5 [Aaron Shenck, Executive Director, Pennsylvania 6 Association of Private School Administrators, stated 7 the association represents about 100 technical 8 colleges and postsecondary career schools across 9 Pennsylvania, including several dozen schools that

Mr. Shenck reported that online delivery tools have gotten more advanced and diversified and more technical and career schools are starting to use this technology, but cosmetology programs have lacked the legal authority to use online technologies in the commonwealth even though approximately half of their curriculum is theory-based and does not require any hands-on training.

Mr. Shenck addressed student education during COVID-19, noting programs like welding, construction, auto mechanics, aviation, nursing, and other careers fall under the State Board of Private Licensed Schools (PLS) in the Pennsylvania Department of Education. He mentioned the Pennsylvania Association of Private School Administrators (PAPSA) worked with the PLS

Board in the Department of Education and the administration who voted to give those programs new legal authorities to do as much education as they could online throughout the pandemic.

Mr. Shenck stated that barbering and cosmetology fall under the Department of State and not the Department of Education and were not given the same legal authority. PAPSA then contacted the Department of State and requested similar authority for barbering and cosmetology, which were given some online flexibility but was capped at 250 hours or 20%.

Mr. Shenck stated PAPSA again contacted the Department of State warning that the caps would run dry and indicated these programs could offer more hours, so the Governor granted the request of the Board of Barbering Examiners an increase to 50% online but not cosmetology programs.

Mr. Shenck commented that PAPSA disagreed with what they had been hearing, where the field of cosmetology was being treated differently than other higher education because cosmetologists are not assessed on practical skills. He noted the General Assembly unanimously passed Act 136 of 2014, which enacting the law requiring written examination for cosmetology license applicants to include both

1 questions on theory and questions on practical skills 2 in the state assessment.

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Mr. Shenck noted the importance of providing cosmetology schools with additional online hours during the pandemic and even after the pandemic. He requested the Board take action today to provide additional flexibility for schools and programs.

Debbie Dunn, Owner, Lancaster School of
Cosmetology/President, PASA Board of Directors, noted
PAPSA provided information to state Board staff
regarding what PAPSA schools have been doing to
effectively evaluate practical skills.

Ms. Dunn believes cosmetologist should also be permitted to do 120 hours of haircutting, hairstyling, and hairpieces via distance just like barbers. She questioned why, in the crossover curriculum, are licensed cosmetologists permitted to do 327 hours of 695 via distance education at a barbering school if, according to the current belief, that licensed cosmetologist never took a practical exam and may never have worked a day in a salon; yet they can do up to 50% of their barber curriculum via distance education.

Ms. Dunn commented that the regulation clearly states that 1000 hours of cosmetology skills includes

both cognitive and manipulative skills, noting that cognitive relates to the mental processes of perception, memory, judgment, and reasoning and not hands on. She believes it can be increased to 50% if it is written in the regulation that those 1000 hours

6 of cosmetology skills include both cognitive and

7 manipulative.

Ms. Dunn reported that some students are seeing this as discriminatory in a female-dominated cosmetology program. She requested the Board consider 50% via distance hybrid, especially during the pandemic.

Frank Schoeneman, Chairman/CEO, Empire Beauty Schools, stated Empire has 17 schools in the commonwealth and 20 schools in other states, noting it to be a travesty where barbering, a male-dominated profession, is allowed to have 625 of the 1250 hours virtually with essentially the same skill sets. He commented that the visuals are unacceptable, and it needs to be changed.

Mr. Schoeneman addressed the changed 25-30 years ago, where all schools in Pennsylvania within five years of operating had to become accredited because the Board had no ability to manage, inspect, and take care of what amounted to quality education standards.

Mr. Schoeneman commented that the state allowed accrediting commissions to become the compliance people for education and have never discussed it since. He reported accrediting agencies have all allowed at least 50% or more of cosmetology education to be online in 50 states.

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Mr. Schoeneman stated the 625, less 250 already approved at 20% of the program leaves 375 hours. He noted subjecting cosmetology students, who are primarily between the ages of 18-24 and female, to 59 days of public transportation to learn theory that could easily and effectively be learned at home during the pandemic.

