12 1 Appointment - Bureau of Finance and Operations 2 Annual Budget Presentation 3 [Amanda Richards, Chief of Fiscal Management, Bureau 4 of Finance and Operations, Department of State, 5 referred to licensee population over the past seven years, noting the Board had 8,750 licensees in FY21-6 7 22 and 8,638 licensees at the time of the report in 8 January, showing a decrease of 112 licensees. She 9 reported an increase this morning of 29 licensees to 10 8,667. 11 Ms. Richards addressed license class, including 12 veterinarian and veterinary technician. She noted 13 the Board renewed in November of 2023 and had an 14 increase in licensees from the previous renewal in 15 FY20-21. 16 Ms. Richards addressed revenue, noting it is 17 reviewed on a biennial basis. She reported on the 18 Board's revenue in FY20-21 and FY21-22, noting the 19 Board's biennial total. She noted 90 percent of 20 revenue was from renewals and applications. She 21 stated that revenue is received from other categories 22 but is not a consistent source of revenue.] 23 24 [Arion R. Claggett, Acting Commissioner, Bureau of 25 Professional and Occupational Affairs, exited the

1 meeting at 10:54 a.m.] * * * 2 3 [Ms. Richards stated that the Board approved a fee 4 increase in January 2022 and provided a breakdown of 5 increases for FY24, FY26, and FY28. 6 Ms. Richards noted the two main categories when 7 reviewing expenses are administrative and legal 8 costs. She stated that expenses are brought in 9 through direct charges, timesheet-based charges, and 10 licensee population. She reported on the Board's expenses in FY20-21, FY21-22, and as of January 18, 11 12 2023. She noted the budgeted amount of \$1,211,000 is 13 adequate for FY22-23. 14 Ms. Richards addressed revenue and expenses, 15 noting the projected balance for FY22-23 and 16 projecting the Board's balance by FY25-26, which 17 should be a healthy balance. She noted the fee 18 increase package was included in the budget and 19 projecting revenue for the next few years.] * * * 20 21 [Arion R. Claggett, Acting Commissioner, Bureau of 22 Professional and Occupational Affairs, reentered the 23 meeting at 10:58 a.m.] * * * 24 25 Appointment - Prosecution Division Annual Report

2	[Carolyn A. DeLaurentis, Esquire, Executive Deputy
3	Chief Counsel, Department of State, informed Board
4	members that she is now the executive deputy chief
5	counsel for the Department of State but is presenting
6	to the Board on behalf of the prosecution division in
7	her former role to provide the presentation.
8	Ms. DeLaurentis presented to the Board to provide
9	a summary of the prosecution division's role and
10	present annual numbers for 2022. She informed Board
11	members that the Bureau of Professional and
12	Occupational Affairs provides administrative and
13	legal support to all 29 licensing boards and
14	commissions under the legal support of the
15	prosecution division, counsel division, and hearing
16	examiners. She noted the mission is to protect the
17	health and safety of the public and the integrity of
18	the profession.

20	[Anjilla Colley, D.V.M., exited the meeting at
21	11:03 a.m.]
22	* * *
23	Ms. DeLaurentis explained that the Office of
24	Chief Counsel is under the Governor's Office of
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25 General Counsel and assigned to the Department of

State, noting the prosecution division is one 1 2 division under the Office of Chief Counsel. She 3 noted the prosecution division works with the Bureau 4 of Enforcement and Investigation (BEI), along with 5 the Professional Compliance Office (PCO). Ms. DeLaurentis stated BEI, PCO, and prosecution 6 7 are all tasked with receiving complaints, 8 investigating allegations, ensuring public safety, 9 and enforcing compliance with the acts and 10 regulations of the 29 licensing boards and commissions. 11 12 Ms. DeLaurentis stated the prosecution division 13 is the largest division under the Office of Chief 14 Counsel for the Department of State. She explained 15 that there are five senior prosecuting attorneys assigned to teams, including Paul Jarabeck, Karl 16 17 Geschwindt as an acting senior prosecutor, Heather 18 McCarthy, Ray Michalowski, and William Newport. She 19 mentioned there are currently 32 prosecuting 20 attorneys serving under the senior attorneys, 21 including Board liaisons. 22 Ms. DeLaurentis addressed the complaint process, 23 noting that complaints may be received in any manner 24 the aggrieved party sees fit, but the preferred 25 method of submission is through the Pennsylvania

