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   Report of Prosecutorial Division
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   [Paul J. Jarabeck, Esquire, Senior Board Prosecutor,
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   had nothing to report. He introduced Amber
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1 Czerniakowski as the new prosecution liaison for 2 their Board.

4 Appointment - Prosecution Division Annual Report
5 Presentation

[Carolyn A. DeLaurentis, Esquire, Executive Deputy
Chief Counsel, Department of State, informed Board
members that she is now the executive deputy chief
counsel for the Department of State but is presenting
to the Board on behalf of the prosecution division in
her former role to provide the presentation. She
announced Carlton Smith as the new deputy chief
counsel for the prosecution division.

Ms. DeLaurentis presented to the Board to provide a summary of the prosecution division's role and to present annual numbers for 2022. She informed Board members that the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs provides administrative and legal support to all 29 professional and occupational licensing boards and commissions with the mission to protect the health and safety of the public and the integrity of the profession. She noted legal support includes the prosecution division, counsel attorneys, hearing examiners, and support staff.

Ms. DeLaurentis explained that the Office of

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1 Chief Counsel is under the Governor's Office of
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- 2 | General Counsel, and all of the attorneys under the
- 3 Office of Chief Counsel are assigned to the
- 4 Department of State, noting the prosecution division
- 5 is the largest division under the Office of Chief
- 6 Counsel. She noted the prosecution division works
- 7 | with the Bureau of Enforcement and Investigation
- 8 (BEI), along with the Professional Compliance Office
- 9 (PCO).
- 10 Ms. DeLaurentis stated BEI, PCO, and prosecution
- 11 are all tasked with receiving complaints,
- 12 | investigating allegations, ensuring public safety,
- 13 and enforcing compliance with the acts and
- 14 regulations that govern the 29 licensing boards and
- 15 commissions.
- 16 Ms. DeLaurentis stated the prosecution division
- 17 has five senior prosecuting attorneys because the
- 18 prosecution division is broken into five teams, where
- 19 each team is led by a senior prosecutor. She noted
- 20 they have prosecuting attorneys under their
- 21 supervision as well as support staff.
- 22 Ms. DeLaurentis noted Paul Jarabeck, Heather
- 23 McCarthy, Ray Michalowski, and William Newport are
- 24 | senior prosecutors, along with Karl Geschwindt
- 25 serving as an acting senior prosecutor. She noted

there are currently 32 prosecuting attorneys with 1 vacancy, which includes prosecution liaisons.

Ms. DeLaurentis explained that prosecution is a complaint-driven agency, noting complaints are received from any source but prefer complaints be submitted through the Pennsylvania Licensing System (PALS) at pals.pa.gov because it is the most efficient. She noted prosecution also accepts complaints from other state and federal agencies, law enforcement, and through media reports.

Ms. DeLaurentis discussed levels of review, including jurisdiction checks to see if the complaint falls under their jurisdiction. She mentioned complaints are referred to the appropriate agency if prosecution does not have jurisdiction. She provided a list of complaint categories.

Ms. DeLaurentis addressed the prosecution process after determining jurisdiction, where BEI is sent out to interview witnesses and gather evidence.]
