Mr. Kriner noted the proposed regulatory package for 16A-448 Sexual Misconduct is under departmental

Mr. Kriner noted Regulatory Counsel is drafting 16A-4411 Volunteer License.

Mr. Kriner referred to 16A-4412 Child Abuse Reporting Requirements, noting counsel is revising the proposed rulemaking to reflect numerous changes requested by the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC).

Mr. Kriner informed Board members that he would get a number for the radiographic assistants' regulation, noting he drafted a memo and presented it internally, which is under departmental review. He will be moving forward with drafting the preamble and annex because he received no comments. He mentioned that the regulation would be discussed further when they discuss the Radiation Health and Safety Exam administered by the Dental Assisting National Board later on the agenda.

Mr. Kriner informed Board members that the legislative initiative the Board discussed and

approved counsel to draft and move forward at the 1 2 June 2022 meeting was completed and under 3 departmental review. He reported receiving no 4

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response at this time.]

6 Report of Board Chair

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[Michael J. Paris, D.P.M., M.B.A., Chairman, commented that the Board does a good job spelling out continuing medical education (CME) and licensure requirements but noted the importance of discussing legal requirements of podiatrists in the state.

Chairman Paris addressed medical malpractice and the Podiatry Practice Act, noting the requirements and options may not be spelled out on the website for podiatrists. He mentioned being solicited by various insurance companies wanting him to buy malpractice insurance but not knowing whether the companies are legal in Pennsylvania.

Chairman Paris addressed the importance of podiatrists in Pennsylvania knowing which medical malpractice insurance companies are admitted into Pennsylvania to legally provide insurance. He stated such matters come under the jurisdiction of the Pennsylvania Insurance Department and believed there needed to be a connection between their Board and the

1 department as far as steering licensees in the right 2 direction.

Dr. Greenberg stated the public and citizens of Pennsylvania need to go to a podiatrist who is insured by a company admitted into Pennsylvania for protection if the company goes bankrupt or there is a claim against the podiatrist. He also mentioned receiving unsolicited calls and not knowing whether the company is admitted or not admitted.

Dr. Greenberg suggested having a link on the website to the Pennsylvania Insurance Department for licensees that would provide a list of those companies admitted to provide insurance to podiatrists in Pennsylvania and only consist of reliable companies. He asked whether someone could contact the State Insurance Department.

Dr. Greenberg also suggested the insurance provided by the Joint Underwriting Association (JUA) of Pennsylvania, whose main purpose is to provide insurance for health care providers who cannot otherwise obtain insurance coverage from the private market, be included in the list of companies. He noted they also provide insurance for nonsurgical podiatrists that should be accessible for licensees to review. He recommended an email blast be sent to

all licensees informing them of the link on the Board to the Pennsylvania Insurance Department.

Acting Commissioner Claggett agreed with the addition of the medical malpractice requirement to the website and asked Ms. Wray to contact the Pennsylvania Department of Insurance to see what is searchable publicly for podiatrists and add that link as well.

Dr. Greenberg stated there are many companies that sell medical malpractice insurance, but not all provide insurance for podiatrist and suggested asking the Pennsylvania Insurance Department for their cooperation in finding companies that provide insurance specifically for podiatrists, including the Pennsylvania Joint Underwriting Association.

Dr. Greenberg noted the Pennsylvania Insurance
Department keeps track of a company's financial
standing, and the Board would not be endorsing or
saying anything about the quality of any company.

Acting Commissioner Claggett discussed commencing the work on those requests, along with Ms. Wray contacting the Department of Insurance and checking with JUA. He suggested the matter be placed on the agenda for the next Board meeting, where he would provide an update for discussion.

Chairman Paris referred to a lengthy discussion last meeting regarding the Department of Environmental Protection's (DEP) requirements of podiatrist who take X-rays in their office. He stated there are many podiatrists who do not realize there are Board regulations and DEP regulations as far as X-rays and suggested putting a link on their webpage regarding the DEP and directing podiatrists where to find the information.

Chairman Paris stated it was determined at the previous meetings to allow carryover of 10 CME credits and suggested sending an email blast to licenses and updating their webpage.

Mr. Kriner explained that it was not as simple as just approving the carryover, because the regulations specify that licensees cannot carry over credits and would require an amendment to permit the carryover of 10 continuing education (CE) credits. He noted the Board approved the carryover of 10 CE credits, but it was not done because they had already been in the process of going in front of IRRC to have that CE regulation approved and missed the vote on adding it to that regulation.