Mr. Schoeneman addressed practical testing in Pennsylvania called a written practical test with approved by the Pennsylvania legislature, democrats, republicans, and signed by the governor. He commented that students have been blocked at 250 hours since March and pleaded with the Board to allow 625 hours of online theoretical education today.

Mark Fisch, father of a student at Monroe Career & Technical Institute, requested assistance from the Board to help his daughter and keep other kids on track in visualizing their dreams and seeing their dreams of becoming licensed come true by allowing them

additional distance hours.

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Vicky Haines, Cosmetology Instructor, Bethlehem Area Vocational-Technical School, commented that global partnership for education (GPE) schools are suffering. She expressed the need to take a serious look at this today to get the hours increased, so students do not have to pay any additional monies because of a pandemic due to not having the hours.

Karen Houshultz, Licensed Cosmetologist, Apple
Day Spa & Hair Restoration Salon, stated she is
hopeful the considerations will be taken and also
extended to the teachers' portion of cosmetology as
well.

Jacqueline Butcher-Jones, Technical College High School Pennock's Bridge Campus, noted experiencing the same problems as other schools, where students will run out of the ability to accrue hours, noting they will graduate and meet the Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE) requirements but not as far as cosmetology. She requested the Board increase hours for cosmetology students for both private and public schools.

Michael Stauffer, Ed.D., Director of Curriculum,
Instruction, and Assessment/East Campus Principal at
Berks Career & Technology Center, addressed the limit

- 24 business and holding them back is unfair because they
- 25 | would be able to take their studies online if they

were in a conventional college or university.

Ms. Folk suggested making it a Board recommendation that the policy be changed in order to help provide an education for those who are seeking more online hours.

Mr. Szabo agree with everyone and recommend the hours be changed to at least the barber industry.

Mary Lou Enoches, Owner, La Difference Salon &

Day Spa, agreed with changing the hours to get those

people educated and felt it to be discriminating.]

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Ms. Walter commented that she is unable to give a timeline on any action, and like all of the other waivers and guidance issued during the emergency declaration, it will be posted on the website.]

Ms. Walter referred to the proposed annex for 16A-4520 regarding fees. She stated the Bureau of Finance and Operations presented the Board's budget, which showed an increase in renewal fees was necessary. She provided a new fee structure, which increases the fees over three renewal cycles.

Danielle Slade, Licensed Cosmetologist and Educator, expressed concern with fee increases because her business has not returned to 100% and is bringing in less profit prior to March 2020.

Ms. Walter explained that the numbers were voted on and prepared by the Bureau of Finance and

16 package was first discussed with the Board in 2015 and

17 | involves the practice of massage therapy in

18 cosmetology or esthetician salons and required the

19 | State Board of Cosmetology and State Board of Massage

20 Therapists to jointly promulgate regulations regarding

21 standards.

Ms. Black referred to the draft of the proposed

23 regulation approved by the Cosmetology Board in March

24 2015 and the Massage Therapy Board in April 2015. She

25 provided an overview of the proposed sections, noting

Section 7.150 is new and sets forth the standards for practicing massage therapy within a salon. Subsection (a) sets forth conditions that must be met to practice massage therapy and would reiterate that massage therapists must be the owners of the salon or an employee and must comply with the Massage Therapy Law and corresponding regulation.

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Ms. Black noted the section clarifies that if a massage therapist is the owner of a salon that they are responsible for complying with other regulations of the Board pertaining to salon management as well as the Massage Therapy Law. The section further provides requirements for private massage therapy rooms to be used when the massage therapy practice exceeds the scope of cosmetology or esthetician practice.

Ms. Black stated that private rooms would be required to be 120-square feet and would be considered to be part of the licensed square footage of the salon and linens and other supplies used for massage services would be allowed to be stored in the private room or in the salon space designated by the salon owner.

Ms. Black stated the section would allow esthetician services to be provided in the private room as long as the said services were not provided at

the same time as massage therapy services.

