24 Report of Board Counsel - Discussion

25 [Sean C. Barrett, Esquire, Board Counsel, referred to

1 16A-429 regarding general revisions and noted prior
2 Board discussion on barbershop square footage
3 reduction. He noted the Board received variance
4 application requests for the square footage
5 requirement in the Board's regulation. He mentioned
6 that the Board's current regulation for a one chair
7 barbershop requires a minimum space of 180 square
8 feet with a minimum width of 12 feet.

9 Mr. Barrett stated that the Board is also aware
10 of salon suites and the cosmetology rentals and the
11 change in the Cosmetology Law to reduce the square
12 footage required to 120 square feet. He noted the
13 Board wanted to add that to the general revisions
14 regulation.

15 Chair Muniz commented that this came about from
16 their variance requests for studios and suites and
17 noted being aware that this has been a new phase
18 in the industry and that the Board is trying to
19 provide a solution that meets their laws and
20 regulations. He noted prior discussion regarding
21 going from a width of 10 feet to a length of 12 feet
22 and that there are things in the general revisions
23 that they have been working on concerning the sinks,
24 waiting area, and the closet.

25 Mr. Barrett stated that there are a number of

1 equipment requirements that have been reduced and are
2 in the general revisions package as well. He
3 mentioned the Board was about to send those out for
4 comment but had the square footage issue and wanted
5 to include that in the package. He mentioned that
6 the main issue with the reduction to potentially 120
7 square feet is that the seating area must accommodate
8 three people and whether that would be possible to
9 figure that within 120 square feet.

10 Mr. Barrett referred to § 3.53 regarding minimum
11 space requirement, where every barbershop shall
12 provide a minimum length of 15 feet for 1 chair
13 shops, 20 feet for 2 chair shops, and 5 feet
14 additional length for each additional chair with a
15 minimum width of at least 12 feet. He noted the
16 easiest way to 120 square feet is to drop those
17 numbers.

18 Mr. Barrett stated that there is a minimum width
19 of 10 feet and length of 12 feet with the Cosmetology
20 Act changes and would be a reduction of 3 feet on
21 length and 2 feet on the width, which would bring the
22 total square footage for 1 chair shops down to 120
23 square feet for the minimum requirement.

24 Mr. Barrett noted the regulations currently
25 require an additional 5 feet for each chair so

1 bringing it to 12 feet for a one chair shop it would
2 have to be 17 feet foot length for two chair shops
3 would be 170 square feet. He mentioned that there
4 was no reason to change the additional 5 feet for
5 each chair because that is based on the equipment for
6 the additional chair and not on the other equipment
7 needed.

8 Chair Muniz stated that the Board was in
9 agreement regarding space requirements as far as the
10 12 feet minimum and then 5 additional because it is
11 enough space to provide services, and most of the
12 issues are with the minimal equipment requirements.
13 He explained that the biggest issue was the one
14 cabinet or closet for mops and brooms and seating
15 accommodations for at least three people.

16 Chair Muniz mentioned that studios and suites are
17 appointment-based and having a seating accommodation
18 would take more space, making a 10 x 12 square foot
19 area tight for seating accommodations, along with the
20 closet for the mops and brooms, which would take away
21 some of the square footage also.

22 Mr. Barrett asked whether the Board wanted to
23 reduce the seating accommodations section to one or
24 two people or one chair per chair in the shop. He
25 noted the Board could also remove the requirement

1 altogether.

2 Chair Muniz noted not being opposed to having one
3 patron chair per chair in the shop.

4 Mr. Barrett stated the best change would be to
5 modify Section 12 concerning seating accommodations
6 and changing the square footage minimum requirements.

7 Chair Muniz also mentioned one cabinet or closet
8 room should be within the building. He noted they
9 would have one bathroom for the entire studio, and
10 the mop and broom closet would be the same as the
11 bathroom within that area.

12 Mr. Barrett mentioned that it could be done for
13 the seating accommodation if they want to just
14 provide access to those, where they do not
15 necessarily require that to be within the square
16 footage. He referred to the cleanliness of the salon
17 and whether they have
18 a shared access broom closet and would they rely on a
19 licensee to walk across the building to get the
20 broom.

21 Chair Muniz stated that the closet is where the
22 issue is and having a cabinet within an enclosed
23 space would save some of the square footage.

24 Mr. Barrett commented that the regulation does
25 not require a cabinet or closet and had no problem

1 striking the cabinet or closet.

