Mr. Fritz noted he is handling a new appeal that was filed and is getting ready to submit the certified record. He also noted a second protest was filed by B&B Sales and Service v. Triumph Motorcycles and not reflected on the cases.

Mr. Fritz stated the fee increase regulations were presented to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) at the beginning of December and approved. He informed Board members that it would be published as final in a week or two. He mentioned the fee increase goes into effect for anyone renewing after June 1, 2023. He also noted the fee increase for new applications begins July 1, 2023.

Mr. Fritz informed Board members that there would be a reinstatement hearing, along with the Lucid Group USA, Inc., hearing at the February meeting.]

   Professional and Occupational Affairs provides

   administrative and legal support to all 29 boards and
```

commissions, along with prosecution, the counsel division, and hearing examiners. She noted professional licensing protects the health and safety of the public and protects the integrity of the professions to ensure everyone is complying with laws and regulations.

Ms. DeLaurentis explained that the Office of Chief Counsel is under the Governor's Office of General Counsel, noting the prosecution division is one division under the Office of Chief Counsel. She noted the prosecution division works with the Bureau of Enforcement and Investigation (BEI), along with the Professional Compliance Office (PCO).

Ms. DeLaurentis stated the prosecution division is tasked with receiving complaints, investigating allegations, ensuring public safety, and enforcing compliance with the acts and regulations that govern the 29 boards and commissions.

Ms. DeLaurentis stated the prosecution division has five senior prosecuting attorneys and is broken into five teams, noting Paul Jarabeck is the senior prosecuting attorney for the State Board of Vehicle Manufacturers, Dealers, and Salespersons. She also noted the other senior prosecuting attorneys are Karl Geschwindt, who is an acting senior prosecutor,

Heather McCarthy, Ray Michalowski, and William Newport. She mentioned there are currently 33 prosecuting attorneys.

Ms. DeLaurentis addressed the complaint process, noting complaints are received from any source. She stated the most efficient way to file a complaint is on the Pennsylvania Licensing System (PALS) at pals.pa.gov and encouraged the public to utilize the online website. She noted prosecution accepts referrals from other agencies, law enforcement, and sometimes hear something through the news.

Ms. DeLaurentis discussed levels of review, including jurisdiction checks, noting administrative assistants review every complaint to see if it falls under one of the boards. She mentioned complaints are sent to sister agencies if prosecution does not have jurisdiction. She noted BEI helps to determine whether an investigation is warranted after it is determined prosecution has jurisdiction.

Ms. DeLaurentis addressed levels of review to see if allegations are a violation of the law. She explained that prosecution is able to file charging documents if a violation is found and include orders to show cause or citations. She mentioned that a warning letter may also be issued but is not

disciplinary action. She stated the individual is entitled to a hearing if charged and the hearing examiner issues a proposed decision but then the Board makes a final decision. She noted the Board also makes the final decision for consent agreements, where both sides are negotiating toward a resolution.

Ms. DeLaurentis informed Board members that investigations by their office are confidential and privileged under confidentiality statutes, where prosecution cannot disclose something within their files if it is not contained within the document presented to the Board.

Ms. DeLaurentis addressed a question requesting additional information regarding the investigation process by prosecution. She noted BEI has over 70 investigators and 30 inspectors. She stated prosecutors review a case to decide whether an inspection or an investigation is warranted. She noted prosecution has the ability to interview witnesses and ask for records and documents, along with asking for a subpoena from the Board if denied records or documents.

Ms. DeLaurentis explained that BEI is not law enforcement and does not have search warrant authority but does have certain boards under their

statute that are required to comply with requests to see records and documents, including their Board. She reported the internet to be helpful as an investigative tool. Ms. DeLaurentis stated BEI not only conducts interviews, inspections, and obtains evidence but also serve subpoenas, orders, letters and also testify. She noted some boards are supposed to comply based upon their governing regulations and statutes if BEI asks to see their records, but there

are limitations.

Ms. DeLaurentis noted BEI provides the information to the attorneys and legal analysts to decide whether to close the case or charge. She noted they have the ability to do immediate temporary suspensions if someone is an immediate danger to the health and safety of the public.

Ms. DeLaurentis stated prosecution also has the ability to issue automatic suspensions that usually concern drug act violations, orders for examination, petitions for appropriate relief when someone has violated a board order, orders to show cause, and consent agreements. She noted levels of discipline include revocations, suspensions, probations, reprimands, fines and citations, remedial education, and cost of the investigation.

Ms. DeLaurentis referred to the confidentiality statute under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3109, where prosecution information is confidential and privileged except for the final action of the agency and why prosecution cannot answer some questions concerning consent agreements. She explained that Department of State investigations are deemed as noncriminal investigations under the Right-to-Know Law.

Ms. DeLaurentis stated information could be shared with other licensing boards, law enforcement, and other agencies in furtherance of investigative efforts but only their final action could be shared publicly.

Ms. DeLaurentis noted the annual report is not finalized but provided data as of January 3, 2023, noting the number of current open cases for the whole division is 13,154 and less than last year. She stated 16,084 cases were opened in 2022 and is down from 2021 at 18,363 cases. She reported closing 17,826 files in 2022 and is up from 2021, where 15,994 cases were closed. She thanked the prosecution and counsel divisions and the Board for their hard work in 2022.

Ms. DeLaurentis mentioned that her goal is for all cases to be handled within a year or so but that

cases can stay open for years pending the results of a criminal trial. She noted prosecution monitors those cases to have a final action ready once a decision is made. She reported the average to close a case is 343 days. She also addressed the hearing process.

Ms. DeLaurentis addressed another question further explaining that not all of the 13,000 open cases are going to an investigator but offered to provide Board Counsel with the actual numbers. She noted the Bureau of Enforcement and Investigation is managed by leaders who make sure cases keep moving. She mentioned everything to be a group effort of about 37 attorneys in prosecution, about 17 or 18 attorneys in the counsel division, 5 legal analysts, and 12 paralegals.

Ms. DeLaurentis reported prosecution is at full complement for staff, where attorney case lists are around 150 and manageable. She reported some of the cases are on hold pending an evaluation.

Ms. DeLaurentis commented that a breakdown of case categories would be on the final annual report provided to the General Assembly and would be available for review soon.

Ms. DeLaurentis addressed specific information

- 7 probation cases which is down from 2021 at 66 cases,
- 8 22 revocations, 13 suspensions, and 29 voluntary
- 9 surrenders.

- 11 discipline and referred to Z codes, where prosecution
- 12 was not warranted. She reported 264 warning letters
- 13 | in 2022, which is down from 2021 at 360.
- 14 Ms. DeLaurentis answered a question asking
- 15 whether it is a burden on prosecution when the Board
- 16 places somebody on probation not concurrent with
- 17 their criminal probation.
- 18 Ms. DeLaurentis explained that the tracking of
- 19 criminal probation and their probation is separate,
- 20 where someone on criminal probation has a probation
- 21 and parole officer. She mentioned that prosecution
- 22 has a probation compliance officer who monitors
- 23 whether a licensee's obligations are being met during
- 24 their probation. She commented that the monitoring
- 25 helps with probation violations and reinstatement.
