- 7 Report of Acting Commissioner
- 8 [K. Kalonji Johnson, Acting Commissioner, Bureau of
- 9 Professional and Occupational Affairs, announced that
- 10 | Governor Wolf signed House Bill 1172, which is now Act
- 11 41 of 2019, allowing Boards and Commissions of the
- 12 Commonwealth to provide provisional licenses and
- 13 license by endorsement to promote licensure
- 14 portability for those actively licensed in other
- 15 states.
- 16 Acting Commissioner Johnson commented that the
- 17 | bill was originally formulated to help military
- 18 | spouses who do not stay in one place long enough to
- 19 establish the necessary requirements. He stated
- 20 legislature wanted to promote workforce development
- 21 and promote portability. He noted that the bill does
- 22 | not supersede any of the existing Practice Acts and
- 23 does not require Boards to act outside the scope of
- 24 their authority. The bill was designed for the Boards
- 25 | that do not have the appropriate legislative authority

1 to now provide for a less burdensome way for folks to
2 gain the ability to employment.

Acting Commissioner Johnson stated the bill will become effective in 60 days but requires each Board to promulgate regulations.

Chair O'Neill commented that any drafting or preparing of regulations will be discussed in public session during the Board meeting for public input.]

Appointment - Prosecution Division Presentation

[Carolyn A. DeLaurentis, Esquire, Deputy Chief

Counsel, Prosecution Division, introduced herself and
provided a brief summary of her professional
background.

Ms. DeLaurentis provided information for the Cosmetology Board for FY 2018-2019, noting that 1,159 cases were opened; and as of July 1, 2019, there were 989 open cases. She also provided information on enforcement actions.

Ms. DeLaurentis stated the prosecution division has the ability to perform immediate temporary suspensions of a license if an immediate danger to the public health or safety is anticipated.

Ms. DeLaurentis noted there were 69 immediate temporary suspensions in the prosecution division in

1 FY 2018-2019, 11,359 open cases as of July 1, 2019, 2 and 13,270 closed files.

Ms. DeLaurentis addressed the Pennsylvania

Justice Network (JNET), where the prosecution division

receives an alert when licensees from all of the

Boards and Commissions are charged with a crime. She

noted that two administrative assistants process those

alerts to identify relevant arrests.

Ms. DeLaurentis discussed the Office of General Counsel's Mediation Program, which is free of charge, where a mediator is assigned to work with both sides to resolve the case.]

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14 Appointment - Office of General Counsel Mediation
15 Presentation

[Tara J. Smith, Esquire, Board Prosecutor, addressed the Office of General Counsel's Mediation Program, which is a free service available to all of the agencies that are serviced by OGC. She noted the setting to be informal, where respondents in the case present their arguments and point of views in hopes of reaching a resolution.

Ms. Smith commented that the cases move along quicker and also saves the Board money. She stated it will be noted in the consent agreement that the case

1 was resolved through mediation, but the Board still

2 has the right to reject or approve the agreement.]

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4 Licensees of Southeastern Pennsylvania Presentation 5 [Alan P. Novak, Esquire, Lamb McErlane PC,

6 representing licensees and salon operators from West

Chester in Delaware County, regarding variances. He

8 discussed regulations and imbalances that impact the

9 marketplace. He stated salon owners considered having

10 a MY SALON Suite but did not want to risk putting

11 money up front into building a plan. The owners then

12 asked for a variance to avoid the risk of losing that

13 | capital by not getting approved.

Mr. Novak questioned the Cosmetology Board's processes concerning variances. He used to be a zoning lawyer, where decisions are published and the facts on which those decisions were relied upon by the zoning Board are written as well. He commented that salon owners are familiar with the municipal regulatory and zoning area because as business owners they have to do that in getting approvals for their facilities. He stated a business person and owner can come before a township, borough, or city and present a plan and get some kind of preliminary read on whether that plan is going to be well received or not well

received.

2.

Ms. Walter referred to 49 Pa. Code § 7.76(a) regarding floor space, where it states that the Board, upon the applicant's request, may grant a variance from the space requirements concerning a salon which the Board believes is reasonable. She stated the minimum floor space for a salon is 180-square feet with a minimum width of 10 feet and then an additional area of at least 60 square for each additional licensee in the salon.

Ms. Walter explained that a salon owner can apply for a variance request if a salon, after it is complete and measured, does not meet the space requirements. She stated the Variance Committee has the authority granted by the Board to review those requests. She commented that the Variance Committee sends the request to the full Board for review in executive session because the Board is receiving legal advice. She mentioned the Right-to-Know Law Request, where any member of the public is free to submit and obtain the documents for specific applications.

Ms. Walter stated the Board looks at a variance request in terms of the deficiency, the placement of the equipment, and whether or not the salon could be operated in a safe manner given the deficiency. She

noted that the Board looks at each case individually and makes a decision based upon each individual salon.

2.

