Ms. Goldman noted that it is not a test but a preamble explaining the importance of ethics and whether they could answer the questions.

Vice Chair Butler commented that all of the states are developing a requirement in continuing education units (CEUs) for ethics and offered to provide information from other states at the next Board meeting.

Acting Commissioner Claggett informed Board members that something could be sent to licensees after review of the questions because it would be informational and not a requirement.

Vice Chair Butler addressed implementing a web page for speech-language pathology and audiology but apologized for the confusion. She explained that the Board does have information on the site for speech-language pathology and audiology. She noted speaking with Acting Commissioner Claggett regarding putting something on that page related to insight of something going on and would discuss that more as a Board.

Vice Chair Butler addressed the Board's request for the prosecution division to provide more detailed information regarding the number of citations.

Ms. Wucinski suggested the Board ask Ms. DeLaurentis for an additional report specifically for citations.

Vice Chair Butler thanked Acting Commissioner
Claggett and the state for providing a self-learning
plan to better understand how to submit a travel

Ms. Czerniakowski offered prosecution's assistance in providing information regarding their process as part of any presentations. She also welcomed any contacts Board members have to make it easier to provide the presentations.]

Appointment - Prosecution Division Annual Report

Presentation

[Carolyn A. DeLaurentis, Esquire, Executive Deputy

Chief Counsel, Department of State, informed Board

members that she is now the executive deputy chief

counsel for the Department of State but is presenting

to the Board on behalf of the prosecution division to

Ms. DeLaurentis presented to the Board to provide a summary of the prosecution division's role and to present annual numbers for 2022. She informed Board members that the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs provides administrative and legal support to all 29 professional and occupational licensing boards and commissions with the mission to protect the health and safety of the public and the integrity of the profession. She noted legal support includes the prosecution division, counsel attorneys, hearing examiners, and legal staff.

Ms. DeLaurentis explained that the Office of
Chief Counsel is under the Governor's Office of
General Counsel, and all of the attorneys under the
Office of Chief Counsel are assigned to the
Department of State, noting the prosecution division

is the largest division under the Office of Chief
Counsel. She noted the prosecution division works
with the Bureau of Enforcement and Investigation
(BEI), along with the Professional Compliance Office
(PCO).

Ms. DeLaurentis stated BEI, PCO, and prosecution are all tasked with receiving complaints, investigating allegations, ensuring public safety, and enforcing compliance with the acts and regulations that govern the 29 licensing boards and commissions.

Ms. DeLaurentis stated the prosecution division has five senior prosecuting attorneys because the prosecution division is broken into five teams, where each team is led by a senior prosecutor. She noted Paul Jarabeck, Heather McCarthy, Ray Michalowski, and William Newport are senior prosecutors, along with Karl Geschwindt serving as an acting senior prosecutor. She noted there are about 33 prosecuting attorneys, which includes prosecution liaisons.

Ms. DeLaurentis explained that prosecution is a complaint-driven agency, noting complaints are received from any source but prefer complaints be submitted through the Pennsylvania Licensing System (PALS) at pals.pa.gov because it is the most

efficient. She noted prosecution also accepts complaints from other states, law enforcement, and through media reports.

Ms. DeLaurentis discussed levels of review, including jurisdiction checks to see if the complaint falls under their jurisdiction. She mentioned complaints are referred to the appropriate agency if prosecution does not have jurisdiction. She provided a list of complaint categories.

Ms. DeLaurentis stated prosecution works with BEI and investigators to determine whether there is a violation of the act or regulation. She noted BEI conducts investigations, interviews witnesses, and gathers documents and facts.

Ms. DeLaurentis addressed the various levels of review and determining whether there was a violation. She explained that matters could be closed if there is not a violation to focus attention on cases where there may be a violation.

Ms. DeLaurentis noted prosecutors make charging decisions in conjunction with the seniors and their team if it is determined they have jurisdiction and there may be a violation. She addressed charging decisions, where they could file an order to show cause or issue a citation. She noted the licensees

have the ability to challenge the charges through a hearing process, noting it is similar to a regular criminal trial, where both parties enter evidence through witness testimony, documents, and legal arguments.