2 Chair Muniz agreed with removing the cabinet or
3 closet and leaving everything else the same.

4 Mr. Barrett noted the Board wanted to reduce the
5 square footage; reduce the seating accommodations in
6 line with the amount of chairs in the shop by capping
7 it to one for one, two for two, and three for
8 anything above; and remove the requirement of a
9 cabinet or closet for mops and brooms.]

10 MR. BARRETT:

11 Based on discussions here today, I
12 believe the Board Chair would entertain
13 a motion to release an exposure draft
14 of the proposed annex that we just
15 discussed, 16A-429, as well as some
16 changes the Board discussed to
17 interested parties and stakeholders for
18 comment.

8 ***

9 Report of Board Counsel - Discussion

10 [Sean C. Barrett, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted House
11 Bill 327 was introduced and would alter the
12 requirements for a barber teacher, where someone
13 currently would need to be a barber for 5 years for
14 experience and has not changed. He mentioned the
15 second option, where someone could be a manager
16 barber and take the 1250-hour course, which basically
17 reduces the requirement of 1250 hours of education to
18 500 hours.

19 Mr. Barrett noted the Board would probably need
20 to make some regulations regarding the curriculum for
21 barber teachers. He also noted a change that would
22 allow those hours to be earned in a barber school or
23 cosmetology school. He mentioned that there are
24 some legal problems regarding the aspect of barber
25 teachers getting trained in a cosmetology school,

1 where the Cosmetology Board does not have the power
2 to implement such a regulation and would require a
3 change to the Cosmetology Act as well.

4 Mr. Barrett also addressed a proposed provision,
5 where someone who was a barber manager for 3 years
6 could instantly become a barber teacher upon
7 application and would not have to take the test. He
8 noted it also reduces the age of the barber teacher
9 from 23 to 18. He mentioned that someone would
10 probably be over 21 by that point with the experience
11 requirement of 5 years for a barber.

12 Chair Muniz addressed current laws, where someone
13 would be 17 with 5 years to get a teacher's license
14 from having an active barber license, noting it would
15 make someone 23 years of age and believed that would
16 be enough experience. He commented that the ability
17 to teach should never go without testing to ensure
18 students are getting the proper education.

19 Chair Muniz disagreed with grandfathering in
20 after having a manager's license for 3 years because
21 teachers should be tested. He also disagreed with
22 going to a cosmetology school for barbering because
23 cosmetology and barbering are two separate boards.

24 Mr. Barrett mentioned that they are changing the
25 1250 hours, the 500 hours of subject dealing with

1 basically how to teach, so they are trying to focus
2 on moving the barber teacher curriculum from just
3 1250 hours to actually having to teach people and is
4 a change but is counterintuitive from a legal
5 perspective to just give every barber manager a
6 teacher's license because barber managers might not
7 necessarily have knowledge of how to actually teach.

8 Chair Muniz noted the importance of barbers being
9 able to handle clippers and razors properly, stating
10 that cosmetologists are not trained on those and
11 would not be able to teach certain topics to
12 students.

13 Mr. Barrett noted the bill is pending and that he
14 provided a bill analysis for the governor's office,
15 where from a legal perspective and after speaking
16 with counsel from cosmetology, a barber teacher
17 curriculum would need to be provided for cosmetology
18 students.

19 Chair Muniz commented that there are ways for
20 someone to get a teacher's license but falls on the
21 individual as to whether they want a teacher's
22 license. He mentioned that plenty of barbers and
23 barber managers have had their license for a long
24 time. He noted the practical on the teacher's
25 license is a whole different thing.

1 Mr. Edsall commented that laws, stipulations, and
2 the testing for teachers right now are not very
3 extreme and is attainable.

4 Mr. Barrett reported pass rates from Pearson VUE
5 within the last 5 years show barber teachers with
6 overall pass rate of 76 percent and that 91 percent
7 of test takers pass on their first try, but the pass
8 rate falls to 21 percent for repeat takers, noting a
9 class of people who may not be qualified.

10 Mr. Edsall commented that they need quantity but
11 also quality and noted the importance of students
12 having qualified teachers. He believed that someone
13 who is 18 years old does not have haircutting
14 background or industry experience and that barbering
15 is not just cutting hair but also includes business
16 and other layers of the profession.

