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   Report of Regulatory Counsel - Other
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   [Dana M. Wucinski, Esquire, Board Counsel, addressed
22
   House Bill 1816 of 2021, which would amend the Medical
23
   Care Availability and Reduction of Error (MCARE) Act
24
   and prohibit pelvic, rectal, and prostate examinations
25
   without explicit consent of the patient.
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Ms. Wucinski stated medical students currently perform those examinations on a patient that is under general anesthesia for another surgical procedure, oftentimes without their consent. She noted the bill was referred to the Health and Human Services Committee on July 27, 2021.

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- Ms. Wucinski addressed House Bill 1818 of 2021, which would allow minors 14 and over to consent to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) -10 recommended immunizations. She stated minors, who are 11 14 and older, can currently consent to inpatient mental health treatment, and the bill would expand 12 13 that and give them the decision-making for 14 immunizations. She noted the bill was referred to the 15 Health and Human Services Committee on August 31, 2021. 16
- Ms. Wucinski mentioned that counsel will reach out to Board members for their position if they are asked to do a bill analysis.
 - Ms. Walter addressed Senate Bill 397 of 2021 regarding physician assistants' modernization of practice. She stated the bill was signed by Governor Wolf on October 7 and changes the landscape of physician assistants written agreements in Pennsylvania. She stated it adds two new board

members, one physician assistant and one additional position and it takes the physician assistant (PA) out of the rotation for the rotating seat. She noted written agreements will be effective upon submission to the Board.

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Ms. Walter stated the Board is required to review 10 percent of written agreements submitted to the Board. She informed the Board that they have 120 days to submit to the Legislative Reference Bureau the manner in which they will undergo the review process and select the 10 percent of written agreements for review.

Ms. Walter noted the number of physician assistants that a supervising physician may supervise has increased to six. She stated the countersignature requirements for a physician assistant who has changed specialty or recently been licensed have remained the same, requiring 100 percent chart review; however, after those milestones have been met by the physician assistant, the chart review was up to the supervising physician.

Ms. Walter informed the Board that the act is effective immediately, and they have to promulgate final regulations within 180 days.

Ms. Walter further explained that Board members

and stakeholders will be working on a plan for the 10 percent review within 120 days and then working on the regulations to implement anything that is necessary.

Ms. Wucinski commented that some of the current regulations do not flow with what is in the act, and amendments are needed to be consistent.

Ms. Walter added that even though PAs will come off the rotating part of the Board, it will not be replaced with another allied health professional. She explained that the PA was removed from the rotating seat, but the Osteopathic Medical Practice Act was not amended to add an allied health professional.

Ms. Wucinski commented that it is going to be interesting to see what is going to happen with the Medical Board because their allied health professional is a physician assistant.]

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   [K. Kalonji Johnson, Commissioner, Bureau of
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   Professional and Occupational Affairs, noted Board
   members were notified a few weeks ago of the
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25
   continuation of virtual Board meetings through the end
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of March 2022. He thanked Board members for their patience and grace as they continue to move through with the existing technology.

Commissioner Johnson reiterated that the travel policies have been reinstated for physical travel but encouraged all to strongly consider virtual attendance. He noted physical travel has reverted back to the original limit of two Board members per event but no cap on the virtual option.]

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11 Report of Department of Health

12 [Denise A. Johnson, M.D., Acting Physician General,

13 provided a COVID-19 update, noting 1,491,146 total

14 cases, 3,031 people currently hospitalized, and 30,228

15 deaths. She stated 13,169,965 vaccinations were given

16 with a current 7-day moving average for vaccines at

17 25,267. She reported 69.9 percent of Pennsylvania

18 adults are fully vaccinated.

Dr. Johnson noted current recommendations are to follow the CDC guidance of masking regardless of

21 vaccination status in counties with substantial or

22 high community spread, which is currently all

23 Pennsylvania counties.

Dr. Johnson addressed third doses and boosters,

25 stating that 277,000 of the 13.1 million doses given

- 1 have been additional doses. She mentioned that the
- 2 | CDC is currently recommending a third dose for those
- 3 | who are immunocompromised. She noted booster doses
- 4 have been authorized for the Pfizer vaccine or the
- 5 | Comirnaty vaccine for people over 65 or with
- 6 underlying conditions or those whose occupations or
- 7 | living conditions put them at risk. She commented
- 8 | that boosters for Moderna and Johnson & Johnson are
- 9 | not yet authorized.
- 10 Dr. Johnson noted anxiously awaiting the CDC and
- 11 FDA recommendations for authorization for Pfizer
- 12 vaccines for children ages 5 to 11.
- Dr. Johnson reported an increase in cases over
- 14 the past month or so driven largely by the Delta
- 15 variant. She mentioned continuing the effort to get
- 16 people vaccinated with media campaigns, mobile
- 17 | clinics, and equity clinics.
- 18 Dr. Johnson noted grants are available for local
- 19 grassroots organizations to help resource them to
- 20 carry the outreach message and encouraging physicians
- 21 to talk with their patients about vaccination and
- 22 | making sure providers and individuals know about
- 23 monoclonal antibody treatment. She reported a change
- 24 in how those are distributed to the states, noting
- 25 information is available on their website.

Dr. Johnson mentioned working with the CDC regarding breakthrough cases, but vaccines seem to be still working very well to prevent severe illness and death. She reported a lot of people in the hospital with non-COVID illnesses compared to last year because of the decreased mitigation measures.

Dr. Johnson addressed staffing shortages and strains on hospitals and is encouraging flu vaccination to keep hospital capacity up.

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Dr. Dardarian asked Dr. Johnson whether
Pennsylvania is on the upslope or downslope of the
bell curve regarding the Delta variant.

Dr. Johnson noted currently surpassing the peak in April and is hoping that it has plateaued and will start coming down.

Commissioner Johnson asked Dr. Johnson whether the increase in the non-COVID-related respiratory cases is due to environmental factors or due solely to the mitigation factors.

Dr. Johnson noted not seeing any reports of environmental causes but had been seeing many respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) cases in hospitals, that staying out of crowds and masking would decrease the cases.
