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4 Second, please? 1 2 DR. GREENBERG: 3 I'll second it. 4 CHAIRMAN WEBER: 5 So moved. 6 [The motion carried unanimously.] * * * 7 8 Report of Prosecutors [Christopher K. McNally, Esquire, Board Prosecution 9 10 Liaison, had no formal report to offer the Board.] * * * 11 12 Report of Board Counsel [Todd Kriner, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted the Board 13 14 met in Executive Session to engage in quasi-judicial 15 deliberations under Section 708(a)(5) of the Sunshine 16 Act on matters listed under the Report of Board 17 Counsel.] MR. KRINER: 18 19 Would the Board entertain a motion to 20 adopt the hearing examiner's proposed 21 Adjudication and issue a corrected Order for William T. Ainsley, D.P.M., at Case 22 23 Nos. 20-44-011657 & 20-44-012841? 24 CHAIRMAN WEBER: 25 Could I have a motion from a Board

5 member, please? 1 2 DR. GREENBERG: 3 I'll make a motion to accept. 4 CHAIRMAN WEBER: 5 Second, please? 6 DR. PARIS: I'll second. 7 8 CHAIRMAN WEBER: 9 All in favor? Any nays? 10 [The motion carried unanimously.] * * * 11 12 [Todd Kriner, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted the 13 meeting was being recorded, and those who remained on 14 the line were giving their consent to being recorded.] * * * 15 16 MR. KRINER: 17 Would the Board entertain a motion to 18 adopt the hearing examiner's proposed Adjudication and Order for Lawrence J. 19 20 Kansky, D.P.M., Case No. 21-44-01179? 21 CHAIRMAN WEBER: 22 Could I have a motion to accept? 23 DR. GREENBERG: 24 I'll make that motion to accept. 25 CHAIRMAN WEBER:

6 Second? 1 2 DR. PARIS: 3 I'll second. 4 CHAIRMAN WEBER: 5 All in favor? Any nays? 6 [The motion carried unanimously.] * * * 7 8 MR. KRINER: 9 Would the Board entertain a motion to 10 accept the hearing examiner's proposed 11 Adjudication and Order with regard to 12 Sharon Louise Pletcher, D.P.M., Case Nos. 18-44-01489 & 19-44-004587? 13 DR. PARIS: 14 I'll make the motion. 15 16 DR. GREENBERG: I'll second it. 17 18 CHAIRMAN WEBER: 19 All in favor? Any nays? 20 [The motion carried unanimously.] 21 * * * 22 Report of Regulatory Counsel 23 [Todd Kriner, Esquire, Regulatory Counsel, referred to 24 16A-4417 regarding continuing education. He addressed 25 prior Board discussion concerning comments to the

1 proposed rulemaking regarding distance learning and 2 the issue of reducing credit hours from 50 to 45, 3 noting the Board agreed to go back to 50 hours. 7

Mr. Kriner addressed prior discussion regarding 4 5 clock hours to include, "may be in approved courses 6 and programs that involve the use of reading 7 professional journals," where the Board wanted to 8 revert back to how it is written pursuant to the 9 comments from the American Podiatric Medical 10 Association (APMA) and the Pennsylvania Podiatric 11 Medical Association (PPMA). He noted language in 12 § 29.61(3) addresses the concern.

13 Chairman Weber commented that having approved 14 courses and programs is the crux of the matter, along 15 with the removal of magazine articles.

Mr. Kriner stated at least 30 of the clock hours must be in courses and programs in podiatry approved by the Board or Council on Podiatric Medical Education and questioned whether those courses are offered by distance learning.

21 Dr. Paris commented that he did not think there 22 was any specification whether clock hours have to be 23 through distance learning or in person and referred to 24 § 29.61(4), which clarifies how clock hours may be 25 obtained.

Mr. Kriner commented that the Board voted to 1 2 allow 100 percent of clock hours online, noting 3 § 29.61(4) accurately reflects that. Dr. Paris referred to § 29.61(4), where it mentions 4 5 meeting a skills assessment, which is not necessary if 6 it is a livestreaming or a live interaction-type 7 program. He proposed adding the word "asynchronous" 8 for it to read, "Clock hours that are obtained through 9 asynchronous distance learning courses shall only be 10 eligible." He also suggested defining synchronous and 11 asynchronous. 12 Mr. Kriner commented that the Board has gone 13 through several Board counsels over the recent years 14 and he wanted to make sure he understood the Board's 15 concerns and wanted to clarify everything to be able 16 to complete the final annex to keep moving forward. 17 Mr. Kriner recommended the Board vote on the 18 April minutes again, noting a first and a second for 19 approval but no vote.] * * * 20 Approval of minutes of the April 21, 2021 meeting 21 2.2 CHAIRMAN WEBER: 23 At this moment, in regard to the approval 24 of the minutes, could I have a motion to 25 approve and a second?

