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   Appointment - Introduction
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   [Michael McDonald, Policy Director, Department of
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   State, introduced himself and provided a brief
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   history of his professional background. He informed
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everyone that the policy office works with all of the program areas and licensing boards and commissions to develop policy initiatives, review and assess proposals, and review legislation.

Mr. McDonald noted their work with Board Counsel to review and draft regulations or implement a policy change. He also noted keeping track of the activities in other jurisdictions that could have an impact on the licensing population or citizens of Pennsylvania.

Mr. McDonald noted working with other agencies regarding AnaSed (xylazine) scheduling to make sure the impact would be limited on the licensee population.

Mr. McDonald encouraged Board members to consider him or Deputy Policy Director Andrew LaFratte as a resource for any questions or concerns.

Mr. McDonald thanked Board members for their service to the licensees and citizens of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Ms. Kehoe commented that the American Association of Veterinary State Boards (AAVSB) has a newsletter describing what other states are working on and changes in other states.

Mr. McDonald thanked Ms. Kehoe for the

information.] 1 2 3 Report of Board Counsel - Regulations 4 [Thomas M. Davis, Esquire, Board Counsel, informed 5 Board members that the final preamble for the 6 euthanasia regulation was nearly completed, and said 7 he may be calling for a vote on the final regulation 8 before the end of the year. Mr. Davis also informed Board members that he 10 completed the Regulatory Analysis Form (RAF) for the fee increase and turned it in for internal review on 11 12 May 19, 2023.] 13 \* \* \* 14 Report of Board Counsel - Miscellaneous 15 [Thomas M. Davis, Esquire, Board Counsel, addressed 16 the temporary scheduling of xylazine as a Schedule III controlled substance by the Acting Secretary of 17 18 Health. He suggested anyone with questions regarding 19 xylazine consult with a private attorney for legal 20 advice or a professional organization for guidance. 21 Mr. Davis noted informing Board members when they 22 last met on May 5, 2023, that the Acting Secretary of 23 Health submitted a Notice of Intent to temporarily 24 add xylazine to the list of Schedule III drugs under

Pennsylvania's Controlled Substance, Drug, Device,

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and Cosmetic Act. He mentioned that the Notice of 1 2 Intent was published April 22 in volume 53 on page 3 2270 of the PA Code and Bulletin and was also 4 available under "Announcements" on the Board's 5 website.

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- Mr. Davis provided updated information since that time, where the Acting Secretary of Health issued a final order on June 3, 2023, temporarily scheduling xylazine, which is not currently listed in any schedule of the Controlled Substance, Drug, Device, and Cosmetic Act. He noted the Final Order would place xylazine in Schedule III subject to certain 13 limitations.
  - Mr. Davis stated the Secretary of Health is taking this action because the scheduling of xylazine on a temporary basis is necessary to avoid an imminent hazard to public safety. He reported five limitations that include dispensing, prescribing, administration, manufacturing, or use with relation to nonhuman species currently permitted under the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act.
  - Mr. Davis suggested everyone review the information that is available on the Board's website or on the PA Code and Bulletin published June 3, 2023, volume 53, issue 22, page 3031. He suggested

anyone with questions consult a private attorney for legal advice or a professional organization for guidance because he is not permitted to provide legal advice to anyone but the Board.

Mr. Davis addressed the Annual Report to the General Assembly. He stated the Veterinary Medicine Practice Act requires the Board to annually inform the General Assembly with a description of the types of complaints received, status of cases, etc. He noted that Carolyn DeLaurentis, the former prosecution section chief, presented information to the Board a few months ago and recently provided him with additional data, which has been provided to the Board.

Mr. Davis noted 8,625 active licensees in 2022, 236 cases opened in 2022, 243 open cases at the time of the report, and 289 cases closed in 2022, with the average age to close those cases of 470 days. He reported 22 cases ended in fines, prosecution was not warranted in 166 cases, and a warning letter was sent in 51 cases. He told anyone who wished to have a copy of the report to contact him or the Board's main email address.]

22 Dr. Guise noted that it was something that should

23 be addressed in the Pennsylvania Veterinary Medical

24 Association (PVMA) Newsletter or by the Board to make

25 everyone aware that there are employees who are

probably overstepping their bounds.

Mr. Davis read a paragraph from the Pennsylvania Veterinary Medicine Practice Act Section 28(b), where any person who engages in the practice of veterinary medicine without the license required by this act or who performs the duties of an animal health technician without the certificate required by this act commits a misdemeanor of the third degree and shall, upon conviction, for a first offense, be sentenced to a fine not to exceed \$1,000 or to imprisonment for not more than six months or both. A second offense shall be subject to a fine not to exceed \$2,000 or imprisonment for a term of six months to one year or both.

Mr. Davis stated the Board could also discipline individuals who are performing veterinary medicine or acting in the capacity of a certified veterinary technician (CVT) without a proper license or certification. He suggested that any information or complaint about individuals unlawfully acting as a veterinaria or CVT be submitted to the Board via the Pennsylvania Licensing System (PALS).]
