3 * * * 1 2 State Board of Podiatry 3 December 21, 2022 * * * 4 5 [Pursuant to Section 708(a)(5) of the Sunshine Act, 6 at 7 9:30 a.m. the Board entered into Executive Session 8 with Todd P. Kriner, Esquire, Board Counsel, for the 9 purpose of conducting quasi-judicial deliberations 10 and to have attorney-client consultation. The Board returned to open session at 10:30 a.m.] 11 * * * 12 13 The regularly scheduled meeting of the State 14 Board of Podiatry was held on Wednesday, December 21, 15 2022. Michael J. Paris, D.P.M., M.B.A., Chairman, called the meeting to order at 10:31 a.m. 16 * * * 17 18 Roll Call/Introduction of Attendees 19 [Nichole Wray, Board Administrator, provided an 20 introduction of the Board members, staff, and audience in attendance. 21 22 Ms. Wray also reminded everyone that the meeting 23 was being recorded, and voluntary participation 24 constituted consent to be recorded.] * * * 25

Approval of minutes of the October 19, 2022 meeting 1 2 CHAIRMAN PARIS: 3 Could we get a motion to approve the minutes from the October 19 meeting? 4 5 DR. MCCAUGHAN: 6 I'll make that motion. 7 DR. WEBER: 8 I'll second it. 9 CHAIRMAN PARIS: 10 Roll call vote. 11 12 Mr. Claggett, aye; Dr. Paris, aye; Dr. 13 Weber, aye; Dr. McCaughan, aye. 14 [The motion carried unanimously.] 15 * * * 16 Appointment - Bureau of Finance and Operations 17 Annual Budget Presentation 18 [Amanda Richards, Chief of Fiscal Management, Bureau 19 of Finance and Operations, Department of State, 20 referred to licensee population over the past seven 21 years, noting the Board had 1,461 licensees in FY21-22 22 and 1,549 licenses as of the time of the report. 23 She reported an increase of 88 licenses. 24 Ms. Richards addressed license class. She stated 25 the Board is currently in the middle of a renewal

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1 year. She noted prior discussion concerning a fee 2 increase but informed Board members that the fee 3 increase is no longer necessary because of the 4 substantial growth in licensees.

5 Ms. Richards addressed revenue, noting it is 6 reviewed on a biennial basis. She reported revenue 7 for FY20-21 at \$581,000 and revenue for FY21-22 of 8 about \$27,000 for a biennial total of \$608,430.89. 9 She noted 96 percent of revenue comes from renewals 10 and applications. She stated that revenue is 11 received from other categories but is not consistent.

12 Ms. Richards noted the two main categories when 13 reviewing expenses are administrative and legal 14 costs. She stated that expenses are brought in 15 through direct charges, timesheet-based charges, and 16 licensee population. She referred to expenses in FY20-21 at about \$355,000, FY21-22 about \$309,000, 17 18 and \$100,414.87 at the time of the report. She noted the budgeted amount for FY22-23 of \$312,000 is more 19 20 than adequate for this fiscal year. 21 Ms. Richards addressed revenue and expenses showing a projected balance in FY22-23 to be about 22

23 \$2.1 million and showing substantial growth in

24 revenue through FY25-26 at \$1.9 million.]

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1 [Todd P. Kriner, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted the 2 Board engaged in guasi-judicial deliberations during 3 Executive Session on matters listed on the agenda.] * * * 4 5 Report of Prosecutors 6 [Timothy J. Henderson, Esquire, Board Prosecution 7 Liaison, presented the Consent Agreements for Case No. 21-44-010334 and Case No. 21-44-017790.] 8 9 MR. KRINER: 10 The Chairman would entertain a motion on 11 number 4 to accept that Consent Agreement at Case No. 21-44-010334. 12 13 DR. MCCAUGHAN: 14 I'll make that motion. 15 DR. WEBER: 16 I second. CHAIRMAN PARIS: 17 18 Roll call vote. 19 20 Mr. Claggett, aye; Dr. Paris, aye; Dr. 21 Weber, aye; Dr. McCaughan, aye. 22 [The motion carried unanimously. The Respondent's 23 name is Aisha S. Chaudhry, D.P.M.] * * * 24 25 MR. KRINER:

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7 1 Moving on to number 5. It is my 2 understanding that the Chairman would 3 entertain a motion to reject the Consent 4 Agreement at Case No. 21-44-017790 as 5 being too lenient. DR. MCCAUGHAN: 6 7 I make a motion. 8 DR. WEBER: 9 Second. 10 MS. WRAY: 11 Mr. Claggett, aye; Dr. Paris, aye; Dr. 12 Weber, aye; Dr. McCaughan, aye. 13 [The motion carried unanimously.] * * * 14 15 Report of Board Counsel - Other 16 [Todd P. Kriner, Esquire, Board Counsel, provided an 17 update regarding Lawrence Kansky's appeal. He stated 18 the Board filed a brief in response on December 5, 19 2022, and is now in the Commonwealth Court's hands to 20 decide the matter. 21 Mr. Kriner referred to 16A-66 regarding the Act 22 53 regulation for the Board's review. He noted the 23 proposed rulemaking was published in the Pennsylvania 24 Bulletin the first week of November and is still in 25 the comment period. He informed Board members that

1 any comments received would be reviewed and then 2 begin drafting the final-form regulation in 2023. He 3 noted the radiographic assistant's preamble and annex 4 for would be on the February agenda for the Board's 5 review.

6 Mr. Kriner addressed questions raised at the last 7 meeting concerning the disability placard. He 8 informed Board members that PennDOT's website states 9 that a health care provider can fill out the form and 10 podiatrists are included under the definition of 11 health care provider.

