The regularly scheduled meeting of the State

Board of Podiatry was held on Wednesday, October 18,

2023. Eric B. Greenberg, D.P.M., J.D., Chairman,

called the meeting to order at 10:36 a.m.

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[Dean F. Picarella, Esquire, Senior Board Counsel, noted the meeting was being recorded and voluntary participation constituted consent to be recorded.

Mr. Picarella also noted the Board entered into Executive Session for the purpose of conducting quasi-judicial deliberations on a number of matters that are currently pending before the Board and to

The Respondent's 12 name is Steven Dennis Epstein, D.P.M.] 13 * * * 14 Appointment - Podiatric Residency and Licensing 15 Concerns [Andrew Meyr, D.P.M., FACFAS, Program Director, 16 17 Temple University Hospital/Vice Chair and Region 7 18 Representative, Council of Teaching Hospitals, 19 presented to the Board to discuss podiatric residents 20 and licensing concerns. He serves as the 21 representative for all 20 of their podiatric 22 residency programs in Pennsylvania. 23 Dr. Meyr informed Board members of a unique 24 problem concerning licensing of incoming PGY-1 25 residents in Pennsylvania. He reported Pennsylvania

and Kentucky are the only two states that require

Part III of the National Board of Podiatric Medical

Examiners (NBPME) examination to obtain a residency

license. He mentioned that Pennsylvania has 20

programs with 63 incoming residents.

Dr. Meyr explained that candidates are only eligible for Part III in the spring of their fourth year of school, noting results typically come out in the middle of June, which puts programs under stress for their PGY-1 residents to get their applications together to submit to the Board for their license.

Dr. Meyr's stated licenses often come in around July 1 and that it was completely untenable this year. He reported not being aware of any PGY-1 residents in Pennsylvania who had their license as of July 1 because most programs and most PGY-1 residents were delayed for weeks. He commented that it is a bad look for their profession, noting complaints and questions received from hospital graduate medical education (GME) committees inquiring as to this problem with podiatric residents.

Dr. Meyr mentioned NBPME agreed to release their scores a few weeks early, but despite the results coming out a few weeks earlier and applications for the PGY-1 licenses being submitted a few weeks

earlier, there were significant and substantial delays. He mentioned that residents who do not have their license often cannot sign a contract or start rotations with the hospital and affects the residents education and the ability of program directors to effectively manage their programs.

Dr. Meyr reported delays of up to six weeks with a resident obtaining their license and being able to start on July 1, noting there may be some extensions with the Council on Podiatric Medical Education (CPME) of training because of the delays. He informed Board members that it is a challenge every year and offered his assistance in remedying the situation.

Acting Commissioner Claggett asked Dr. Meyr to further explain when individuals graduate.

Dr. Meyr stated fourth-year podiatric medical students graduate somewhere in the ballpark of May, but results from the Part III Board scores do not come out until June. He noted fourth-year podiatric medical students take Part II of the Board examination in their fourth year, usually in December or January but are not eligible for Part III until the spring.

Dr. Meyr reported that most states do not require

Part III for a resident license and only require Part III and could pass Part III during their residency training. He believed Kentucky and Pennsylvania to be the only states requiring Part III in order to get the resident license and again noted that it is a real stretch with the timing of the test and the timing of the release.

Acting Commissioner Claggett offered to address

Part III with the policy staff. He informed Dr. Meyr

that nothing could be done as far as the delay with

exam scores coming in close to the time staff are

going to start. He offered to continue the

conversation offline to discuss the issue more in

depth.

Dr. Meyr commented that one possible solution that could be explored is not specifically requiring Part III for a PGY-1 license and could be required at some point over their training. He stated something needs to be done about the processing of the application because the same issue would continue if there is not a mechanism to have those approved as of July 1.

Acting Commissioner Claggett will take Part III to the policy staff. He noted there is nothing they could do as far as the applications until they

receive the exam scores if Part III is required by law in Pennsylvania.

Dr. Meyr asked whether it would be possible for applicants to submit a portion of their application early to start the process and then submit the final component when available to speed up the process, noting Part III scores are a small portion of the application.

Acting Commissioner Claggett explained that applicants are currently able to submit their application early to be processed, noting the applicant would be sent a discrepancy notice informing the applicant of what is needed to complete the process. He noted the applicant would already be in the system but are still at the mercy of the school or whoever is providing the exam results.