Mr. Novak suggested the Board publish decisions and applications online because the Right-to-Know Law Request is not very user-friendly.

Donald Moore, Calista Grand Salon & Spa, questioned the square footage requirements, noting that some of the salon suites are 110- to 120-square feet and expressed a safety concern. He intends to open up a salon suite concept but would like to know what the goalpost is regarding approval.

Ms. Walter again commented that 180-square feet is what the regulations require, but he would also have the opportunity to submit a variance request if the square footage is less than 180. She discussed what the Board looks for in terms of deficiencies.

Mr. Moore questioned the process of a salon owner submitting their own salon dimensions to get approved.

Ms. Walter explained that the Bureau of Enforcement and Investigation have the sketch upon inspection of a new salon, and if the salon does not meet the 180-square foot requirement and no variance has been granted, the salon will not pass inspection.

Mr. Moore requested Ms. Walter review a list of questions that he provided. Ms. Walter answered

questions on the list from Mr. Moore that included reasons a variance is granted, what is protocol for requesting a variance for less than 180-square foot requirement, and whether any variances had been granted.

Michaeline D'Annunzio, Owner, Platinum Hair
Salon, addressed concerns with a MY SALON Suite
dimensions. She also noted a concern regarding
recruiting of her staff to other salons. She stated
there is not a level playing field and questioned
whether a variance could be offered to stylists. She
noted a concern with no guidance from a salon owner or
an educator within the salon company to guide younger
people or inexperienced hairdressers with problems
with hair colors, straightening products, and
texturizing treatments.

Ms. D'Annunzio provided plans from the West Goshen building inspector, reflecting pictures of hallways that are not handicap accessible for a full spin around for someone who has an oversized wheelchair.

Ms. D'Annunzio referred 49 Pa. Code § 7.65 regarding booth rental space being strictly prohibited but questioned whether a variance is possible to be able to offer her employees the same deal as a suite

organization and still have a for-profit business.

2.

Ms. Walter commented on the nature of competition and business. She stated the Board does not enforce building codes and only enforces regulations. She stated the Board does prohibit booth rental through its regulation, and the Cosmetology Practice Act also prohibits booth rental that was enacted by the legislature. She noted that the Board does not have the authority to waive the enforcement of a statute, and suggested speaking to legislature regarding the booth rental prohibition.

Mr. Novak reviewed reasonable as set forth in the facts that can be reviewed by a Board to decide whether the facts not only constitute safety but are reasonable in the zoning world.

Ms. Walter noted that the Board has been consistent regarding granting variances and making sure the safety of the public is protected, whether a variance is granted or not. Ms. Walter also commented that the Board cannot pass judgement on those desiring to take a risk with a salon and can only determine whether or not it complies with the regulations or a variance.

Mr. Novak questioned what happens when the Board grants a variance and then that licensee transfers the

salon to another licensee. Ms. Walter explained that each new owner of a salon has to apply, provide their sketches, and submit a variance request if the square footage does not meet the requirements.

John D'Annunzio, Platinum Hair Salon, questioned whether the Board was comfortable with people asking for variances who quit other jobs and are risking their careers if the variance is not approved. He commented that it would be easier if everybody knew ahead of time whether a variance would be approved.

Ms. Walter noted that the Board cannot make preapproval decisions.

Frank J. Rizzo III, Esquire, representing Image Studios 360, stated their mission was to empower stylists and provide them the opportunity to have their own business by expediting the process. He mentioned that the business was primarily made up of women and minorities, and noted retaining talent can be accomplished by changing the compensation structure.]

- 10 Ms. Navarro mentioned that all owners register
- 11 | with the federal government by getting an employer
- 12 identification number, register with the state of
- 13 Pennsylvania through a limited liability company (LLC)
- 14 process, and register with their local government.
- 15 | She noted that all are legitimate business owners and
- 16 are paying taxes, essentially bolstering the economy
- 17 for the state of Pennsylvania.
- 18 Ms. Navarro stated this model allows people to
- 19 open a salon in a more cost-feasible way than opening
- 20 | up a larger space. She follows all of the same
- 21 compliance laws, the Americans with Disabilities Act
- 22 (ADA), and fire laws. She noted that all of the salon
- 23 owners are here because they believe in the spirit of
- 24 entrepreneurship and empowering others and assisting
- 25 | them on their journey of a small business owner.

Ms. Walter stated Pearson VUE wanted to know if Board members were agreeable with allowing an interpreter, at no cost to the Board, to accompany the

candidate and speak their native language for the purpose of getting them through the admissions process.

Ms. Diller commented that interpreters are available at the candidate's cost for testing purposes, but this discussion is certainly getting them in to take the exam.

Acting Commissioner Johnson stated the

Commonwealth was in the process of instituting

language access policy and guidelines. He noted that

the state employs Propio Language Services at no cost

to folks who are multilingual and English is not their

primary language or if there are difficulties in
