery referred to Executive Order 1996-
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   1, where no regulations can proceed without their
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              She mentioned receiving approval on
   approval.
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   January 5, 2023, noting the regulation was then
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   forwarded to the Office of Attorney General and
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   received approval on February 1, 2023. She reported
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   being prevented from delivering the regulations to
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   the Independent Regulatory Review Commission and the
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   standing committees until the new legislative session
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   got underway and the House and the Senate both
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   published their designations of their committees on
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Ms. Montgomery stated the proposed rulemaking was

delivered on April 14, 2023, and published in the

Pennsylvania Bulletin on April 29, 2023. She

provided the proposed rulemaking as published, noting

edits were made but no substantive changes since

adopted in 2020. She informed Board members that no

comments were received during the 30-day public

comment period, which ended on May 29, 2023.

- Ms. Montgomery also reported receiving a no comment letter from the Independent Regulatory Review Commission after their opportunity to comment on June 29, 2023. She also mentioned that no comments were received from the House Professional Licensure Committee or Senate Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee.
- Ms. Montgomery informed Board members that the rulemaking would be deemed approved once redelivered because there were no comments. She stated the final face sheet would be presented to the Legislative Reference Bureau when published and explained that the final preamble is the explanatory document and the final annex is the actual regulatory language with the regulatory amendments.
- Ms. Montgomery noted they are implementing a multitude of changes to the Child Protective Services Law that were made from 2014 through 2019 and

updating existing regulations on child abuse
reporting requirements, including in the regulations
as to licensure and continuing education with the
additional requirement that all mandated reporters
must do 3 hours of training in child abuse
recognition and reporting as a condition of licensure
and at least 2 hours as a condition of renewal.

Dr. Wilcox requested confirmation that taking photographs of bruises would be permitted in an exam room.

Ms. Montgomery referred to § 23.112, noting regulations permit mandated reporters to take photographs, X-rays, or relevant medical tests when child abuse is suspected. She mentioned that the big change was in the immunity from liability section and confidentiality section to provide immunity from civil liability and disciplinary proceedings for taking actions that are authorized by the Child Protective Services Law.]

He reported no 22 substantive changes since the last meeting. 23 explained that the Statement of Policy clarifies the 24 Board's current interpretation of individual study 25 contained in § 23.86 regarding sources of continuing

education to the regulated community.

Mr. Jayman addressed requirements for optometry license renewal under § 23.82 regarding continuing education requirements, where licensees must complete at least 30 hours of Board-approved continuing education each biennial period from a Board-approved optometry continuing education provider in § 23.86(a). He noted § 23.86(g) allows up to 15 of the required 30 hours to be individualized study programs that includes taped study programs, online or webinar programs, and journal courses. He noted that 50 percent of continuing education credits must be obtained from attendance at live in-person courses and programs.

Mr. Jayman noted the Board received inquiries regarding whether § 23.86(g) applied to live virtual courses and programs that are conducted through realtime audio and video communications, where the instructor and participant can interact in real time.

Mr. Jayman noted the Statement of Policy provided interprets § 23.86(g) to exclude live virtual courses and programs that are conducted through real-time audio and video communications where the instructor and participant can interact in real time. He also noted that stated differently, the Board considers

live virtual courses and programs with real-time video and audio communication as live in person continuing education.

Dr. Wilcox mentioned that the Sunset Date is not being established for the Statement of Policy and asked whether they could periodically monitor efficacy. She also asked when it would take effect.

Mr. Jayman noted the Board could periodically monitor but was not sure when it would be published because it had to go through the regulatory process.

Dr. Wilcox mentioned that the only question on the licensure renewal form is whether someone met CE requirements and suggested it be further defined to read, have you completed 30 hours of continuing education. She also noted it should read, have you completed 4 hours of glaucoma instruction for a glaucoma license since it says have you completed 2 hours of pain management credits if someone has licensure to use pain medication.

Acting Commissioner Claggett noted that to be a simple change and could be more defined.]

She again expressed concern with not being mandatory reporters and not being required to learn the signs of elder abuse but would like to see that move up in importance on the agenda for all healthcare professionals.]

- 12 they know whether it is equivalent to part I, II, and

- 14 Dr. Berson commented that he would have no
- 15 problem saying okay because the exam appears to be
- 16 stricter than Pennsylvania from his assessment.
- 17 | Chairperson Chubb noted Canada is asking whether
- 18 they want to change regulations so a person could
- 19 take the OEBC exam instead of the NBEO exam part I,
- 20 II, and III.
- 21 Dr. Berson suggested looking at everyone on an
- 22 | individual basis.
- Dr. Wilcox commented that looking at everyone on
- 24 | an individual basis would require amendments to the
- 25 regulations to include the exam.

Chairperson Chubb mentioned that it would be an extensive research project to make sure their exam is similar to the NBEO exam part I, II, and III. She also noted no other states have approved Canada's exam at this point.

Dr. Berson suggested sending a letter back to

Canada asking them to present it to ARBO to look into

the exam and provide a recommendation to the states.

Chairperson Chubb agreed with Dr. Berson and commented that it sounds appropriate from an ARBO regulatory perspective instead of each individual state. She mentioned that they would refer to ARBO and ask them to do a comparable if they have interest in moving that into Pennsylvania. She noted the Board could thank Canada for the information and keep it on file as something they may look into in the future.]