Dr. Meyr asked why there were so many delays this year compared to the previous year.

Acting Commissioner Claggett explained that the department was short staffed but is now back up to speed. He noted there is currently no backlog for podiatry but did see a 30-day backlog the last graduation season. He again noted that the next step would be to run Part III through the policy staff to see if anything can be done and continue to look at

ways to help the process as they go forward.

Dr. Seda commented that it would make it easier to allow them to take it once they start rather than taking it away, noting they should allow them to get in rotations, take call, and get paid.

Dr. Meyr commented that no one could sign a contract at Temple until they have a license, noting all of his residents were not paid and other hospitals had similar issues.

Chair Greenberg commented that it is a very serious problem for residency programs and affects Pennsylvanians as far as receiving appropriate care. He stated contacting Acting Commissioner Claggett is a direct conduit to the Governor's Office and the legislature to get things done. He noted the Board would try their best to resolve this issue.

Dr. Seda asked whether Dr. Meyr discussed this issue with Dean Mattiacci or anybody else.

Dr. Meyr reached out to all of the program directors in Pennsylvania, noting 50 percent replied back and reported issues and delays.

Chair Greenberg informed Dr. Meyr that the Board would start working on it immediately because it is a serious problem that needs attention.]

6 Report of Board Counsel - Other

7 [Dean F. Picarella, Esquire, Senior Board Counsel,

addressed House Bill 1722 regarding a military

personnel pilot program being proposed in the

10 legislature.

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Mr. Picarella explained the proposal would amend Title 51 Military Affairs and would require the Department of Health and Department of State to consult with Military Affairs in order to establish a pilot program to allow military medical personnel to be delegated the performance of certain duties under the supervision of a physician or a podiatrist.

Mr. Picarella informed Board members that House Bill 1722 is in its early stages but would allow military personnel to get experience toward licensure or other duties in both medical and/or podiatry. Не noted the the bill is to help military personnel adapt and get back into the workforce in Pennsylvania as easily as possible.]

Report of Board Counsel - Regulatory Status Report [Thomas M. Davis, Esquire, Board Regulatory Counsel, introduced himself and informed Board members that he served as Board Counsel for several other boards over the past five years but decided to move over to a regulatory position. He mentioned that his chief priority is to discuss and push regulations along for nine boards.

Mr. Davis stated the Board currently has seven active regulations. He referred to 16A-448 regarding sexual misconduct, noting the Board approved the annex and the preamble on July 12, 2023. He noted a legal extern provided research concerning other states for comparison, which is being incorporated into the Regulatory Analysis Form (RAF). He noted it would then be sent to the Office of General Counsel (OGC) and Office of Attorney General for approval and hopefully published around the earlier part of 2024.

Mr. Davis informed Board members that 16A-4412 regarding child abuse reporting requirements was approved by the Office of General Counsel on September 14 and sent to the Office of Attorney General on October 10. He mentioned that the Office of Attorney General would have until November 10 or so to make comments and that it would be approved and

published in December if the Board does not receive any comments.

Mr. Davis informed Board members that he made some administrative and stylistic changes to 16A-4420 regarding radiologic procedures examination to take care of some of the tweaks and stylistic changes the Legislative Reference Bureau may have had and to lessen the time for it to be published.

Mr. Davis addressed an issue that was not administrative and referred to the language saying that programs must be preapproved by the Board. He explained that it would cause an issue with the Office of Attorney General because the act itself says programs must be approved by the Board.

Mr. Davis mentioned the sections that discuss preapproved providers is fine, including the American Society of Podiatric Medical Assistants (ASPMA) and the American Registry of Radiographic Technologists (ARRT). He also mentioned any programs that are approved by the State Board of Medicine, State Board of Osteopathic Medicine, or State Board of Chiropractic is also fine.

Mr. Davis commented that the Board is tying their hands with the preapproved language and explained that another jurisdiction organization may have a

radiological examination that the Board does not know exists or have listed and is not preapproved forcing the individual to take another examination because the Board would not have the ability to approve it.

Mr. Davis explained that changing the language from preapproved to approved by a Board would allow them to look at the examination and make the determination as to whether or not the examination meets their standards and is why he changed it from preapproved to approved.]