Ms. DeLaurentis noted hearing examiners typically issue a proposed adjudication and order and then the final decision is made by the Board because they have the power to impose discipline. She addressed consent agreements, where both parties have negotiated and reached a settlement they wished to present before the Board, but the Board has the final authority of whether to accept or reject the consent agreement.

Ms. DeLaurentis addressed the prosecution division's role at Board meetings, including presenting consent agreements and listening to concerns of the Board. She pointed out that prosecution has a confidentiality statute that applies to their files, where all of the contents within their files is confidential under the law and is why prosecution cannot speak on some matters.

Ms. DeLaurentis mentioned that all prosecution attorneys and staff sign a confidentiality affidavit indicating that they would abide by that and face

discipline if they do not.

Ms. DeLaurentis stated BEI conducts interviews and inspections for certain boards to obtain evidence. She noted BEI also serves subpoenas and deliver orders and letters, along with testifying to the results of their investigations and inspections. She noted BEI does not have unlimited access to locations or documents, is not considered a law enforcement agency under Pennsylvania law, and does not have search warrant authority.

Ms. DeLaurentis addressed document authority, where some boards have regulations and statutes that require cooperation if a request is made to review their records but not everyone complies and would be another charging decision prosecutors would need to make.

Ms. DeLaurentis addressed post-investigation, where BEI is gathering facts and present the evidence to prosecution. She stated BEI is not determining whether or not a law has been violated or determining whether someone should be charged because that is the role of the prosecution division. She noted prosecuting attorneys work with support staff to determine whether there was a violation to decide whether to close the matter or present the case.

Ms. DeLaurentis addressed immediate temporary suspensions, where a license is immediately suspended if someone is an immediate danger to the health and safety of the public. She noted automatic suspensions include 302 commitments for someone who was involuntarily committed for a mental health issue, drug act violations, and orders for examination for mainly health care licensees. She also noted petitions for appropriate relief are when someone has violated a board order.

Ms. DeLaurentis stated levels of discipline include revocations, suspensions, probations, reprimands, fines, remedial education, and cost of the investigation.

Ms. DeLaurentis referred to the confidentiality statute under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3109, where prosecution and investigative files are deemed privileged and confidential under the law. She explained that investigative records are deemed noncriminal investigative records and exempt from disclosure under the Right-to-Know Law.

Ms. DeLaurentis stated information could be shared with other licensing boards and law enforcement in furtherance of investigative efforts but only their final action could be shared publicly,

1 including final adjudications and orders, final
2 consent agreements, and final letters.

Ms. DeLaurentis provided data as of January 3, 2023, that includes notary and the Navigation Commission but not charities. She reported the number of open cases for the whole prosecution division was 13,154. She noted 16,084 cases were opened in 2022 and 17,826 were closed. She also noted the number of cases opened in 2021 was 18,363 and 15,994 cases closed. She thanked the prosecution division, counsel division, BEI, Board staff, legal staff, and the Board for their group effort.

Ms. DeLaurentis addressed specific information for the State Board of Examiners in Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology as of January 3, 2023, noting 71 cases were opened in 2022 and 43 closed. She reported 42 cases were opened in 2021 and 53 closed. She noted the Board currently has 48 open cases, which was around 20 in 2022.

Ms. DeLaurentis referred to disposition of closed cases, including discipline and non-discipline. She stated there were 10 cases that involved fines in 2022 and 3 Act 48/citation cases, which has been consistent with 2021 and prior years.

Ms. DeLaurentis addressed Z codes, noting they

- are internal codes used in their system when
  determining how to close a matter. She noted Z18 are
  the warning letters.
- Ms. Wucinski informed Ms. DeLaurentis that a lot 4 5 of licensees are confused about their biennial 6 renewal requirement, which is the 20 hours versus Act 7 48, which is the Pennsylvania Department of Education's Act 48 that requires teachers to complete 9 a certain number of continuing education hours every 10 5 vears. She wanted to clarify that Act 48 on the 11 sheet has nothing to do with the Pennsylvania 12 Department of Education. She further explained that 13 Act 48 under their law is the citation law.
  - Ms. DeLaurentis thanked Ms. Wucinski for bringing the information to her attention and believed the Act 48 citations should be reported as citations in the future.