Ms. Black stated Section (b) provides that a license would be subject to inspection by the Board and the Massage Therapy Board. Subsection (c) provides clarification that a licensee under this new section who violates this act or the Massage Therapy Law is subject to discipline by licensee's applicable licensing board. She commented that the two subsections put all licensees on notice of possible inspection, investigation, and disciplinary sanctions.

Michelle Grochalski, CEO/Esthetician, Foundation Skincare by Michelle, suggested changing owner of the spa to cosmetology or limited license owner to allow massage therapy to have it within the salon.

Ms. Black suggested that comments could be submitted to the Board once the annes is sent out for an exposure draft, but the Board would have to first adopt the annex.]

Ms. Walter explained that the Board and their team within the department are taking this seriously and considering everyone's comments made at the July meeting as well as all of the comments received via

email and telephone relating to facials.

Anna mentioned attending the July meeting, where the Board was going to contact the governor and asked whether there was any response. She expressed concern of losing her business, stating she is working in a retail environment and exposing herself to more dangers to pay rent on a business that has not been opened since February.

Anna questioned why the facial issue was not put on the meeting when so many estheticians have been without a job for 7 months. She noted not being able to qualify for the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) because she had a new business. She mentioned contacting her state representative but received no response. She suggested the Board help and fight for them.

Judith Padomi, Hand & Stone Massage and Facial

Spa, applauded the Board for help given to students this morning to achieve their career aspirations but asked for help for those who need to perform their career now as licensed professionals. She mentioned New Jersey, Delaware, Ohio, and New York have opened with enhanced protocols and safety procedures. She noted presenting protocols to the Board in hopes of receiving a date to resume services but believes anesthetists have been overlooked without guidance.

Mary Lou Enoches, Owner, La Difference Salon &
Day Spa, stated she is aware it is the governor's rule
but suggested the Board send something to the governor
to back these people. She also suggested facial
coverings made of Plexiglas, where the person is
completely covered and hands go under the shield.

Marc Farrell, Deputy Policy Director, Department of State, assured everyone that it is not a lack of reaching out to the governor on their part that is preventing anything from moving forward. He explained that removal of the mask is the primary issue. He encouraged everybody to contact the Governor's Office directly and to contact their legislators.

Ms. Houshultz noted contacting Representative

Jonathan Fritz and being in touch with the Governor's

Office, where the response received from emails sent

- 1 from her representative says that the Board of
- 2 Cosmetology has not updated their guidance for salons.

- 19 from our representative's office and the governor, the

- 24 answers communicate with each other for people to be
- 25 able to provide these services.

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Ms. Walter requested the emails be forwarded to the Board's resource account for her review.

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- Ms. Houshultz questioned whether the State Board of Cosmetology in the State of Pennsylvania believes and/or agrees with the fact that facials with the proper protocols should be acceptable and has it been proposed to the Governor's Office.
  - Ms. Walter stated all of the information received had been provided to the Governor's Office.
  - Ms. Houshultz informed the Board of an email stating that the Governor's Office said it is at the discretion of the State Board of Cosmetology.
- Ms. Walter requested the email be forwarded for her review.
  - Ms. Houshultz offered to provide Ms. Walter with the email. She also requested contact information to speak with someone personally other than continual email correspondence.
- Ms. Walter explained that the Board staff and administrator are doing their best to answer phone calls but are still, in a large part, working remotely.
- Hilary Sanchez, Owner, Bella De Salon, wanted to know who is making regulations for the beauty industry, noting health care workers on the front

lines of COVID-19 do not have certain regulations.

2.2

Ms. Walter provided an overview of the regulatory process.

Ms. Sanchez requested a list of who made the regulations and guidelines because she believes their industry is trained over and over on sanitation and does not understand why hospitals are not doing some of the things that are required of them.

Ms. Walter noted that guidance received from the Governor's Office and the Department of Health is being followed and will be posted on the website if that guidance changes. She commented that the governor has declared a state of emergency in Pennsylvania related to the pandemic, and the Board does not have the authority to override an executive order.

