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   [Hillary D. Snyder, MSPAS, PA-C, Vice Chair,
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   addressed her attendance at the 2023 Federation of
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   State Medical Boards (FSMB) Meeting as a
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   representative for the House of Delegates from the
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   State Board of Osteopathic Medicine in May.
        Ms. Snyder mentioned being able to see people
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   from other states and interact with colleagues from
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Ms. Snyder mentioned being able to see people from other states and interact with colleagues from the medical board side as well. She noted there was a mitigating implicit bias session and an update on the Interstate Compact looking to include physician assistants (PAs).

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Ms. Snyder noted that the board from Ohio talked about their strategic development of assessing and reassessing sexual misconduct cases, where they are

looking at some of the high-profile issues with physician misconduct and sexual misconduct.

Ms. Snyder reported that Ohio chose to retroactively look back at some cases and offered opportunities for victims to be reinterviewed to try to protect the public at a higher level to correct past mistakes. She also noted Ohio discussed the importance of having trauma-informed interviews and counselors when trying to interview victims.

Ms. Snyder commented that the meeting was a great opportunity and highly recommended everyone attend FSMB meetings in the future.

Chair Bulger thanked Ms. Snyder for the update and representing the Board.]

Wucinski, Esquire, Board Counsel, addressed 15 House Bill 1722 regarding a military medical 16 personnel pilot program and requested Board feedback, 17 noting she and Ms. Walter are working on a bill 18 analysis. Ms. Wucinski explained the bill would amend Title 19 20 51 to require the Pennsylvania Department of Military 21 and Veterans Affairs (DMVA), along with the Department of Health and the Department of State, to 22 23 develop a pilot program for medically trained 24 military service personnel to perform certain medical

duties that would constitute the practice of medicine

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under the supervision of a physician or podiatrist once they leave the military.

Ms. Wucinski noted the bill would require the Department of Health and the Department of State to establish general requirements for the program and draft regulations. She reported a possible concern that both podiatrists and physicians could supervise for services that constitutes the practice of medicine but noted that a podiatrist does not practice medicine.

Ms. Grey asked whether the individual would be like a corpsman or medic who gets a job and wants to practice with no limitations on what they can do.

Ms. Wucinski explained that it would have to be within their skills and training, noting the Department of Health and Department State would have to create guidelines. She mentioned that physicians can also delegate medical services to unlicensed technicians pursuant to the Medical Practice Act. She believed that the language is this bill is for medics who come out of the military and cannot get a job in what they have been trained to do in the military.

Chair Bulger recommended podiatrists clarify around the practice of medicine if they are

1 practicing medicine, as noted in other acts, because

2 | they would need to be supervised by someone who is

3 covered by those acts. He also referred to Ms.

4 | Wucinski's point, where podiatrists not covered by

5 those acts would not be able to supervise and may

6 just require a clarification in the definitions of

7 | the bill.

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Chair Bulger mentioned that they would only be able to work under what is in the scope of the Podiatry Practice Act if they were working under the podiatrists.

Ms. Wucinski stated the delegated duties had to be within the military medical personnel's scope of experience and training which would be defined by the Board and the Department of Health.

Ms. Walter noted there is a Military Occupational Crosswalk on their website that walks through the different military specialties and the equivalency with licenses as far as education received in the military and how that would translate to skills regulated by the boards.

Ms. Grey commented that it is a good idea with the current shortage of medical professionals.

Dr. Oline mentioned that corpsmen have certain skills and suggested additional training through a

pilot program when they come out of the military to be able to fit into different professions.

Ms. Snyder stated, historically, the physician assistant profession started with corpsmen from Vietnam who came out with experience and were provided a pathway to enter the physician assistant profession. She mentioned there was still a certificate program out of California that is a pathway for a PA certificate but not a Pennsylvania pathway.

Ms. Snyder understood the barriers present for military service members as far as finding jobs right away with their experience but requested additional information regarding how their education lined up with the expectations of different medical professionals.

Dr. Dardarian asked whether any of the PA schools give corpsmen a certain number of credits like advanced standing or credit for some of the basic assessment skills classes.

Ms. Snyder explained that corpsmen do not receive credit but would receive the patient contact hour requirements for their experience in the service.

She reported that many people in the PA profession have a military background, noting they regularly

honor veterans in their societies and PA programs very much like to admit students who have military experience.

Dr. Oline addressed a period during the Vietnam War, where osteopathic physicians were not considered full-fledged physicians, noting that it was not so long ago that their profession was struggling to get full recognition. He agreed that providing more training and programs would be a benefit, where someone may sign up to be a medic in the military because it could lead to further things.

Dr. Oline offered to work with counsel to speak with recruiters and people who take care of retirement out-processing concerning schools and jobs that would be available.

Ms. Walter stated someone in the department did extensive research for all of the branches of the military and would provide a copy of the document.

Ms. Wucinski commented that it would be a benefit of the bill and would encourage more people to sign up if they knew they could receive additional training and a job in certain states.

Dr. Dardarian referred back to the 2024 Board meeting dates and questioned a few of the dates.

Ms. Turek read a message from Ms. Wray, noting

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   the dates were different because of conflicts with
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   other boards having meetings on those dates.]