- Ms. DeLaurentis addressed the earlier request from the Board and informed Board members that prosecution would be able to provide more information regarding citations. She also noted that an annual report is issued to the General Assembly, which includes complaint categories and types of cases, and would provide that report to the Board.
- 25 Vice Chair Butler asked whether audiology,

speech, and assistants are ever divided.

Ms. DeLaurentis suggested the Board provide the specific breakdown information to Board Counsel so prosecution could provide that data.

Mr. Jarabeck provided data from January 1, 2020, through the current day, and reported seven citations for the Board with one in 2020, one in 2021, three in 2022, and two as of 2023. He noted citations that occurred in 2022 and 2023 are based on continuing education and matters beforehand were generally a lapsed license.

Ms. Goldman asked whether an audit has been completed on renewals from 2022.

Mr. Jarabeck explained that an audit would come from Board staff to the prosecution division to review and make final determinations as to whether there are formal prosecutorial actions that would result in an order to show cause and potentially closure of the matter through a consent agreement and order or there could be the Act 48 citation or closure of the case if prosecution is not appropriate. He explained that the process is still ongoing in terms of prosecution.

Ms. DeLaurentis addressed warning letters, noting they are non-disciplinary but are used for de minimis

2.5 1 violations or CE issues that somebody rectified. She 2 noted warning letters are a great tool for 3 prosecutors on behalf of the Board to remind 4 licensees to follow the act and regulations to 5 protect the health and safety of the public and 6 maintain the integrity of the profession. 7 Vice Chair Butler thanked Ms. DeLaurentis for the 8 presentation.] 9 10 Appointment - Pennsylvania Insurance Department -Pennie Health Insurance Presentation 11 12 [Scott Yeager, Outreach Manager, Pennie, presented to 13 the Board to provide information about the 14 Pennsylvania Health Insurance Exchange Authority, commonly known as Pennie, which is the official 15 16 health insurance marketplace in the Commonwealth of 17 Pennsylvania.

Mr. Yeager stated the Pennie launched November 1, 2020, and has been able to transition customers from HealthCare.gov to pennie.com, initially transferring about 280,000 to a current enrollment of about 371,000 people in Pennsylvania.

Mr. Yeager explained that Pennie exists predominantly to help the uninsured in Pennsylvania who cannot access Medicare and Medicaid options.

reported 1 in 20 Pennsylvanians do not have health insurance, noting Pennie provides a competitive marketplace to make sure individual health insurance rates and premiums are affordable, provide choice, and help with financial assistance. He noted that 90 percent of Pennie customers qualify for some type of financial assistance by way of advanced premium tax credits to reduce the monthly premium, along with cost-sharing reductions aligned with silver plans to reduce copays, deductibles, and coinsurance.

Mr. Yeager stated individuals helped through
Pennie include those who lose employer-sponsored
coverage, small business owners, sole proprietors,
and others who do not have access to group insurance
plans. He reported 37 percent of customers are 55
and over and 40 percent of customers pay less than
\$75 a month for quality health insurance. He
mentioned that Pennie has several health insurance
carriers and multiple plan options, along with dental
insurance providers.

Mr. Yeager addressed open enrollment, which is from November 1 to January 15 but also has a special enrollment period from January through December for a qualifying life event and provided a list of qualifying events. He explained that the qualifying

life event is yearlong for individuals and families at or below 150 percent of the federal poverty level and do not qualify for Medical Assistance.

Mr. Yeager addressed a program called the Path to Pennie, which is a partnership between Pennie and the Pennsylvania Department of Revenue to help uninsured tax filers in Pennsylvania. He explained that Form REV-1882 could be completed and attached to their state tax return and then the Pennsylvania Department of Revenue securely shares that individual or family's information with Pennie. He noted Pennie then sets up an account, informs the individual of their eligibility for financial assistance, and connects them with resources to help them receive insurance.

Mr. Yeager addressed the ending of continuous coverage and the continuous coverage requirement for individuals protected under Medical Assistance during the pandemic. He stated the Department of Human Services has not had an annual redetermination process for those individuals and families but noted that the redetermination process started again on April 1, 2023, and encouraged everyone to inform individuals of Pennie.