Karen Krall, Distributor/Educator, Danne'
Montague-King, questioned the background and
credentials of those who make the regulations.

Ms. Walter explained the regulation process, where all regulations that are drafted go before the Board and then the annex is published and members of the public from any individual expert or trade association has the ability to comment on the proposed regulation. She stated it then goes through the

regulatory process through the Independent Regulatory
Review Commission (IRRC) and then an 18-month process.

She noted this to be separate and apart from guidance.

2.0

Ms. Krall believes a lot of regulations are outdated and the state is behind. She noted a comment from the July meeting, where someone mentioned the State Board of Cosmetology is not here to represent them but to protect the public. She commented that any institution that is highly qualified keep their business highly professional but is currently unsure who is representing them.

Ms. Walter noted having email folders with comments and questions and the minutes. She stated the Board is doing their job to protect the citizens of Pennsylvania and taking licensee concerns to the appropriate individuals.

Tara Hepler, Medical Aesthetician/Laser

Technician, questioned why there could be disciplinary action for guidance. She noted many people performing facials in the Pittsburgh area all over social media.

Ms. Walter noted a link on the Department of
Health website, where an individual can make a
complaint that a business is not following the
Department of Health guidance and the Department of
State website if a business is acting contrary to the

| regulations.

Ms. Gustafson referred to the Pennsylvania

Department of Health website, noting the question,

"Do I have to wear a mask at the dentist?" "At a

medical appointment related to my nose?" The answer

is individuals obtaining a service, medical or

otherwise, involving the nose or face for which

temporary removal of the face covering is necessary to

perform the service are allowed to temporarily remove

their face covering to obtain the service.

Ms. Enoches explained that this is a COVID-19 mandate from the governor who was influenced by Dr. Levine. She noted trying to contact all different government officials and her own officials. She noted the state Board can only do so much, and it is impossible to reach Dr. Levine. She explained that people who are representatives under the governor will not go against him and will do no good.

Ms. Enoches recommended everyone contact Senator Mastriano, who will help, instead of attacking the Board. She also explained that whoever is providing information from the Governor's Office that it is the state Board's responsibility is wrong.

Ms. Walter will contact the Governor's Office tomorrow.

Anna mentioned prior discussion at last meeting regarding face shields and wanted to know if there was any response from the governor.

Ms. Walter noted the safety protocols and personal protective equipment (PPE) brought to the Board's attention at the last meeting was given to the Governor's Office.

Julie requested specific guidance regarding medical spas being allowed to perform facials and not regular spas.

Ms. Walter explained that the statute and regulations require esthetician services for cosmetology for compensation be performed in a licensed salon. She commented that complaints can be filed on the Board's website against estheticians performing services in a salon not licensed by the Board.

Ms. Enoches commented that many spas are governed under the medical Board.

Ms. Haywood believes there is no representation for estheticians. She reported and investigation taking place in her business while clients were present for waxing services, noting that people are on edge and then investigators come in during COVID-19 due to guidelines, which are causing people to lose

their business. She noted the need for a united front on the protocols. She also noted having a license in Georgia and Pennsylvania, commenting that Pennsylvania is behind.

Ms. Haywood reported a demographic of people who are experiencing heightened skin care issues because of the mask mandate, and estheticians are being told as healers not to do what they are licensed to do because of guidance being enforced.

Judith Padomi, Hand & Stone Massage and Facial Spa, addressed HydraFacial/Dermalinfusion (Silk Peel). She commented that Virginia has the same mask mandate as Pennsylvania but are allowing anything on a long wand to be used underneath the mask without removal of the mask, including HydraFacial and Dermalinfusion.

Ms. Walter believes the guidance specifically says no facial treatment but could add the different technique to the information being provide today.

Ms. Gustafson, requested clarification for an esthetician's ability to provide an esthetic service on the back and decollete area.

Ms. Walter read the definition of "esthetics."

She noted that she is unable to provide a direct

answer to anything beyond the definition because she

is not permitted to provide members of the public with