Mr. Kriner informed Board members that he 12 13 contacted Matt Eaton, who is Acting Commissioner 14 Claggett's designee for the Medical Marijuana 15 Advisory Board, regarding another question concerning 16 podiatrist and the medical cannabis program. Не stated the Medical Marijuana Advisory Board met on 17 18 September 22 and that he was advised that they would 19 be discussing this at their next regulatory 20 subcommittee meeting and would keep the Board 21 updated. 22 Chairman Paris asked whether the carryover of

22 continuing medical education is (CME) tied into one 24 of the regulations currently going through the 25 process.

Mr. Kriner explained that the CME would be put in 1 2 with another regulation package and would go along 3 with the list of therapeutic drugs. He mentioned 4 that the list of therapeutic drugs would be available 5 next time for the Board's review and would be a part 6 of the prescribing opioid package as well. He noted 7 the package up until the potential addition of the 8 therapeutic drugs has not been controversial and 9 would have moved through pretty quick. 10 Mr. Kriner stated there was potential kickback 11 with the addition of the therapeutic drugs, but Dr.

12 McCaughan did some amazing work and believed they 13 would be able to address any concerns. He informed 14 Board members that the package could be readdressed 15 to make sure what the Board wants prioritized gets 16 through and passes.] * * * 17 18 Report of Regulatory Counsel - No Report * * * 19

20 Report of Board Chair

[Michael J. Paris, D.P.M., M.B.A., Chairman, noted prior Board discussion concerning malpractice and insurance companies allowed to provide service in Pennsylvania. He mentioned Dr. Greenberg brought up the term companies that are admitted into

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Pennsylvania at a previous meeting. He noted
 visiting the Pennsylvania Insurance Department's
 website showing a list of insurance companies
 licensed in Pennsylvania.

5 Chairman Paris stated there are hundreds of 6 companies listed and would be a lot for a new 7 podiatrist in Pennsylvania looking through the list. 8 He suggested having someone from the Pennsylvania 9 Insurance Department provide a brief presentation 10 explaining where a podiatrist in Pennsylvania would go to know who could actually offer malpractice 11 insurance and the difference between admitted and 12 13 licensed.

14 Chairman Paris referred to Dr. Greenberg 15 previously bringing up the Joint Underwriting 16 Association (JUA) of Pennsylvania. He noted that it 17 was established in accordance with the Medical Care 18 Availability and Reduction of Error (MCARE) Act many 19 years ago and suggested having a brief presentation 20 to touch on that and have on record what a 21 Pennsylvania podiatrist needs to do to secure 22 malpractice insurance.

Acting Commissioner Claggett offered to work with the Pennsylvania Insurance Department to have someone do a presentation.

Dr. Weber also suggested having the information
 in an email blast or newsletter.

3 Ms. Wray commented that it would be worthwhile to 4 provide the information after the presentation to 5 anyone unable to attend.

6 Chairman Paris noted the importance of keeping 7 the information current and believed an email blast 8 would be better than a newsletter because the 9 information becomes irrelevant due to the time it 10 takes for approval of the newsletter articles.

Acting Commissioner Claggett commented that he and Mr. Kriner would be approving the newsletter and are committed to turn that around as soon as possible.

15 Dr. Weber commented that the Board has compassion 16 for practitioners whether or not they are members of 17 the American Podiatric Medical Association (APMA) or 18 not. He noted the importance of taking care of young 19 podiatrists, where younger individuals are sometimes 20 placed into an insurance policy accepted by the state 21 but does not have the liability to hire the best 22 administrators and attorneys to represent them.] 23 24 Report of Acting Commissioner - No Report * * * 25

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1 Report of Board Administrator

2	[Nichole Wray, Board Administrator, reminded
3	everybody the license renewal is open until December
4	31 and encouraged everyone to complete child abuse
5	and CME requirements because there is no grace
6	period. She noted the child abuse and any CME must
7	be completed between January 1, 2021 and December 31,
8	2022. She addressed the Department of Health Survey.

9 Ms. Wray welcomed anyone who had any questions to 10 call or email the Board at st-podiatry@pa.gov or 11 submit a ticket directly through their Pennsylvania 12 Licensing System (PALS) account.

Acting Commissioner Claggett commented that he is working with the Department of Health to reduce the number of questions in the survey.

Dr. Weber addressed podiatrists who are retiring and requested information concerning what the Board should be advising people who are retiring and considering giving up their license.

20 Ms. Wray discussed license status options, 21 including active or active-retired status each of 22 which require some form of CE, or inactive and 23 expired status.

Ms. Wray addressed the renewal process, including a 60-day window with an email notice and instructions

and a 30-day and 15-day reminder. She reported 1 2 renewals are around 75-76 percent. 3 Chairman Paris commented that hospitals, surgery 4 centers, and nursing homes ask for proof of renewal 5 sometimes a month or two before they renew their 6 licenses.] 7 * * * For the Board's Information/Discussion - Old 8 9 Business/New Business - Approval of Proposed 2024 10 Board Meeting Dates 11 [Nichole Wray, Board Administrator, informed Board 12 members that many of the dates are not on a Wednesday 13 because the dates were already taken. 14 Ms. Wray offered to provide proposed 2025 meeting 15 dates in February for the Board's review.] 16 CHAIRMAN PARIS: 17 We need a motion to approve the 2024 18 dates. DR. MCCAUGHAN: 19 20 I make a motion to approve. 21 DR. WEBER: 22 Second. 23 CHAIRMAN PARIS: 24 Roll call vote. 25
