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9 Report of Board Counsel - Other

10 | [Dana M. Wucinski, Esquire, Board Counsel, provided a

11 report on the Annual Federation of State Medical

12 Boards (FSMB) Meeting in April and thanked Board

13 members for allowing her to attend. She mentioned the

14 -hardship between 2020 and now with pandemic

15 disruption to computer-based testing and the shift in

16 reporting to pass/fail versus a numeric number in May

17 | 2022.

18 Ms. Wucinski stated the testing attempt limit is

19 going to change from six to four attempts in July

20 2022. She noted the Level 2-Performance Evaluation

21 (PE) is currently suspended with the short-term

22 | solution being attestation that the Board voted on at

23 the last meeting.

24 Ms. Wucinski informed Board members of a National

25 | Board of Osteopathic Medical Examiners (NBOME) Special

Commission was formed in February 2021 consisting of students, training programs, and public members. She stated the key takeaway of the Special Commission is that the assessment of clinical skills is important, colleges of osteopathic medicine (COMs) have a role in licensure assessment, and it is important to have a national standard. She noted the Special Commission is working and making recommendations.

Ms. Wucinski stated the Comprehensive Osteopathic Medical Variable-Purpose Examination (COMVEX) Reentry Program used by boards to establish competency and clinical skills of physicians is going to be useful to the Board.

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Ms. Wucinski noted the meeting addressed physician sexual misconduct, and the FSMB House of Delegates adopted a landmark policy on sexual misconduct in 2020 raising awareness of the issue nationally and promoted new discussions of what approaches are most effective. She provided a list of FSMB recommendations for the Board to review for implementing an alignment with FSMB's sexual misconduct.

Ms. Wucinski addressed a session she attended with other attorneys and board members on pandemic-related developments in other states discussing what

- 24 [Carolyn Byrnes, M.P.H., C.P.H., Department of Health,
- 25 | provided a COVID-19 update, noting nearly 2.9 million

1 cases in the state of Pennsylvania, 1,329
2 hospitalizations, and 45,254 deaths as of May 31.

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Ms. Byrnes stated the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) is using COVID community levels to illustrate risk. She reported 27 of Pennsylvania's 67 counties are green or low risk, 23 are yellow, and 17 are red or high risk.

Ms. Byrnes reported Pennsylvania administered 19,783,851 vaccinations with 73.2 percent of those 5 years of age or older who are fully vaccinated and a United States average at 70.9 percent. She noted also administering 3.5 million first booster doses and 500,715 second boosters.

Ms. Byrnes addressed data from the CDC estimating that within the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) region for the week ending May 28 that 68 percent of all COVID cases were due to the Omicron BA.2.12.1 variant and 29 percent due to BA.2.

Ms. Byrnes informed everyone that seasonal influenza activity in Pennsylvania and the United States was moderate and has decreased over the past few weeks. She reported a total of 84,666 laboratory-confirmed influenza cases have been confirmed in all 67 counties with a total of 65 confirmed influenza-associated deaths with 1 pediatric death.

Ms. Byrnes reported five pediatric patients with hepatitis of unknown cause were identified at a hospital in Alabama in October 2021. She mentioned no known common exposures were found among the children and no children had significant underlying medical conditions. She noted all of the children are now recovering.

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Ms. Byrnes noted 36 states reported at least one person under investigation, including Pennsylvania as of May 18. She noted the person under investigation does not mean they have a confirmed case and that hepatitis does not seem to be associated with COVID or COVID vaccinations.

Ms. Byrnes addressed monkeypox, noting 36 cases have been reported in United Kingdom, Portugal, and Spain and one confirmed case by the CDC on May 18 in Massachusetts. She reported the first case of monkeypox in Pennsylvania was confirmed in Philadelphia on June 3 and 31 cases have been confirmed in the United States as of June 6.

Ms. Byrnes noted clinicians should consider a diagnosis of monkeypox infection in people with an unexplained rash and provided a list of risk factors. She noted stated clinicians should report cases to their local public health, Pennsylvania Department of

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1 Health, and to contact their Division of Infectious
2 Disease Epidemiology.
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Ms. Byrnes addressed the infant formula shortage, noting it to be largely driven by Abbott's product recall. She informed everyone that Abbott resumed production on June 4 and will start EleCare aiming for an initial product release around June 20.

Ms. Byrnes informed the Board that Governor Wolf is calling on the General Assembly to pass gun legislation concerning the gun violence in communities across the country.

Chairman Swallow requested an update on the etiology of the hepatitis and whether an infectious cause has been ruled out.

Ms. Byrnes did not have an answer but offered to provide some resources from the CDC.]
