- 11 Act 41 regarding licensure by endorsement, noting the
- 12 annex was approved and sent out as an exposure draft
- 13 and comments were received.
- 14 Ms. Grey noted the need to define the word
- 15 "active" when referring to 2 of the 5 years. She
- 16 pointed out that the certified respiratory therapist
- 17 technician (CRTT) credential no longer exists, where
- 18 | it is certified respiratory therapist (CRT) and
- 19 registered respiratory therapist (RRT). She mentioned
- 20 the need to add "and" or "or" at specific points.
- 21 Ms. Wucinski suggested looking at how other
- 22 | boards are wording Act 41.
- Ms. Grey reported that the Pennsylvania Society
- 24 for Respiratory Care (PSRC) recommended something like
- 25 2000 hours.

Dr. Tursi expressed concern with having different numbers for every board causing confusion and agreed with going along with the consensus of other boards.

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- Ms. Wucinski stated most boards were just saying
 active practice, noting the State Board of Nursing was
 the only Board requiring a certain number of hours.

 She stated it was easier to review applications on a
 case-by-case basis with the general understanding of
 seeing two years of active license practice. She
 mentioned requesting more information on anything
 questionable and putting it before the committee or
 the Board.
 - Dr. Tursi expressed concern with burdening Board counsel with applications.
 - Ms. Wucinski commented that very few Act 41 applications are received for medical boards, and it would not be burdensome because they are evaluated under Act 41 as part of the evaluation process.
- Dr. Tursi suggested leaving the wording the way it is.
- Ms. Walter offered to change the acronyms to make those consistent with what is relevant at this point in time.
- Ms. Grey commented that it would provide a basis
 for people to understand they are not going to become

a respiratory therapist in Pennsylvania having done one shift in two years if Board Counsel reviewed the applications.

Ms. Grey will send an email concerning the "and" and "or" language.

Ms. Walter and Ms. Wucinski will make the necessary changes.]

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9 Report of Regulatory Counsel - Other

10 [Shana M. Walter, Esquire, Board Counsel, referred to

11 House Bill 1094 of 2021 regarding the Professional

12 Licensees Illegal Employment Act, which is a

13 prohibition on licensees employing illegal aliens.

Ms. Walter noted House Bill 1176 of 2021, which would mandate implicit bias and cultural competence training as part of continuing education.

Ms. Walter referred to House Bill 1233 of 2021, noting it would allow genetic counselors to order genetic tests for genetic diseases or conditions. She mentioned it was very specific as to what they are allowed to do and would not infringe on a physician's ability to diagnose and treat the condition. She noted it to be an act of the legislature and any issues with the context of the bill should be made on their individual capacity through their legislator.

Ms. Wucinski further explained that whatever genetic counselors were doing before, aside from ordering the tests, they have to continue to do now. She explained that all of the bills are proposed bills for the Board's information. She mentioned that there were times when she and Ms. Walter reached out to the Board because counsel was asked to perform a bill analysis, which means a bill was gaining traction.

Ms. Wucinski addressed House Bill 958 of 2021 concerning the Immunization Freedom Act, where health-care practitioners would not be able to terminate an already existing client-patient relationship for the patient failing to follow the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) vaccination guidelines.

Ms. Wucinski explained that the client-patient relationship cannot be terminated if the patient obtains at least one vaccine a year on an altered schedule. She stated it also requires the health-care practitioner to also meet with the guardian and go over the deviated schedule and could require separate waiting rooms for these individuals. She mentioned that she drafted a bill analysis on HB 958 and talked with relevant organizations.

Chairman Litman commented that many pediatricians raised a lot of objections because of the potential

danger to incompletely vaccinated people but also noted that the same argument would be if someone came in with a viral infection that there was no available vaccine for and the need for a healthy versus a sick waiting room.

Ms. Wucinski reported that there seemed to be general opposition to this house bill because it takes away the physician's option to terminate a client-patient relationship. She stated the Department does not typically meddle in what a physician can do, but this was for all health-care practitioners.

Ms. Wucinski addressed Senate Bill 554 of 2021 requiring agencies to make their agendas available to the public. She stated once the agenda was finalized and posted for the public, the agency cannot take any official action on any items not listed.