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Licensing System (PALS) at pals.pa.gov because it is 1 2 the most efficient. She noted prosecution also 3 accepts complaints from sister agencies, federal 4 agencies, law enforcement, and through media reports. 5 Ms. DeLaurentis discussed levels of review, 6 including jurisdiction checks, noting administrative 7 assistants review every complaint to see if it falls under one of the 29 boards and commissions. 8 She 9 mentioned complaints are referred to the appropriate 10 agency if prosecution does not have jurisdiction. 11 Ms. DeLaurentis stated that prosecution works 12 with BEI inspectors and investigators to determine 13 the most efficient use of resources. She noted 14 investigations may include interviewing witnesses and 15 gathering documents, along with paralegals and legal 16 analysts. 17 Ms. DeLaurentis addressed the various levels of 18 review and how prosecution division determines 19 whether there was a violation. She explained that 20 matters could be closed if there is not a violation 21 of the act or regulation which allows prosecution to 22 devote resources to other cases, where there is a 23 violation. 24 Ms. DeLaurentis discussed the post-investigation 25 process, where attorneys may need to make charging

decisions based on evidence by filing an "order to 1 2 show cause" or a citation. She noted there is a 3 hearing process, which is like a regular trial but 4 slightly less formal, where both sides are able to 5 present evidence and arguments. Ms. DeLaurentis noted that if it goes to a hearing examiner, the 6 7 hearing examiner usually issues a proposed 8 adjudication and then it goes to the boards and 9 commissions for their final decision because they 10 have the ultimate authority for discipline. She 11 addressed consent agreements, where the parties 12 negotiate a resolution which is then presented to the 13 Board, allowing the Board to accept or reject the 14 agreement.

15 Ms. DeLaurentis addressed the prosecution 16 division's role at Board meetings, including presenting consent agreements and listening to 17 18 concerns of the Board. She pointed out that 19 prosecution has a confidentiality statute that 20 applies to their files, where all the contents within 21 their files is confidential under the law unless 22 presented publicly as part of a proposed consent 23 agreement and is why prosecution's files are kept 24 confidential except for the final disciplinary 25 action.

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1 Ms. DeLaurentis stated BEI conducts 2 investigations and interviews, gathers evidence, and 3 conducts inspections for certain boards. She noted 4 the role of the investigators is fact gathering and 5 serving subpoenas, orders, and letters. She 6 mentioned that prosecution has subpoena authority, 7 but BEI does not have search warrant authority and is She noted BEI also testifies to the results 8 limited. 9 of their investigations and inspections. She also 10 noted they have inspection authority for six boards but do not have statutory authority and cannot remain 11 at that location if asked to leave. 12

13 Ms. DeLaurentis addressed documents upon request, 14 where some boards and commissions have regulations 15 that require cooperation but not everyone complies 16 and charges may be filed for failure to comply. She 17 stated all of the evidence gathered is presented to 18 the teams and reviewed by prosecuting attorneys and 19 legal analysts to determine whether there was a 20 violation of the act or regulation to decide whether 21 to close the case or charge.

Ms. DeLaurentis addressed "immediate temporary suspensions," where someone is an immediate danger to the health and safety of the public, but the licensee may request a hearing within 30 days and explained

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that immediate temporary suspensions are different 1 2 than the typical disciplinary process in which 3 prosecution files an order to show cause, and the 4 license remains active until the case is resolved. 5 She noted automatic suspensions include involuntary 6 mental health commitments, orders for examination, 7 and drug act violations. She also noted "petitions 8 for appropriate relief" are filed when someone has 9 violated a board order.

Ms. DeLaurentis stated that levels of discipline include revocations, suspensions, probations, reprimands, fines, remedial education, and cost of the investigation. She mentioned that some cases could have more than one type of discipline and can be found in more than one category in the report.

Ms. DeLaurentis referred to the confidentiality statute under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3109, where prosecution and investigative files are deemed privileged and confidential under the law. She explained that Department of State investigative files are deemed noncriminal investigative records under the Right-to-Know Law.]

24 [Anjilla Cooley, D.V.M., reentered the meeting at 25 11:07 a.m.]

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1 * * * 2 [Ms. DeLaurentis stated the information could be 3 shared with other licensing boards, law enforcement, 4 and other agencies in furtherance of investigative 5 efforts, but only their final action could be shared 6 publicly, including final adjudications and orders, 7 final consent agreements, and final letters. 8 Ms. DeLaurentis provided data as of January 3, 9 2023, where the number of open cases for the 10 prosecution division was 13,154, which is down from 11 2021 at 15,141. She stated that 16,084 cases were 12 opened in 2022 and is down from 2021 at 18,363 cases. 13 She reported closing 17,826 files in 2022 and is up 14 from 2021, where 15,994 cases were closed. She 15 thanked the prosecution division, counsel division, and Board for their group effort. 16 17 Chair Garg requested information regarding the 18 increase in the number of files closed and asked 19 whether it was due to more staff. 20 Ms. DeLaurentis explained that prosecution does 21 not have more staff but believed their staff is 22 working as efficiently as possible. 23 Paul J. Jarabeck, Esquire, Senior Board 24 Prosecutor, explained that things can change from 25 board to board, where large licensing populations may

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be renewing in a particular year and have an increase in technical violations regarding renewal with continuing education and lapsed license. He stated those violations can result in a greater number of opened files but may just be simple matters and cause the increase shown in prosecution numbers.