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1 DR. PARIS: 2 I make a motion to approve. 3 DR. GREENBERG: Second. 4 5 CHAIRMAN WEBER: 6 All in favor? Any nays? 7 [The motion carried unanimously.] * * * 8 9 CHAIRMAN WEBER: 10 Could I have a motion to accept Board 11 counsel's report? 12 DR. GREENBERG: 13 Motion to accept. DR. PARIS: 14 I'll second. 15 16 CHAIRMAN WEBER: All in favor? Any nays? 17 18 [The motion carried unanimously.] * * * 19 20 CHAIRMAN WEBER: 21 Motion to accept the regulatory counsel 22 report? 23 DR. GREENBERG: 24 I make a motion to accept the regulatory 25 counsel report.

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10 DR. PARIS: 1 2 Second. 3 CHAIRMAN WEBER: All in favor? 4 Any nays? 5 [The motion carried unanimously.] * * * 6 7 Report of Board Chair 8 [Robert B. Weber, D.P.M., J.D., M.B.A., Chairman, requested Michael J. Paris, D.P.M., Vice Chairman, 9 10 discuss an issue he brought up at the last meeting 11 regarding assistants taking X-rays. 12 Dr. Paris commented that the only avenue for an 13 assistant to be certified to take X-rays is to receive 14 certification through the American Society of 15 Podiatric Medical Assistants (ASPMA), which requires the supervising doctor to be a member of the PPMA. 16 17 Dr. Paris stated roughly 40-45 percent of 18 licensees were not members of PPMA, so how do they 19 legally take X-rays in their office if their staff is 20 unable to get certified. 21 Dr. Paris mentioned reviewing the Podiatry 22 Practice Act printed in 2006 and referred to § 21.2, 23 where auxiliary personnel can perform X-rays as long 24 as they are directly being observed or supervised by a 25 podiatrist on the premises and as long as the person

has passed an examination and has been approved by the 1 Board administered in accordance with the 2 Administrative Code of 1929. 3

4 Dr. Paris noted the avenue for a podiatric 5 assistant to receive certification to take X-rays is 6 passing a test approved by the Board and questioned 7 who is able to petition the Board with such tests.

Dr. Paris questioned whether individual 9 podiatrists could develop a test that might be 10 comparable to tests that are already out there that 11 review radiologic safety and procedures or does it 12 have to be another organization. He commented that whatever the examination the assistant would have to 13 take would have to be in accordance with the 14 15 Administrative Code of 1929.

16 Chairman Weber commented that certification every 17 year is an unnecessary nuisance that adds extra 18 expense and a tremendous amount of work on the staff. 19 He questioned whether the Board would have the ability 20 to change certification to biennial. He noted that 21 Board members have an obligation to look after people 2.2 who are not members of PPMA and are still licensed in 23 the commonwealth. He thanked Dr. Paris for the information. 24

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Dr. Paris referred to the Podiatry Practice Act,

where it is written that a person has to pass an 1 2 examination approved by the Board but whether or not 3 that person kept up with current ASPMA certification 4 is not written in the Podiatry Practice Act and 5 deferred the matter to legal colleagues. Chairman Weber thanked Dr. Paris for his input 6 7 and requested legal counsel look into the matter. 8 Chairman Weber addressed a possible mechanism in 9 the future where boards could have a cochair and 10 expressed appreciation for every person on the Board, 11 including legal counsel, administration, and the 12 Commissioner.] * * * 13 14 Report of Commissioner 15 [K. Kalonji Johnson, Commissioner, Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs, offered no 16 formal report. He addressed discussions during 17 18 Executive Session, where they are finalizing 19 preparation for the email blasts to licensees on 20 behalf of the Board. He thanked Board members for 21 their work regarding the substantive content. Нe 22 mentioned updates will be provided with regard to 23 legislative updates for all licensees hopefully within the next several days. 2.4 25 Commissioner Johnson commented that Board

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1 meetings will continue in virtual formal. He 2 mentioned that the General Assembly extended many 3 waivers affecting licensees for the next 90 days even 4 though the emergency disaster declaration formally 5 ended.

6 Commissioner noted that the Department of State 7 Office of Policy, Office of Legislative Affairs, and 8 Office of Chief Counsel are collaborating with the 9 administration and working with colleagues in the 10 General Assembly and executive directors for the 11 Professional Licensure Committees and Consumer 12 Protection Committees in the House and Senate to ensure beneficial waivers can be enacted to be 13 implemented after October 1 and to ensure gradual wind 14 15 down does not harm the public or detrimentally affect 16 practitioners.

17 Dr. Greenberg referred to a question received 18 from a colleague regarding the waiver. He questioned 19 whether a podiatrist, who does not have all of the 20 continuing education (CE) credits in online by 21 September 30 and the curtain comes down and since the 22 proposal is not in place yet where you get 100 percent 23 of credits online, would now have to find a face-to-24 face conference.

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Commissioner Johnson stated a face-to-face

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1 conference would have to be found if something could 2 not be scheduled before October 1, unless the general 3 assembly was willing to provide a legislative remedy 4 that would apply to all of the boards.

