3 June 26, 2017

5 The regularly scheduled meeting of the State
6 Board of Barber Examiners was held on Monday, June 26,
7 2017. John C. Christopher, Chairman, called the
8 meeting to order at 9:09 a.m.

9 ***

10 Pledge of Allegiance

11 [The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.]

12 ***

13 Introduction

14 [Roll call was taken, followed by the introduction of
15 the audience members.]

16 ***

17 Approval of Minutes of the February 27, 2017 meeting

18 CHAIRMAN CHRISTOPHER:

19 Any questions on the meeting minutes
20 from the last meeting? Could I have a
21 motion on the floor to accept the
22 meeting minutes?

23 MR. VAVRO:

24 I make a motion to accept.

25 CHAIRMAN CHRISTOPHER:

1 Second?

2 MR. GRAY:

3 Second.

4 CHAIRMAN CHRISTOPHER:

5 All in favor, say aye. Opposed? The
6 ayes have it.

7 [The motion carried unanimously.]

8 ***

9 Report of Prosecutorial Division

10 [Kenneth J. Suter, Esquire, Board Prosecution Liaison,
11 welcomed the new Board members.]

12 ***

13 [Robert B. Armour, Esquire, Board Prosecutor,
14 presented the Consent Agreements for File Nos. 13-42-
15 10472, 13-42-10473, 13-42-10474.]

16 ***

17 [Timothy Smith, Esquire, Board Prosecutor, presented
18 the Consent Agreement for File No. 13-42-06252.]

19 ***

20 Report of Board Counsel

21 [Dana Wucinski, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted matters
22 for the Board's discussion in Executive Session.

23 Ms. Wucinski noted House Bill 1123 and House Bill
24 1452 included in the agenda for the Board's
25 information.

1 She also noted that House Bill 1123 was a
2 reintroduction of the former House Bill 246, which
3 amends the Barbers' License law, and would allow
4 licensed barbers with three years of experience or
5 licensed barber managers with one year of experience
6 to become barber teachers without examination.

7 House Bill 1452 amends the barber law to allow
8 barber services to be provided for events for
9 charitable purposes.

10 Ms. Wucinski will provide the new Board members
11 with copies of recusal guidelines and the new
12 Executive Order regarding the executive branch
13 employee gift ban.]

14 ***

15 Public Session

16 [Kelly Kolling, Director of Operations, Barber School
17 of Pittsburgh, commented on House Bill 1123. She
18 submitted a revision two weeks ago to be presented in
19 front of Mr. Mako.

20 Ms. Kolling addressed her concerns that
21 educational institutions have relating to the
22 automatic election of a teacher without examination
23 and suggested reducing the number of hours mandated
24 for teaching. She disagreed that individuals could
25 graduate from a cosmetology teaching program and

1 obtain a barber-teacher license and teach barbering
2 without barber trade knowledge.

3 Ms. Kolling also suggested the elimination of
4 apprenticeships regarding discrepancies between code
5 and law. The law does not state that an individual
6 can do an apprenticeship under a barber manager;
7 however, the code permits the same.

8 Ken Jaram, President, Barber School of
9 Pittsburgh, agreed with Ms. Kolling. Mr. Jaram
10 commented on a major shortage of barber-teachers. He
11 discussed preserving the integrity of barbering.

12 Mr. Jaram suggested a separation between
13 apprenticeship hours and barber schooling hours.

14 Matt Schwalm, Barber Styling Institute, discussed
15 House Bill 1123 and the cosmetology aspect. Mr.
16 Schwalm discussed cosmetologists obtaining their
17 cosmetology teacher license after completing a
18 cosmetology program. With a cosmetology teacher
19 license, House Bill 1123 permits a cosmetology teacher
20 to then continue their education in a cosmetology
21 school to acquire a barber-teacher license.

22 Mr. Schwalm noted that there are currently 3,220
23 active barbers in Pennsylvania and 2,998 barber
24 managers.

25 Chairman Christopher discussed the difference in

1 numbers between cosmetology and barbering. The total
2 number for barbers is less than 10,000, and
3 cosmetology has well over 100,000 in the Commonwealth
4 of Pennsylvania. Barber managers may be upgraded to a
5 barber-teacher after a minimum of five years of
6 experience, who then could be entrepreneurs and open a
7 school or multiple shops to assist in growing the
8 barber business and profession.

9 Mr. Schwalm discussed a cosmetologist or a barber
10 could either going to a barber school or a cosmetology
11 school to acquire their barber-teacher license with
12 strict teaching methods. Mr. Schwalm suggested
13 removing the apprenticeship program to motivate
14 barbers to acquire a barber-teacher license.