Dr. Greenberg commented that the Board is just adding something but not waiving their approval of

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   all online credits by voting on this.
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        Mr. Kriner noted the removal under § 29.61(a),
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   "excess clock hours may not be carried over to the
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   next biennium" and the addition of "May carryover up
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   to 10 CE credits."

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   that there are a lot of regulations in the pipeline,

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the other regulations already in the pipeline because
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   it is just that one sentence. He informed Board
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   members that he would discuss the matter with senior
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   Regulatory Counsel to ensure the most streamline and
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   efficient way possible.]
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   Report of Acting Commissioner
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   [Arion R. Claggett, Acting Commissioner, Bureau of
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   Professional and Occupational Affairs, notified
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   everyone of in-person Board member training on
   October 24, 2022, from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. in
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   Harrisburg. He noted the training is mandatory for
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   public members but also encouraged professional
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   members to attend. He noted topics would include the
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   role of prosecution and Board Counsel. He also
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   mentioned everyone should have received an email.]
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   Report of Board Administrator - Other
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   [Nichole Wray, Board Administrator, informed Board
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   members that email blasts were sent to all active
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   licensees on Monday, August 15 regarding 16A-4417
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   continuing education, highlighting changes that up to
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   100 percent of continuing education may be completed
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   online through approved synchronous and/or
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   asynchronous distance education, along with providing
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the definitions of synchronous versus asynchronous distance education.

Ms. Wray noted the email also included an attachment of the Board's updated renewal CME requirements, which could also be found on the Department of State's website under general board information at www.dos.pa.gov/pod.

Ms. Wray read a public notice issued by the Council on Podiatric Medical Education (CPME), dated August 11, 2022, and shared by the Federation of Podiatric Medical Boards (FPMB) yesterday, stating the Council on Podiatric Medical Education (CPME) is aware of the recent announcements by the American Board of Podiatric Medicine (ABPM) to offer a Certificate of Added Qualification (CAQ) in podiatric surgery. She noted the Council does not recognize or approve any CAQs within its current policies and procedures for board recognition.

Ms. Wray stated CAQs are not equivalent to certification and cannot lead to certification in any specific content area, where the Council believes it would be confusing to the public to provide a qualification in podiatric surgery when there is a surgical certification board within the profession.

Ms. Wray stated the Joint Committee on the

Recognition of Specialty Boards (JCRSB) was restructured as a standing committee of the Council as the Specialty Board Recognition Committee (SBRC) as of March 2022 and is no longer a joint committee with the American Podiatric Medical Association (APMA). She noted the ruling made by the JCRSB in 2018 is still in effect and states that, although the ABPM was offering CAQs, all language on the actual CAQ provided to its certificants must state

that the CAQ is not a CPME-recognized product.

Ms. Wray stated the Council had already appointed an ad hoc advisory committee to begin the rewrite of the SBRC documents beginning in the fall of 2022. She stated the Council's rules and procedures are the result of a thoughtful and deliberative process, and CPME would continue to vigorously enforce its existing and future standards with due process.

Ms. Wray stated CPME requested that all specialty boards refrain from implementing CAQs, including the CAQ in podiatric surgery, until the rewrite process is complete.

Ms. Wray informed Board members that CPME is making the public statement so there is no ambiguity in its current position with respect to CAQs and ensuring that stakeholders have accurate facts about

the Council's prevailing policy.

Ms. Wray addressed additional context from CPME's website that two specialty boards aligned with three special areas of practice are recognized by the Council and the JCRSB. She stated recognition is based upon the demonstrated ability of a board to satisfy established criteria, and with a view towards ensuring the health and safety of the public, only one specialty board may be recognized to conduct certification for each designated podiatric medical specialty area.

Ms. Wray noted the American Board of Podiatric Medicine is recognized as the certifying board for the specialty areas of podiatric orthopedics and primary podiatric medicine, and the American Board of Foot and Ankle Surgery is recognized as the certifying board for the specialty area of podiatric surgery.

Ms. Wray informed everyone to direct any questions related to the public notice to the Council on Podiatric Medical Education at CPMEstaff@cpme.org. She noted forwarding a copy of that notice to Board members yesterday and asked that the announcement be posted on Department of State's website under the announcement page.