5 Ms. Wray commented that the waiver actually 6 indicates specifically through the individual's next 7 renewal that comes after January 1, 2021.

Ms. Wray mentioned that the voted part states 8 9 effective January 1, 2021, licensees are permitted to 10 renew their license after next renewal that comes 11 after January 1, 2021, utilizing CE obtained through 12 either traditional in-person courses or by means of 13 distance learning and means that licensees may satisfy 14 up to 100 percent of their CE requirements for their 15 next renewal.

Commissioner Johnson believed the intent of that language is if an individual has the online CE and completed the online CE at some point between January 1 and the end of the disaster declaration.

20 Commissioner Johnson commented that the idea 21 behind that language is to ensure full credit for any 22 courses taken under the conditions of the waiver even 23 if the disaster declaration ends. He noted it does 24 not artificially extend the conditions of the waiver 25 beyond what the general assembly now dictated.

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Dr. Greenberg suggested Mr. Kriner or
 Commissioner Johnson provide a definitive answer for a
 newsletter for licensees.

4 Commissioner Johnson commented that he would 5 provide language for all to understand that waivers 6 are ending on September 30, 2021, and anyone who is 7 going to continue acting as if they were under a 8 waiver after that date will be subject to conditions 9 or penalties.

Commissioner Johnson emphasized that everyone may simply go back to the way things were on March 15, 2020, or there may be a new paradigm depending on what the general assembly does in the next 90 days. He noted the importance of licensees being prepared for those eventualities.

Commissioner Johnson stated the only answer that could be given on June 16 is that unless the waiver is extended beyond September 30, the conditions of the waiver will no longer be in effect.

20 Commissioner Johnson further explained that 21 credit received moving forward until September 30 will 22 be kept and no one will be penalized for operating 23 under the waiver. He mentioned adding something, 24 where individuals would not lose credit, but the idea 25 they would be able to approve more credits cannot be

answered because no one knows what will happen between 1 2 now and September 30, 2021. 3 Commissioner Johnson encouraged associations 4 reach out to elected officials to see what they can do 5 to extend some of the waivers and advocate on behalf 6 of their members and licensees in general as to why 7 the waiver is beneficial instead of relying on an 18month regulatory process.] 8 9 CHAIRMAN WEBER: 10 I would like to have a motion to accept 11 Commissioner Johnson's report. 12 DR. GREENBERG: 13 I make a motion to accept Commissioner 14 Johnson's report. 15 DR. PARIS: I'll second. 16 17 CHAIRMAN WEBER: 18 All in favor? Any nays? [The motion carried unanimously.] 19 * * * 20 21 Report of Board Administrator - No Report 22 [Nicole Wray, Board Administrator, informed the Board 23 that she is officially the Board administrator and 24 offered her assistance with any questions or concerns. 25 Chairman Weber thanked Ms. Wray for being onboard

and answering the Board's questions.] 1 * * * 2 3 Continuing Education Program Approval 4 [Nicole Wray, Board Administrator, noted there were no 5 applications to be brought before the Board today. 6 Dr. McCaughan stated she had nothing to report on 7 an educational basis and had no issues with reviewing applications going forward.] 8 9 * * * 10 For the Board's Information/Discussion - Board Meeting 11 Dates [Robert B. Weber, D.P.M., J.D., M.B.A., Chairman, 12 13 noted upcoming Board meeting dates.] 14 * * * 15 Miscellaneous 16 [Robert B. Weber, D.P.M., J.D., M.B.A., Chairman, 17 requested information regarding potential appointments for the Board. 18 19 Commissioner Johnson mentioned not seeing any 20 correspondence from the Governor's Office with respect 21 to podiatry. He apologized to Dr. Fetchik for not 22 being able to formally welcome him as the newest 23 member but is working on whatever hiccups took place 24 so everyone can enjoy his participation and commentary 25 in the next Executive Session.

Commissioner Johnson acknowledged Andrew LaFratte 1 and Marc Farrell for their work on the Veterans' 2 3 Licensure Survey and pending 50-state report that is 4 going live soon, which is a comprehensive look at 5 Pennsylvania's licensing requirements across all of 6 the boards and commissions throughout the 50 states. 7 Commissioner Johnson stated the Veterans' 8 Licensure Survey was incredibly well done and 9 highlights some of the policies that are an impediment 10 to military families and looks at recommendations for 11 streamlining licensing requirements to remediate 12 administrative burdens. 13 Commissioner Johnson commented that they are 14 moving on to the final element of the project, looking 15 at licensure of new Pennsylvanians and how their 16 licensure is impacted by the basis of where they are 17 coming from.] * * * 18 19 Adjournment 20 CHAIRMAN WEBER: 21 Could I have a motion for adjournment? 2.2 DR. PARIS: 23 I'll make that motion. 24 DR. GREENBERG: 25 I'll second it.

19 CHAIRMAN WEBER: 1 2 All in favor?