15 Ian J. Harlow, Commissioner of Professional and
16 Occupational Affairs, urged the public, Board members
17 or schools with a concern such as the language of the
18 bill to contact either their local state rep or
19 senator to facilitate that matter.

20 Commissioner Harlow explained the process for the
21 passage of bills. He suggested sharing all concerns
22 with him or with Counsel.

23 Ginger Etter, Secretary, Consumer Protection
24 Member, stated educational institutions have started
25 working with Representative Mako regarding the

1 rewriting and resubmission of the bill.

2 Ken Jaram mentioned House Bill 246 had barber
3 manager crossed out. House Bill 1123 does not contain
4 the term barber manager. Mr. Jaram stated upon
5 graduation from school and obtaining a temporary
6 license, an individual can work under a barber manager
7 or barber-teacher. There are not many barber
8 teachers.

9 Chairman Christopher stated there was discussion
10 to keep all three designations and that the barber
11 manager designation was not to be taken out.]

12 ***

13 Appointment - Brendan Lynch

14 [Brendan Lynch, Staff Attorney, Community Legal
15 Services, discussed complaints from confused barbers
16 regarding the right to sit for the barber exam. Mr.
17 Lynch suggested the Board not deny or revoke licenses
18 for felony convictions not related to the practice of
19 barbering, but to confine its denials or revocations
20 where the criminal activity directly related to
21 barbering.

22 Mr. Lynch pointed out a section of the 1979
23 Criminal History Record Information Act (CHRIA) as
24 cited by the Board in its decisions and final orders.
25 He stated 90 percent of employers conduct criminal

1 background checks, which makes it very difficult to
2 obtain work.

3 Mr. Lynch noted that the United States Equal
4 Employment Opportunity Commission explained that a
5 neutral hiring policy can have a disparate impact. He
6 also noted Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964
7 does apply to public entities.

8 Mr. Lynch presented felony conviction statistics
9 involving African Americans and Hispanics due to the
10 effects of our criminal justice system. He addressed
11 Senator Scavello's memo wherein he stated, while
12 background checks have never been a part of licensing
13 for barbers and cosmetologists in the past, the
14 Department of State has now decided barbers and
15 cosmetologists should have to do a criminal background
16 check as a prerequisite of obtaining a license. For
17 careers that do not have a specific authorization to
18 do background checks in their practice act, the
19 Department of State would be prohibited from
20 implementing one.

21 This would protect against individuals seeking
22 licensure as barbers against discrimination based on
23 criminal background. Senator Scavello's legislation
24 does not amend the law to end the existing
25 requirements.

1 Prior, the Board would issue final orders in which
2 they could declare that they were revoking a license
3 or denying an application under two types of
4 authority, both CHRIA and the law, that the Board was
5 created to enforce, which is the Barbers' License Law,
6 the Act of 1931. He also noted the Kirkpatrick
7 decision. The Commonwealth Court explained that the
8 Barbers' License Law does not give the Board authority
9 to deny or revoke a license based on a conviction
10 unless it is directly related to barbering.

11 Mr. Lynch suggested the Board start citing only
12 CHRIA because CHRIA permits the denial of licenses.
13 He urged the Board to write decisions which cite and
14 enforce the Barbers' License Law. He emphasized the
15 Board has the power to only deny or revoke licenses
16 for acts that are directly connected to barbering and
17 to focus their efforts on making sure that when people
18 are in barber chairs they are having their hair cut by
19 someone who is licensed and skilled to cut their hair
20 properly and safely. He discussed ensuring proper
21 reentry and reintegration into the economy by
22 individuals leaving state correctional institutions.]

23 ***

24 Report of Commissioner

25 [Ian J. Harlow, Commissioner of Professional and

1 Occupational Affairs, updated the Board on the (IT)
2 Information Technology infrastructure and (PALS)
3 Pennsylvania Licensing System. Commissioner Harlow
4 anticipated completion by the end of this calendar
5 year or January of next year. This \$2.5 million
6 project impacts all licensees across all Boards.

7 Commissioner Harlow welcomed two new Board
8 members.]

10 Report of Board Chairman

11 [John C. Christopher, Professional Member, Chairman,
12 updated the Board on legislation regarding the use of
13 barbershop poles strictly for barbershop designations
14 in Pennsylvania.]

15 ***

17 [Kelly I. Diller, Board Administrator, informed the
18 Board of new barber school licenses in Pottstown and
19 Lancaster and one relocation.]

6 total of 9,058.