Ms. Wucinski referred to Senate Bill 705 of 2021 regarding telemedicine, which would require each board to draft telemedicine regulations for health-care providers for patients located within the commonwealth.

Chairman Litman referred to Senate Bill 554 of 2021 concerning the amendment to the Sunshine Act. He expressed concern that many practitioners, whose cases may appear before the public, may object to their

names being in a posted agenda and questioned whether it was posted by the name or the docket number, where it could raise doubts for practitioners.

2.4

Ms. Wray commented that the agenda was posted in the same format as how the Board views it, where case number is used for the report of prosecuting attorneys but the name and case number is listed for the proposed reports from the hearing examiner and the final adjudications.

Dr. Tursi questioned whether any of the bills are close to passage. He expressed concern with mandatory requirements and mandatory trainings and questioned whether they could be combined under one statute to be completed at one time, noting legislature does not seem to understand the burden on an independent practicing physician.

Ms. Wucinski addressed feedback received from the Pennsylvania Osteopathic Medical Association (POMA) and the other medical board regarding HB 958 of 2021, noting it was ultimately the position of the department and not of the individual Board members.

Dr. Tursi questioned how thoughts would be put out there in a timely manner if there was a short turnaround time and the agenda cannot be altered.

Ms. Wucinski stated all of the bills are proposed

and people proposing them do not understand what the Board does and the timing needed.

Chairman Litman questioned whether House Bill 1176 of 2021 would be a one-time requirement or an annual renewal because it did not have the word "initial."

Ms. Walter commented that it would probably proceed in the same manner as the child abuse regulations where each board would promulgate regulations specific to their Board if it were to pass. She stated there would be a separate section for child abuse regulations, regular continuing education (CE), and any additional CE required.

Dr. Poggi addressed House Bill 1176 of 2021, stating that it seems totally political with what is going on in the landscape of the United States of America right now because physicians are taught to treat a patient medically with respect. He expressed concern with more continuing medical education (CME) that costs more money and causes more time off. He also mentioned the difficulty for individual practitioners to meet requirements from those who do not know the effects on individuals being governed.

Chairman Litman commented that it was appropriate for initial licensure but not necessarily for renewal

1 licensure.

Dr. Swallow suggested Dr. Poggi and other members
of the Board call it to the attention of POMA and
recommend that the Government Affairs Committee look
into this.1

25 [William B. Swallow, D.O., Vice Chairman, announced

that a recent retiree from the Board of Osteopathic Medicine, Burton Mark, was recognized as professor emeritus at the Commencement Ceremony at Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine (PCOM) on May 24.

Chairman Litman congratulated Dr. Mark.

Report of Department of Health

[Denise A. Johnson, M.D., Acting Physician General,
noted 1,206,935 COVID-19 cases as of today with 710

current hospitalizations and a total of 27,417 deaths.

Dr. Johnson reported 58.9 percent of adults in Pennsylvania are fully vaccinated and 72 percent of adults over 18 have gotten their first dose. She stated 60 percent of Pennsylvanians have been vaccinated and ranked 9th throughout the country for the total number of people vaccinated.

Dr. Johnson noted mitigation orders were lifted as of May 31 except for the masking order, which is projected for June 28 or when 70 percent of adults are fully vaccinated.

Dr. Johnson addressed vaccination education to increase vaccination rates with media campaigns, Vax Facts, and transitioning to small sites. She noted grants are available for local organizations assisting with messaging.

Dr. Johnson stated the constitutional amendment went through to limit disaster declarations to 21 days or able to be rescinded with action from the legislature. She noted the Secretary of Health has the authority to take disease-related infection control measures that are necessary. She reported many of the waivers would conclude and did not believe legislature had taken any action to extend those waivers.

Dr. Johnson addressed ongoing work updating hospital regulations that were promulgated in the 1970s with some action in 1997. She mentioned involvement with several workgroups since 2016 and stakeholders from urban and rural hospitals, consumer and patient care groups, and health systems.

Dr. Johnson addressed homebound efforts, where the secretary's order advised vaccine providers, as well as managed care organizations and local Area Agency on Aging, to collaborate to provide vaccines all across the state.

Ms. Grey questioned whether there was a lag time when updating retired providers but wanted to administer the vaccine, noting someone had been waiting since March.

Ms. Wray stated there was a lag time existing