17 Mr. Barrett noted they lowered it to 500 hours,
18 which is the same amount of hours required for
19 cosmetology. He stated that the cosmetology
20 curriculum is mostly related to teaching but also
21 includes management of salons, and when looking at
22 the barber teacher requiring 500 hours in just
23 education, the cosmetology curriculum would not apply
24 to barbers because it is not just in teaching.

25 John Christopher, President, National Association

1 of Barber Boards of America, expressed opposition to
2 House Bill 327 because there is too much to learn and
3 understand for someone who is 18 years of age to be
4 prepared to be a teacher. He mentioned being a
5 member of the Board when the age was changed from 25
6 to 23 based on a licensed barber at 18 years of age.

7
8 Mr. Christopher addressed House Bill 327, stating
9 that there should be no crossover, where
10 cosmetologists should not be training somebody to
11 become a barber teacher, especially since licensed
12 cosmetologists are no longer required to take a
13 practical test and only have to take a theory test.

14 Mr. Christopher referred to a discrepancy on the
15 Pearson VUE application for a cosmetology teacher,
16 where one area lists 400 hours of training and
17 another area lists 500 hours of training were
18 required to test and should be corrected.

19 Mr. Barrett commented that it should be 500 hours
20 for a cosmetology teacher and would look into that
21 matter.

22 Mr. Christopher commented that anyone training
23 for a barber teacher test should not be tested on
24 whether or not they could construct a lesson plan
25 because anybody could do that and is more for a

1 person who would teach history in a high school. He
2 noted that they wanted to know if someone would be
3 able to teach subjects related to the profession and
4 not setting up a lesson plan. He suggested that be
5 spelled out and addressed if it becomes part of House
6 Bill 327.

7 Mr. Christopher referred to grandfathering of the
8 barber teacher license. He noted working with
9 outside agencies and that it could be a good thing if
10 spelled out properly. He stated that the language is
11 worded now, where a licensed barber manager, a
12 minimum of 3 years, has a one-time only opportunity
13 to upgrade to a barber teacher without testing.

14 Mr. Christopher noted that it should not be
15 continual, where somebody receives a license all of
16 the sudden and could just upgrade. He stated they
17 should go through some steps, become a licensed
18 barber manager, and serve as a barber manager before
19 considered for a license upgrade.

20 Mr. Christopher mentioned that if it is put into
21 play in January 2024 that there would be one
22 licensing cycle, and whenever someone's license is
23 due in 2026, they have that amount of time within
24 that window to upgrade after 2026 and then it is done
25 and not continual.

1 Mr. Barrett explained that they tried to do that
2 by requiring 3 years of experience as a manager
3 barber as of January 1, 2022, but has not passed.

4 Mr. Christopher addressed the importance of
5 building up the licensed barber teachers in the
6 profession. He commented that he was not opposed to
7 barber teacher as part of House Bill 327 but believed
8 there may be ways to rewrite the language to make it
9 more understandable and fair.

10 Mr. Christopher referred to the barber teacher
11 part of the bill and believed the crossing over of
12 being able to take the required hours from a licensed
13 cosmetology situation is not a good thing and
14 believed it should be done in a barber situation. He
15 also mentioned that there may not be curriculum in
16 place to obtain that and should be looked at as well.

17 Mr. Edsall explained that part of the practical
18 testing for a teacher is actually a two-part
19 practical that includes a classroom setting teaching
20 shaving and then the practical part of how to perform
21 a shave. He mentioned that it should be maintained
22 the same way, where the teacher would submit an
23 outline and follow the outline, along with teaching a
24 theory and practical class.

25 Mr. Barrett stated that there have been concerns

1 about the bill and informed everyone that they could
2 reach out to their local representatives. He
3 mentioned that the Board is limited in terms of an
4 opinion and noted it is an enactment of the General
5 Assembly and that the Board is not writing it.

6 Mr. Christopher informed Board members that the
7 National Association of Barber Boards of America is
8 expressing their opposition to House Bill 327.

9 Mike Gent, Curriculum Coordinator, Pennsylvania
10 Department of Corrections, agreed that someone 18
11 years old is too young to teach, noting it to be a
12 challenge even at 22. He stated that having
13 knowledge is crucial for the health of the public.
14 He informed Board members that the Department of
15 Corrections has to go to cosmetology schools because
16 they cannot find barber teachers. He reported five
17 male institutions are going to have to be cosmetology
18 schools and possibly seven within a relatively short
19 time.

20 Mr. Gent mentioned that residents in their
21 institutions become barber teachers and noted the
22 importance of training but the conundrum of getting
23 people prepared to teach successfully.]