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Ms. Wray announced receiving approval to update
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   the equipment registration requirements information,
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   noting the Department of State's website had already
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   been updated and reviewed the changes with Board
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   members. She referred to general Board information
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   and informed everyone of an additional auxiliary

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2 For the Board's Information/Discussion - Old 3 Business/New Business - Radiation Health and Safety 4 Exam Administered by the Dental Assisting National 5 Board (DANB) [Nichole Wray, Board Administrator, provided 6 7 clarification with the help of Mr. Jarabeck to the 8 Board's previous discussions concerning what the 9 Dental Board accepts as a radiology exam, which is 10 the Dental Assisting National Board. She provided 11 documents, including the actual application for 12 registration, qualification requirements, and 13 examination quidelines. She reminded everyone that 14 the State Board of Podiatry recognizes not only the 15

Chairman Paris commented that dental assistants are adept regarding X-rays as far as safety and technique much more than any other assistants and would be in favor of having the DANB as an option.

exam from PPMA but also exams approved by the Board

of Medicine, Board of Chiropractic, and Board of

Chairman Paris stated an unemployed dental assistant could still keep their certification, but it was not an option in podiatry. In order for a podiatric assistant to get any kind of certification

through their facilitation, the applicant must be currently employed by a podiatrist who is a member of the APMA, which makes it more difficult to find someone who is certified. He noted the regulations state someone can pass any test that is approved and administered by their Board, where someone could present a test similar to a dental exam or any other exam and present it to the Board for approval and would be an option at some point.

Mr. Kriner informed Board members that they have to be in agreement that this is the type of exam that would be approved. He noted reviewing this particular exam and referred to § 29.83(a), where it reads, "With an emphasis placed on the scope of practice of podiatric medicine" and wanted to make sure this particular exam would cover this.

Chairman Paris mentioned the need for more information and looking further at the Board of Medicine, Board of Chiropractic, and Board of Osteopathic Medicine tests. He noted the importance of a podiatric assistant knowing how to shield the patient, collimate the machine, and clean the machine

Mr. Kriner and Ms. Wray will review the exams approved by the Board of Medicine, Board of Chiropractic, and Board of Osteopathic Medicine.

Chairman Paris suggested including the American
Registry of Radiologic Technologists (ARRT) model
exam as well. He noted there would be no voting
until additional information is received for
discussion at the next meeting.]

Pharmaceuticals

[Michael J. Paris, D.P.M., M.B.A., Chairman, referred to updates to approved pharmaceuticals.

Dr. Fetchik informed Board members that diuretics for stasis changes in the lower extremities and antiplatelet agents that could be used for cardiovascular issues affecting the lower extremities, such as Buerger's disease, were not mentioned in any of the lists.

Dr. McCaughan addressed an issue with a patient in need of a diuretic and having difficulty trying to correspond with the primary care physician's office to get someone to see the patient within a timely manner and prescribe it.

Chairman Paris requested information regarding the process of adding medications to the list.

25 Mr. Kriner noted amendments recommendations had

been made to the therapeutic drugs at § 29.41 before,

but the policy department and governor's office

turned it down because they were not sure of how the

particular drugs related to the scope of practice of

podiatry and concern of treating systemic disease as

opposed to as it relates to the scope of podiatric

medicine.

Mr. Kriner noted he would need the Board's help in clearly defining these drugs and what they would be used for, making sure it is within the scope of podiatric medicine.

Dr. McCaughan offered to provide an outline of what diagnoses podiatry would be treating with specific drugs.

Mr. Kriner stated the Board knows what the policy office and governor's office concerns are and could specifically address those by amending § 29.41 to add the specific drugs to that list. He also mentioned it would be important to know what other states are doing as well. He noted the provisions were adopted in 1971 and amended in 1990.

Chairman Paris noted the importance of updating the list because there are whole categories of medications that have been developed after 1990, along with medications themselves with new approved

21 1 uses. 2 Dr. Greenberg commented that it is within their 3 statutory definition, where in their scope of 4 practice, medicine includes local manifestations of 5 systemic disease and would fall within that 6 parameter.] 7 * * * 8 Adjournment CHAIRMAN PARIS: 10 Could we get a motion to adjourn the 11 meeting?