7 Ms. DeLaurentis informed Board members that an 8 annual report is issued to the General Assembly, 9 which includes a breakdown of case categories, and 10 would notify Board Counsel when available for review.

Ms. DeLaurentis addressed specific information for the State Board of Veterinary Medicine, noting 236 cases were opened in 2022, which was down from 2021 at 299. She reported 289 cases were closed in 2022 and is an increase from 2021 at 267. She noted 243 cases were open as of January 3, 2023, which is fewer than were opened in 2022, which was 290.

Ms. DeLaurentis referred to disposition of closed cases, including discipline and non-discipline. She reported 22 cases resulted in fines in 2022 and 13 in 2021, along with 12 reprimands in 2022 and 4 in 2021. She mentioned that non-disciplinary actions are called Z codes in their system, where prosecution was not warranted.

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Ms. DeLaurentis addressed warning letters, noting

1 warning letters are not discipline but help maintain 2 the integrity of the profession by attempting to 3 correct any behavior that may become an issue and are 4 given for de minimis (minor) violations.

5 Chair Garg commented that he was having a hard 6 time believing there were only 10 consent agreements 7 for continuing education in 2022.

8 Mr. Jarabeck stated the Board would be in the 9 neighborhood of 15 to 18 consent agreements for 2022 10 but something may have been missed in terms of 11 continuing education that may be part of a consent 12 agreement and order.

13 Mr. Jarabeck mentioned that consent agreements 14 presented on a frontline level where there is not a 15 prior history may request continuing education and 16 give or take a reprimand and that initial discipline 17 to give somebody education to put them on the right 18 path but at the same time not be too harsh. 19 Chair Garg thanked Ms. DeLaurentis for the 20 presentation and wished her good luck in her new 21 role.] 22 * * * 23 Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture - High 24 Consequence Disease Response Statement 25 [Michelle Roberts, Board Administrator, informed

1 Board members that Dr. Wolfgang, on behalf of the 2 Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture, wanted to 3 thank the Board for their cooperation, and for 4 providing the Department of Agriculture with a list 5 of veterinary technicians. She stated PVMA is 6 cooperating with a consortium of states to advance 7 readiness in the case of animal or poultry disease 8 and emergencies, where resources are greatly stressed 9 by a highly pathogenic avian influenza or other 10 invasive pathogens.

Ms. Roberts noted that the Bureau of Animal Health and Diagnostic Services is cooperating with the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) and Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) to develop a more robust list of veterinary personnel who may be able to assist in the future with animals that need response or remediation.

Ms. Roberts stated a survey would be mailed electronically to certified veterinary technicians in Pennsylvania to gather a list of individuals with interest and would include type I or II accredited veterinarians and veterinary personnel who may have valuable skills and knowledge but are not accredited.]

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Report of Board Counsel - Regulations	
[Thomas M. Davis, Esquire, Board Counsel, informed	
Board members that he is working on the Act 41	
regulation, continuing education (CE) regulation, fe	
regulation, and euthanasia regulation. He noted Act	
41 regarding licensure by endorsement is still before	
senior regulatory counsel and the other two are being	
actively drafted as well as the Regulatory Analysis	
Form on the continuing education and fees. He noted	
the Board previously voted to increase fees in the	
next couple years and is actively working on that.	
He mentioned the CE regulation is just to make sure	
the Board would be allowing 100 percent of CE online	
from here on out for vets and certified veterinary	
technicians (CVTs) but only after the regulation is	
in place.	
Mr. Davis informed Board members that he is still	
amending the annex for the euthanasia regulation	
based on the discussion at the last meeting. He	
referred to § 31.108 under duties of certificate	
holders, noting the animal protection organizations	
are going to be applying for a certificate to allow	
them to purchase and store drugs for euthanasia.	
Mr. Davis noted the new language to read, "a	
certificate holder shall maintain a controlled	

1 substance log in the manner and format required by 2 the DEA and shall immediately make the controlled 3 substance log available for inspection by agents of 4 the Board, the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture 5 (PDA), and Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) upon 6 request."

7 Mr. Davis also noted other amendments since the 8 last meeting, including renewal of certificate of 9 registration at § 31.113 and renewal of license in 10 active status and reactivation of license at § 31.126. 11 He mentioned being incorrect at the last meeting and 12 amending the annex for the euthanasia regulation to 13 read, "initial certificate of registration or license 14 issued any time after September 1 of an even-numbered 15 year," which is the 90-day period prior to the 16 renewal cycle. He noted the update is to reflect 17 what the Pennsylvania Licensing System (PALS) can do 18 and is doing.

Mr. Davis referred to § 31.122(a)(5) regarding euthanasia technicians. He noted the Board suggested it read, "has adequate knowledge of the Commonwealth statutes and regulations relating to euthanasia and demonstrates knowledge in a manner and format approved by the Board."

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Mr. Davis noted the Animal Destruction Method

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Authorization Law (ADMAL) had a requirement, where
euthanasia technicians must have adequate knowledge
of the Commonwealth statutes and regulations, and the
Board came up with a worksheet that talks about
different sections and what is required under
different sections of the Vet Act, ADMAL, and vet
regulations.

8 Mr. Davis mentioned the worksheet will still have 9 to undergo internal review, to see if it complies 10 with the requirements of the statute.

11 Mr. Davis mentioned that he is still in direct 12 contact with someone at the DEA concerning 13 categories. He commented that prescribers of 14 controlled medications need a DEA certificate of 15 registration and said he is working to make sure the 16 Board is doing everything it needs to do when it 17 comes to DEA certificate categories.

18 Mr. Davis addressed correspondence with the 19 Department of Agriculture discussing the possibility 20 of entering into a memorandum of understanding in 21 which Department of Agriculture agents would inspect 22 the animal protection organizations. He provided a 23 response from the Department of Agriculture 24 explaining why they must decline the Board's offer. 25 Chair Garg commented that the Department of

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Agriculture explained they are experiencing staffing limitations and asked how the Board would know whether it could be done through BEI, saying he was concerned the Bureau may also have staffing limitations.

6 Mr. Davis explained that the Board would have to 7 find a way even if it ultimately means hiring new 8 people.

9 Paul J. Jarabeck, Esquire, Senior Board 10 Prosecutor, applauded the Board with their effort in trying to work with other agencies like the 11 12 Department of Agriculture. He explained that BEI 13 would be able to do inspections that do not require a 14 great amount of expertise or knowledge and may come 15 from a checklist or review document, but some 16 inspections require someone who has a greater amount 17 of knowledge and training.

18 Mr. Jarabeck further explained that BEI would be 19 able to do inspections when it comes to initial 20 registration of the organizations that could probably 21 be done with a checklist based on the Board's 22 regulations, but the tie-in now with the drug log is 23 making it more complex and requires more review.] * * * 24 25 Report of Board Chairperson

1 [Thomas Garg, V.M.D., Chair, addressed recent 2 communication with the Pennsylvania Veterinary 3 Medical Association regarding uncertainty as to which, if any, organizations are official constituent 4 5 organizations of the PVMA. He stated this is a 6 concern because constituent organizations of PVMA can 7 provide approved CE without submitting an application 8 to the Board, noting it is important for the Board to 9 know which organizations are official PVMA 10 constituent organizations. 11 Chair Garg requested Mr. Davis and Ms. Roberts 12 look into this and asked Ms. Roberts to contact PVMA 13 to obtain the current list of official constituent 14 organizations and report back to the Board at the 15 next meeting.] 16 * * * Report of Acting Commissioner 17 18 [Arion R. Claggett, Acting Commissioner, Bureau of 19 Professional and Occupational Affairs, addressed Act 20 35, which provides expedited application review for 21 service members, veterans, and military spouses. Нe 22 stated that application types included in the 23 expedited review are initial applications, renewal 24 applications, and reactivation applications. 25 Acting Commissioner Claggett noted Act 35 gives

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them the ability to waive the initial application fee 1 2 for spouses when they are required to move due to 3 military orders. He mentioned that the fee waiving 4 functionality in PALS does not currently work but the 5 Bureau would be able to provide refunds where 6 appropriate. 7 Acting Commissioner Claggett noted Act 35 also 8 has directs the Bureau to create a military crosswalk 9 explaining how military experience transfers over to 10 licensure and could be found on the Board web page. 11 Acting Commissioner Claggett stated Act 35 also 12 gives them the ability to provide temporary permits 13 for applicants whose military experience may be 14 lacking certain requirements.] 15 * * * 16 Upcoming Meeting Dates [Thomas Garg, V.M.D., Chair, noted the upcoming 17 18 meeting dates published in the agenda for the Board's 19 review.] 20 * * * 21 Adjournment 22 CHAIR GARG: 23 Would anybody like to make a motion to 24 adjourn? 25 DR.
